The New York Jets take great pride in a long-standing, year-round commitment to our community. Programs funded by the New York Jets Foundation look to positively influence the lives of young men and women in the tri-state area by supporting youth football and promoting social justice, particularly in disadvantaged communities.

From launching football teams at urban high schools to unifying our community for change to fostering positive school environments, the New York Jets invest in programs that make a difference in the lives of others. In addition to our focus on youth development, the Jets support the efforts of the Lupus Research Alliance, numerous established charitable organizations and causes sponsored by the NFL.

JETS PLAY FOOTBALL

The New York Jets are committed to growing the game of football, removing barriers of access, and improving safety through a comprehensive outreach program designed to provide opportunities for underserved communities to play football.

FLAG FOOTBALL

The Jets fund and create thousands of flag football opportunities for children ages 5-18 to enjoy America's favorite sport. Players benefit by being physically active through non-contact, continuous action while learning the fundamentals of football, lessons in teamwork, and sportsmanship.



In February 2021, in accordance with the 35th National Girls and Women in Sports Day, the Jets and Nike announced the creation of a High School Girls Flag Football league in New Jersey. The long-term goal of this league is to have the sport recognized as an official high school statewide championship sport. In Spring 2022, the Jets High School Girls Flag Football League expanded in New Jersey and onto Long Island. The Jets doubled their number of teams in the North Jersey Super Football Conference (NJSFC), while launching leagues in the Big Central Football Conference (BCC), North Jersey Interscholastic Conference (NJIC), Section VIII and Section XI. In its second season, there were over forty (40) schools in five (5) leagues throughout NJ and NY. The Jets provided all participating schools with grant funding, uniforms, and equipment. The season culminated on Saturday, June 4th at the Atlantic Health Jets Training Center, as the Jets hosted the Long Island Finals, as well as the NJ State semifinals and finals.

In 2021, the New York Jets supported the New York City Police Athletic League (PAL) to operate an NFL FLAG Football program powered by Reigning Champs Experiences. Through funding provided by the Jets Foundation, over 1,000 New York City youth have the opportunity to play flag football at no cost. All participants are given a free Jets NFL FLAG Football jersey and teams are coached by police officers from the neighborhood.

Each year the Jets provide \$50,000 to support the Public Schools Athletic League (PSAL) Girls Varsity Flag Football League. The league created in 2011 by the PSAL and Jets has grown from 19 teams to now almost 60 schools participating. In 2022, the Jets will host the winning team at MetLife Stadium during their Play Football themed game on Monday, August 22nd vs. the Atlanta Falcons. The team will be honored on-field pregame and receive customized championship rings courtesy of the Jets.

Since 2007, the Jets have provided annual funding for the expansion of CHAMPS Middle School Flag Football League to more than 3,000 students at over 100 programs throughout the New York City public school system. The CHAMPS Middle School Sports and Fitness League is an initiative of the New York City Department of Education that promotes student physical activity during the critical years of middle school. The name CHAMPS derives from the initials of the five characteristics that describe our participants: Cooperative, Healthy, Active, Motivated and Positive Students. PUBLIC SCHOOLS ATHLETIC LEAGUE

In 2001, the New York Jets formed a community partnership with the Public Schools Athletic League (PSAL) to provide support to New York City public school football programs. Through an annual matching grant from the NFL's Youth Football Fund, the New York Jets now donate \$100,000 to the PSAL's football programs. The funding offsets the cost of reconditioning every student-athletes' helmet and has helped to create 15 new and developmental football teams. Beyond these grants, the Jets support the PSAL in a variety of other ways including honoring the PSAL football champions at a home game during the NFL season.



NEW YORK JETS 11-ON TOURNAMENT



Annually, the Jets and Nike host a 48-team high school 11-ON football tournament. In 2022, the event returned to the Atlantic Health Jets Training Center for three days in July and was comprised of both a traditional 7on7 tournament, as well as a linemen challenge. The tournament is free of charge to all schools and participants receive a complimentary pair of Jets branded shorts and Gatorade product, courtesy of the Jets, Nike and Gatorade. The 7on7 and linemen challenge champions are invited to a Jets home game and honored on-field prior to kickoff. Information for the 11-ON Tournament is made available in early spring. HIGH SCHOOL COACH OF THE WEEK

For 10 weeks during the football season, the Jets present the High School Coach of the Week award to a coach in the tri-state area. This coach serves the best interests of the game through the teaching of sound football fundamentals, the motivation of young players to achieve, and the promotion of youth football by way of dedication to their community, school, and student-athletes. The Jets award each winner with a \$1,000 check for their high school's football program. In addition to the weekly award, a Coach of the Year is selected at the end of the high school season and awarded \$2,000. All winners are honored on-field during a Jets regular season home game.

INSPIRE CHANGE

As part of the New York Jets social justice, inclusion, and diversity efforts, the Jets annually support five partner organizations with the goal of reducing barriers and creating opportunities for individuals in need. These organizations - All Stars Project, Innocence Project, New York Urban League, STOMP Out Bullying, and Year Up - each receive critical funding and resources from the Jets to further their missions. Additionally, New York Jets players, coaches, and staff volunteer their time and expertise on various projects with each organization.

In August of 2020, the Jets Social Justice, Diversity and Inclusion Team (SJDIT) was formed to represent and help steer the entire organization as it relates to the process and execution of the club's social justice efforts as well as internal diversity and inclusion practices. The group is comprised of employees from across business and football staffs, each serving a 1-year term, that meet regularly to evaluate and provide feedback on issues surrounding the organization as well as the team's social justice outreach. The SJDIT, along with club ownership, senior executives, and player leadership, identified four focus areas in which to make an impact: poverty, race equality, diversity and inclusion, criminal justice reform, police-community relations, access to education, and healthcare.

Members of the New York Jets staff have volunteered their time to work with each partner organization in different capacities. Volunteer opportunities include mentorship with students from Year Up and Urban League, a listen and learn with Innocence Project, and Operation Conversation with All Stars Project. These opportunities have allowed staff members to be involved and enact change within the community.

LUPUS RESEARCH ALLIANCE



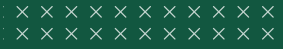
The New York Jets organization is deeply committed to supporting the Lupus Research Alliance, a voluntary health organization co-founded by Robert Wood Johnson IV - a member of the founding family of Johnson & Johnson, and chairman of the New York Jets. The Lupus Research Alliance's mission is to improve treatments while advancing research toward a cure for systemic lupus erythematosus (SLE, or lupus), a debilitating autoimmune disease. As the world's leading private funder of lupus research, the Lupus Research Alliance has supported the most promising lupus biomedical research leading to key discoveries that are improving diagnosis and treatment, while helping scientists find mechanisms that will ultimately, prevent and cure the disease. The organization has committed \$220+ million to more than 500 lupus research projects at the most prestigious universities, medical schools, and hospitals throughout the world. The Lupus Research Alliance believes that scientific research is the most powerful way we can improve the lives of people living with lupus today and over the long term. By pushing the limits of scientific exploration and shepherding new discoveries into potential treatments, we seize every opportunity that will help ease the burden of people living with this difficult disease. To accomplish this goal, the Board of Directors covers all administrative and fundraising costs of the organization, ensuring that 100% of all donations go directly to funding research programs to realize our vision of a world free of lupus.

SALUTE TO SERVICE

Salute to Service is the Jets and League’s year-round effort to Honor, Empower and Connect with our nation’s service members, veterans and their families. Salute to Service is highlighted in NFL games during Weeks 10 - 12, where the Jets traditionally give complimentary tickets to service members, host an enlistment ceremony, display a military themed National Anthem and donate proceeds from the 50/50 raffle to the Stephen Siller Tunnel to Towers Foundation smart home program for disabled veterans. Additionally, the Jets recognize and celebrate First Responders at a selected regular season home game. Workers from local hospitals, fire departments and police stations are honored throughout the game and integrated into the game presentation.



SALUTE TO SERVICE

SOLDIERS TO SIDELINES

The New York Jets have pledged their ongoing support to Soldiers To Sidelines to develop service members and veterans to become excellent coaches and connect them to teams in their communities. During the week leading up to the Jets Salute to Service Game, the team will host a New York Jets Virtual Football Coaching Certification Seminar for over 100 participants. Then prior to the game, the Jets will host over 30 of these participants in-person for a full day of strategic coaching seminars and classes.. Over the course of the program, they will learn the process of becoming a football coach. All participants will earn coaching certificates following the seminar. The Soldier Coaches will be armed with coaching knowledge and techniques along with connections to the athletic community. Soldiers to Sidelines is a non-profit organization who believes that our service members can have a meaningful and lasting impact on others through athletics.



UNITED WAY

Since 1973, United Way, the NFL, and the New York Jets have had the most visible and longest-running charitable collaboration of its kind. Every year, thanks to community service projects and public service announcements, millions of Americans learn about United Way's vital work and the volunteer spirit of the NFL.

Combining their rich histories of active community involvement, United Way of New York City, United Way of Northern New Jersey, United Way of Essex and West Hudson, and the New York Jets have teamed up to drive home the importance of community involvement. Their community outreach efforts include the Hometown Huddle, an annual hands-on volunteer project with players, the Gridiron Gala, New York City's premier charity event, Character Playbook, an innovative digital learning experience that uses evidence-based strategies to educate students on how to cultivate and maintain healthy relationships during their critical middle school years, and Tix for Kids, a charitable ticket turn-back program for season ticket holders.

The New York Jets implement Tix For Kids with the United Way of New York City. The charitable ticket distribution program was created in 2003 to give season ticket holders an opportunity to donate their tickets to underprivileged children. This program allows numerous children to experience the excitement of the NFL first-hand as many of them have never attended a professional football game.

United Way of New York City makes these donated tickets available to children and youth participating in their programs via community-based organizations throughout New York City, including Children's Aid Society, East Side House, Good Shepherd Services, Partnership with Children, Sports & Arts in Schools Foundation, and many others.

PLAY 60 FOOTBALL PROGRAM



PLAY:60

The New York Jets have taken a stance in the fight against childhood obesity through fitness and nutrition programs under the Jets PLAY 60 platform, which encourages children to get 60 minutes of activity every day.

The Jets PLAY 60 Flag Football Program encompasses 6th Grade students from local middle schools where the Jets provided flag belts, jerseys and footballs to operate a flag football unit. All participating schools, Chatham Middle School, Frelinghuysen Middle School, Harding Middle School, LC Johnson Middle School, Madison Jr. School, Memorial Junior School, Ridgedale Middle School, and St. Vincent The Martyr School encouraged students to participate in at least 60 minutes of physical activity every day while learning the game of football. As a culmination, each school will compete in a tournament at the Atlantic Health Jets Training Center. Two students from each participating school will receive tickets to the Jets home game on Sunday, November 27th vs. the Chicago Bears.



FUEL UP TO PLAY 60 HOMETOWN GRANTS

Through the Fuel Up to PLAY 60 program, the New York Jets and American Dairy Association Northeast are offering two \$5,000 Hometown Grants to eligible schools in Nassau County and Suffolk County that best showcase how their students stay active for 60 minutes per day, as well as provide increased access to school breakfast and ensure their students are fueled to learn. Grants will be awarded to one school in each county to help facilitate sustainable physical activity and eating improvements. Schools not already enrolled in the Fuel Up to PLAY 60 program can enroll at www.fueluptoplay60.com and email Kristina Moher at KMoher@milk4u.org for the online grant application. Fuel Up to Play 60 is an in-school nutrition and physical activity program launched by National Dairy Council and National Football League, with additional support from the US Department of Agriculture. The program encourages youth to consume nutrient-rich foods and achieve at least 60 minutes of physical activity every day. Proper nutrition and consistent physical activity are both necessities for maintaining a healthy child.

HOMETOWN HUDDLE

The Jets and United Way's Hometown Huddle is an annual service project that provides the Jets Women's Organization and Jets rookie class the opportunity to participate in a community service project together. Each year, the Jets Hometown Huddle consists of building a Jets PLAY 60 fitness zone in New Jersey. Last year's recipient was Head Start of Morris County. Since 2008, the New York Jets have donated over \$1,054,000 to complete fifteen PLAY 60 Fitness Zones.

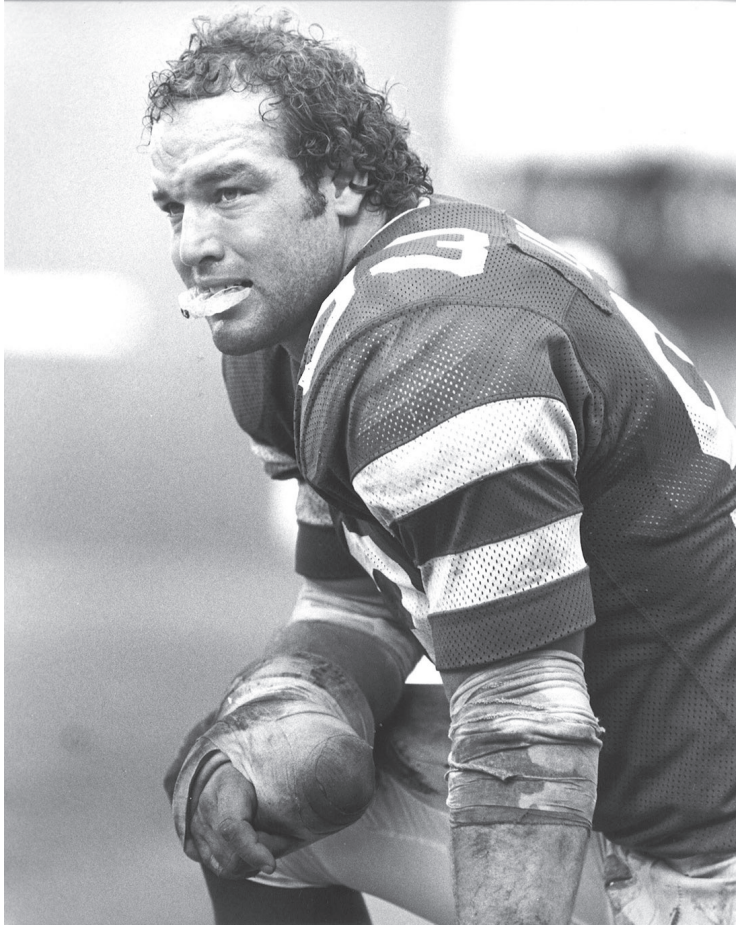

COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD

Named after 2013 Ring of Honor inductee, Marty Lyons, the Marty Lyons Award is presented each year to a New York Jets player that gives from the heart through charity and community involvement (as voted by Jets staff). Lyons played the entirety of his 12-year NFL career with the New York Jets as a member of the feared "Sack Exchange." In 1984, Lyons was named the National Football League's Man of the Year and in 1990 the New York Jets renamed their Outstanding Community Service Award because of Lyons' commitment to the community.

MAN OF THE YEAR

Since 1970, the NFL has awarded the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year award to recognize a player's off-the-field community service, as well as his playing excellence. The Jets award winner will receive \$50,000 to donate to the 501(c)(3) organization of his choice. The team's recipient is eligible to win the national Walter Payton Man of the Year Award and be recognized at a press conference during Super Bowl Week. The national winner will receive \$500,000 to donate to the 501(c)(3) organization of his choice. The Jets have had two national winners, Marty Lyons in 1984 and Boomer Esiason in 1995.

ATLANTIC HEALTH JETS TRAINING CENTER

Located at **ONE JETS DRIVE** in Florham Park, New Jersey, the Atlantic Health Jets Training Center has been the headquarters of the Jets since its official ribbon cutting on September 2, 2008. Designed by Skidmore Owings + Merrill, the 224,000 square-foot complex sits on nearly 100 acres of open space and provides players, coaches, and staff with a best-in-class facility to learn, practice, and work within 30 minutes of both MetLife Stadium and Newark Liberty International Airport.



UNDER THE SAME ROOF

Prior to the opening of the Atlantic Health Jets Training Center, the team's operations were split between two locations. Located on the campus of Hofstra University, Weeb Ewbank Hall housed the players, coaches and football support staff, while the business operations were located in New York City.

In the creation of the new facility, Chairman Woody Johnson looked to unite all elements of the franchise under one roof. In the Atlantic Health Jets Training Center, the organization now has a building that seamlessly combines the operations of both the football and business departments. Equipped with open-concept workstations and state-of-the-art technology to create an efficient and friendly work environment, the training center was a major contributing factor in the team being named one of Inc. Magazine's Top Small Company Workplaces in 2010. An outdoor terrace, which overlooks the practice fields, provides a business entertainment area for both the team and its corporate partners.



FOOTBALL FACILITIES

Featuring state-of-the-art training and medical facilities that combine the latest advances in rehabilitation pools, high-performance equipment, and nutrition, the Atlantic Health Jets Training Center also has five full-size football fields: three natural grass, two Sportexe synthetic turf fields, one outdoors, and another indoors in the Field House, each with a permanent scoreboard. Additionally, the goalposts on two of the natural grass fields can be repositioned 90 degrees to help minimize some of the wear throughout the season. With a first floor that is all football, the facility houses a 5,500-square-foot locker room, an 11,000-square-foot weight room and a 10,000-square-foot cafeteria.

As a "graduate school for football" - an element that was important in the design of the building - the Atlantic Health Jets Training Center has more than 25,000 square feet of space dedicated to classrooms and instruction space, including 10 classrooms. The classrooms also provide direct access to both the indoor and outdoor practice field, allowing for seamless transition between classroom and practice.

With a relationship that began in 2006, the New York Jets and Atlantic Health Systems agreed on a 12-year naming deal for the new facility in 2007. The agreement was renewed by both parties in 2018, lasting until 2029.

TRAINING CAMP

For the sixth consecutive year, the New York Jets will host training camp at the Atlantic Health Jets Training Center, in addition to all team mini-camps and organized team activities.

From 2017-21, with the exception of closed practices in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the facility has welcomed over 30,000 Jets fans to camp. Fans are able to take advantage of bleachers for enhanced viewing, a shuttle service to and from the parking lot, water and sunscreen stations close to the field, cooling zones and a fan zone fully equipped with family-friendly activities. Additionally, Jets Fest, a training camp tradition since 1997, returns this year featuring kids activities and experiences, the Jets Shop merchandise tent, interactive games, photo opportunities, music, and a concession with food and beverage for purchase. Admission and parking are free.



METLIFE STADIUM is the home of the New York Jets and is one of the largest stadiums in the NFL. The venue has hosted nearly 600 major events and over 2,800 special events. Event highlights include the first outdoor, cold-weather Super Bowl XLVIII, WrestleMania 29 and 35, Army-Navy Football Game, the Copa America Centenario Soccer Final and many concerts, college and high school football games, and international soccer matches. MetLife Stadium was recently named an official match venue and New York/New Jersey an official Host City for the 2026 FIFA World Cup. MetLife Stadium has earned numerous honors including “Stadium of the Decade” and 9-time “Highest Grossing Stadium of the Year” by Billboard and “2017 Venue of the Year” by StadiumBusiness.

MetLife Stadium bleeds green on Jets game days and offers fans a wide array of options for entertainment and tailgating before the game. Fans can catch the ESPN New York - 98.7FM pregame radio show broadcast live from the west plaza, head to the Kids Zone for family-fun activities and enjoy a vast array of food and beverages on the Stadium’s multiple concourses. Fans can also find the latest gear at the team’s 10,000 square-foot flagship plaza store. The intimate seating bowl, uncompromised sight lines, video boards, LED signage, and sound system all enhance the game-watching experience.

In 2021, MetLife Stadium became the first NFL stadium to join the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change’s Sports for Climate Action Framework, which aims to achieve global greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions reductions goals.

MetLife Stadium was the first NFL stadium to receive SAFETY Act certification by the US Department of Homeland Security in 2013 and has ranked No. 1 for Safety by Security magazine’s “Security 500” in the Spectator Sports Facility division for 9 straight years (2013-21). MetLife Stadium also received the Facility of Merit for Safety and Security Award (nominated by the NFL) twice from the National Center for Spectator Sports Safety and Security (NCS4) at The University of Southern Mississippi.

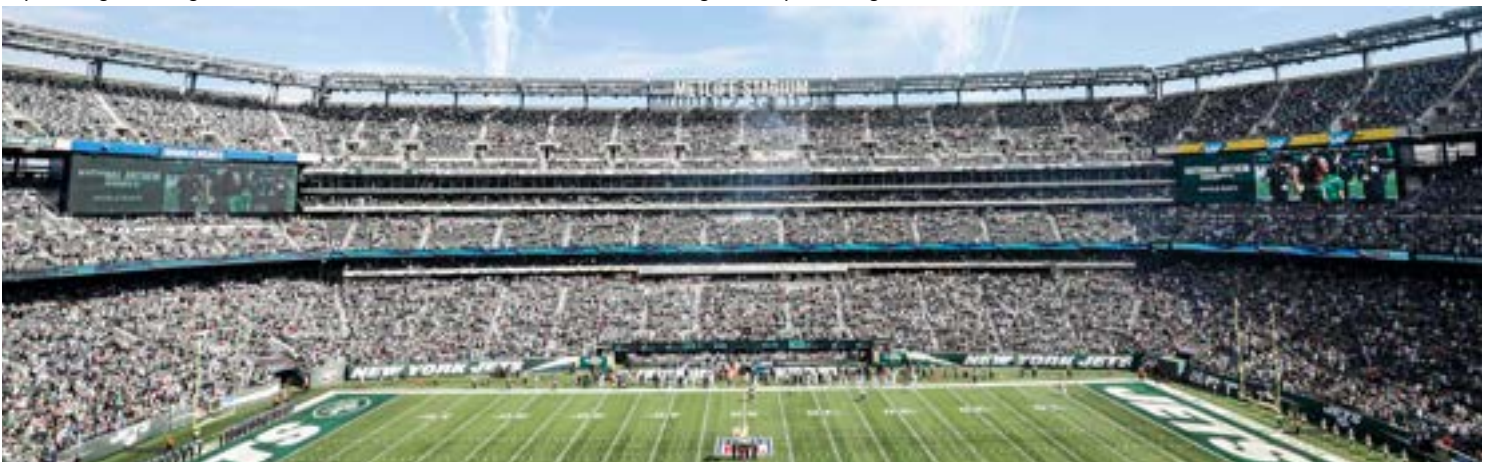

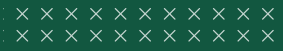

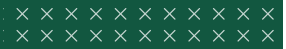

EXECUTIVE STAFF



ROBERT WOOD JOHNSON

CHAIRMAN



ROBERT WOOD JOHNSON, a member of the founding family of Johnson & Johnson, has built upon his family’s proud legacy of achievement as a successful businessman, compassionate philanthropist, civic leader, and diplomat.

Upon purchasing the team in 2000, Johnson established his commitment to a culture of success built on three key elements: passionate players, supportive fans, and a new stadium. Under his leadership, the Jets entered their new home field, MetLife Stadium, an award-winning arena that has been ranked as the #1 highest grossing venue in the world and most recently recognized by Billboard as stadium of the decade. He also moved the Jets into the Atlantic Health Jets Training Center, a world-class 224,000 square-foot complex that united the entire organization, and provided the perfect facility for everyone—players, coaches, and staff—to continually improve and excel.

In 2017, Johnson was appointed the U.S. Ambassador to the United Kingdom. As ambassador, he strengthened the ‘Special Relationship’ between the US and the UK, by promoting security and economic prosperity over a range of issues from trade to cyber security policies. While in London, the Ambassador resided in the historic Winfield House, receiving world leaders including Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and on multiple occasions, President Donald Trump. Ambassador Johnson led the relocation of over 1,000 employees from the Embassy’s historic location at Grosvenor Square to a new state of the art headquarters at Nine Elms. When the pandemic struck London, he then directed those employees in the remote, effective and efficient operation of the Embassy to continue to serve and promote the United States’ interests in the United Kingdom. Throughout his tenure at the Embassy, Ambassador Johnson engaged with government leaders and the British people, traveling extensively throughout the United Kingdom and Northern Ireland to hear local concerns and emphasize the ‘Special Relationship.’

Beyond the field, Ambassador Johnson’s philosophy of a successful team celebrates the crucial role of fans, as well as the significant role the team plays in the community. In this spirit, the team, through the New York Jets Foundation, positively influences the lives of young people in the area by expanding youth football, preventing bullying, and promoting social justice, particularly in disadvantaged communities.

Among the Foundation’s programs is the launch of the first Girls High School Flag Football League in New Jersey.

In 2022, the Jets announced a \$1 million donation to help aid the people of Ukraine, with the money distributed among various organizations, each receiving \$100,000, over the course of a year. For Johnson, the events in Ukraine are personal; his wife, Suzanne, grew up in a Ukrainian neighborhood in New York. Her mother, Marie, was born to Ukrainian immigrant parents while Suzanne’s father, Stefan Ircha, was originally from Ternopil, a town outside of Kyiv, and immigrated to the United States after WWII. The Johnson family recently traveled to Poland to meet with Ukrainian refugees and understand firsthand how the unprovoked invasion has impacted their lives.

Chief among Ambassador Johnson’s healthcare initiatives is the support for lupus research. In 1999, he founded the Alliance for Lupus Research (now the Lupus Research Alliance). This was the first organization devoted exclusively to finding new methods to prevent, treat, and ultimately cure lupus. Thanks to his leadership, the organization has dedicated more than \$214 million for research grants and achieved the major milestone of funding research which set the stage for the recent FDA approval of two new treatments for this autoimmune disease.

Over many years, Ambassador Johnson has been active in philanthropy and civic affairs, including past roles as an Honorary Trustee of the Wildlife Conservation Society and a past board member of the National September 11 Memorial & Museum at the World Trade Center and the Peregrine Fund. The Ambassador also served as a Trustee and a Trustee Emeritus of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, the nation’s largest philanthropic organization devoted exclusively to promoting health and healthcare for Americans. Currently, the Ambassador is an active member of the NFL’s Investment Committee and Stadium Committee.

CHRISTOPHER W. JOHNSON

VICE CHAIRMAN



CHRISTOPHER WOLD JOHNSON, a fourth-generation member of the founding family of Johnson & Johnson, has overseen pivotal changes within the organization, appointing the team’s football and business management. A key part of the New York Jets leadership since 2000, Johnson begins his second season as vice chairman, working alongside his brother, Chairman Robert Wood Johnson.

In his new role, Johnson will provide continuity after overseeing the promotion of team President Hymie Elhai, and the hiring of General Manager Joe Douglas and Head Coach Robert Saleh in his time as chairman & CEO. In these three, Johnson is confident he found collaborative leaders who will unify the Jets in their shared goal of a sustained, winning franchise.

Previously serving as the Jets chairman & CEO (2017-21), Johnson has spent the past four years developing a strong bond with the players, working closely with them to advance the programs and initiatives they deem important. In 2020, Johnson addressed the team and discussed how they all—Johnson, coaches, executives, and players—could use their powerful platform to influence positive change.

To support this goal, Johnson and the Jets donated \$1 million to four partner organizations in December of 2020, with each organization—All Stars Project, Innocence Project, New York Urban League and Year Up—receiving \$250,000. These organizations mirror the Jets’ and Johnson’s focus on education, community/police relations, criminal justice reform, as well as other initiatives, including reducing poverty, racial equality, and workforce development. The players, coaches and staff will continue to work to reduce barriers and create opportunities for individuals in need on various upcoming volunteer projects championed by the organization.

As part of the response to the COVID-19 pandemic, Johnson, his family, and the Jets donated \$3 million to support those in need in the New York and New Jersey areas. In March of 2020, they pledged \$1 million to support the United Way of New York City’s COVID-19 Community Fund, the United Way of Northern New Jersey’s ALICE Recovery Fund and the United Way of Long Island’s United Together: A Response Fund for COVID-19. A month later, they donated \$2 million to organizations focused primarily on food insecurity, first responders and regional relief.

Johnson currently serves as an active member of the NFL’s Media Owned and Operated committee.

A dedicated advocate of autism research and awareness, Johnson works closely with the Johnson Center for Child Health & Development. Named for his mother, the late Betty Wold Johnson, the Center aims to advance the understanding of childhood development through clinical care, research and education, as well as raise awareness on Autism Spectrum Disorder and identify medical research to unlock better treatments for children and young adults affected by this condition.

Johnson is also active in various educational endeavors and local philanthropy, supporting a range of initiatives, including charter school construction, as well as encouraging public discourse and exchange of ideas through debating societies.

HYMIE ELHAI

PRESIDENT



HYMIE ELHAI (pronounced *HI-me EL-hi*) begins his fourth season as the president of the New York Jets after his appointment in 2019. Now in his 23rd year with the team, Elhai’s impact has been felt throughout the organization and been defined by his unwavering commitment, a passionate goal to redefine the culture of the organization, and a steady hand of leadership and strategic planning.

Under Elhai, who has garnered league and industry respect by his peers during his tenure, the Jets have solidified their business staff’s senior leadership, as he oversees all team business operations, bringing his balance and perspective to those various departments, including: Communications, Community Relations, Content, Corporate & Premium Partnerships, Events & Game Operations, Facilities, Finance, Information Technology, Legal & Human Resources, Marketing, Security and Ticketing.

Playing a key role in hiring of the football leadership, Elhai worked with Christopher W. Johnson to hire General Manager Joe Douglas in 2019, and with both Johnson and Douglas to hire Head Coach Robert Saleh in 2021.

The collaboration among Elhai, Douglas and Saleh forms the foundation that has moved the Jets toward their goal of being a sustained, winning, and innovative franchise on and off the field. Throughout his time as president, he has worked closely with the football staff, providing counsel and support for various organizational-encompassing objectives. Additionally, in his previous role as general counsel, he helped football administration on all planning initiatives.

Among the important initiatives under Elhai was the formation of the Social Justice, Diversity and Inclusion Team (SJDIT) and the expansion of the Jets Women’s Organization (JWO).

The SJDIT helps steer the Jets as it relates to the process and execution of the team’s Social Justice efforts as well as internal diversity and inclusion practices. The JWO now encompasses the many women affiliated with the organization, including staff members, wives and significant others of coaches, players, and football personnel, serving as a unique outlet to positively impact the workplace, industry, and community.

During the COVID-19 outbreak, Elhai and his staff worked closely with New Jersey Governor Phil Murphy’s office and the NFL, as the team developed their protocols. Prioritizing employee safety, his communication and direction helped manage the unprecedented uncertainty of a global pandemic, keeping the business staff optimized despite working remotely.

Elhai, who was born in Queens, NY and grew up a Jets fan often frequenting games at Shea Stadium, began his Jets career in 2000 as an intern. He previously served as the club’s senior vice president, business affairs and general counsel, where he was responsible for all legal aspects of the team, including sponsorship, licensing, event, digital media, production and broadcasting agreements, and all employment related matters.

Elhai currently serves as a member of the NFL’s CBA player benefits plan committee.

In October 2021, Elhai received the Distinguished Alumni Award from Rutgers School of Law at their 2021 Alumni Recognition Gala.

A Sports Business Journal Forty Under 40 honoree, Elhai is a graduate of Rutgers Law School and The Johns Hopkins University, where he played football and baseball. Elhai resides in Hoboken, NJ.

EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT & CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER



BRIAN FRIEDMAN now in his 13th year with the New York Jets, begins his fourth season as the team's executive vice president & chief operating officer. Previously, Friedman spent nine seasons with the team as their chief financial officer.

Friedman is responsible for the implementation of business operations that are aligned with the team's short-term and long-term business goals. This includes current revenue generation, fan focused initiatives and other strategic growth opportunities for the team and MetLife Stadium. He has oversight of the team's gameday and non-gameday event operations and key vendor relationships. In addition, he oversees information technology, fan commerce and practice facility operations.

Additionally, Friedman oversees all financial aspects of the organization, including business and strategic planning, budgeting, business analytics and financial oversight of the team's interests in MetLife Stadium. ERIC GELFAND now in his seventh season with the New York Jets, is the team's senior vice president, communications and content. Gelfand, having nearly 30 years of experience as a communications brand strategist for some of the most notable sports, media and entertainment properties, is responsible for the strategic development and execution of all team communication strategies, its digital, social and broadcast platforms and relationships, and the organization's multi-faceted community relations programs.

During his tenure in the organization, Gelfand has synergistically aligned the three departments (communication, content and community relations) to maximize their effectiveness, both internally and externally, while simultaneously implementing key new initiatives and content that have helped to increase the team's profile, both on and off-the-field and led to industry recognition and multiple awards, including 67 Emmy nominations and 34 from other organizations such as Cynopsis, Communicator and the Webby's.

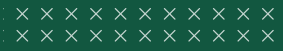

He also helped to guide the creation of the Jets and Nike Girl's Flag Football League in 2021 and the expansion of the league in 2022 from 8 to 43 teams spanning New Jersey and Long Island.

Prior to joining the Jets, Gelfand was the senior vice president of communications and brand strategy for Legends, the venue-solution company co-owned by the New York Yankees and Dallas Cowboys. While there, he was responsible for the development and execution of Legends' communications, public relations, brand strategy and creative services across all of the company's divisions. Prior to joining Legends, he served as the senior vice president, communications for SCP Worldwide, where he was responsible for the strategic media positioning and branding for its holdings, including the St. Louis Blues and Real Salt Lake, while also serving as the primary spokesperson for the company. SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, COMMERCIAL TICKETING, PREMIUM PARTNERSHIPS & MARKETING



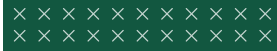

VICE PRESIDENT, BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT + VENTURES

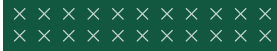

VICE PRESIDENT, TICKET SALES & SERVICE

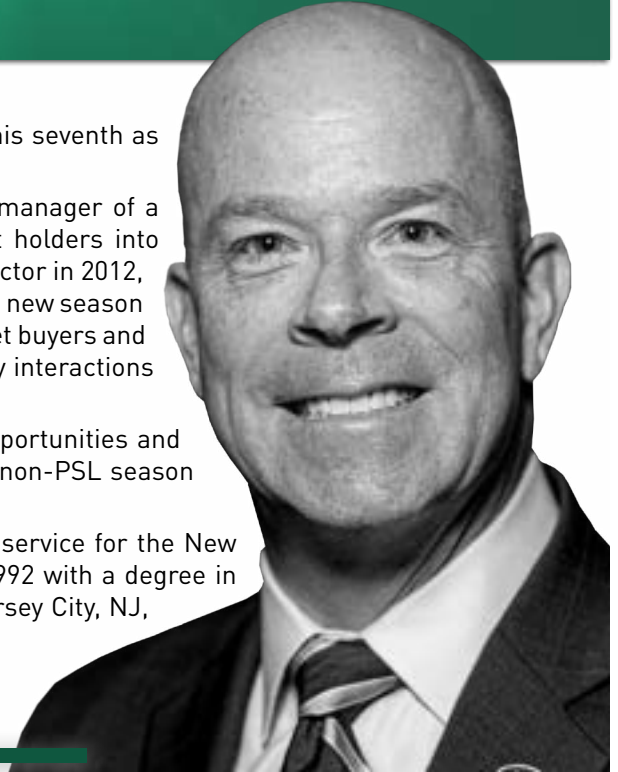


LARRY FITZPATRICK, now in his 14th year with the New York Jets, begins his seventh as vice president, ticket sales and service.

VICE PRESIDENT, TICKET OPERATIONS



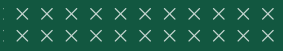

VICE PRESIDENT, SECURITY & FACILITIES OPERATIONS



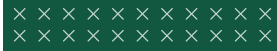

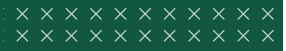

VICE PRESIDENT, PREMIUM PARTNERSHIPS



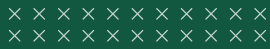

GENERAL MANAGER

JOE DOUGLAS begins his fourth season as general manager of the New York Jets after being named to the position in June of 2019. Now in his 23rd season in the National Football League, Douglas, a three-time Super Bowl winning executive, continues to put his stamp on the organization.

The organization's vision for Douglas was not just about the ability to construct a roster. "A general manager must be more than just a talent evaluator. He must be able to build and sustain a winning culture," Vice Chairman Christopher W. Johnson said after announcing Douglas' hire. "That includes a commitment to collaboration and earning the trust of his colleagues."

Johnson's confidence in Douglas was on display as they, along with team president, Hymie Elhai, led the search for the team's new head coach. In hiring Robert Saleh, Johnson is confident that the first-year head coach will join with Douglas and Elhai to form the cohesive foundation that brings the Jets to their goal of a sustained, winning franchise.

That was advice Douglas recalled from his mentor, former Ravens General Manager Ozzie Newsome, and he has stayed true to his core principle that successful teams are built by people with the right level of commitment, character and competence, as Douglas looks to develop and sustain to what he characterizes as, "the best culture in sports."

Since taking the position, Douglas has shown that the search for players never stops. He has added starters and contributors in the NFL Draft and undrafted free agency, signed key free agents, both from the onset and throughout

the year, and made steady in-season moves via waiver claims and trades. Since his appointment just over two seasons ago, almost 97% of the roster was acquired or extended by him, with over 73% coming in the last two years.

For Douglas, roster construction isn't a quick fix. "Ultimately, I think when you look at successful organizations, no matter what the sport, you don't see a lot of teams that build long-term success by buying their way out of it," he said in 2020. "You see the teams, the organizations that have long-term success, they draft well, and they develop their players."

Since his hire, Douglas has improved the team's financial flexibility and added a number of draft assets, both by trading players with expiring contracts and draft-day deals. Through those deals, most notably the acquisition of two first-round picks and a third-round pick for safety Jamal Adams, as well as a second-round pick, fourth-round pick and sixth-round pick for quarterback Sam Darnold, the Jets have picked in the first two rounds of the 2021 and 2022 drafts seven times, including five first-round selections.

Entering any draft, the mission for Douglas is always the same – add difference makers that fit within the culture and scheme. Over his three drafts as the general manager (2020-22), he has done just that, using top 40 picks on both sides of the ball, selecting cornerback Sauce Gardner (No. 4, 2022), wide receiver Garrett Wilson (No. 10, 2022), edge Jermaine Johnson (No. 26, 2022), running back Breece Hall (No. 36, 2022), quarterback Zach Wilson (No. 2, 2021), Alijah Vera-Tucker (No. 14, 2021), wide receiver Elijah Moore (No. 34, 2021) and tackle Mekhi Becton (No. 11, 2020), while showing mobility in both drafts to target key players via moving up, first with Alijah Vera-Tucker and again this year with Jermaine Johnson.

Beyond the first and second rounds, Douglas has added starters and depth throughout the draft, notably the



team's leading rusher last year (2021) in fourth-round rookie running back Michael Carter as well as cornerback Bryce Hall, the first ever 17-game regular season starter for the Jets who finished sixth in the league in passes defended in his second year (2021).

Despite the added wrinkle that his first draft as general manager (2020) was also the NFL's first ever virtual draft as a result of COVID-19 global pandemic, he showed no signs of being a rookie, despite drafting from his home, and turned eight draft picks and Leonard Williams' expiring contract into 13 players, while also adding key undrafted free agents.

As with the draft picks, matching character and talent has shown to be key when Douglas has used free agency to add to the roster. This offseason (2022), the Jets added multiple veterans with Super Bowl experience as cornerback D.J. Reed, Pro Bowl guard Laken Tomlinson, tight end C.J. Uzomah, and safety Jordan Whitehead have all played in one of the last three Super Bowls.

Among the priorities for Douglas has been remaking the offensive line and in addition to adding first-round picks in his first two drafts – Becton and Vera-Tucker – has signed three free agents, tackle George Fant and center Connor McGovern, who both graded as top 10 players at their position last season (2021) according to Pro Football Focus, and Tomlinson, who made the Pro Bowl in 2021.

Another key for Douglas in constructing the Jets has been waiver claims, using both at final cuts and the wire throughout the season to provide depth and reinforce the roster. Additionally, among his first claims (2019) were wide receiver/return specialist Braxton Berrios, a 2021 first-team All-Pro selection, and defensive lineman John Franklin-Myers, the team leader in pressures, hits and co-leader in sacks (2021) who signed a long-term extension last season. He has also added players like Quincy Williams (2021), the team's second-leading tackler in his first season with the Jets (2021) and Ty Johnson (2020) who has averaged over 4.25 yards per carry with 50 receptions since being claimed.

Throughout his time in the league, Douglas has put in the work and paid his dues, working as both a pro and college scout in Baltimore, Chicago and Philadelphia, and helping shape three different Super Bowl winning rosters. Before joining the Jets, he spent the previous three seasons as the vice president of player personnel with the Eagles. In Philadelphia, he was a key component in acquiring many of the players that helped win Super Bowl LII, including the game's MVP, quarterback Nick Foles.

Using every avenue to help improve the team, Douglas was part of a front office that acquired the players who scored all but two of the team's postseason touchdowns, including four of the five scores in the Super Bowl.

A trio of 2017 unrestricted free agent signings - LeGarrette Blount, Foles and Alshon Jeffery – as well as a pair of street free agents – Patrick Robinson and Torrey Smith – all contributed scores on the team's title run. The Eagles' leading receiver in the Super Bowl, running back Corey Clement, was signed as an undrafted free agent, while the team's leading rusher in the game, running back Jay Ajayi, joined the club as a midseason trade.

Prior to joining the Eagles, Douglas spent a season as the director of college scouting for Chicago (2015).

Entering the NFL as a player personnel assistant (2000) the year Baltimore won Super Bowl XXXV, Douglas ascended within the Ravens organization, holding various posts in the organization's scouting department, serving as a national scout (2012-15), Southeast area scout (2009-11), East Coast area scout (2008) and Northeast area scout (2003-07), helping add a number of prominent players via the draft, including the Super Bowl XLVII MVP, Flacco, as well as a number of Pro Bowl players – Ben Grubbs, C.J. Mosley, Justin Tucker and Marshal Yanda.

An All-Atlantic 10 selection, Douglas started 45 consecutive games at tackle for the University of Richmond. Following his collegiate playing career, he transitioned into a volunteer assistant coach role with the Spiders in 1999.

As an offensive and defensive lineman at Mechanicsville (VA) HS, formerly Lee-Davis, Douglas was recognized as a two-time all-state honoree.

He and his wife, Shannon, have two daughters, Addison and Leighton, and a son, Thomas.

REX HOGAN



ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

REX HOGAN now in his sixth season with the New York Jets, begins his fourth year as the team's assistant general manager after rejoining the organization in June of 2019. For Hogan, he previously served as the team's senior director, college scouting.

In his current role, Hogan assists General Manager Joe Douglas, with the day-to-day operations of the Jets player personnel department. In addition, he oversees the college and pro scouting departments while working directly on personnel decisions and evaluations.

Under Douglas and Hogan, the Jets roster has turned over in the last two-plus seasons, as almost 97% of the roster was acquired or extended by them. In the last three Drafts, they've made 26 total selections, moving up in both the first round of the 2021 and 2022 Drafts to select offensive lineman Alijah Vera-Tucker (2021) and edge Jermaine Johnson (2022), while also moving back to collect additional selections when their board dictates value.

In free agency, Hogan, Douglas and the personnel staff have remained flexible to the situation, using a strategic and disciplined approach in 2020 signing players like offensive linemen George Fant and Connor McGovern, while adding veterans like quarterback Joe Flacco and future Hall of Fame running back Frank Gore. In 2021, the front office targeted specific players at the outset of free agency, moving quickly to add defensive lineman Carl Lawson and wide receiver Corey Davis, among others in free agency's first few days. This past offseason, Hogan played a vital role in key free agent signings, including the re-signing of All-Pro returner Braxton Berrios, Pro Bowl offensive lineman Laken Tomlinson and veteran tight end C.J. Uzomah, among other valuable additions to the roster.

Prior to returning to the Jets, Hogan spent two seasons (2017-18) as the vice president of player personnel with Indianapolis, helping to construct a roster that saw the team return to the postseason in 2018. During his time with the Colts, the front office drafted a pair of rookie All-Pro selections in Quenton Nelson and Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year Darius Leonard. Additionally, he was a part of key veteran acquisitions, including the claims of cornerbacks Kenny Moore and Pierre Desir as well as the signings of Denico Autry and tight end Eric Ebron, who made his first Pro Bowl appearance (2018).

Hogan previously worked with the Chicago Bears for 12 years, the last three seasons as a national scout, and was part of a team that reached Super Bowl XLI and the 2010 NFC Championship. In Chicago, he assisted in the draft selections of Matt Forte, Kyle Fuller, Devin Hester, Alshon Jeffery, Kyle Long and Greg Olsen.

Prior to entering the NFL, he spent one year working as the director of football operations at the University of Utah under former head coach Urban Meyer. He also worked with the University of Notre Dame's athletic department and football program (1998-2003) in various roles, including as a football intern, business intern and in football recruiting/operations. During his time at Notre Dame, the school produced several standouts and NFL Draft selections, including center Jeff Faine, tight end Anthony Fasano, running back Ryan Grant, tackle Ryan Harris, quarterback Brady Quinn, center John Sullivan, defensive end Justin Tuck and San Francisco Giants pitcher Jeff Samardzija.

Hogan received a degree in public relations from Austin Peay in 1995, where he was a four-year member of the football team. The Clarksville, TN native and his wife, Christy, have three children, McKenna, Ryan and Erin.

CHAD ALEXANDER



DIRECTOR, PLAYER PERSONNEL



CHAD ALEXANDER is in his fourth season with the Jets as Director of Player Personnel. In his role, Alexander works closely with both General Manager Joe Douglas and Assistant General Manager Rex Hogan in a collaborative effort to oversee the Player Personnel Department.

Before joining the Jets, Alexander was a Baltimore Ravens executive for 20 seasons, the last nine of which he served as the assistant director of pro personnel. He also worked as an area scout, pro scout and as a personnel assistant with Baltimore, after initially joining the organization in 1999.

Alexander helped develop SYNC (supporting your neighbors and community), a program designed to bring immediate food and educational support to children living in historically underserved communities. Programming operated in collaboration with the Baltimore Police Department. Before entering the NFL, Alexander spent a year working with elementary students with behavior disorders at "Power of Relationships" in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

PHIL SAVAGE is in his fourth season with the Jets as the team's senior football advisor. In his role, Savage evaluates

college prospects and pro players, while providing valuable insight on the player personnel department's overall philosophy, grading system and annual approach to building the club's roster and practice squad.

Joining the team in June 2019, Savage brings over 20 years of NFL front office experience, including four seasons as senior vice president and general manager with the Cleveland Browns (2005-08). Prior to joining the Jets, he worked as the Reese's Senior Bowl executive director (2012-18) and served as the general manager of the Arizona Hotshots in the Alliance of American Football (2018-19).

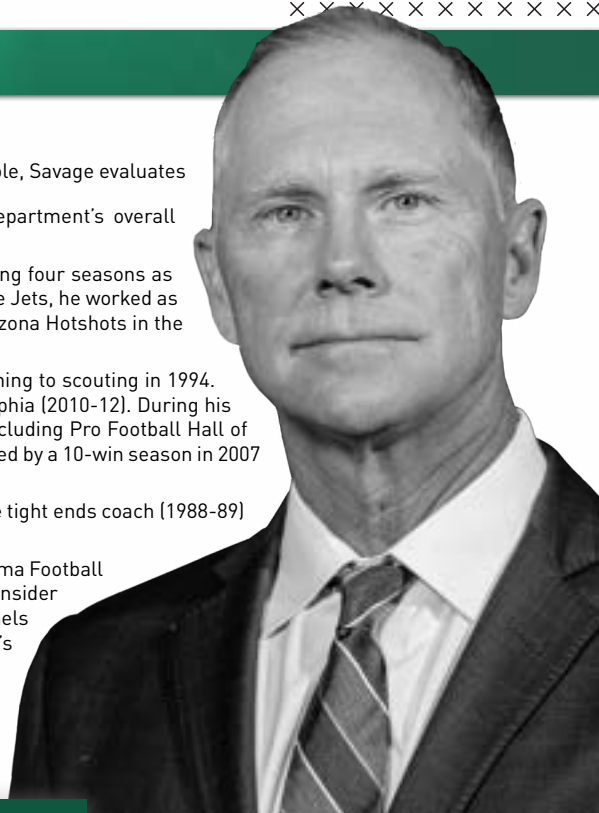
Savage entered the league as a defensive assistant coach with the Browns (1991), before transitioning to scouting in 1994. 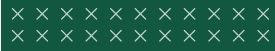

SENIOR DIRECTOR, FOOTBALL ADMINISTRATION



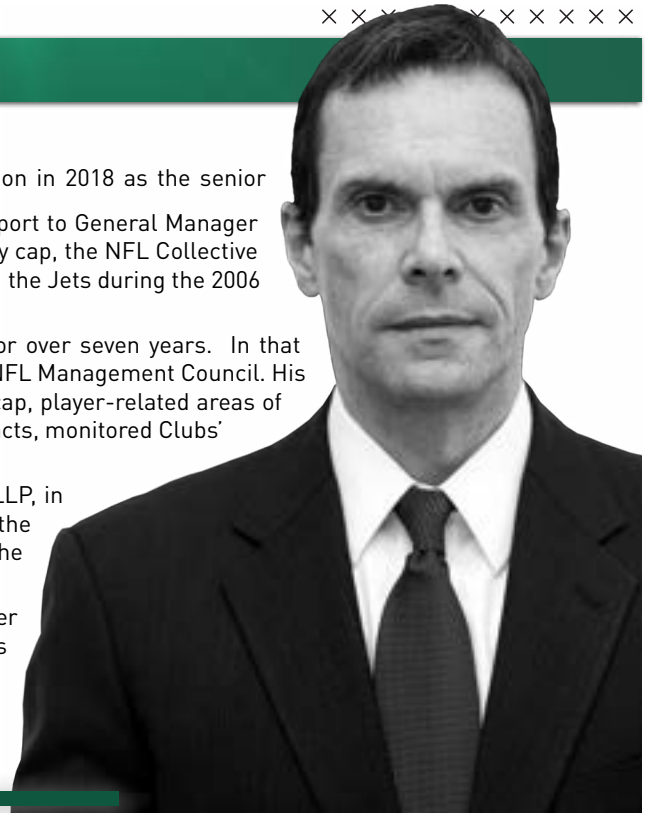

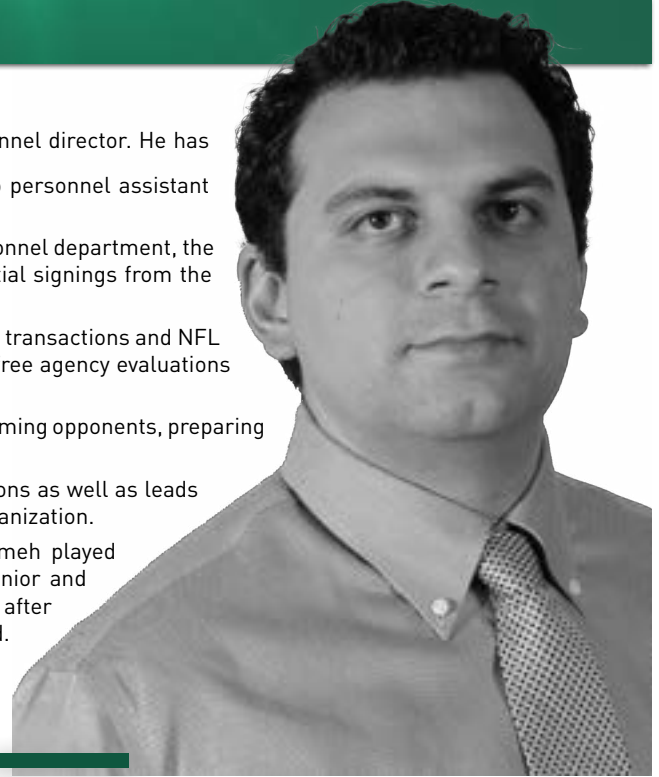

PRO SCOUT



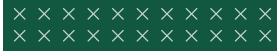

DREW MORRIS is now in his fifth season as a college scout with the New York Jets, his seventh with the organization after serving in the pro personnel department for two years.

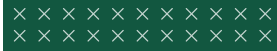

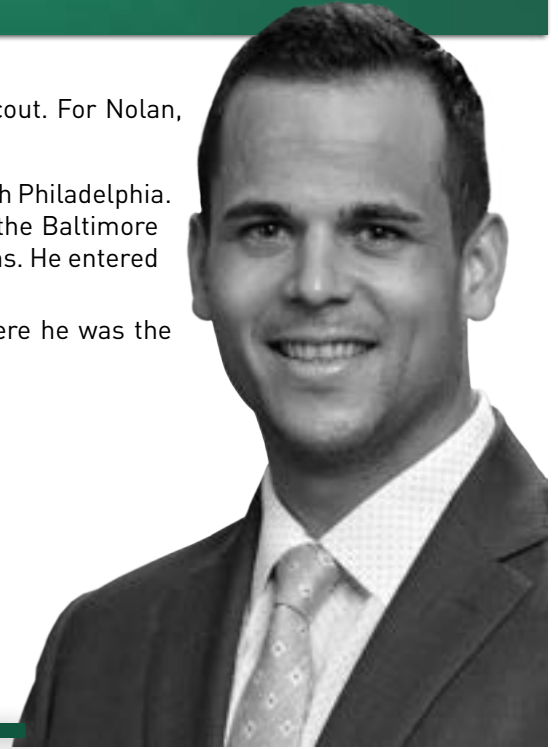

ROBERT SALEH (pronounced: SAH-luh) was named the head coach of the New York Jets on January 19, 2021. With Saleh and General Manager Joe Douglas, Chairman Robert Wood Johnson envisions a synergy that will bring the franchise to their ultimate goal.

"I think you have a synergy of people," Johnson said earlier this year. "Those two people particularly are on absolutely the same page. That's a positive. Joe knows exactly what Robert needs at every position and they have a long list and criteria that they're looking at."

"He is a collaborative leader," Vice Chairman Christopher W. Johnson said in a statement after Saleh's hiring. "I know he will develop the players on our roster, hold them accountable, and put them in a position to succeed. Most importantly, I believe they will connect with him."

Connecting with players has been a constant under Saleh. "They need a personal investment made into them so they can develop into being great football players," he said after being hired. "They want to be rewarded for what they've gone through, and so players should expect that from their coaches, and from the organization. It is an absolute joy to see them hit the pinnacle of their career, where they get rewarded for it. To give that and understand that part is just being human to me." "All Gas, No Brake," for Saleh, it is a mindset that goes beyond the team's practice and preparation to everything they do, on and off the field. More than just the players and coaches, it is about the entire organization stepping on the gas and getting better each and every day.

In his first season with the Jets (2021), Saleh oversaw the league's youngest roster with an opening day age of 25.13. Rookies played 5,675 snaps for the Jets and started a league-high 76 games. They became only the second team since the merger led by rookies in passing yards, rushing yards and receiving yards. And while the results weren't always there, the scars and the experience gained through them were.

"These are all scars that they are getting," Saleh said during his first season. "They're learning. You have to learn not to lose first. Then, once you learn how not to lose, you figure out how to win. Then, once you learn how to win, you have to learn how to close games."

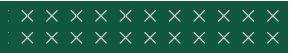
As the season progressed, the young roster did just that. Seven of the final eight games were within a score in the fourth quarter, compared to four of the first nine games. Playing those close games against six teams that finished with winning records, including three playoff teams, the team also improved their numbers on defense in points per game, yards per play, pass yards per attempt and yards per rush over the final seven weeks. On offense, they averaged 5.19 yards per carry over the final eight weeks, the second best in the league.

"We were at least one or two most rookie snaps in the league," Douglas said speaking after the final day of the 2021 Draft. "That's a hard thing for a coaching staff to do with so many young players, I think we all realize that. No one dipped their toe in the water, they cannonballed in, they attacked it, the entire staff developed these young players and the whole plan for that is to benefit the future. So, now we have a group of young players that have played a lot of snaps, a lot of quality NFL snaps. When they're called on to help us again, they're going to be ready. What Coach and his staff did, I can't say enough positive things about that."

Before joining the Jets, Saleh spent four seasons as the defensive coordinator with San Francisco. Since 2017, his group ranked third in the league in passing yards allowed (211.4), holding opposing quarterbacks to the eighth lowest completion percentage (62.9%), while producing Pro Bowl players at linebacker (Fred Warner), cornerback (Richard Sherman) and defensive line (Nick Bosa & DeForest Buckner), while Bosa was also selected as the 2019 Defensive Player of the Year by the Associated Press.

The last two seasons under Saleh, the 49ers defense led the league in passing defense (188.6), ranking in the top 10 in passer rating allowed (85.8), completion percentage allowed (62.4%), tackles for loss (154) and defensive touchdowns (six), while also helping San Francisco advance to Super Bowl LIV.

In his final season with the 49ers (2020), Saleh's unit still finished fifth in the league in total defense and fourth in passing defense, despite an injury-plagued season, getting career years from cornerback Jason Verrett, who started 13 games after playing in just six total the previous four seasons and defensive lineman Kerry Hyder, who started 14 games after logging more than 450 snaps in a season just once in his five previous years in the league. Hyder finished the season as one of just 11 defensive linemen with at least 8.0 sacks, 15 quarterback hits and 40 total tackles.

A key part of the team's Super Bowl LIV run (2019), Saleh's defense finished second in total defense, first in passing defense and third in third-down defense, while producing 48 sacks (tied for the fifth most in the league) and 28 takeaways (the sixth most). The San Francisco defensive line saw four players – Arik Armstead (10.0), Bosa (9.0), Buckner (7.5) and Dee Ford (6.5) – all produce at least 6.5 sacks, the only team in the NFL to have four-or-more players with 6.5-or-more sacks. In the postseason, the defense allowed just over 300 yards per game, holding opponents to just 31.4% on third down and producing seven total takeaways, including two interceptions of league MVP Patrick Mahomes in the Super Bowl, the only game Mahomes had more than one interception that season.

In Saleh's second season with the 49ers (2018), the defense was one of six to allow fewer net yards per game, rushing yards per game and passing yards per game than they did the previous season. In 2017, his first as a coordinator, San Francisco allowed .62 yards fewer per play, the third best improvement in the league. Over the final eight weeks, they ranked second in the league in rushing yards allowed and fourth in yards per carry.

Coaching linebackers for three seasons in Jacksonville, Saleh oversaw a linebacker group that included Posluszny and Telvin Smith as the pair each finished in the top five in the league in total tackles between 2015-16 (according to Radar360). The team's linebackers were also a key part of a Jaguars defense that ranked fifth in passing defense and sixth in opponent rushing average in 2016, and fifth in rushing average allowed in 2015.

Prior to his time in Jacksonville, Saleh spent three seasons in Seattle as a defensive quality control coach, responsible for assisting the defensive staff with day-to-day duties with a focus on the linebackers, while learning an important lesson from Head Coach Pete Carroll:

"The biggest influence I took from Coach Carroll is from a philosophy standpoint," Saleh said in 2017. "Understanding who you are as a person. Understanding what's important to you as a person. And, how to apply it to the message that you're trying to deliver. Understanding that everybody has a style and that every style is the right style provided you apply it in the right way. So, just from a philosophy standpoint, speaking to people, handling people is where I have my greatest growth from Coach Carroll."

In those three seasons, he helped develop linebackers Bobby Wagner (2012 second-round pick) and K.J. Wright (2011 fourth-round pick) as the two became future Pro Bowl selections. A part of the Seahawks Super Bowl XLVIII winning staff, another of the team's linebackers, seventh-round pick Malcolm Smith, earned MVP honors after Smith registered nine tackles, a fumble recovery and a 69-yard interception returned for a touchdown.

Saleh began his NFL coaching career in Houston as a coaching intern (2005), becoming a defensive assistant (2006-08) and ultimately the linebackers coach (2009-10). Linebackers DeMeco Ryans (2006) and Brain Cushing (2009) each earned Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year honors while Saleh was there and were both selected to the Pro Bowl in 2009. That season, the tandem finished in the top 10 in the league in total tackles (according to Radar360).

Before his start as an NFL coach, Saleh spent four seasons coaching college football at Georgia (2005), Central Michigan (2004), beginning his coaching career at Michigan State (2002) as an offensive assistant/tight ends coach before becoming a defensive assistant/defensive line the following season.

A native of Dearborn, MI, Saleh attended Northern Michigan University where he started for four years at tight end. He earned his finance degree, beginning a career as a credit analyst before getting into coaching.

Saleh and his wife, Sanaa, have seven children, sons, Adam, Zane, Michael, Sam, and Jacob, and daughters, Mila and Ella. Born to Lebanese parents, Sam and Fatin, he is considered one of three Arab-American head coaches in NFL history and believed to be the first Muslim-American head coach.

BRANT BOYER returns for his seventh season as the special teams coordinator of the New York Jets after initially joining the team in 2016. Under three different head coaches in his time with the Jets, Boyer has transformed the special teams in one of the best in the league, finishing in the top five in DVOA according to FootballOutsiders.com in three of the last four seasons, one of only three teams – Baltimore and Kansas City – to do so.

Change has been a constant for Boyer, as the Jets have had 10 different kickers, four different punters, and have seen a different team leader in kickoff return average and special teams tackles in every one of his previous six seasons.

Despite the changes, his unit has committed just 95 penalties, the 13th fewest of any team in the league, while posting top 10 rankings in total touchdowns (six – scoring via punt return, kickoff return and via fumble recovery), blocked punts (four), forced fumbles (five), kickoff return average (23.3), opponent kickoff return average (21.4) and fewest touchbacks on punts (22).

Last season (2021), Boyer’s special teams finished second in the league in DVOA, highlighted by the wide receiver/return specialist Braxton Berrios’ first-team All Pro selection. Berrios, who led the NFL in kickoff return average, also ranked second in punt return average (among players with 15 PRs) and was only the 10th player since 1970 with top three finishes in both KOR and PR and the first since another Boyer charge, Andre Roberts in 2018. Boyer is currently the only coach to have multiple players with the accolade. As a result, the Jets were the only team in 2021 to finish in the top five in both kickoff and punt return average.

Justin Hardee, one of 15 NFL players since 2017 with 40+ special teams tackles, registered a single-season best in his first season under Boyer after posting 12 special teams to led the team. In addition, punter Braden Mann (returning from an injury suffered Week One) and kicker Eddy Piñeiro both finished 2021 strong as Mann posted a 43.0 net punting average, fifth best in the league, over the last four games and Piñeiro, signed in Week 14 connected on all eight FG attempts as a Jet. In Mann’s absence, veteran punter Thomas Morstead averaged 43.0 net yards per punt, a top five single-season average in his 12-year NFL career.

In 2020, punter Braden Mann establish a rookie franchise record in punting average (43.9) under Boyer, while setting another team rookie record with a 60-yard punt. Kicker Sam Ficken, the only returning kicker Boyer has had in his five seasons, was connected on all 12 of his attempts under 50 yards one of three kickers with no misses on at least 10 attempts last season.

In 2019, Boyer’s group finished fourth in the league in special teams DVOA, their second consecutive season in the top five, despite new primary players at kicker, punt returner and kick returner. Overall, the group ranked in the top five in coverage touchdowns (two), punt return average (11.4), kickoff return average against (19.3) and fumble recoveries (two).

After they averaged a league-low 6.8 yards per punt return from 2013-17, the Jets had first and second place finishes in 2018 and 2019 respectively, as Boyer narrowly missed becoming the first coach since the merger to have two different returners lead the league in punt returns in consecutive seasons.

In 2018, in addition to their number one ranking from both FootballOutsiders.com and Rick Gosselin, Boyer’s group finished in the top five league-wide in kickoff return average (third; 26.9), punt return average (first; 13.0) and field goal percentage (fourth; 91.7%). The unit also blocked three kicks — a punt, a field goal and an extra point — one of just three teams with at least three blocked kicks and one of just two with a block of all three.

Among the many superlatives by the Jets special teams unit in 2018 were kicker Jason Myers earning a Pro Bowl selection after tying Nick Folk’s field goal percentage franchise record, connecting on 33-of-36 field goals (91.7%) and finishing with the second-most made field goals and tying for the second most points for a single season in franchise history. Additionally, Myers made all five of his attempts of 55+ yards last season, the most in a single year in NFL history, and now accounts for five of the 11 makes

from 55+ yards in Jets history. Myers also became one of just eight players in league history with a seven-field-goal game after connecting on all seven attempts for 24 total points (second-most kicking points in a game in league history) vs. Indianapolis (10/14).

Roberts, a wide receiver/return specialist, was named a first-team All Pro and selected to his first Pro Bowl in nine NFL seasons, led the league in punt return average (14.1) and finished second in kickoff return average (29.4) last season, one of just 12 qualifying players to finish in the top three in both in the same season since 1970. Additionally, Roberts registered 10 returns (three punt, seven kickoff) of 40+ yards last season, two of which accounted for touchdowns — a 78-yard punt return at Detroit (09/10/18) and a 99-yard kickoff return vs. Green Bay (12/23/18). For Roberts, the 10 returns of 40+ make him one of just five players to accomplish the feat since 2000.

In 2017, Boyer oversaw second-year punter Lachlan Edwards establish franchise records with 46.6 gross and 40.5 net punt averages, ranked third in the league with 33 punts inside the 20-yard line, the second most in Jets history. Additionally, kicker Chandler Catanzaro, a 2017 acquisition, improved on his field goal percentage from 75% in 2016 to 83.3%, as well as connecting on 100% of his extra point attempts, the first time he had done so since his rookie season. Catanzaro also connected on a 57-yard field goal, the longest in team history.

Among Boyer's coverage units, the Jets allowed just 20.0 yards per kickoff return in 2017, the eighth lowest average in the league. Safety Rontez Miles led the NFL with 15 solo special teams tackles (according to radar360).

In his first season (2016), kicker Nick Folk connected on 87.1% of his field goal attempts, tied for the sixth best in the league that season and the fourth highest mark in team history.

Boyer joined the Jets after a four-year tenure in Indianapolis (2012-15), where he aided a Colts special teams unit that ranked in the top 10 league-wide during that span in net punting average (third), kickoff return average (fourth), kickoff touchbacks (fourth) and field goal percentage (seventh), despite using three different players as primary punt returners and four different kick returners in his four seasons.

During the 2015 season, the Indianapolis special teams unit established an NFL record with just 156 kickoff return yards allowed for the season, besting the previous mark of 254 set by Denver in 1992.

In 2014, both punter Pat McAfee and kicker Adam Vinatieri received Associated Press First-Team NFL All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors under Boyer as McAfee converted a career-high three inside kicks and set single-season franchise records for punts pinned inside the 20-yard line (30), net punting average (42.8) and kickoff touchbacks (70), while Vinatieri made 30 of 31 field goals and also converted 35 consecutive attempts, the fourth-longest streak in NFL history.

In 2013, Boyer coached Matt Overton to his first career Pro Bowl selection, one year after discovering the long snapper at a specialists combine in Arizona and bringing him to Indianapolis for a workout prior to his signing in April 2012.

Prior to joining the Colts, Boyer was twice a training camp intern, first for the Cleveland Browns (2009) and later for the New York Giants (2010).

Before entering the coaching ranks, Boyer played linebacker and was a standout on special teams for the Miami Dolphins (1994), Jacksonville Jaguars (1995-2000) and Cleveland Browns (2001-03). He served as a special teams captain for both the Jaguars and Browns and led Cleveland in tackles in 2002 and 2003. Boyer was a two-time member of USA Today's All-Joe Team, once as a linebacker and once as a special teams player. In 2002, his teammates selected him for the Cleveland Browns Unsung Hero Award.

Boyer played in 129 career games and totaled 250 tackles, 13.0 sacks, six interceptions, one forced fumble and 15 passes defended. He originally entered the league as a sixth-round selection of the Miami Dolphins in the 1994 NFL Draft.

Before entering the NFL, Boyer was an inside linebacker and team captain at the University of Arizona as part of the school's "Desert Swarm" defense. He led the team in tackles during his senior season, helping the Wildcats to their first 10-win season in 90 years and a victory in the 1993 Fiesta Bowl, and earned a place in the school's Ring of Honor.





MIKE LAFLEUR

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

MOUNT PLEASANT, MI ELMHURST COLLEGE

MIKE LAFLEUR now in his second season as the offensive coordinator for the New York Jets after joining Robert Saleh’s staff in 2021. In his first season, LaFleur oversaw one of the youngest offenses in the league and just the second team since 1970 with a rookie leader in passing, rushing and receiving yards.

In his first season with the Jets, LaFleur saw four different quarterbacks, three of which entered the season with 10 or fewer starts, throw for 290+ yards, the first team in NFL History to do so, while all four also had two touchdown passes in a game, the first team since 1987 to do. Starting quarterback Zach Wilson, the team’s second-overall selection in 2021, returned for injury in Week 12 and finished the season with a team-rookie-record 156 consecutive passes without an interception, while his nine total touchdowns led all rookies over the final eight weeks. Additionally, Mike White made the first start of his career and threw for 400+ yards with a 70+ completion percentage, the first QB in NFL history to do so.

For the fourth consecutive season (Jets 2021, SF 2018-20), LaFleur’s offense saw a wide receiver finish in the top 10 among rookies in receiving yards, as 2021 second-round pick, Elijah Moore led the team, the first rookie to do so since 1995, posting 538 yards in 11 games, including 76.5 yards per game between Weeks Eight and 13 (his final six games of the season).

“The run game in general is just critical. That’s how we all firmly believe. If you can’t run the ball in this league, it’s really hard to just have to throw the ball. If we get the run game going, we’re going to get a lot of things in the passing game.”

And while the rushing offense didn’t start 2021 as superlative, it did finish that way as over the last eight games of the season, the Jets offense increased their rushing yards per game by 50+, averaging 5.19 yards per carry, the second best in the league over that span. Led by rookie fourth-round selection Michael Carter, the first rookie to lead the team in rushing since 2006, the Jets run game was a balanced as four different runners gain 3.9+ yards per carry, with all four scoring touchdowns.

Prior to joining the Jets, LaFleur spent four seasons with SF (2017-20), the last three as passing game coordinator. In his time as passing game coordinator, the San Francisco offense finished in the top 10 in scoring (24.9), total offense (370.6) and rushing offense (127.0), while George Kittle, a two-time All-Pro and Pro Bowl selection, set a then NFL record for a tight end with 1,377 receiving yards (2019). During the 2019 season that finished with an appearance in Super Bowl LIV, the offense had 13 different players with at least one touchdown reception on the season, tying the NFL record for the most players in a single season. Additionally, Jimmy Garoppolo, who registered a .680 winning percentage (17-8), the sixth-best winning percentage in the league. Garoppolo also finished fourth in yards per attempt (8.2), fifth in completion percentage (67.5%) and ninth in passer rating (98.6) among quarterbacks with at least 25 starts since 2018.

Before San Francisco, LaFleur served as an offensive assistant in Atlanta for two seasons, first working with the tight ends (2015) and then wide receivers (2016). In 2016, wide receiver Julio Jones finished second in the league in receiving yards (1,409), averaging 17.0 yards per catch, the fourth-best average in the league among qualified receivers as the Falcons wide receiver group totaled 3,226 yards, the second most that season as the Falcons advanced to Super Bowl LI. In his first season (2015), Jacob Tamme gained 657 yards, a top 10 total in the league for tight ends.

MIKE LAFLEUR

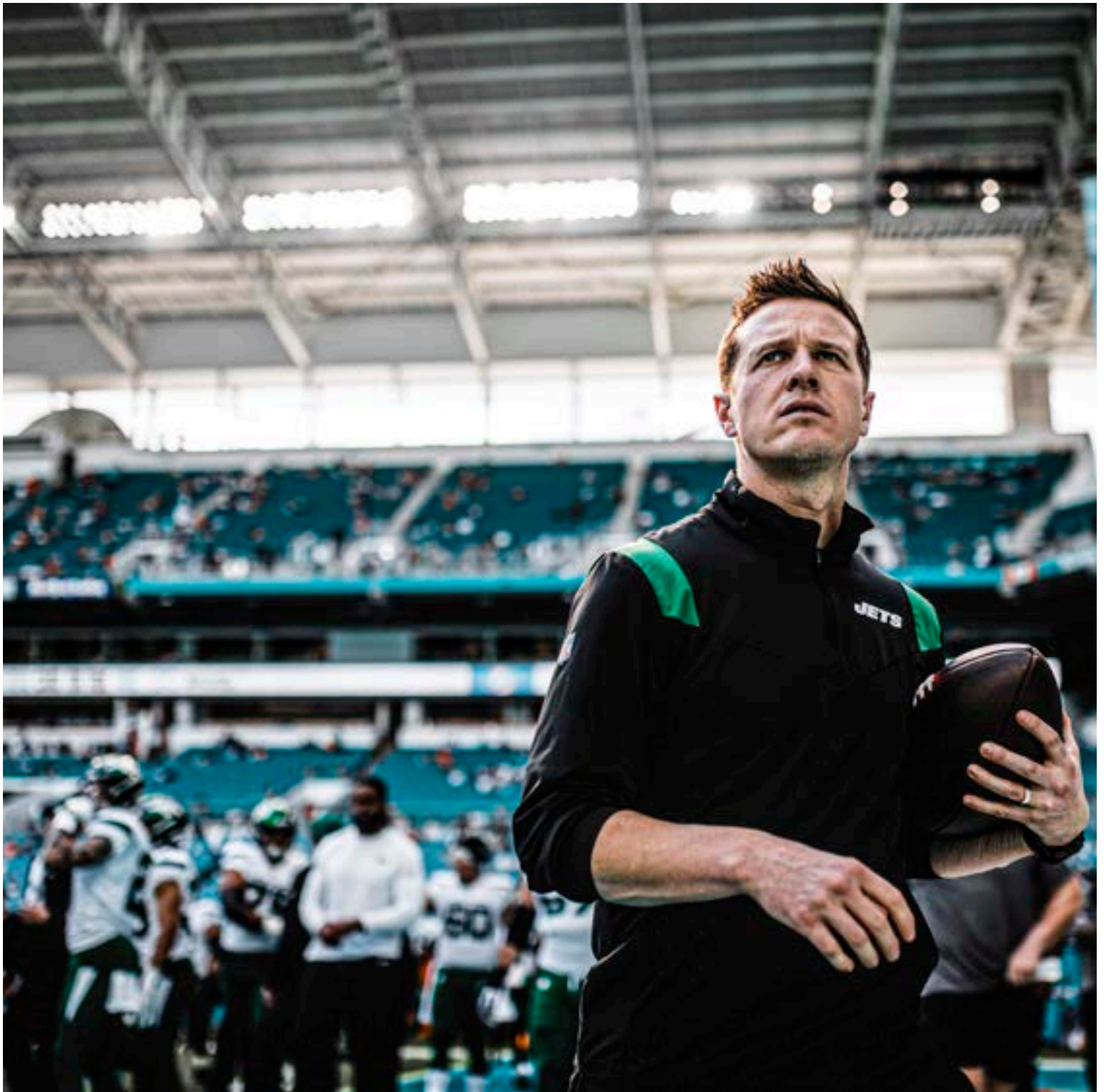


LaFleur began his NFL coaching career as an offensive coaching intern with Cleveland (2014), working with the offensive line. That season, the line helped Browns running backs gain 1,648 yards, the 12th most in the league, producing 16 touchdowns, tied for the second most.

Spending five seasons coaching college football, LaFleur started his career at his alma mater, Elmhurst College, in 2009 as an offensive assistant working with the school's quarterbacks, before moving on to Saint Joseph's College (2010-12) and then Davidson College (2013), finishing his time as the offensive coordinator for both schools.

A native of Mount Pleasant, MI, LaFleur was a team captain and three-time letter winner as a quarterback and safety at Elmhurst, graduating with a bachelor's degree in physical education in 2009.

LaFleur and his wife, Lauren, have two children. His father, Denny, won a National Championship at Central Michigan in 1974, before later becoming an assistant coach at the school, while his brother, Matt, is the head coach of the Green Bay Packers.





JEFF ULBRICH

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

🏠 MORGAN HILLS, CA 🏠 HAWAII

JEFF ULBRICH (*pronounced: ULL-brick*) returns for his second season as the defensive coordinator after initially joining the New York Jets as part of Robert Saleh’s staff in 2021. Ulbrich, a 10-year NFL veteran linebacker, begins his 10th season as coach and second directing the Jets defense.

In his first season with the Jets (2021), Ulbrich oversaw one of the league’s youngest defenses, as 63.9% of the snaps came from players 25-years old or less at the start of the year, the highest percentage in the league and the only team over 50%.



When you’re raising a young defense like we are right now, we’re getting these scars, these battle wounds. I’d like to think that as much as that hurt, that failure will lead to like the defense we’re trying to create here, a Championship-level defense. And when we’re playing for championships here, that’s going to be one of the reasons that we win them.



In “raising” his defense, the scars were visible early in the season, however over the final seven weeks, Ulbrich’s group improved in points per game, yards per play, passing yards per attempt and yards per rush, all while getting valuable reps for a number of young players.

Perhaps no group epitomized the team’s youth as much as the secondary as the top six snap counts among Jets defensive backs were all in their first two seasons. Throughout the league, no team had more snaps from rookie and second-year players in their secondary than the 4,468 by the Jets in 2021. Second-year cornerback Bryce Hall finished in the top 10 in passes defended, while fellow starter, rookie CB Brandin Echols finished in the top 10 among all rookies in PDs.

Upfront, the Jets saw seven different defensive linemen register at least 15+ pressures, while Pro Bowl alternate Quinnen Williams was one of just two players in the league in the top 10 in stop, stuff and sack percentage (according to Next Gen Stats). At linebacker, veteran C.J. Mosley and roster reduction waiver claim Quincy Williams both recorded a single-season high in tackles as Mosley, the 2021 Curtis Martin Team MVP, finished fourth in the league.

Prior to the Jets, Ulbrich spent six seasons with the Falcons, the first five as the team’s linebackers coach (2015-19), before he added the title of assistant head coach (2020). In 2020, following Raheem Morris’ move to interim head coach in Week Six, he became the interim defensive coordinator for the final 11 games. Under Ulbrich, the defense improved in every category: total defense, scoring defense, passing defense, rushing defense, third down defense and red zone defense, while also producing sacks and interceptions at a higher rate. In those final 11 games, the Falcons ranked in the top third of the league in opponents third-down percentage and opposing red zone touchdown percentage, while also allowing the sixth fewest rushing yards per game.

In his six seasons with Atlanta, Ulbrich has had a linebacker register 90+ tackles nine times, including by four different players: Deion Jones (four times), De’Vondre Campbell (three), Foyesade Oluokun and Paul Worrirow. Jones, a second-round pick in 2016, produced 100+ tackles in every season in which he played at least 15 games, posting 513 tackles, the eighth most in the league since 2016. Additionally, Jones, a Pro Bowler, finished in the top two among all linebackers in passes defended (38), interceptions (11) and defensive touchdowns (5) since 2016. Oluokun, a former sixth-round pick out of Yale in 2018, finished second behind Jones in total tackles, while also recording six forced fumbles, the most on the team in his three seasons under Ulbrich.

JEFF ULBRICH



Originally hired as the team's linebackers and special teams coach, Ulbrich added the title of assistant head coach in the spring of his first year at UCLA (2012), spending two years in that role before becoming the defensive coordinator in 2014. In his time with the Bruins, he helped Anthony Barr convert from running back to linebacker before finishing second in the country with 13.5 sacks (2012), Myles Jack earn Pac-12 Defensive and Offensive Freshman of the Year honors (2013), and Eric Kendricks earn both the Butkus Award and Lott IMPACT Trophy after leading the nation in solo tackles per game (2014). All three players were selected in the first or second round of the NFL draft and both Barr and Kendrick have been selected as Pro Bowlers in the NFL. As a special teams coach, he joined just three other schools as the only FBS teams to finish the regular season among the top-20 nationally in both kickoffs and kickoff returns during the 2013 season.

Following his 10-year playing career, Ulbrich started his coaching career with Seattle in 2010 as special teams assistant

for two seasons. During the 2010 season, kicker Olindo Mare matched the sixth-longest field goal streak with 30 straight, while the kickoff return units ranked third in the NFL and the kickoff cover group ranked fifth in the league.

A former third-round selection by San Francisco in the 2000 NFL Draft, Ulbrich played linebacker in 120 games (75 starts) over 10 seasons with the 49ers and posted 653 tackles, 5.5 sacks, four forced fumbles, two interceptions and 13 passes defended, including 481 tackles between 2001-04, when he started 56 of 59 games. A starter for two seasons at Hawai'i, he was named All-WAC first-team and was a team co-captain as a senior, as he led the conference with a school single-season record 169 tackles. Prior to Hawai'i, he spent a year at Gavilan (CA) Junior College where he earned first-team All-Conference and team MVP honors after redshirting at San Jose State as a freshman.

Ulbrich and his wife, Cristina, have a daughter, Samantha, and two sons, Jax and Jace.





MILES AUSTIN

WIDE RECEIVERS

🏠 GARFIELD, NJ 🏀 MONMOUTH

MILES AUSTIN returns for his second season as the wide receivers coach after initially joining the New York Jets as part of Robert Saleh’s first staff in 2021. A former Pro Bowl wide receiver who played in the NFL for 10 seasons, Austin is in his third season coaching in the league after two seasons in scouting.

In his first season with the Jets (2021), Austin oversaw a wide receiver group that adjusted all season due to injuries as their top three receivers – Corey Davis, Elijah Moore and Jamison Crowder. As a result of each being limited to 12 or fewer games, five different receivers caught 25+ passes - only such team in the league in 2021 - while four had multiple touchdown receptions.

Davis, an unrestricted free agent signing in his first season with the Jets, opened the season with four touchdowns and a 14.5 receiving average through the first six games. Moore, a 2021 second-round pick, became the first rookie to lead the Jets in receiving yards since 1995, posting 538 yards in 11 games, including 76.5 yards per game between Weeks Eight and 13 (his final six games of the season). Braxton Berrios, a third-year wide receiver/return specialist who re-signed with the Jets in 2022, posted career highs in receptions, yards and touchdowns. Over his last four games (Weeks 14-17), Berrios scored four touchdowns – one receiving, two rushing and one returning.

Prior to joining the Jets, Austin spent a season with San Francisco (2019) as an offensive quality control coach as the team advanced to Super Bowl LIV. That season, the 49ers finished in the top four league-wide in points per game (29.9) and yards per game (381.1). Before that, he worked as a pro and college scouting intern for two seasons with the Cowboys.

Entering the league as an undrafted free agent, Austin played 129 games (70 starts) over 10 seasons for Dallas, Cleveland and Philadelphia. A two-time Pro Bowl wide receiver, Austin finished his career with 361 receptions for 5,273 yards, both top 25 totals in NFL history for an undrafted free agent.

A native of Garfield, NJ, Austin finished his career at Monmouth as the school’s all-time leader in receptions (150), receiving yards (2,867) and touchdown receptions (33). He is one of seven Hawks alumni to play in the NFL and the school’s only Pro Bowler.

Austin and his wife, Stacy, have three children, Maven, Ava and Miles IV. He started the Austin Family Foundation with a mission to support and promote youth programming in lower income areas with the focus on character development and community involvement.

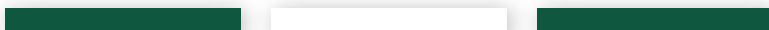

JOHN *BENTON*

OFFENSIVE LINE / RUN GAME COORDINATOR

DURANGO, CO COLORADO STATE

JOHN BENTON returns for his second season as the offensive line coach and run game coordinator after initially joining the New York Jets as part of Robert Saleh's first staff in 2021. Benton has been directing offensive lines in the NFL since 2004, having blocked for top 10 rushing offenses seven times.

In his first season with the Jets (2021), Benton's group showcased their depth and versatility as 11 different players saw time, including nine different starters that formed seven different combinations. Improving in the system over the course of the season in both the run and pass game, the line helped pave the way for the Jets to average 5.19 yards per carry, the second-best average in the league over the final eight weeks. In pass protection, the line improved their pressure allowed percentage from 32.4 to 25.6 over Weeks 11 through 18, a top half percentage in that span.

The line's depth and versatility was on full display in Weeks 16 & 17, as Benton's group – dealing with injuries and COVID - blocked for consecutive games of 150+ rushing yards and one-or-fewer sacks allowed, only the third team in the league with consecutive such games and the first time the Jets did so in back-to-back weeks since 2015. Over those weeks, only two players, Dan Feeney and Morgan – neither kickoff weekend starters – started and finished both games, while the Jets used 10 different linemen and seven different starters.

Selected in the first round of the 2021 draft following a trade up, rookie left guard Alijah Vera-Tucker allowed just two sacks, the second fewest among all rookies (w/ 500 snaps according to Pro Football Focus) and was named to the PFWA All-Rookie team. Following the loss of second-year standout left tackle Mekhi Becton in Week One, right tackle George Fant switched to the left side for the remainder of the season and allowed pressure on just 3.2% of his snaps, the third best among all tackles (w/ 400+ pass block snaps according to Pro Football Focus) and the best among left tackles. Additionally, Fant, signed the previous season, finished with the lowest pressure rate allowed of any Jets tackle since 2006. Another second-year free agent signing, Connor McGovern, was graded as PFF's number nine overall center in 2021.

Over Benton's four seasons in San Francisco (2017-20) as the offensive line coach, the 49ers produced the fourth most rushing yards in the league, with top 10 rushing offenses in each of the last three seasons, including the league's number one rushing attack in 2019 as they advanced to Super Bowl LIV. Additionally, in his time with San Francisco, three different running backs – Raheem Mostert, Jeffrey Wilson and Matt Breida – all averaged over 4.40 yards per carry on at least 200 attempts, one of only two teams in the league with at least three such players.

In protection, the offensive line protected Jimmy Garoppolo as the quarterback finished fourth in yards per attempt (8.2), fifth in completion percentage (67.5%) and ninth in passer rating (98.6) among quarterbacks with at least 25 starts since 2018.

Prior to his time in San Francisco, Benton spent a season in Jacksonville (2016) as an assistant offensive line coach after two years in Miami (2014-15) as the offensive line coach. In his first season with the Dolphins, running back Lamar Miller and quarterback Ryan Tannehill became the first players in team history to register 1,000 yards rushing and 4,000 yards passing in the same season. Additionally, center Mike Pouncey was a two-time Pro Bowler in his two seasons under Benton, while tackle Brendan Albert was also selected.

Colorado State University (Offensive Line) 1983-86

The offensive line coach with Houston for eight seasons, Benton's line helped pave the way for the Texans to finish top 10 in rushing yards in four different seasons, including the 2010 rushing title by Arian Foster (1,616 yards). Foster, a three-time Pro Bowl selection while running behind Benton's lines, averaged 85.8 yards per game, including 94.8 yards per game from 2010-12.

Additionally, Benton's eight seasons with the Texans produced six of the top 10 point totals in franchise history, six of the top 10 passing seasons and five of the top 10 rushing seasons, while three different offensive linemen – tackle Duane Brown, center Chris Myers and guard Wade Smith – each earned their first Pro Bowl selections under him.

Benton's first position in the NFL came as the offensive line coach with St. Louis (2004-05), as the line, anchored by All-Pro tackle Orlando Pace, helped Stephen Jackson rush for the first 1,000-yard season of his career.

Prior to the NFL, Benton spent 17 years coaching at the collegiate level. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Colorado State (1987-90), before moving on to California University (PA) (1990-94), where he coached the offensive line and served as the recruiting coordinator. He returned to Colorado State in 1995, where he spent nine years as offensive line coach (1995-99) and co-offensive coordinator (2000-03).

A four-year starter as an offensive lineman at Colorado State (1983-86), Benton earned honorable mention All-WAC honors during his junior and senior seasons as well as being named All-Academic team as a senior.

Benton and his wife, Nicole, have two children, Gabrielle and Paige.





ROB CALABRESE

QUARTERBACKS

🏠 EAST ISLIP, NY 🇺🇸 CENTRAL FLORIDA

ROB CALABRESE returns for his second season as the quarterbacks coach after initially joining the New York Jets as part of Robert Saleh's first staff in 2021. For Calabrese, he continues his work with the Jets quarterbacks after two seasons in Denver.

In his first season with the Jets (2021), Calabrese saw production from the entire room, specifically improvement from rookie quarterback Zach Wilson. Over the final seven weeks, Wilson ranked in the top half of NFL starters (min. 100 attempts) in total touchdowns and in the top five in fewest turnovers. He closed the season without an interception in 156 passing attempts, the longest rookie streak in franchise history and longest streak by a Jets QB since 2000.

In addition to Wilson's development, all three other quarterbacks under Calabrese contributed in 2021, as Mike White became the first QB in NFL history with 300+ passing yards and a 75+ completion percentage in their first start after throwing for 405 yards and three touchdowns vs. Cincinnati (10/31). Additionally, veteran Joe Flacco, acquired midseason, posted a 100+ passer rating in his only start, and Josh Johnson, appearing in a game for the first time in three seasons, became just the fifth QB in the last 30 seasons to not start a game and still throw for 300+ yards at Indianapolis (11/4).

Before joining the Jets, Calabrese spent two seasons with Denver (2019-20), where he worked with a number of quarterbacks as the Broncos were forced to use five different starters as a result of injury. During the 2019 season, Calabrese's first in the NFL, rookie quarterback Drew Lock started the final five games, compiling a 4-1 record, while Joe Flacco, who started the first eight, completed 65.3% of his passes, the best mark in his 13-year NFL career.

Prior to joining the Broncos, Calabrese coached college football at Wagner College (2016-18) and his alma mater, Central Florida (2014-15). At Wagner, he helped direct an offense that averaged 28 points per game in 2018, an almost seven point per game improvement from the previous season, and the school's best average in nine seasons. At UCF, he worked with the team's quarterbacks and wide receivers as a graduate assistant and was selected as one of 30 coaches for the NCAA-AFCA Future Football Coaches Academy. Before his start in college coaching, Calabrese spent a season at Oviedo (FL) HS coaching quarterbacks.

A quarterback and wide receiver at Central Florida, Calabrese finished his college career passing for 1,276 yards and 12 touchdowns and rushing for 494 rushing yards and two touchdowns. A three-year starter at East Islip (NY) HS, he earned the Boomer Esiason Award as Suffolk County's top quarterback as a junior and senior and broke Esiason's school records for career passing yardage (3,992) and touchdowns (34).

Calabrese and his wife, Taylor, have two sons, Kayden, and Cooper.

TAYLOR EMBREE

RUNNING BACKS

BOULDER, CO *Ucla* UCLA

TAYLOR EMBREE returns for his second season as the running back coach after initially joining the New York Jets as part of Robert Saleh's first staff in 2021. For Embree, this is his sixth NFL season and second as a position coach.

In his first season with the Jets (2021), the running back group saw balanced contributions from several players, as no back carried more than 150 times and three different backs carried at least 50 times. Every back with at least 25 carries averaged at least 3.9 yards a carry, while leading rusher, rookie fourth-round pick Michael Carter, averaged a team-best 4.3 yards per. Despite missing three games, Carter was one just 10 rookies since 2015 with 600+ rushing yards and 300+ receiving yards and one of just two selected after the fourth round. Additionally, among all 2021 rookie runners, his 5.27 yards per touch ranked second.

Before joining the Jets, Embree coached tight ends at Colorado (2020), overseeing a group that was a part of the seventh-best rushing offense among Power Five schools that season. The Buffaloes finished a Pac-12 shortened season at 3-1, one of only three teams with just one conference loss.

An offensive quality control coach who worked with the tight ends for three seasons with San Francisco (2017-19), Embree helped George Kittle register 2,945 yards receiving, the second-most of any tight end in that span, including a then NFL record for a tight end with 1,377 receiving yards (2019).

In his first season coaching in the NFL (2016), Embree worked on the defensive side of the ball as a defensive assistant with Kansas City.

That season, the Chiefs defense produced a league-leading 104 passes defended while tying for the most interceptions with 18.

Embree began his coaching career at UNLV (2012), before returning to his alma mater, UCLA (2013-14).

A wide receiver for four seasons at UCLA, Embree finished his career with 137 receptions, then the eighth most in school history, for 1,776 yards. He was signed as undrafted by the Chargers.

Embree and his wife, Kristina Madsen, have two children, son, Grayson, and daughter, Peri. His father, Jon, is the assistant head coach/tight ends coach with the Dolphins and has coached in college and the NFL since 1993 following his time as an NFL tight end with the Rams and Seahawks. His brother, Connor, is an offensive assistant with the Chiefs.

MARQUAND MANUEL

DEFENSIVE BACKS/SAFETIES

🏠 MIAMI, FL 🇺🇸 FLORIDA

MARQUAND MANUEL returns for his second season as the defensive backs/safeties coach after initially joining the New York Jets as part of Robert Saleh’s first staff in 2021. Manuel has been in the NFL for 18 seasons as both a player and coach, earning trips to the Super Bowl as both.

In his first season with the Jets (2021), Manuel dealt with constantly changing personnel as 10 different safeties appeared on defense for the Jets in 2021, while eight started at least one game. Kickoff Weekend starters, Marcus Maye and Lamarcus Joyner, were limited to 360 total snaps as Joyner was placed on injured reserve in Week Two and Maye in Week 10.

Despite the constant rotation, former 2020 draft choice, Ashtyn Davis was one of just 11 players in 2021 with 50+ tackles, two+ interceptions and two+ forced fumbles after tying for the team lead in both INTs (two) and FFs (three). Additionally, Jason Pinnock, selected in the sixth round that season after a college career at cornerback, made the transition to safety as a rookie and finished the final three weeks as number one rookie rated safety by Pro Football Focus.

Prior to joining the Jets, Manuel served as the defensive backs coach with Philadelphia (2020), before four seasons in Atlanta, first as the secondary coach/senior defensive assistant (2015-16), Manuel was later promoted to defensive coordinator (2017-18). In his first season as coordinator (2017), the defense ranked in the top 10 in scoring defense (eighth), total defense (ninth), rushing defense (ninth), and red zone defense (fifth). Additionally, a pair of second year players, linebacker Deion Jones and safety Keanu Neal, each were selected for their first Pro Bowl.

Manuel’s first NFL position came in Seattle as a special team assistant (2012), before serving as defensive assistant (2013) and assistant secondary coach (2014). In his three seasons with the Seahawks, the team advanced to two Super Bowls, earning a victory in Super Bowl XLVIII, while the defense allowed the fewest passing yards per game in 2014.

An eight-year NFL veteran after initially entering the league as a sixth-round pick (2002), Manuel played with six teams – Cincinnati, Seattle, Green Bay, Carolina, Denver and Detroit – and appeared in 116 games (57 starts). He started 35 of 46 games at Florida, finishing his college career with 308 tackles and six interceptions, before graduating with a degree in criminology and law.

Manuel has two children, daughter, Madison, and son, Marquand II.

TIGHT ENDS

🏠 **ATMORE, AL** 🏈 **AUBURN**

RON MIDDLETON returns for his second season as the tight ends coach after initially joining the New York Jets as part of Robert Saleh's first staff in 2021. An NFL tight end for 10 seasons, Middleton has been coaching since 1997, including 13 seasons at the NFL level.

With the Jets coaching in the 2022 Senior Bowl, Middleton, the Alabama native served as the National Team's head coach, leading the group to a 20-10 win.

In his first season with the Jets (2021), Middleton's group saw five different players record at least one explosive reception (16+ yards), tied for the most by any team in the league this season and the most on a Jets team since at least 2007. Veteran Ryan Griffin, who led the unit in receptions, yards, touchdown and explosive plays, caught at least one pass in each of his 14 games this season, the eighth-longest streak by a Jets TE since 2000.

During the 2021 season, Middleton served as the team's head coach vs. the Jaguars (12/26) after being elevated as a COVID replacement for Robert Saleh. Against his former team, Middleton helped lead the Jets to the 26-21 win as the team tied the franchise single-game record with five fourth-down attempts.

Prior to joining the Jets, Middleton spent eight seasons with Jacksonville as the tight ends coach, also serving as a special teams assistant in his first three seasons (2013-15). Between 2013-17, a Jaguars tight end produced four touchdowns in a season four different times, as both Julius Thomas (2015-16) and Mercedes Lewis (2013, '17) accomplished the feat multiple times.

Middleton's first NFL coaching position came with Tampa Bay as the tight ends/assistant special teams coach (2004-06), as he joined the team as a Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship intern in training camp the year before (2003). In each of his seasons as the tight ends coach, a Bucs tight end produced at least 35 receptions and multiple touchdowns.

Before the start of his NFL coaching career, Middleton spent 13 seasons as a college coach, after he began his career as a restricted earnings coach at Troy, where he worked as a tight ends coach and assisted with the offensive tackles (1997-98), five seasons at Mississippi, first as the tight ends coach (1999-2001) and then as the running backs/special teams coordinator (2002-03), a season at Alabama as the tight ends coach and special teams coordinator (2007), and finally five seasons at Duke (2008-12), where he was the associate head coach/special teams coordinator/tight ends coach.

An NFL tight end for 10 seasons, Middleton entered the league as an undrafted rookie and played for Atlanta, Washington, Cleveland, Los Angeles Rams and San Diego. Prior to that, he spent four years at Auburn where he won three of four bowl games and earned co-offensive MVP recognition as a junior and senior.

After he graduated from Auburn with a degree in pre-law/history in 1988, Middleton later received a master's degree in sports and fitness management from Troy in 1998. He and his wife, Kalita, have four children, Desman, Ron II, Zaria and Mariah.

TONY ODEN

SENIOR DEFFENSIVE ASSISTANT/CORNERBACKS

🏠 CLEVELAND, OH 🏆 BALDWIN-WALLACE COLLEGE

TONY ODEN returns for his second season as senior defensive assistant/cornerbacks after initially joining the New York Jets as part of Robert Saleh's first staff in 2021. A coach in the NFL since 2004, Oden has coached multiple Pro Bowl cornerbacks and safeties over his time in the league.

In his first season with the Jets (2021), Oden's unit consisted entirely of first and second-year players, all of which entered the league as fifth-round or later draft choices or undrafted free agents.

Bryce Hall, a second-year, fifth-round choice in 2020, became the first Jets player to start 17 games in a regular season and finished tied for sixth in the league with 16 passes defended, the most by a Jets since 2013. Brandin Echols, a sixth-round selection in 2021, finished tied for sixth among all rookies with nine passes defended and earned Rookie of the Week honors following his 20-yard interception touchdown return, one of only two Jets to record a defensive TD since 2000. His fellow rookie, Michael Carter II, drafted in the fifth round, was one of only three 2021 rookies with four+ passes defended and four+ tackles for loss, joining Jamal Adams, Erik Coleman and Jonathan Vilma as the only Jets to do so in their first season since 2000.

Prior to his start with the Jets, Oden spent a season as the defensive backs/cornerbacks coach in San Francisco (2020). Despite using seven different starters at corner, the 49ers finished fourth in passing defense while also ranking in the top 10 in both completion percentage and passer rating allowed.

In Miami (2018-19), Oden helped a pair of young players in Xavien Howard and Minkah Fitzpatrick. In 2018, as the defensive backs coach, Howard registered seven interceptions to tie for the league lead, earning his first Pro Bowl appearance. Additionally, Fitzpatrick finished in the top five among all rookie safeties in tackles, interceptions and passes defended.

Oden spent four seasons in Detroit (2014-17) as the defensive backs/cornerbacks coach and helped the Lions finished with 58 interceptions, the ninth-most of that span. Under Oden, cornerback Darius Slay earned his first Pro Bowl selection (2017) after finishing the season with eight interceptions, tied for the most in the league. Additionally, Slay posted 69 passes defended, the most in the league over that span while also finishing in the top five with 14 interceptions.

Before Detroit, Oden spent a season in Tampa Bay (2013) as the secondary/cornerbacks as the Buccaneers defense finished third in the league with 21 interceptions. Cornerback Darrelle Revis was selected to the Pro Bowl in his only season with the team after finishing with a team-high 11 passes defended, two interceptions, two forced fumbles and a sack.

As the secondary coach in Jacksonville (2012), Oden helped cornerback Derek Cox tie a career high with four interceptions, while safety Dawan Landry finished with 100 tackles - one of just eight DBs with at least 100 tackles that season.

A member of the New Orleans staff for six seasons (2006-11), Oden was the assistant secondary coach for five years before becoming the secondary coach in 2011. In his time with the Saints, the team won Super Bowl XLIV, finishing the 2010 with the fourth best passing defense in the league. In that span, safety Roman Harper earned the only two Pro Bowl selections of his 11-year career.

Beginning his NFL career in Houston, Oden served as a defensive assistant and assistant defensive backs coach (2004-05). His first season, the Texans registered 22 interceptions, fifth in the league and still the most in franchise history.

Before coaching in the NFL, Oden served as defensive backs coach at Eastern Michigan University (2003), after spending three seasons at East Carolina University as the safeties coach (2002), secondary coach (2001) and outside linebackers coach (2000). Prior to joining East Carolina, Oden was the assistant defensive backs coach at West Point (1998-99). He began his coaching career as assistant defensive backs coach at Millersville (PA) University in 1996, followed by one season as a graduate assistant working with the wide receivers at Boston College (1997).

A four-year linebacker at Baldwin-Wallace College, Oden earned First-Team Ohio Athletic Conference honors twice and was a 1994 Division III All-American.

Oden and his wife, Amanda, have a son, Jaylen, and a daughter, Ryan.





MIKE RUTENBERG

LINEBACKERS

🏠 CHEVY CHASE, MD 🏡 CORNELL

MIKE RUTENBERG returns for his second season as the linebackers coach after initially joining the New York Jets as part of Robert Saleh’s first staff in 2021. For Rutenberg, 2022 marks his 13th season in the NFL and second as a position coach.

With the Jets coaching in the 2022 Senior Bowl, Rutenberg served as the National Team’s defensive coordinator, holding the American Team to 10 points, 120 yards passing and a 56.6 rating in the win.

In his first season with the Jets (2021), Rutenberg saw career years from Pro Bowl veteran C.J. Mosley as well as Quincy Williams, a third-year player claimed by the Jets prior to the start of the regular season. The pair became one of just eight linebacker tandems in 2021 with 100+ tackles each.

Mosley, who returned after opting out of the 2020 season and missing all but two games the year before was a Pro Bowl alternate and Team MVP after he finished fourth in the league with a single-season best 168 tackles. Williams, who entered 2021 with 18 games played (eight starts) in his first two seasons, posted single-season bests in tackles (107), sacks (2.0), passes defended (five) and tackles for loss (nine), becoming one of just five players in 2021 with 100+ tackles, nine+ TFLs and five+ PDs.

Prior to joining the Jets, Rutenberg was the passing game specialist (2020) with the 49ers. In his only season with San Francisco, he helped the defense finish fourth in passing defense while also ranking in the top 10 in both completion percentage and passer rating allowed.

Coaching college football for seven seasons, first with UCLA (2006-08) and then with New Mexico State (2009-12), Rutenberg was named the defensive coordinator at the University of San Diego (2013) before he returned to the NFL with the Jaguars initially as the assistant defensive backs coach (2013-15), then as a defensive assistant (2016-17), before serving as the assistant linebackers coach (2018-19).

Rutenberg entered the league with Washington, initially as a player personnel intern (2013), before working with Head Coach Joe Gibbs as football assistant to the head coach.

A graduate of Cornell, Rutenberg and his wife, Stacey, have a daughter, Laney, and a son, Luke.

GREG SCRUGGS

ASSISTANT DEFENSIVE LINE

GREG SCRUGGS begins his first season with the New York Jets after joining Robert Saleh’s staff as the assistant defensive line coach on March 1, 2022. For Scruggs, this is his first coaching position in the NFL following a five-year NFL career where he won Super Bowls with two different teams.

Prior to joining the Jets, Scruggs spent four seasons at the University of Cincinnati, the last two as the defensive line coach, part of a staff that saw the Bearcats go 22-2 in that span and finished both years ranked in the Top 10. In 2021, his line was a key part of a defense that ranked fifth nationally in scoring defense (16.5) and 10th in total defense (318.4), after finishing the season with 39 sacks, second in the conference and 18th in the nation.

Scruggs joined Cincinnati in 2018, serving as the director of player development and NFL liaison for two seasons, where he mentored Bearcat players and managed many of the program’s off-the-field initiatives, including community service efforts. Before that, he worked with the NFL’s Legends Development Program in player marketing and communications following his retirement from professional football.

A two-time Super Bowl champion, Scruggs spent five years in the NFL after entering as a seventh-round selection by Seattle (2012). Beginning his career as a defensive lineman, he switched to tight end in his final season, spending time with the Seahawks (2012-14), Bears (2015-16) and Patriots (2016).

Before the NFL, Scruggs played in 42 games (26 starts) at defensive tackle and defensive end for Louisville after just one season of high school football. In his lone high school football season, he posted nine sacks, two forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries and 51 quarterback pressures as St. Xavier (OH) HS finished as the nation’s top ranked team, winning the state championship and finishing the season 15-0. In addition to football, he spent four years on the basketball team and three seasons as a drummer in the marching band.

Scruggs serves on the international board of directors and as a national spokesperson for Boys Hope Girls Hope, an organization centered on cultivating youth empowerment through the foundation of education and holistic support. He appeared in the 2020 film, Black Boys, a feature-length documentary about what it means to be born black and male in America.

Earning a bachelor’s degree in sociology from Louisville in 2011, Scruggs has a son, Koven.

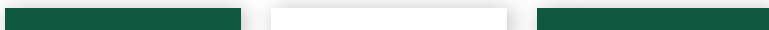

SITUATIONAL FOOTBALL/GAME MANAGEMENT COORDINATOR

NEW YORK, NY  CARNEGIE MELLON

DAN SHAMASH returns to the New York Jets after joining Robert Saleh’s staff as the situational football/game management coordinator on February 1, 2022. Shamash, who first worked with the Jets in 2008, has been in the NFL for the last 14 seasons, coaching both sides of the ball.

Prior to joining the Jets, Shamash spent five seasons with the Chargers (2017-21) in a variety of roles on the offense. Over his time with Los Angeles, he helped coach an offense that ranked in the Top 10 in the league four times. Working with tight ends, Hunter Henry twice posted a single-season best in receptions (2020 & 2019), while he assisted receivers, Keenan Allen set a then-franchise record with 102 receptions (2017), the fourth most in the NFL.

Working on the defensive side of the ball in Jacksonville (2014-16), Shamash served as a defensive quality control coach on the same staff as Saleh (linebackers coach). In 2016, the Jaguars defense finished sixth in the league, allowing 321.7 yards per game and just 5.00 yards per play (ranked third).

In Tampa Bay (2012-13), Shamash worked closely with Head Coach Greg Schiano in football aspects ranging from situational football and game management to daily practice, squad meetings and research projects.

With the Browns (2009-11), he was an offensive assistant for two seasons, assisting with the offense line (2009) – as Alex Mack was named to the All-Rookie Team and Joe Thomas earned All-Pro honors – and then working with the tight ends (2010) – as Ben Watson led all AFC TEs in receptions. In addition, he worked with offensive coordinator Brian Daboll in preparation for daily practice scripting, scheduling and game planning, while also assisting Head Coach Eric Mangini on studying situational football.

Starting his time in the league as an intern with the Jets (2008), Shamash also served as a defensive assistant with Columbia University.

A native of New York City, Shamash earned his undergraduate degree from Carnegie Mellon University in 2008. He played four years for the Tartans at inside linebacker, helping CMU to an 11-1 record in 2006 – the winningest season in school history.

Shamash and his wife, Cassie, have two daughters, Liana and Emma.

DEFENSIVE LINE

🏠 CHARLOTTE, NC 🏆 UNC 🏈 SOUTH CAROLINA

AARON WHITECOTTON returns for his second season as the defensive line coach after initially joining the New York Jets as part of Robert Saleh’s first staff in 2021. Whitecotton is now in his 10th season as an NFL coach and second a position coach.

In his first season with the Jets, Whitecotton oversaw a deep defensive line group as seven different linemen registered 15+ quarterback pressures, one of nine teams in the league to do so. Among those seven, four registered single-season highs in pressures, including John Franklin-Myers whose 43 pressures were the most by a Jet since 2015. Franklin-Myers, who earned a contract extension during the season, was also one of 11 players in 2021 with multiple games of seven+ QB pressures.

Against the run, all three of the Jets interior defenders with 500+ snaps – Folorunso Fatukasi, Sheldon Rankins and Quinnen Williams – finished in the top 10 league-wide in stuff percentage (defined as tackles made on run plays resulting in no gain or loss). Williams was selected as a Pro Bowl alternate as one of just two players in the league in the top 10 in stop, stuff and sack percentage.

Prior to joining the Jets, Whitecotton worked as the assistant defensive line coach in San Francisco (2020). Despite losing two opening day starters in Week Two, Nick Bosa, the reigning defensive rookie of the year, and Solomon Thomas, the 49ers defense finished fifth in total defense and seventh in rushing defense. Defensive lineman Kerry Hyder started 14 games after logging more than 450 snaps in a season just once in his five previous years in the league as he become one of just 11 defensive linemen with at least 8.0 sacks, 15 quarterback hits and 40 total tackles.

Before his season in San Francisco, Whitecotton spent three seasons with Buffalo, the last two as the assistant defensive line coach. The Bills defense finished second in the league in 2018 and third in 2019 in total defense, combining to allow just 296.2 yards per game, the lowest in the league over that span. From 2018-19, six different defensive linemen totaled at least 5.0+ sacks, five different d-linemen registered 10+ quarterback hits and four recorded 10+ tackles for loss.

Entering the NFL with Jacksonville in 2013, Whitecotton spent three seasons (2013-15) as a defensive assistant working with the defensive line, before serving as an assistant defensive line coach with the Jaguars in 2016. That season, the defense ranked sixth in total defense while a league-high five different defensive linemen each registered six+ tackles for loss. Additionally, rookie defensive end Yannick Ngakoue, a third-round pick, recorded 8.0 sacks (ranked second among all rookies) and four forced fumbles (ranked first).

Beginning his coaching career at his alma mater, Myers Park (NC) HS, Whitecotton served as the defensive coordinator, linebackers and defensive line coach throughout his time at the school (2005-11), before coaching a season as a defensive assistant at New Mexico State (2012).

Whitecotton played center at South Carolina from 2000-01 before transferring to UNC Charlotte, where he earned his undergraduate degree. He and his wife, Heather, have four children, two daughters, Lila James and Lorelei Tyler, and two sons, Jax and Jet.

ASSISTANT OFFENSIVE LINE

BEN WILKERSON begins his first season with the New York Jets after joining Robert Saleh’s staff as the assistant offensive line coach on February 16, 2022. For Wilkerson, this is his eighth season coaching in the league following a four-year playing career.

Prior to joining the Jets, Wilkerson spent four seasons with the Giants (2018-21) as the assistant offensive line coach. In 2021, Andrew Thomas cut his sacks allowed from 10 as a rookie to two and his pressures allowed from 59 to 18 (according to Pro Football Focus). Thomas ranked in both the top 10 in sacks and pressures allowed among all tackles with 500+ snaps.

Serving as the assistant offensive line coach with Chicago (2015-17), Wilkerson helped oversee an offensive that line helped the Bears rank 10th in rushing, averaging 112.0 yards a game in that span. Additionally, rookie Jordan Howard’s 1,313 yards in 2016 were the second-highest total in the NFL that season, and the most by a rookie in franchise history.

Wilkerson began his coaching career at his alma mater, LSU, as an offensive graduate assistant (2010), and then as an offensive administrative intern (2011). He then spent training camp with the Steelers (2012) as part of the Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship program, and two seasons at Grambling State (2012-13) as the o-line coach, and a year as an assistant football and track coach for North Shore (TX) Senior HS (2014) before returning to the NFL.

MACK BROWN returns for his fourth season with the New York Jets, second as an offensive assistant, after two seasons as a defensive assistant. Brown, who initially joined the team in 2019, is now in his second season working with the team’s receivers after two working with the linebackers.

In the 2022 Senior Bowl, Brown was elevated to wide receivers coach working with the National Team’s six WRs as part of a staff that won 20-10.

Last season, his first on the offensive side with the Jets, Brown worked with wide receiver coach Miles Austin as five different Jets receivers caught 25+ passes, the only such team in the league in 2021, while four had multiple touchdown receptions. 2021 second-round pick, Elijah Moore, became the first rookie to lead the Jets in receiving yards since 1995, averaging 76.5 yards per game between Weeks Eight and 13 (his final six games of the season).

Working primarily with the linebackers in his first two seasons (2019-20) with the Jets, Brown helped Neville Hewitt produce single-season career highs in 2019 (72) and 2020 (131) as Hewitt finished ninth in the league last season. Additionally, those two seasons, the five different inside linebackers have produced at least one 10+ tackle game, as the defense allowed just 99.5 yards per game rushing, the fourth best average in the league.

Prior to joining the Jets, Brown spent the previous three seasons as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Missouri State, helping the Bears increase their scoring average in consecutive seasons.

Before Missouri State, Brown served on the staff at Missouri, starting as a recruiting assistant before adding the role of offensive quality control and graduate assistant. He began his coaching career as an assistant coach at William Jewell College, before moving on as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Lawrence (KS) High School.

As a player at Baker, Brown was a first-team All-HAAC performer in 2008 and a three-time NAIA Academic All-American, helping to lead the Wildcats to their first NAIA playoff berth in 15 years. He finished with school records for most passing yards in a career, season and game by a Wildcat quarterback.

Brown completed a master’s degree in health, physical education and recreation from Emporia State in 2011. He is married to his wife, Amanda.

RICKY MANNING JR. returns for his second season as a defensive assistant after initially joining the New York Jets as part of Robert Saleh’s first staff in 2021. Manning, Jr. has now been a part of the NFL for 10 years, including six as a player and four as a coach.

In the 2022 Senior Bowl, Manning, Jr. was elevated to cornerbacks coach working with the National Team as the defense limited the American Team to 10 points, 120 yards passing and a 56.6 rating in the win.

In his first season with the Jets, Manning, Jr. worked with Tony Oden and the Jets cornerbacks. The corners, part of a young secondary that led the NFL with 4,468 snaps by rookie and second-year defensive backs saw standout performances from a number of players, including Bryce Hall (tied for sixth in the league in passes defended), Brandin Echols (tied for sixth among rookies in PDs) and Michael Carter II (one of three rookies with four+ PDs and tackles for loss).

Manning, Jr. spent two seasons as the assistant defensive backs coach in Seattle, helping the Seahawks defense rank in the top 10 in completion percentage and passer rating allowed, while finishing in the top five in passing defense. Both cornerback Richard Sherman (2016) and safety Earl Thomas (2017) were Pro Bowl selections, while rookie cornerback Shaquill Griffin (2017) registered 15 passes defended, a single-season career best and the most on the team that season.

A native of Fresno, CA, Manning, Jr. coached at Fresno State (2015) and Fresno City College (2013-14), after beginning his coaching career as the head coach at his alma mater, Edison (CA) HS (2012). Before joining the Jets staff, he served as a defensive back coach (2018-19) before being promoted to the defensive coordinator (2020) at Clovis North (CA) HS.

An NFL veteran for six seasons, Manning, Jr. played in 84 games (38 starts) with Carolina, Chicago and St. Louis. Appearing in two Super Bowls, he registered 14 regular season interceptions – with another five in the postseason – scoring three defensive touchdowns (two INT returns and one fumble return). Following his NFL career, he played in the UFL for the Florida/Virginia franchise.

Starting 45 consecutive games for UCLA, the second-longest streak in school history, Manning, Jr. was a three-time first-team All-Pac 10 selection, finishing his career with 13 interceptions, a top 10 total in Bruins history.

As part of the Social Justice, Diversity and Inclusion team with the Jets, Manning, Jr. delivered the commencement speech to the 2021 class at Year Up, a group committed to ensuring equitable access to economic opportunity, education, and justice for all young adults—no matter their background, income, or zip code.

Manning, Jr. and his wife, Tasha, have four sons.

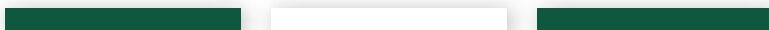

Washington has three sons, Leon, Nolen, and Noel, and a daughter, Lily.

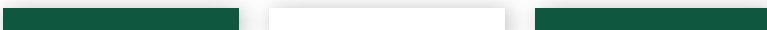

TOP OF THE CLASS: BERRIOS graduated as valedictorian of Miami's School of Business Administration with a double major in finance and entrepreneurship, finishing with a 3.961 grade point average • Honored with the ACC's Jim Tatum Award as the conference's top scholar-athlete.

"At the end of the day, I have a competitive edge and I have a switch that just doesn't go off," he said in Dec. 2021. "So when I sat in those classes it was either you or me. You got the same test I got, you got the same quiz I got, you got the same project, whatever, and I was going to make sure that when I turned mine in, I was going to beat you. That carried on and then junior year, it was kind of like, 'Oh wow, I might actually have a shot at [valedictorian].' I got one B junior year second semester.

When BERRIOS was asked what class he got the B in, he laughingly responded, "I don't want to talk about it. It stung, it hurt. It was in a finance class and, yeah, it bothered me for a while."

TWO-PHASE CONTRIBUTOR: In addition to his contributions on special teams, BERRIOS registered single-season career bests in receptions (46), receiving yards (431), rushing attempts (seven), rushing yards (40) and scrimmage touchdowns (four) • He became the first Jets wide receiver to record multiple rushing touchdowns in the regular season, one of two receivers in the league this season to do so and one of just 19 total since the merger (1970).

Including his 102-yard kickoff return touchdown, BERRIOS is one of nine players with a receiving, rushing and kick return touchdown in the same season since 2016.

ALL-PRO PRODUCTION: Selected as a first-team All Pro and first alternate for the Pro Bowl, BERRIOS - a former waiver claim (2019) - finished first (min. 20 kickoff returns) in kickoff return average (30.4) and second (min. 15 punt returns) in punt return average (13.4) last season (2021).

Since 1970, BERRIOS joins a list of only 10 players to finish in the top three in both kickoff and punt return average in the same season • Additionally, despite returning 13 total kickoffs in his previous two seasons, he finished with both the third best kickoff return average (min. 20 kickoff returns) and punt return average (min. 15 punt returns) in franchise history.

TARHEEL LEGEND: A four-year running back, CARTER finished his career at UNC with the fourth-most rushing yards in school history (3,404), 22 touchdowns, and added 656 yards and six touchdowns on 82 receptions • His 6.6 yards per carry average was the highest in school history (min. 50 carries) • As a senior (2020), earned All-ACC Honors, was a third-team All-American selection by the Associated Press and was a finalist for the Paul Hornung Award after he started all 11 games and led the ACC in rushing yards per game (113.2), gaining 1,245 yards and nine touchdowns on 8.0 yards per carry, the third-highest average in the FBS and a school record.

SOCIAL JUSTICE: A captain in his senior season at UNC, CARTER helped lead the team in the wake of George Floyd’s killing, as Head Coach Mack Brown said he was the first player he called, and those conversations laid the foundation for how the team communicated on social injustices facing the nation.

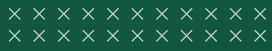

TRACK & FIELD: DAVIS became a four-time All-American, Pac-12 champion, and two-time MPSF champion for the Cal track and field program after joining as a walk-on with no offers coming out of high school • Won the 110-meter hurdles on 14 occasions during his Cal career, including the Pac-12 Championships with a personal best time of 13.50 that ranks as the third-best mark in the event in school history.

DAVIS's track career started late as he played baseball, basketball and mostly football growing up, joining the high school track team as a junior, only after his high school quarterback suggested it as a way to increase his speed for football • Despite his football and track success, he had no offers and attended the 2014 California High School State Track and Field Championships to try to find a school • He settled on Cal because of proximity and their willingness to let him try to continue his football career.

"My dad said, 'Just keep doing (track) and use it as a platform for where you want to go for football,'" Davis recalled to the Cal student newspaper. "It was really hard to find a school that was going to let me pursue football as well. When I visited Cal, the track staff was totally fine with me doing that, so it was just the right fit."

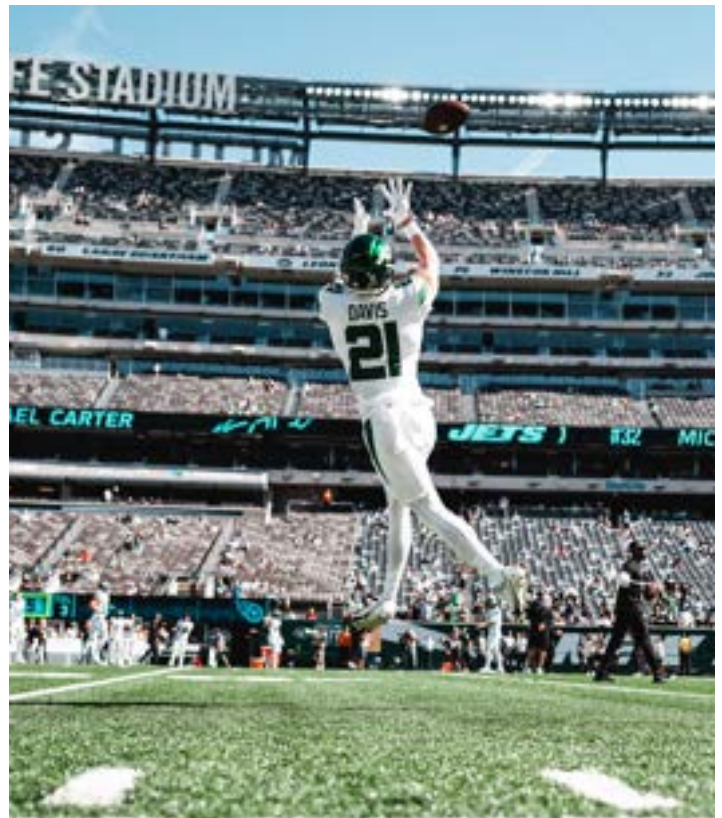

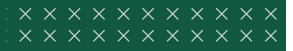

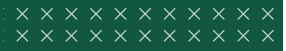

PAVED THE WAY: DAVIS's older brother, Titus, the all-time receiving yards (3,700) and touchdown (37) leader at Central Michigan University, spent parts of two seasons on the Jets practice squad (2015-2016)

"Since I was a little kid, I was always chasing after him and trying to be like him," Corey told the Tennessean in 2020. "I wore his number every year to copy him. He thought it was annoying, but I looked up to him tremendously."

Corey, like Titus did, wears 84 with the Jets.

Titus passed away in 2020 at the age of 27 from Renal Medullary Carcinoma, a rare form of kidney cancer, only a few months after his diagnosis.

"He was so courageous to me ... he was a giant," Corey told the New York Post in 2021. "He faced a lot of adversity, seen a lot of obstacles, and no matter what he went through, it never really seemed to shake him. Even when he was going through his toughest times, you know battling this really rare, really aggressive [kidney] cancer it never shook him. And to me, that says a lot about who he is as a person, it never shook him, and he was the same person the whole time. The entire process he was the same person."

"He was always looking out for me. He was the best big brother, man. It was just unbelievable to see the strength ... I'm nothing without him. He taught me the way."

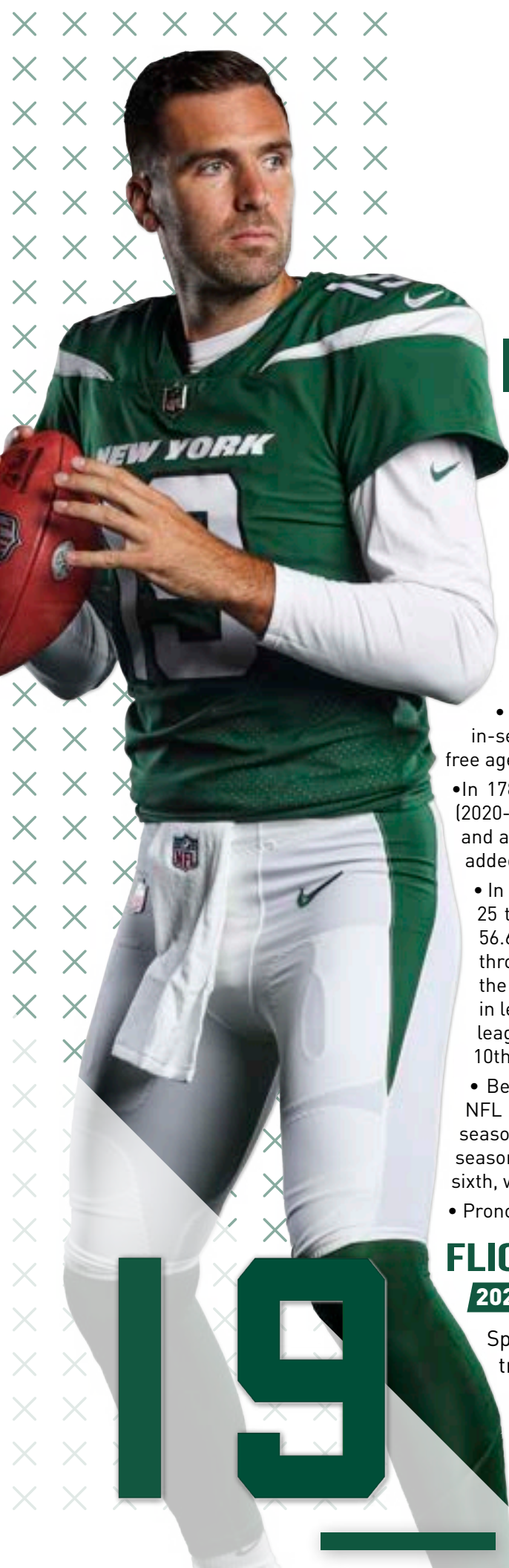

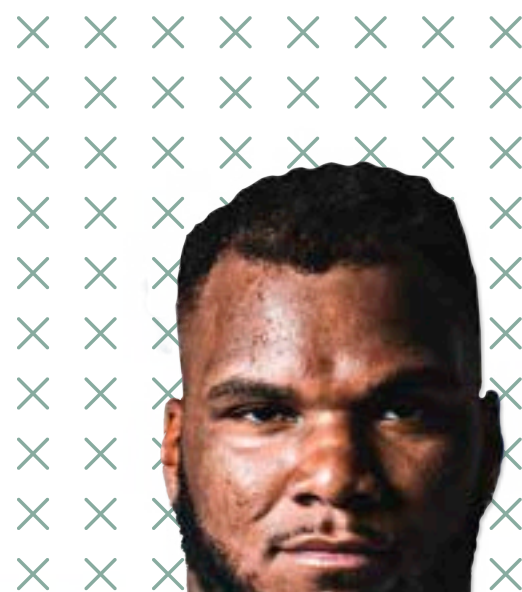

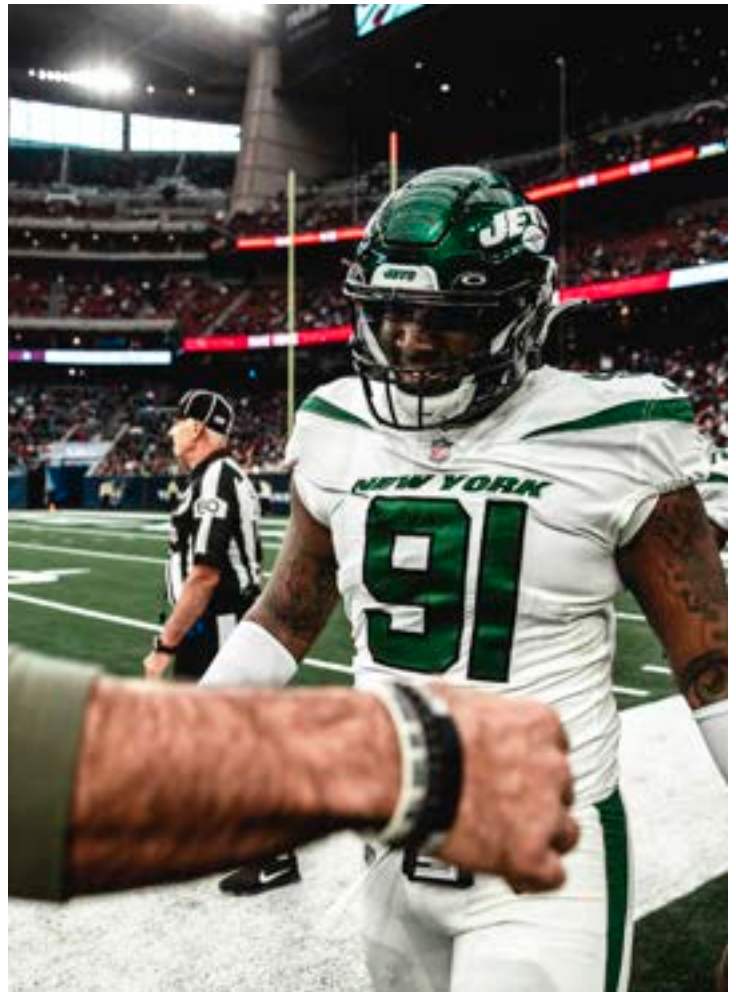

EXTRA SPECIAL: Signed last offseason as an unrestricted free agent, HARDEE is one of 16 players with at least 40 special teams tackles since he entered the league (2017) • In his first season with the Jets, he registered a single-season best 12 tackles to lead the team.

HARDEE CARES FOUNDATION: Through his Hardee Cares Foundation, HARDEE facilitates programs for youth in New Orleans and Cleveland, as well as supporting sarcoidosis awareness, honoring his mother, Estella, who passed away from the disease in 2013 at the age of 55.

“My mom, I want to do so much for her,” Hardee told SI in 2020. “I want to be the best human being, the best football player, the best businessman, for her. I want to do so much. I wish she was here to see it all. Since she’s not, I’ve got to do everything I can [to do] the right things, I’ve got so much more in store.”

PAPA JOHN’S FRANCHISE: HARDEE opened his own Papa John’s Franchise in New Orleans, an idea he first had in 2017 as a rookie after he joined teammates Ted Ginn Jr. and Marshon Lattimore at a charity event catered by Papa John’s.

After reaching out to Malcolm Jenkins, also a Papa John’s franchise owner, and planning for over a year, he opened the Tulane Avenue store in 2020.

“How can I be sitting here with three degrees and really not have nothing else, not really be getting money from another stream,” Hardee said in 2020. “I just told myself I wanted to be an off-the-field millionaire, just without ball.”

RARITY: SHEPHERD became only the third player ever drafted from Fort Hays State and the first in over 30 years • Despite coming from a small school, gained the attention with his invite to the 2018 Senior Bowl.

“I walked into Senior Bowl practices not even knowing his name, honestly,” Rob Rang, NFLDraftScout.com analyst, told the Toronto Sun in 2018. “This is a good player who just happens to come from a really small school. And the country, if they didn’t know his name before, they should have once the Senior Bowl got going. He was just terrific.”

OFF THE FIELD

ODD JOBS: As a result of Canadian universities not offering full athletic scholarships, **SHEPHERD** was forced to withdraw from Simon Fraser University in Burnaby, British Columbia, before enrolling at Fort Hays State the following year. In his time between the two schools – two seasons – he worked in a plant nursery, electrical construction, and a factory that made boxes for beer and soda, working out by doing push-ups between his 12-hour shifts.

“If it is to be, it’s up to me,” something instilled in him by his Ajax-Pickering Dolphins Football Club coach, Jeff Ahlstedt, a message that **SHEPHERD** told the New York Post in 2018, “I can’t lie, that’s something that was ingrained in my character. So ‘If it is to be it’s up to me’ for me it was just a great way to kind of take control of whatever you wanted your future to look like.”

THE DEFENSIVE LINE: After the passing of his older sister, Ella, in January 2018, THOMAS began dedicating his life to sharing Ella's story, working with nonprofit organizations to raise awareness and secure funds for mental health and suicide prevention work • He and his family – mother, Martha, and father, Chris – founded The Defensive Line (@TDefensiveLine) to honor Ella and bring a message of hope and help to other at-risk young people with their stated mission, "To end the epidemic of youth suicide, especially for people of color, by transforming the way we communicate and connect about mental health."

"I just really want people to know, it's OK to not be OK, that all the feelings you're feeling throughout the day, you know, whether you're feeling sad, depressed, anxious, angry – these are feelings of the human experience," said THOMAS in a CNN piece. "At the time I started speaking of it, I hadn't come to terms with it, I really hadn't accepted it at the time."

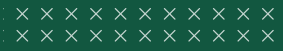

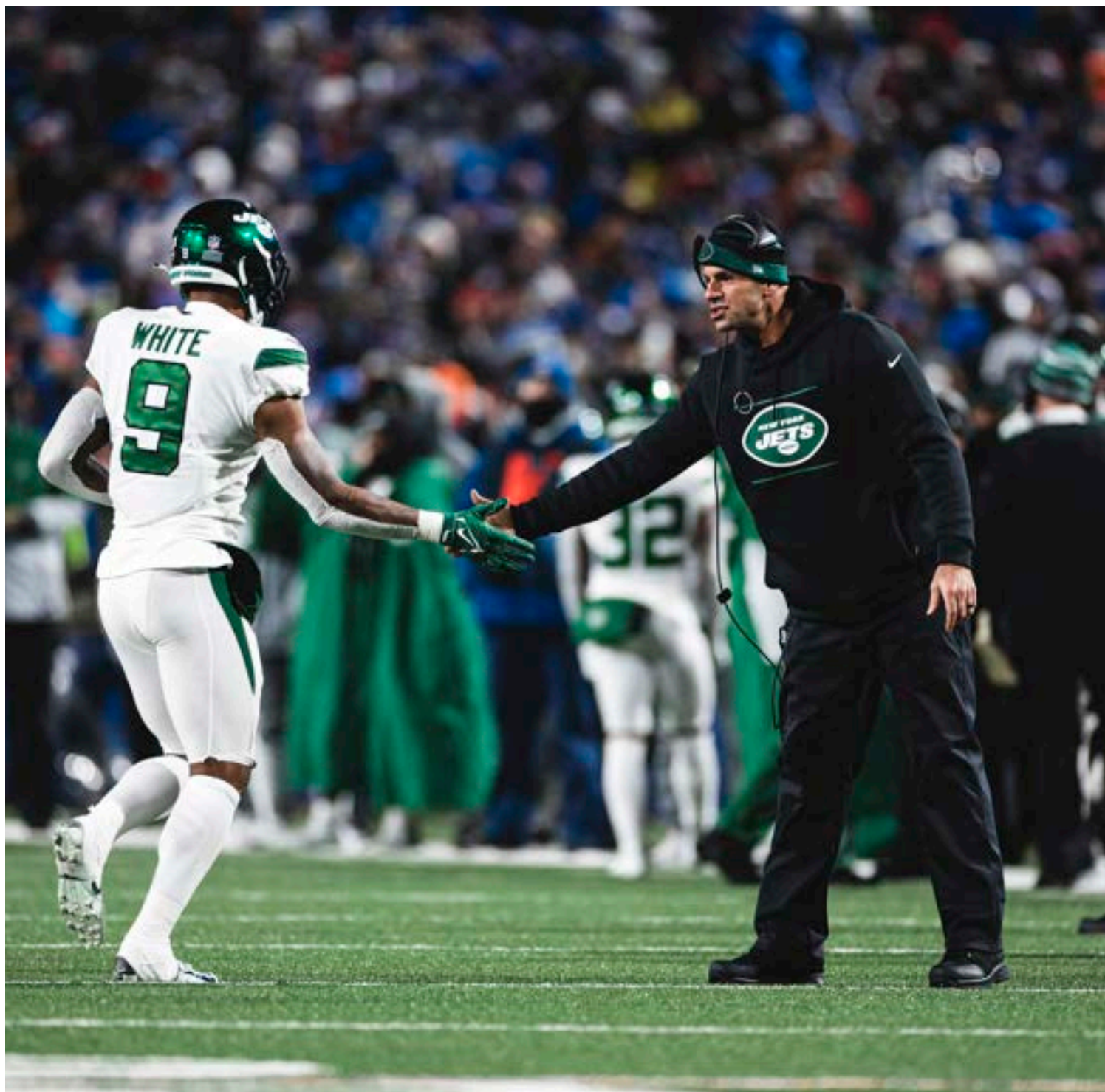

TRANSFERRED: After transferring from South Florida to Western Kentucky following his sophomore season, WHITE led a Hilltopper offense in 2016 that finished top five among all FBS schools in points per game (45.5), passing efficiency (174.9), total offense (523.1), and passing offense (336.8).

Over WHITE's two seasons at WKU, threw for 8,540 yards, the third most in the country behind 2018 No. 1 overall pick, Baker Mayfield, and 2018 second-round selection, Mason Rudolph.

OFF THE FIELD

FOR THE LOVE OF THE GAME: A standout baseball player in high school, WHITE was named a Louisville Slugger All-American as a junior and earned first-team All-Broward honors from the Miami Herald as a pitcher, going 9-2 with a 0.43 ERA.

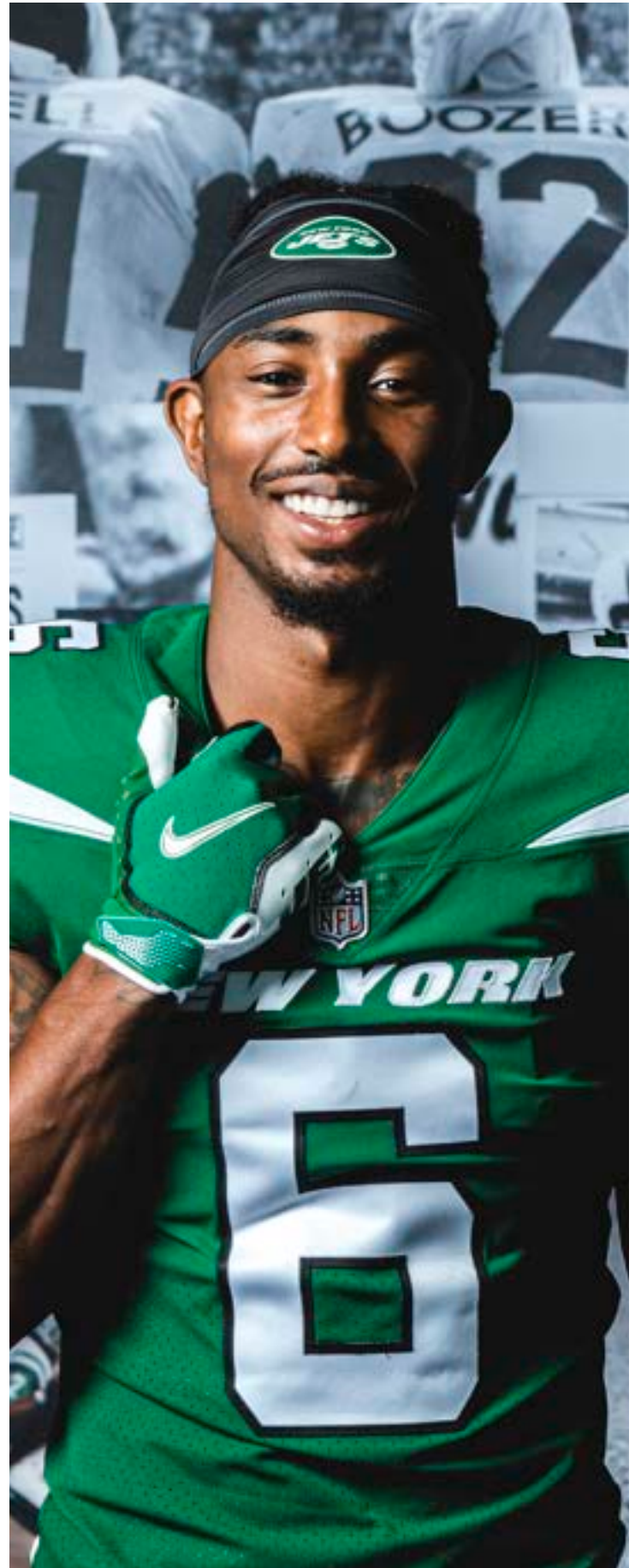

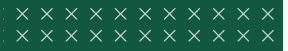

GOOD COMPANY: In his final season at BYU (2020), WILSON broke the school record, previously held by Steve Young, for completion percentage, as he completed 73.5% and threw for 3,692 yards and 33 touchdowns, the third most in the country in both categories and added 10 rushing touchdowns, the fourth most by a QB in the nation • Finished the season with just three interceptions, tied for the fewest interceptions in a season among all quarterbacks with at least 30 touchdown passes.

HS MVP: After he led Corner Canyon (UT) HS to an 11-1 record, a regional championship and the 5A state semifinals as a senior, WILSON was named 5A Most Valuable Player and a first-team all-state selection after he threw for 2,986 yards and 24 touchdowns and ran for 752 yards and eight scores.

OFF THE FIELD

FORESHADOWED: While in college, WILSON traveled to New York City with his former BYU Head Coach Kilani Sitaki's More2Life Foundation to work with the Harlem Jets, a youth athletic organization in Harlem, NY.

"It never occurred to me when I was there that I would be playing there," Wilson told the Deseret News after being drafted. "New York is a faraway place. I used to love visiting. It was such a blast. Staying right in the city, in Times Square, and I think it was a week we would spend there, working with a lot of those kids. It was a blast. Did I think I would be there within a year? I didn't. But what an amazing opportunity to be in that situation now."

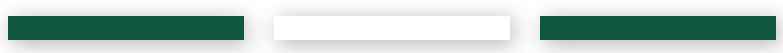

"When I'm in my little calm mood, it's just me being Ahmad. The Sauce is within me, so I'm always Sauce. I have to know when to flip the switch up and turn the switch off."



After being drafted by the Jets, GARDNER visited patients virtually, as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, at Goryeb Children's Hospital • Signed and sent a football to patients and offered them tickets to a Jets game.

On June 3rd, GARDNER, along with the rest of the Jets 2022 Rookie Class, participated in the Operation Cops and Kids community service with Newark and NYC Police Officers and youth.

"Garrett was one of the best basketball players I've ever seen, too," Baty told SNY.tv. "If he chose basketball, no doubt he'd be in the NBA right now."

"I'm confident he would've been in the NFL as a quarterback," WILSON said of Baty. "He was that good. He says he was just throwing it up to me, but the bombs he was throwing were 45, 50 yards and we were in sixth grade."

In 2017, WILSON was named the area's Male Athlete of the Year by the Austin American-Statesman, an award Baty won the following year.

BASKETBALL IN HIS BLOOD: His father, Kenny, finished his career at Davidson as the school's seventh all-time leading scorer, while WILSON was an All-Central Texas selection in basketball after he averaged 21 points per game at Lake Travis (TX) HS.

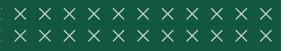

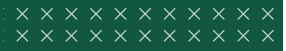
