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METLIFE STADIUM HOME OF THE NEW YORK GIANTS

In 2010, the Giants moved into a beautiful, new, state-of-the-art stadium built just a few yards from where Giants Stadium stood for more than three decades. MetLife Stadium is the nation’s finest football stadium. It seats 82,500 fans and is one of the NFL’s most technologically advanced stadiums.

MetLife Stadium took more than 4 million man-hours and \$1.6 billion to build. The stadium features more than 9,000 club seats, 221 suites and 130,000 square feet of state-of-the-art club lounges. The first row of seats is just 46 feet from the sidelines and the sightlines are superb. The Giants’ home is 2.1 million square feet, compared to Giants Stadium’s 900,000 square feet. It has four 30 feet by 118 feet high-definition video screens, a 350,000 square foot outdoor plaza filled with interactive activities for fans of all ages.

On Feb. 2, 2014, MetLife Stadium hosted a historic event. It was the site of Super Bowl XLVIII, the first Super Bowl to be played outdoors at a cold weather venue. The Seattle Seahawks defeated the Denver Broncos, 43-8.

In its inaugural 2010 season, the Giants’ home was known simply as New Meadowlands Stadium. On Aug. 23, 2011 the Giants, Jets and MetLife announced the signing of a 25-year agreement to name the teams’ home venue MetLife Stadium.

“Our partnership with the Giants and Jets goes back to 2008 when we became the first cornerstone sponsor here at the stadium,” said Steven A. Kandarian, president and chief executive officer of MetLife. “This expanded partnership provides significant benefits for both sides. MetLife secures the naming rights to a world class venue that will extend the reach of our brand to levels unmatched in the industry. And the Jets and Giants gain a sponsor with a history of financial strength and a brand as strong and storied as their own. MetLife Stadium is clearly one of the world’s premier sports marketing facilities.”

The NFL’s premier venue opened for business in 2010. In addition to being the only stadium that is home to two NFL teams and Super Bowl XLVIII, it hosts dozens of non-NFL events each year including concerts, NCAA football and lacrosse games and international soccer matches.

The entire Meadowlands Sports Complex has been renamed The MetLife Sports Complex.

“It is truly an honor for our team to be affiliated with such a wonderful partner,” said John Mara, president and chief executive officer of the Giants. “I know how much MetLife means to so many in New York and New Jersey, as an employer, as a trusted provider of financial services, and as a great corporate citizen. The company’s huge presence and influence in our area makes it a natural fit for this stadium and the strength, stability and quality of MetLife matches perfectly with the characteristics that the Giants try to achieve in all aspects of our aspirations. MetLife is a true leader in its industry and brings a powerful, well-known brand that reflects very well on our stadium and what we’re trying to accomplish here. For the Giants in particular, MetLife’s reputation and long history are very appealing qualities that resonate with us on a very basic level. We are both organizations that value heritage and legacy.”

“MetLife Stadium immediately joins the ranks of the most prestigious, high-profile sports-branded venues in the world, and that’s the way it should be,” said Steve Tisch, the Giants’ chairman and executive vice president. “If you look at MetLife and the marketing and branding assets they have, you can understand how proud we feel that they have selected our stadium as the one they want their name on. Clearly MetLife realizes what a unique situation we have: two NFL home teams and twice as many games over the course of the season. And of course, we are very proud that MetLife has recognized just what a fantastic, one-of-a-kind facility this stadium is.

The 2023 season will be the Giants’ 14th in MetLife Stadium. They are 50-56-1 in regular-season games and 1-0 in the postseason, defeating Atlanta in a 2011 NFC Wild Card game on their way to winning Super Bowl XLVI. MetLife Stadium has hosted numerous prestigious events, including NFL, college football and soccer games, and concerts. In 2014, the stadium was the site of Super Bowl XLVIII, the first outdoor Super Bowl played in a “cold weather” city. Seattle defeated Denver, 43-8.

PRESIDENT AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

NEW YORK FOOTBALL GIANTS

John K. Mara is in his 33rd season with the Giants. The franchise's President and Chief Executive Officer, he assumed the team presidency upon the passing of his father, Wellington Mara, in 2005. Mara joined the Giants in 1991 as General Counsel and later added the title of Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer.

With team Chairman Steve Tisch, Mara was at the forefront of the planning and negotiations for MetLife Stadium, where the Giants have played their home games for 13 seasons after 34 years in Giants Stadium. In addition, Mara, Steve Tisch and Jonathan Tisch, as well as Jets owner Woody Johnson, headlined the bid committee that helped convince the NFL owners to award Super Bowl XLVIII to the new stadium. Seattle and Denver played in the game on Feb. 2, 2014. The first Super Bowl to be held in a cold-weather outdoor venue was an overwhelming success, both in the week prior to the game and on game day.

Mara, one of the NFL's most prominent and respected owners, is the chairman of the league's Management Council Executive Committee, and he played an important role in negotiating the 2011 and 2020 collective bargaining agreements with the NFLPA. He also serves on several other NFL committees, including for the last 22 years on the influential Competition Committee, which studies all aspects of the game and recommends rules and policy changes to NFL clubs. Mara also serves on the NFL's Health and Safety, Compensation, Workplace Diversity and Legalized Sports Betting committees.

Mara is also on the board of the Newark, N.J. Covenant House Action Research Think Tank (CHART), which was formed to combat human trafficking.


Mara has been affiliated with the Giants his entire life. The franchise was founded in 1925 by his grandfather, Tim Mara. Wellington Mara was one of the most influential, respected and beloved executives in NFL history. Tim and Wellington Mara are both enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Since John Mara joined the organization in an official capacity, the Giants have participated in 11 playoffs, won five NFC East titles and played in three Super Bowls, winning two.

Born in New York City on Dec. 1, 1954, Mara grew up in Westchester County in White Plains and graduated from Iona Prep High School in New Rochelle. He attended Boston College where he received a B.S. degree in marketing, graduating with Cum Laude honors in 1976. Mara earned his law degree from Fordham University in 1979. He specialized in labor and employment law and litigation at two Manhattan firms prior to joining the Giants.

Mara serves on the Board of Directors of Saint Vincent's Hospital in Harrison, N.Y. and Boys Hope Girls Hope of New York.

John and his wife, the former Denise Walter, have five children and 14 grandchildren.



STEVE TISCH



CHAIRMAN AND EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT

NEW YORK FOOTBALL GIANTS

Steve Tisch is an Academy-award winning producer; partner at Escape Artists Productions; Chairman, Executive Vice President and Co-Owner of the New York Football Giants; and a committed philanthropist. He is the only person with both an Oscar and a Super Bowl ring, winning Best Picture for *Forrest Gump* in 1994 and receiving two Super Bowl rings as Chairman of the Giants for Super Bowls XLIII and XLVI.

For more than four decades, Steve has successfully produced compelling stories in film and television, from the critically acclaimed television movie, *The Burning Bed* starring Farrah Fawcett, to *Risky Business*, the sleeper hit that helped launch Tom Cruise's career. Other film credits include *Lock, Stock and Two Smoking Barrels*, *American History X*, *Snatch*, *The Weather Man*, *The Pursuit of Happyness*, *Seven Pounds*, *The Taking of Pelham 123*, *The Back-Up Plan*, *Hope Springs*, *The Equalizer*, *Southpaw*, *The Equalizer 2*, *The Upside*, *Troop Zero*, *A Journal For Jordan*, *Being the Ricardos*, *Pig* and *The Man from Toronto*. The next feature release for Escape is *The Equalizer 3*, coming to theatres this fall.

On the television side, Escape Artists first straight to series show, *Perpetual Grace, LTD.*, premiered in 2019 on EPIX, with a limited run conclusion currently in the works. Currently streaming on Peacock is *Dr. Death*, based on the Wondery podcast, with follow up seasons in the works. Also streaming on Apple TV, are Seasons 1, 2, 3 & 4 of *Servant*, in association with M. Night Shyamalan. Tisch also served as an Executive Producer alongside Steven Spielberg and Alex Gibney on *Why We Hate*, a six-part docu-series which aired recently on The Discovery Channel, examining the origins and dangers of hate.

Steve Tisch has been involved with the New York Giants since his father, Preston Robert Tisch, purchased 50 percent of the franchise in 1991. In 2005, Steve was named Executive Vice President, and with the passing of his father that year, he assumed the additional title of Chairman. He worked closely with John Mara, President and CEO of the Giants, on the

planning and construction of MetLife Stadium, which was completed in the spring of 2010 and ranked as the number one grossing stadium in the world in 2012. Steve also helped win the successful bid to bring Super Bowl XLVIII to MetLife Stadium in February 2014. Tisch and Mara were named Best NFL Owners by Forbes in 2011.

Tisch is also active in philanthropy, generously contributing his time and resources to a variety of organizations in the arts, health and education. Recognizing the value of storytelling and its ability to increase dialogue and understanding, Steve made a transformative gift to Tel Aviv University, elevating its Department of Film and Television into a full school, now named The Steve Tisch School of Film and Television. The school has won top prizes at film festivals around the world and is Israel's leading institution of film and television studies. It has been ranked by *The Hollywood Reporter* among the top 15 international film schools for three years in a row. Tisch was awarded an honorary doctorate degree from Tel Aviv University in 2016.

Tisch made a leadership gift to the David Geffen School of Medicine for the UCLA Steve Tisch BrainSPORT Program, the single largest donation from an individual to a medical center for a concussion-related initiative. The gift created the first U.S. fellowship to train pediatric neurologists who specialize in sports concussions, and established the world's most sophisticated research, prevention, diagnosis and treatment program for concussions and brain injuries with a particular emphasis on young athletes.

Steve Tisch is currently on the Board of Trustees of the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, is a founding Trustee of The Geffen Theatre in Los Angeles, is on the Board of Advisors of the Tisch School of the Arts at New York University and The Preston Robert Tisch Brain Tumor Center at Duke University, and previously served on the board of the Sundance Institute.

Tisch resides in both Los Angeles and New York City.

SENIOR PLAYER PERSONNEL EXECUTIVE, BOARD DIRECTOR

NEW YORK FOOTBALL GIANTS

Chris Mara, who is in his 21st season in his second stint with the Giants, is the team's senior personnel executive. Mara joined the Giants as vice president of player evaluation on July 29, 2003. He was promoted in 2011 to senior vice president of player personnel and received his current title in 2022. In his position, Mara evaluates both college and professional players.

Mara was instrumental in acquiring numerous players on the 2007 and 2011 Giants teams that won Super Bowls XLIII and XLVI.

Mara first joined the Giants' staff prior to the 1979 season and over the next 14 years was a member of the club's player personnel department. Mara was a scout during the franchise's first two Super Bowl Championship seasons in 1986 and 1990.

Following his first stint with the Giants, Mara spent eight years (1994-2001) operating ProRate, Inc., an independent football scouting service contracted by as many as 15 NFL franchises. The service provided an evaluation of the free agent market in the NFL.

Mara spent 2001-02 as the President/General Manager of the New Jersey Gladiators of the Arena Football League. He oversaw a myriad of responsibilities including ticket sales, operations, and the arena lease. Mara's primary focus was on player personnel and player contracts. He brought his extensive knowledge of professional football to the team and

revived the struggling franchise in just one season.

After a difficult first season, the Gladiators posted a 9-5 record in 2002 and a first-place finish in the Eastern Division of the National Conference. Posting the biggest turnaround in AFL history, the Gladiators finished the 2002 regular season with seven more victories than the previous year and qualified for the playoffs for the first time in franchise history.

Mara graduated from Iona Prep in New Rochelle, N.Y. where he was a standout defensive back for three seasons, winning All-Catholic High School Athletic Association recognition after his senior year.

He began his collegiate career at Springfield College, where he was a defensive back on the freshman team and lettered on the varsity golf team. He then transferred to Boston College, where he earned a B.A. in the arts and sciences. During his scholastic and collegiate days, Mara spent many summers working at Giants training camps. During the regular season, he worked with broadcast teams from both CBS-TV and NBC-TV, as well as with visiting and home radio broadcast groups.

Mara was born in New York City. He is married to the former Kathleen Rooney and the couple has four children - Daniel, Kate, Rooney and Conor - and seven grandchildren, Judith Kailee, Wellington Rooney, Ann MacKenna, Blaise Rooney (Daniel's children), a granddaughter (Kate's daughter) and two grandsons (one apiece for Kate and Rooney).

Jonathan M. Tisch is Co-Chairman of the Board of Loews Corporation and Executive Chairman of its subsidiary Loews Hotels & Co. Prior to assuming the role of Executive Chairman, Tisch was Chairman and CEO of Loews Hotels & Co. and has been an officer of the Company since 1986.

Tisch has led Loews' expansion and emergence as a prominent and respected hotel company with a widely praised culture that embraces the power of partnerships—with team members, guests, communities, and owners. He was voted "Hotelier of the World" by HOTELS magazine.

Recognized nationally as a statesman for the multibillion-dollar travel and tourism industry, Tisch is Chairman Emeritus of the U.S. Travel Association and previously served as chairman of the Travel Business Roundtable and the American Hotel & Lodging Association. Committed to a vibrant tourism industry locally, Tisch served for nearly six years as chairman of NYC & Company, New York City's official tourism agency, and was chairman of New York Rising, which was established to bring back visitors and revive the economy after 9/11. Crain's New York Business named him one of the "Top 10 Most Influential Business Leaders" and inducted him into its Hall of Fame, which recognizes individuals who have transformed the City in both their professional work and in their civic and philanthropic activities.

Tisch is the author of three bestselling books: *The Power of We:*



NEW YORK FOOTBALL GIANTS

Joe Schoen, who has more than 20 years of NFL experience as a scout and personnel executive, is in his second year as the Giants' general manager.

In his first season in the position, Schoen's retooling of the front office, hiring a standout head coach and restructuring the roster resulted in the Giants finishing with nine regular-season victories – five more than in 2021 – earning their first postseason berth in six years and winning their first playoff game since 2011.

One week after he was introduced, Schoen hired Brian Daboll, with whom he worked for four years with the Buffalo Bills. Daboll's leadership, offensive acumen and strategic decisions not only fueled the Giants' resurgence but earned him the NFL Coach of the Year award.

Schoen strengthened the organization by adding several important personnel experts, including assistant general manager Brandon Brown, assistant director of player personnel Dennis Hickey and director of pro scouting Chris Roseetti, while retaining longtime contributors Kevin Abrams and Tim McDonnell.

The Giants' first two drafts with Schoen at the helm delivered numerous players who should be vital contributors for many seasons, including Kavon Thibodeaux, Evan Neal, Wan'Dale Robinson, Daniel Bellinger, Deonte Banks, John Michael Schmitz and Jalin Hyatt. He also re-signed quarterback Daniel Jones and Pro Bowl defensive lineman Dexter Lawrence, and added a group of veterans that includes Jihad Ward, Isaiah Hodgins, Darren Waller, Bobby Okereke, and Parris Campbell.

When he was hired on Jan. 21, 2022, Schoen, 44, became just the Giants' fifth general manager since 1979, when Pro Football Hall of Famer George Young joined the organization. Young was succeeded in 1998 by his assistant, Ernie Accorsi, who is in the franchise's Ring of Honor. Jerry Reese took over in 2007, the year he presided over the first of two Super Bowl victories. Dave Gettleman was the G.M. for four seasons before announcing his retirement the day following the final game of the 2021 season. Schoen is the first Giants general manager without previous ties to the franchise since Young.

Schoen spent only three weeks as a ticket office intern before entering the personnel side of the NFL in 2001 as a scouting assistant with the Carolina Panthers. He has also worked for the Miami Dolphins and Buffalo Bills, with whom he spent the previous five years as the team's assistant general manager.

After joining the Bills in 2017, Schoen – pronounced "Shane" – teamed with general manager Brandon Beane to make Buffalo a regular

postseason participant and championship contender. Before their arrival in upstate New York, the Bills failed to make the playoffs for 17 consecutive seasons. After Schoen became Beane's top associate, the Bills earned a postseason berth in four of his five seasons with the team, including each of the last three, usurped six-time Super Bowl champion New England as the AFC East's best team and won the last two division titles, and advanced to the conference championship game in 2020.

Schoen was instrumental in acquiring a large majority of the players that have fueled Buffalo's successful run, including quarterback Josh Allen – selected seventh overall in the 2018 NFL Draft – wide receiver Stefon Diggs, running back Devin Singletary, wide receiver Gabe Davis, tight end Dawson Knox, defensive tackle Ed Oliver, linebacker Tremaine Edmonds, and kicker Tyler Bass.

Prior to moving to Buffalo, Schoen spent most of the previous decade in the Dolphins' front office, including the last three years as the team's director of player personnel.

Schoen's first year in Miami was 2008, when he began a five-year stint as one of the Dolphins' national scouts. In the first three of those years, he worked under Giants two-time Super Bowl-winning coach and Pro Football Hall of Famer Bill Parcells, then the team's executive vice president of football operations.

In 2013, Schoen was promoted to assistant director of college scouting. He led Miami's preparation, assessment and acquisition of potential professional and collegiate free agents. Schoen was heavily involved in Miami's NFL draft preparations, including evaluation and draft board construction while also serving as a key liaison between the coaching staff and personnel staff.

Schoen's first NFL job was as a ticket office intern with the Carolina Panthers in 2000, when he was a 21-year-old college junior. Beane, who filled various personnel and executive roles in his 19 seasons with Carolina, then presented Schoen with an opportunity to work in football operations. Schoen spent seven seasons (2001-07) working for the Panthers under Marty Hurney, first as a scouting assistant and then as a southeast and southwest area scout.

A native of Elkhart, Indiana, Schoen graduated from DePauw University in 2001 with a communications degree. He was a quarterback as a freshman and wide receiver his final three years, serving as a captain during his senior season.

Schoen and his wife, Marie, have three children, daughters Sydney and Harper Grace and son Carson.

BRIAN DABOLL

HEAD COACH

Brian Daboll was hired as the 20th head coach in Giants history on Jan. 28, 2022, and directed one of the most successful debut seasons in the 98-year history of the franchise.

Daboll was named the 2022 NFL Coach of the Year after leading a resurgence that resulted in nine regular-season victories, the team's first playoff berth in six years, and its first postseason victory in 11 seasons.

Daboll, 48, was the first Giants coach to be selected Coach of the Year since Jim Fassel in 1997. Like Fassel, Daboll took over a team that was last in the NFC East the previous year and led it to the playoffs in his debut season. He took the team one step further by defeating the Minnesota Vikings in an NFC Wild Card Game.

Daboll was the fifth Giants coach to be selected Coach of the Year since it was first awarded in 1957. Allie Sherman was honored in 1961 and 1962, Bill Parcells in 1986, Dan Reeves in 1993 and Fassel four years later.

When he was the Buffalo Bills' offensive coordinator in 2020, Daboll was voted the AP NFL Assistant Coach of the Year after the Bills finished 13-3 and unseated longtime powerhouse New England atop the division. Daboll is the first person to win both Coach of the Year and Assistant Coach of the Year.

In Daboll's debut season, the Giants finished 9-7-1 and qualified for the NFC playoffs as a wild card team. It was the Giants' first winning season and first postseason appearance since 2016. The Giants won just four games in 2021, the year prior to Daboll's arrival, and the five-game improvement is their largest in one season since they jumped from six victories in 2015 to 11 the following season.

Daboll was the fifth coach in Giants history to lead the team to the playoffs in his debut season, joining Sherman (1961), Reeves (1993), Fassel (1997) and Ben McAdoo (2016). Rookie coach Earl Potteiger led the Giants to the 1927 NFL championship in the era before playoffs.

Daboll was one of three first-year head coaches to lead his team to the postseason in 2022, joining Minnesota's Kevin O'Connell and Miami's Mike McDaniel. Daboll was the only one of the three to advance to the divisional round, and he did so with a Giants victory against O'Connell's Vikings.

Daboll was the first Giants coach to win his postseason debut since Reeves in 1993. He joined Jim Lee Howell, Ray Perkins, Bill Parcells, and Reeves as Giants coaches who were victorious in their first playoff games.

The Daboll difference was evident early in the season. In 2020 and 2021, the Giants started 0-5 and then 0-3. But in their first game under Daboll, they overcame a 13-0 halftime deficit to defeat the Titans in Tennessee, 21-20, on a touchdown and two-point conversion reception in with 1:06 remaining. Daboll became the first Giants coach to win his debut with the team since McAdoo in 2016. He was the first Giants coach to win five of his first six games since Reeves in 1993, and his 6-1 start was the best for a coach in his first Giants season since LeRoy Andrews was 6-0-1 in 1929.

In the first five weeks of the season, the Giants defeated Tennessee and Green Bay, the 2021 No. 1 playoff seeds in their respective conferences.

The Giants performed significantly better on offense in 2022 than they had the previous season. Their 365 points were 107 more than they scored in 2021. The Giants averaged 333.9 yards a game, an increase of 46.6 yards per game. One year after averaging 99.3 rushing yards a game and 4.0 yards per carry, they finished fourth in the NFL with 148.2 rushing yards a game and fifth with 4.8 yards a carry. Their 352 first downs were 53 more than the previous season.

Under the tutelage of Daboll and his offensive assistants, quarterback Daniel Jones and running back Saquon Barkley – each selected in the top six picks of their respective drafts - had their finest statistical seasons.

Jones completed 317 of 472 passes for 3,205 yards, all career highs. His 15 touchdown passes were the 2nd-highest total of his career, and his 5 interceptions were a career low. Jones' passer rating was a career-best 92.5 and his 67.16 completion percentage was a Giants' single season record. He had each of his five highest single-game completion percentages in 2022: 80.9 at Tennessee, 80.6 vs. Washington, 79.2 vs. Indianapolis, 77.8 at Green Bay and 76.5 vs. Houston. Jones led with NFL and set a franchise record by throwing an interception on just 1.1% of his passes (five in 472 throws).

In addition, Jones rushed for a Giants quarterback-record 708 yards and seven touchdowns on 120 carries, all the second-highest totals on the team.

Barkley was selected to his second Pro Bowl and was one of three players nominated for the NFL Comeback Player of the Year award. He had career-high totals of 295 carries for 1,312 yards – the NFL's fourth-highest total - and rushed for 10 touchdowns, one less than his career-high rookie total. Barkley was also the team's co-leader with 57 receptions and was seventh in the NFL with 1,650 scrimmage yards, almost double his 2021 total of 856.

Daboll joined the Giants with 20 years of NFL coaching experience.

He is a five-time Super Bowl champion with the New England Patriots and won a national championship at the University of Alabama in his primary season as a college coach.

Daboll joined the Giants after spending the previous four seasons as the offensive coordinator of the Bills. He devised the game plans and called the plays for one of the most productive offenses in the NFL, one that helped Buffalo earn three consecutive playoff berths, win two AFC East titles and advance to the conference championship game in 2020.

Daboll also oversaw the development of quarterback Josh Allen, the seventh overall selection in the 2018 NFL Draft. Allen is the only player in history with 100 passing touchdowns and 30 rushing in his first four years. In his last two seasons working with Daboll, Allen threw 73 touchdown passes against just 24 interceptions.

In 2021, Daboll's offense excelled as Buffalo won its second straight AFC East championship with an 11-6 record. The Bills finished third in the NFL with 28.4 points a game and fifth with 381.9 yards a game. Allen was sixth in the league with a franchise-record 409 completions, seventh with 36 touchdown passes and eighth with 4,407 yards. Allen's favorite target, wide receiver Stefon Diggs, caught 103 passes for 1,225 yards and 10

touchdowns.

Daboll was voted the AP's NFL Assistant Coach of the Year in 2020, when Allen finished second in the NFL most valuable player voting after setting Buffalo single season franchise records with 4,544 yards, 37 touchdown passes, a 69.2 completion percentage and a 107.2 passer rating.

Daboll joined the Bills in 2018 and in his second season the Bills scored 45 more points and won four more games than they had in the previous season to earn a wild card berth.

In 2017, Daboll returned to collegiate coaching for the first time in 18 years when he became the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Alabama, which finished 13-1 and earned its 17th national championship. The Crimson Tide averaged 38.8 points, 245.0 rushing yards, 210.3 passing yards and 455.3 yards of total offense in Daboll's one season in Tuscaloosa. Daboll coached future NFL quarterbacks Jalen Hurts, Tua Tagovailoa and Mac Jones.

Daboll joined the Crimson Tide after spending the previous four seasons with the Patriots, his second stint with the team. He spent a total of 11 seasons in New England and helped the team win five Super Bowl titles (XXXVI, XXXVIII, XXXIX, XLIX and LI).

Daboll was an offensive assistant in 2013 before coaching the team's tight ends the next three seasons. Under his tutelage, Rob Gronkowski was selected first-team All-Pro following the 2014 and 2015 seasons. The following season, Gronkowski and Martellus Bennett combined for 80 receptions, 1,241 yards and 10 touchdowns.

Daboll was the Kansas City Chiefs' offensive coordinator in 2012. The Chiefs finished fifth in the NFL with an average of 149.7 rushing yards a game. Jamaal Charles was fourth with 1,509 yards and five touchdowns and averaged 5.3 yards a carry while earning a selection to the Pro Bowl.

In 2011, Daboll was coordinator in Miami, which improved from 30th in the league the year before his arrival to 20th during his one season with the team. That Dolphins team had both a 1,000-yard rusher and 1,000-yard receiver for the first time in franchise history as Reggie Bush ran for 1,086 yards and Brandon Marshall totaled 1,214 yards while catching a team-high 81 passes.

Prior to joining the Dolphins, Daboll served as Cleveland's offensive coordinator during the 2009 and 2010 seasons. The Browns offense saw dramatic improvement in the second half of the 2009 season. Cleveland scored 11.1 more points per game, was 20.8 percent better in the red zone, converted on 14.7 percent more third downs and averaged 1.9 fewer turnovers per game during the final eight games of the season. The 2010 season saw the Browns improve 12 spots to rank eighth in the NFL in rushing offense, averaging 130.4 yards per game.

Daboll coached quarterbacks during his two seasons (2007-08) with the New York Jets. He helped Hall of Fame quarterback Brett Favre pick up the Jets offense after the signal-caller came out of retirement. In his one season under Daboll, Favre was named to the AFC Pro Bowl team and had the second-highest completion percentage of his career (65.7). Daboll also helped the Jets improve from the NFL's 25th ranked scoring offense in his first season to No. 9 in season two, averaging 25.3 points per game.

Daboll's first stint in New England began in 2000, his first of two seasons as a defensive assistant for head coach Bill Belichick.

From 2002-06, he coached the Patriots' wide receivers. Daboll helped Deion Branch earn Super Bowl XXXIX MVP honors in the Patriots' victory against Philadelphia following the 2004 season. Branch became the first wide receiver to win the honor since San Francisco's Jerry Rice in Super Bowl XXIII after the 1988 season.

Prior to entering the NFL, Daboll spent the 1997 season as a volunteer assistant at the College of William & Mary before serving two seasons (1998-99) as a graduate assistant for Nick Saban at Michigan State.

Daboll graduated from the University of Rochester in 1997 graduate with an economics degree. He was a two-year starter at safety for the Yellowjackets and intercepted three passes in a game in his junior season.

Daboll was born in Welland, Ontario, Canada, a suburb of Niagara Falls. He was raised by his grandparents and mother in West Seneca, N.Y. Daboll lettered in football at Saint Francis High School in Athol Springs, N.Y.

Daboll and his wife, Beth, have six children: Mark, Christian, Aiden, Haven, Avery and Luke.

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

NEW YORK FOOTBALL GIANTS

Mike Kafka is in his second season as the Giants' offensive coordinator and seventh as an NFL coach.

The offense significantly improved in Kafka's first season as coordinator.

The Giants' 365 points were 107 more than they scored in 2021. They averaged 333.9 yards a game, an increase of 46.6 yards per game. One year after averaging 99.3 rushing yards a game and 4.0 yards per carry, the Giants finished fourth in the NFL with 148.2 rushing yards a game and fifth with 4.8 yards a carry. Their 352 first downs were 53 more than the previous season.

Quarterback Daniel Jones and running back Saquon Barkley their finest statistical seasons.

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In addition, Jones rushed for a Giants quarterback-record 708 yards and seven touchdowns on 120 carries, all the second-highest totals on the team.

Barkley was selected to his second Pro Bowl and was one of three players nominated for the NFL Comeback Player of the Year award. He had career-high totals of 295 carries for 1,312 yards – the NFL's fourth-highest total – and rushed for 10 touchdowns, one less than his career-high rookie total. Barkley was also the team's co-leader with 57 receptions and was seventh in the NFL with 1,650 scrimmage yards, almost double his 2021 total of 856.

Before coming to the Giants, Kafka, 36, spent five seasons as an assistant coach on Andy Reid's staff with the Kansas City Chiefs, the last two as the team's quarterbacks coach and passing game coordinator.

During Kafka's tenure in Kansas City, the Chiefs were one of the NFL's most successful teams and deployed one of the league's most prolific offenses. Patrick Mahomes became an NFL most valuable player and Tyreek Hill, Travis Kelce and Mecole Hardman developed into elite receivers.

In 2021, the Chiefs advanced to the AFC Championship Game for the fourth consecutive year, a streak in which they advanced to two Super Bowls, winning one. Kansas City finished fourth in the NFL in scoring (28.2 points a game) third in total yardage (396.8) and fourth in passing yardage (281.8). Mahomes threw for 4,839 yards – his fourth consecutive 4,000-yard season – and 37 touchdowns against just 13 interceptions. Wide receiver Hill and tight end Kelce combined for 203 catches, 2,364 yards and 11 touchdowns in the regular season, while Hardman added 59 receptions 692 yards and two scores. The trio combined to score seven

touchdowns in three postseason games.

The previous year, Mahomes threw for 4,740 yards and 38 touchdowns to become just the seventh player in NFL history to throw for 4,500+ passing yards and 35+ touchdown passes multiple times in his career. The Chiefs' passing game ranked first in the league in yards-per-game (303.4), third in average gain per pass play (7.48) and tied for third in passing touchdowns. Kansas City defeated Cleveland and Buffalo in the playoffs to advance to Super Bowl LV.

In 2019, Kafka led a quarterback group that finished first in third down percentage (47.6). Despite missing multiple games due to injury, Mahomes threw 26 touchdown passes. He concluded that season by rallying the Chiefs from a 10-point fourth-quarter deficit to defeat San Francisco in Super Bowl LIV for their first title in 50 years. At 24 years and 138 days old, Mahomes became youngest quarterback to be named Super Bowl MVP.

In Kafka's first year coaching Kansas City's quarterbacks in 2018, Mahomes was voted the league's MVP after becoming only the second quarterback to pass for over 5,000 yards and 50 touchdown passes in a season.

Kafka served as an offensive quality control coach in his first year with the Chiefs in 2017, when he mentored Mahomes during the quarterback's rookie season. Kansas City's offense featured a 4,000-yard passer (Alex Smith), 1,000-yard rusher (Kareem Hunt), receiver (Hill) and tight end (Kelce).

In 2016, Kafka served as an offensive graduate assistant at his alma mater, Northwestern University. With Kafka's assistance, the Wildcats averaged 398.2 yards per game and 26.0 points per game, and defeated Pittsburgh, 31-24, in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl in Yankee Stadium.

Prior to becoming a coach, Kafka enjoyed a six-year NFL playing career, primarily as a backup quarterback and practice squad member with several teams.

Kafka was a fourth-round choice in the 2010 NFL Draft (122nd overall) by the Philadelphia Eagles, then coached by Reid, who has held the same position with the Chiefs since 2013. He played in four games, all with the 2011 Eagles (he completed four of seven passes vs. the Giants on Sept. 25). Kafka also did stints with New England, Tampa Bay and Minnesota, where he spent his final season in 2015.

Kafka played in 30 games at Northwestern, where he completed 408 of 637 passes (64.1%) for 4,265 yards with 19 touchdowns. He set single-game records in both passing yards (532 vs. Auburn, 2010) and rushing yards by a quarterback (217 vs. Minnesota, 2008). Additionally, his 3,725 yards of total offense as a senior in 2009 stands as the No. 2 season in program history.

A product of Chicago's St. Rita High School, Kafka earned a degree in communication studies from Northwestern.

Mike and his wife, Alli, have three children, Ashton, Jackson and Camden.

Don "Wink" Martindale is his second season as the Giants' defensive coordinator, his 19th season in the NFL and his 36th year in coaching.

In 2023, Martindale was one of three recipients of the Pro Football Writer Association's Paul "Dr. Z" Zimmerman Award, which is presented for lifetime achievement as an NFL assistant coach. The award is named for Zimmerman, who covered the NFL for 29 years as *Sports Illustrated's* lead pro football writer. The other honorees were John Mitchell, who retired following the 2022 season after 31 years as an NFL defensive line coach, including 28 with the Pittsburgh Steelers, and the late Bobb McKittrick, an offensive line coach in the league from 1971-99, who coached in five Super Bowls.

In Martindale's first year as coordinator in 2022, the Giants allowed 45 fewer points and recorded seven more sacks than they had the previous season, a major reason their victory total increased by five games, and they earned their first playoff berth since 2016 and won their first playoff game since 2011. The Giants ranked fifth in the NFL in third-down defense, as their opponents converted just 35.1% of their opportunities. They ranked fifth in the NFL in red-zone defensive efficiency in 2022, allowing touchdowns on 49.2% of opponent possessions.

Dexter Lawrence had a team and career-high 7.5 sacks, was selected a second-team all-pro and was one of the NFL's most dominant defensive linemen. Rookie Kayvon Thibodeaux was a Pro Bowl alternate, received an NFC Defensive Player of the Week award and steadily improved as the season progressed. Despite injuries that forced them to miss games, lineman Leonard Williams, cornerback Adoree' Jackson and safety Xavier McKinney excelled in Martindale's "position-less" defense.

Martindale, 60, joined the Giants after spending the previous 10 seasons on the Baltimore Ravens' coaching staff, the last four as defensive coordinator. During Martindale's tenure in Baltimore, the Ravens won Super Bowl XLVII and consistently had one of the NFL's best defenses. His unit ranked in the top three in the NFL in points allowed in each of his first three seasons, and first, fourth and seventh, respectively, in yardage yielded while never finishing lower than eighth against the run or the pass.

In 2021, Martindale's defense led the NFL against the run, allowing 84.5 yards a game. Baltimore's opponents converted only 34.8% of their third-down chances, the league's third-best figure.

In Martindale's first three seasons as coordinator (2018-20), Baltimore permitted both the league's fewest points (18.2 a game) and total yards per game (307.8) and was tied for the league lead with 12 defensive touchdowns. In those three years, Baltimore led the league in number of players to record a sack (33) and second-half points allowed (401), while ranking No. 2 in both fourth-down stops (41) and opponent QB rating (81.9).

Martindale's 2019 defense ranked fourth in the league by allowing 300.6 yards and helped the Ravens finish with a franchise-best 14-2 record and second straight AFC North Division title. The Ravens' six defensive touchdowns were tied for the second most in franchise history.

In his first season as coordinator in 2018, the Ravens yielded an NFL-best 292.9 yards-per-game and established a modern-era mark by not allowing a second-half touchdown in the first six games of the season (the last team to do so was the 1934 Detroit Lions.) Martindale was recognized by *Sports Illustrated/MMQB* as the Assistant Coach of the Year and was the AP NFL runner-up for the same award. The Ravens ranked third in third-down defense (34.1%), fourth in rushing yards allowed (82.9 yards per game) and fifth in passing yards permitted (210.0 a game).

Martindale joined the Ravens in 2012, as linebackers coach. In his first season in Baltimore, Martindale coached Pro Football Hall of Famer Ray Lewis and helped the Ravens defeat San Francisco in the Super Bowl.

Martindale helped develop numerous standout Ravens linebackers. C.J. Mosley in 2014 became the first Ravens rookie to earn Pro Bowl honors and finished second in the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year voting. Daryl Smith was a standout performer for Baltimore, joining Lavonte David as the only NFL players to post at least 350 tackles, 5.0 sacks, five interceptions and four forced fumbles 2013-15.

Martindale was the Denver Broncos' linebackers coach in 2009 and defensive coordinator in 2010. In his first season with the team, he helped the Denver defense rank seventh in the NFL (allowing 315.0 yards a game). Outside linebacker Elvis Dumervil led the NFL with a then-team-record 17.0 sacks and was a Pro Bowler and first-team All-Pro selection. The next year, he coordinated a defense that included two Hall of Famers in cornerback Champ Bailey and safety Brian Dawkins.

Martindale originally entered the NFL in 2004, the first of five seasons in which he coached linebackers for the Oakland Raiders. Martindale tutored linebackers Kirk Morrison and Thomas Howard who combined from 7 INTs from 2006-2008. In 2006 Oakland's defense ranked 3rd in the NFL in yardage (284.8 YPG) and first against the pass (150.8 yards-per-game)

Martindale began his coaching career in 1986 at his alma mater Defiance College in Ohio, where he coached the secondary in his debut season and added defensive coordinator duties the following year.

From 1988-93, Martindale was a defensive coordinator at three Ohio high schools, including his alma mater, Trotwood-Madison.

He returned to college coaching as a defensive assistant at Notre Dame from 1994-95. Martindale also coached at the University of Cincinnati, Western Illinois and Western Kentucky before entering the NFL. Martindale also helped Western Kentucky earn a Division I FCS National Championship in 2002.

Martindale played safety for Defiance, where he earned a bachelor's degree in business education. He was an all-state linebacker and baseball player at Trotwood-Madison.

Martindale and his wife, Laura, have a daughter, Cassie, and a son, Ty. Martindale has one granddaughter, Gigi.

Thomas McGaughey (pronounced muh-GAY-hee), is in the sixth season of his second stint with the Giants and his sixth as their special teams coordinator. He was previously a coordinator for three other NFL teams.

Working with McGaughey, Graham Gano has become one of the finest kickers in Giants history. In three seasons with the Giants, Gano has made 89 of 97 field goal attempts (91.8%), including 20 of 25 (80.0%) from 50+ yards, with a long of 57 yards. His 91.8% success rate is the highest in Giants history among kickers with at least 50 attempts. Gano has the franchise's second and sixth-highest single-season field goal percentages with 96.9 (31 of 32) in 2020, and 90.6 (29 of 32) in 2022. Gano's 20 field goals of 50 or more yards are more than twice as many as any other kicker in Giants history. Joe Danelo is second with nine.

In 2022, Gano set a Giants single-season record with eight field goals of 50 or more yards, one more than the previous record he established in 2021. Gano also tied the franchise record for the longest field goal with a 57-yarder at Dallas.

The previous season, the Giants were one of just four teams that did not have any negative plays (turnover, blocked kick, touchdown allowed) on special teams. Their opponents averaged an NFL-low 17.8 yards per kickoff return.

Several of the best placekicking performances in Giants history have occurred during McGaughey's tenure as coordinator.

In 2020, Gano made 31 of 32 field goal attempts, a .9687 percentage that is the second highest in Giants history. Gano's predecessor, Aldrick Rosas made 32 of 33 attempts, a success rate of .9696, in 2018, McGaughey's first season as coordinator.

Gano's .9687 percentage was the highest among the 21 NFL kickers who attempted at least 25 field goals in 2020. His only miss was on a 57-yard try in Chicago in Week 2. Gano followed by making his next 30 field goal attempts that season and first seven in 2021.

In 2019, the Giants' kickoff coverage team led the NFL and finished in the top two for the season straight season by allowing an average return of just 18.1 yards. The punt coverage team was tied for fifth as opponents averaged only 5.7 yards a return. Conversely, the Giants were fourth and 10th, respectively, in the NFL in punt (9.8 yards) and kickoff (23.5 yards) return average.

In McGaughey's first season leading the Giants' special teams in 2018, Rosas was selected to the Pro Bowl and named second-team All-Pro after missing just one field goal attempt and one PAT. His 32 field goals were the fifth-highest total in Giants history. Rosas' .970 field goal percentage was a Giants record and was just 1/100th of a percentage point behind NFL leader Robbie Gould, a former Giant. On Dec. 2, Rosas kicked the longest field goal in Giants history, a 57-yarder against Chicago in MetLife Stadium (a record Gano matched in 2022).

Michael Thomas led the Giants with nine special teams tackles (six solo) and was the NFC special teams player in the Pro Bowl.

Prior to returning to the Giants, McGaughey spent two seasons as the Carolina Panthers' special teams coordinator. Initially hired as Carolina's assistant special teams coach in February 2016, McGaughey was named

coordinator six months later when the late Bruce DeHaven transitioned to the role of senior advisor to special teams.

In 2017, the Panthers ranked fifth in the NFL with a franchise-record 42.4-yard net punting average. Gano played in the Pro Bowl after leading the league with a franchise-record .967 success rate on field goal attempts (29 of 30). In McGaughey's first season with Carolina, the kickoff coverage unit limited opponents to an NFL-best average of 18.1 yards per return.

McGaughey was the San Francisco 49ers' coordinator in 2015. The 49ers ranked second in the league with four blocked field goals and eighth in punt coverage, allowing an average return of just 6.4 yards.

In 2014, McGaughey coached the Jets' special teams. The kickoff return team finished fifth in the NFL with an average drive start of the 24.1-yard line, while the coverage group was seventh by limiting opponents to an average of 21.8 yards per return.

From 2011-13, McGaughey was the special teams coordinator/defensive assistant at Louisiana State. In those three seasons, the Tigers scored seven special teams touchdowns and McGaughey coached more than 40 future NFL players.

McGaughey was first on the Giants' staff from 2007-10, when he was the assistant special team coach. In his first season, the Giants won Super Bowl XLII. The following year, McGaughey helped produce the Pro Bowl battery of kicker John Carney, punter/holder Jeff Feagles, and long snapper Zak DeOssie as the Giants won the NFC East.

McGaughey initially came to the Giants following two seasons (2005-06) as the Denver Broncos' assistant special teams coordinator.

McGaughey was the special teams coordinator at his alma mater, the University of Houston, in 2003 and added cornerbacks coach to his responsibilities in 2004.

After getting his start in the NFL as an intern in the Houston Texans' pro scouting department in 2001, McGaughey was hired as the Kansas City Chiefs' as an assistant special teams coach the following year.

Between his internship and full-time position with the Chiefs, McGaughey spent the spring of 2002 in NFL Europe as the Scottish Claymores' defensive backs coach and special teams coordinator.

McGaughey began his coaching career at Houston as a graduate assistant in 1997. He handled defensive backs and special teams at Willowridge High School in Houston from 1998-2001.

McGaughey played for the Houston Cougars from 1991-95 and was special teams captain as a senior. He was a three-time letter-winner on the track team, competing in the 110-meter hurdles. McGaughey majored in kinesiology and sports administration.

He was briefly with the Cincinnati Bengals and Philadelphia Eagles in 1996 and played in NFL Europe and was a member of the Barcelona Dragons team that won the World Bowl in 1997.

McGaughey has three children, sons Thomas (Trey) and Trenton, and daughter Taylor.

Laura Young, the first woman to hold a coaching position in Giants history, is the team's second-year director of coaching operations. She has 19 years of experience and is involved in every aspect of the football operations. When Brian Daboll was named the Giants coach in January 2022, one of his first moves was to hire Young as his top assistant.

Young came to the Giants from the Buffalo Bills, where she served under two head coaches and worked alongside Daboll for four years and Joe Schoen, now the Giants' general manager, for five.

She joined the Bills in 2015 working under Rex Ryan as the manager of football administration services/assistant to the head coach. Sean McDermott replaced Ryan in 2017 and in April of that year, Young transferred to the player development department. In that role, she worked closely with coaches and players as they transitioned into the NFL and Buffalo area, helped develop player career, leadership and professional growth, worked with the Women's association and was involved in other operational roles for players, coaches and their families. In addition, during the 2020 and 2021 seasons, she served as the Bills' COVID-19 protocol coordinator.

Prior to joining the Bills, Young spent six seasons with the Jets when Ryan was the team's head coach. She served as the assistant to the head coach from 2009-13 before moving to the personnel department as manager of football administrative services for the 2014 season.

Young entered the NFL in 2004 with the Baltimore Ravens as the executive assistant to the vice president of business ventures and the team president. She remained in that position through the 2008 season.

Prior to embarking on her football career, Young worked in accounting, coached high school athletics and taught special education.

Young has a bachelor's degree in sports medicine from the University of the Pacific.

Shortly after joining the Giants, Young was joined by another woman on the staff when Angela Baker, who is an offensive assistant and the team's inaugural recipient of the Rosie Brown Minority Coaching Fellowship, was hired. The third woman on the football side of the Giants' organization is Hannah Burnett, who has been the team's first full-time female scout since 2020.

Mike Adams, a two-time Pro Bowl player, is in his first season as a Giants assistant special teams coach.

Adams was the Chicago Bears' assistant defensive backs coach in 2021.

Adams entered the NFL as an undrafted free agent from Delaware and played 16 seasons in the NFL, including stints with the San Francisco 49ers (2004-06), Cleveland Browns (2007-11), Denver Broncos (2012-13), Indianapolis Colts (2014-16), Carolina Panthers (2017-18) and Houston Texans (2019).

Adams appeared in 228 regular-season games with 149 starts and was credited with 869 tackles (653 solo), 90 passes defended, 30 interceptions, 15 tackles for loss and 13 forced fumbles. He also played in 10 postseason games with eight starts, including one in the Broncos' Super

Bowl XLVIII loss to Seattle in MetLife Stadium.

Adams had his best statistical seasons with the Colts in 2014 and 2015, when he was twice selected to the Pro Bowl while totaling 162 tackles, 10 interceptions for 87 yards and a touchdown, five forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.

Adams was born in Paterson, N.J. and starred at Passaic County Technical Institute, located just 16 miles from MetLife, and helped lead the football team to the 1998 New Jersey Group 4 title.

At Delaware, Adams played in 43 games with 23 starts and collected 213 tackles and 11 interceptions. He was a co-captain on UD's 2003 Division 1-AA NCAA championship team. Adams' 228 NFL games are a record for a Delaware alumnus.

Angela Baker is in her first season as an offensive assistant after serving last year as the Giants’ offensive quality control.

In 2022, Baker was the Giants’ inaugural recipient of the Rosie Brown Minority Coaching Fellowship and joined Laura Young as the first women to hold coaching positions in Giants history. Young is the team’s director of coaching operations.

As an offensive assistant, Baker works closely with the Giants’ tight ends and their coach, Andy Bischoff, and has daily and direct contact with head coach Brian Daboll and offensive coordinator Mike Kafka.

Baker spent the 2021 season at the University of Redlands in California, where she helped coach the kickers and punters and was a defensive quality control coach.

In the spring of 2020, Baker spent three weeks with the Cleveland Browns coaching staff as part of the NFL’s Bill Walsh Diversity Coach Fellowship program. She was one of six aspiring coaches, including two women, to join the Browns’ staff as part of the fellowship. The fellows participated in the team’s offseason practices, which were limited to virtual meetings because of the pandemic.

Baker worked with Cleveland’s quarterbacks, including Baker Mayfield, by analyzing film, studying the playbook and identifying weaknesses of the team’s quarterback play. She also learned coaching techniques from offensive coordinator Alex Van Pelt. Baker specifically addressed team unity and cohesiveness through technology interactions during the pandemic.

Baker participated in the 2022 IFAF Women’s World Football

Championship in Finland. A wide receiver, she was also member of the 2017 IFAF world championship team that won a gold medal.

Baker was a seven-time Women’s Football Alliance (WFA) All-American while competing for the Pittsburgh Passion Women’s Professional Football Team. The full-contact football squad won the Independent Women’s Football League National Championship in 2014 and 2015 and she was named the National Conference Offensive Player of the League in 2016.


After a three-year hiatus from school, Baker graduated from Slippery Rock University with a B.S. in physical activity and fitness management and a minor in coaching.

The Club Coaching Fellowship Program gives minorities who hope to coach in the NFL an opportunity to work full-time on a team’s staff for one or two seasons.

The Giants’ Minority Coaching Fellowship is named in honor of Rosie Brown, one of the greatest players and arguably the best offensive lineman in Giants history. A member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame class of 1975, Brown played for the Giants from 1953 through 1965 after joining the team as a 27th round draft choice from Morgan State. He was a starting tackle for 13 consecutive seasons, a period in which he was named to nine Pro Bowls and selected All-NFL eight consecutive seasons. Brown helped the Giants win the NFL title in 1956 and advance to the championship game in 1958, 1959, 1961, 1962 and 1963. He was immediately named assistant line coach by the Giants after a phlebitis condition forced him to retire in 1966. Brown continued his Giants affiliation as a scout from 1971 until his death on June 9, 2004.

Andy Bischoff, who has extensive coaching experience at the NFL, CFL and high school levels, is in his second season as the Giants’ tight ends coach.

In 2022, Bischoff’s largely unheralded tight ends were important contributors in the Giants’ turnaround season. The group was led by rookie fourth-round draft choice Daniel Bellinger, who finished fifth on the team with 30 receptions, for 268 yards and two touchdowns, despite playing in just 12 games. He also rushed for a touchdown and scored another in the Giants’ NFC Wild Card victory in Minnesota.

Bischoff joined the Giants after spending the 2021 season coaching the Houston Texans’ tight ends. His top three players – Jordan Akins, Pharaoh Brown and Brevin Jordan – combined for 67 catches for 563 yards and three touchdowns.

From 2015-20, Bischoff coached in a variety of roles on the Baltimore Ravens’ staff, working with the tight ends in his final four seasons. With Bischoff, Mark Andrews became the first tight end in Ravens history with multiple seasons of at least 700 receiving yards and seven touchdowns. Among NFL tight ends from 2019-20, Andrews totaled the most receiving touchdowns (17), fourth-most receiving yards (1,553) and fifth-most receptions (122). In 2019, Andrews, who led the team with 64 receptions, 852 receiving yards and 10 touchdowns, earned his first career Pro Bowl selection.

Bischoff’s tight ends group was instrumental in blocking for a Ravens rushing attack that led the NFL in 2019 (206.0 yards-per-game) and 2020 (191.9).

In Baltimore, Bischoff first crossed paths with current Giants tight end Darren Waller. Bischoff was instrumental in Waller’s transition from wide receiver to tight end, and the two stayed in touch during Waller’s four-plus

seasons with the Raiders.

Bischoff entered the NFL in 2013 as the Chicago Bears’ tight ends coach/staff coordinator. In 2014, Bischoff tutored a group led by Martellus Bennett, who finished first in receptions (90) and third in receiving yards (916) among NFL tight ends and earned a Pro Bowl selection.

Bischoff spent five seasons with the CFL’s Montreal Alouettes as the running backs/special teams coordinator/assistant to the head coach (2010-12) and the running backs/offensive quality control coach (2008-09). In 2012, the Alouettes finished first in the CFL’s East Division and the year prior, Bischoff helped guide Brandon Whitaker to career highs in rushing yards (1,381), receiving yards (638), catches (72) and touchdowns (5). Montreal won consecutive Grey Cups in 2009-10.


In his first coaching role, Bischoff coached at Cretin-Derham Hall High School in St. Paul, Minn. where he won 168 of 190 games and one state title (1999) during his 15 seasons with the Raiders. Bryan Cox, a Super Bowl winner and three-time Pro Bowler as a player who previously coached with five other NFL teams, is in his second season as the Giants' assistant defensive line coach. He assists Andre Patterson in mentoring the Giants' defensive line.

In his first season with the Giants in 2022, Cox was instrumental in the development of Dexter Lawrence, who was one of the league's very best defensive linemen. Lawrence set career highs with 68 tackles (35 solo) and a team-leading 7.5 sacks and was named second-team All-Pro by the Associated Press and to the NFC's Pro Bowl roster. Lawrence and Leonard Williams gave the Giants one of the NFL's most productive defensive line duos.

Before joining the Giants, Cox, 55, last worked in the NFL as the Atlanta Falcons' defensive line coach from 2014-16. In his final season with the team, the Falcons won the NFC championship and advanced to Super Bowl LI, where they lost in overtime to New England, 34-28.

From 2012-13, Cox coached the defensive front seven and served as the pass rush specialist for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Cox helped several players post career bests, including defensive tackle Gerald McCoy who totaled 14.0 sacks, 36 quarterback hits, and 24 tackles for loss in those two seasons and earned his first Pro Bowl selection in 2012.

Prior to joining the Buccaneers, Cox spent six seasons as an assistant coach with the Jets, Cleveland Browns, and Miami Dolphins.

In 2011, he helped the Dolphins finish in the top 10 in sacks with 41 while

serving as the club's pass rush specialist. He joined the Dolphins after spending the 2009-10 seasons with the Browns as defensive line coach.

Cox began his coaching career as assistant defensive line coach with the Jets from 2006-08. In his final season with the team, he helped the Jets' defense rank seventh in the NFL in both sacks (41) and rushing defense (94.9 yards per game).

Before becoming a coach, Cox played linebacker for five NFL teams for 12 years. He was selected by the Dolphins in the fifth round of the 1991 NFL Draft (113th overall) and spent his first five seasons in Miami. Cox was selected to the Pro Bowl in 1992, 1994 and 1995 when he was with the Dolphins.

Cox went on to play for the Chicago Bears (1996-97), Jets (1998-2000), and in New England and won a Super Bowl with the Patriots after the 2001 season. Cox finished his career in 2002 with the New Orleans Saints.

He played in 165 regular-season games with 144 starts and totaled 938 tackles (677 solo), 51.5 sacks, 14 fumble recoveries and four interceptions. Cox also played in 10 postseason games, including Super Bowl XXXVI.

A graduate of Western Illinois, Cox played for the Leathernecks from 1987-90 while earning his degree in mass communications.

Cox is a native of East St. Louis, Ill. He and his wife, Kim, have four daughters: Lavonda, Britanni, Chiquita and Kelli and one son, Bryan, Jr.

John Egorugwu, whose 14 years of coaching experience include eight in the NFL, is in his second season as the Giants' inside linebackers coach.

In his first season with the team in 2022, Egorugwu helped develop a constantly changing cast of linebackers into a productive and reliable group that helped the Giants earn their first playoff berth in six years. Micah McFadden, a fifth-round draft choice, started seven games and contributed 58 tackles, 2.0 sacks and six tackles for loss.

Egorugwu spent the 2021 season as the linebackers coach at Vanderbilt University.

He was previously on the Buffalo Bills' coaching staff for four years (2017-20), the last three with Brian Daboll, as a defensive quality control coach and assistant linebackers coach. He first coached in the NFL with the Baltimore Ravens from 2015-16 as a defensive assistant under current Giants coordinator Wink Martindale, working primarily with the linebackers.

In 2020, the Bills returned to the AFC Championship Game for the first time since 1993. Egorugwu's work with the linebackers helped the team finish fifth in the league in opponent pass efficiency. Egorugwu helped Buffalo linebacker Tremaine Edmunds earn his first Pro Bowl selection in 2019, when the defense allowed just 298.3 yards a game. In 2018, the Bills' linebackers intercepted seven passes, interceptions, tying them with

the Giants for the most among the position group in the NFL.

During his two years with the Ravens, Egorugwu helped linebacker Elvis Dumervil to a 2015 Pro Bowl selection and linebacker C.J. Mosley to a Pro Bowl nod in 2016. Mosley and linebacker Zach Orr were second team AP all-pros in 2016.

Before entering the NFL, Egorugwu coached the Missouri State wide receivers in 2015.

He spent three years as a graduate assistant at the University of Missouri, working with both the defense (2012) and offense (2013-14). During his tenure, the Tigers played in the Cotton Bowl and Citrus Bowl. Missouri claimed the SEC East Division title and played in the league's championship game in 2013 and 2014.

Egorugwu began his coaching career at his alma mater, William Jewell College, mentoring linebackers from 2010-11.

A linebacker for William Jewell, Egorugwu played in 29 games, collecting 156 tackles, 22.0 tackles for loss, 7.0 sacks and two interceptions during his career. As a senior, he tallied 84 tackles, 16.5 tackles for loss and 4.5 sacks.

Egorugwu received his bachelor's in accounting and business/management in 2007 and earned his master's from Missouri in educational and counseling psychology.

Mike Groh, who has 23 years of experience coaching in the NFL and at the collegiate level, is in his second season as the Giants' wide receivers coach.

In 2022, Groh schooled a group that overcame the early season loss of Sterling Shepard and help quarterback Daniel Jones set a franchise record with a 67.2 completion percentage. Darius Slayton the Giants with 724 receiving yards, rookie Wan'Dale Robinson demonstrated he will be a long-term contributor before hurting his knee, and midseason acquisition Isaiah Hodgins tied for the team lead with four touchdown receptions and added a score in the team's NFC Wild Card victory in Minnesota.

Groh was the receivers coach of the Indianapolis Colts in 2020-21. In 2021, Michael Pittman, Jr. caught 88 passes for 1,082 yards and six touchdowns. The previous season, the Colts finished 11-5 and were 11th in the NFL in passing yardage as wideouts T.Y. Hilton, Zach Pascal and Pittman combined for 140 receptions, 1,894 yards and 11 touchdowns.

Groh was the Philadelphia Eagles' offensive coordinator from 2018-19 after spending his debut season with the team as the receivers coach. In his first season as coordinator, Philadelphia finished with the NFL's seventh-ranked passing offense (267.2 yards a game) and Zach Ertz set the NFL record for receptions by a tight end with 116.

In 2017, wideouts Nelson Agholor and Alshon Jeffrey totaled 119 catches, 1,557 yards and 17 touchdowns and added 27 receptions in the three-game postseason that culminated with the Eagles defeating New

England in Super Bowl LII. The Eagles were the only team with two wide receivers that produced eight-or-more receiving touchdowns.

In 2016, Groh coached the wideouts and was the passing game coordinator for the Los Angeles Rams. He coached the Chicago Bears wide receivers from 2013-15, when his group included Pro Bowlers Brandon Marshall and Jeffrey.

Groh began his college coaching career at his alma mater, the University of Virginia, from 2001-08. He was first the receivers coach, added the quarterbacks in 2003, and coached them exclusively in 2004-05. Groh was the team's offensive coordinator from 2006-08.

In 2009, he moved to Alabama as a graduate assistant before spending a year at Louisville coaching quarterbacks. Groh then returned to Alabama for a two-year stint as receivers coach and recruiting coordinator. The Crimson Tide won the national championship all three years Groh was on Nick Saban's staff.

Groh's father, Al, was a Giants assistant coach from 1989-91, and was the defensive coordinator in the last of those seasons. Mike Groh's first coaching job was as an assistant with the Jets when his father was the head coach in 2000.

Mike Groh was Virginia's starting quarterback in 1994-95, when the Cavaliers were a combined 18-7 and won two bowl games. In 1997, he played in the World League with the Rhein Fire.

Groh's brother, Matt, is the director of player personnel for the Patriots.

DEFENSIVE BACKS COACH

NEW YORK FOOTBALL GIANTS

Jerome Henderson, a 17-year NFL coaching veteran, is in his fourth season as the Giants' defensive backs coach.

With significant contributions from the secondary, the Giants allowed 214.0 passing yards a game to finish 14th in the NFL in 2022, the team's highest ranking since it was 10th in 2013. The unit excelled despite multiple-game absences due to injury of cornerbacks Adoree' Jackson and Aaron Robinson and safety Xavier McKinney. Henderson helped several newcomers become important contributors, including safety Jason Pinnock and rookies Cor'Dale Flott and Dane Belton.

In 2021, McKinney led the team with five interceptions, the highest total by an NFL safety that season. He earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors after his performance vs. Las Vegas on Nov. 2, when he twice picked off Raiders quarterback Derek Carr. McKinney returned the second interception 41 yards for a touchdown at the beginning of the third quarter. In his first season with the Giants, Jackson had 62 tackles and eight passes defended, despite missing three games.

The previous year, Henderson was instrumental in improving a pass defense that jumped from 28th in the league the previous season to a tie for 16th. The Giants allowed 237.9 yards game through the air, a 26.2-yard improvement over their 2019 average. Cornerback James Bradberry was selected to his first Pro Bowl after tying for second in the NFL with 18 passes defended. Another newcomer, Logan Ryan, moved from cornerback to safety and finished second on the Giants with 92 tackles (67 solo). Henderson helped McKinney and Darnay Holmes make significant contributions as rookies.

Prior to joining the Giants, Henderson spent four years as the Atlanta Falcons' defensive passing game coordinator/secondary coach.

In 2019, Henderson molded a group of young defensive backs into a productive unit that helped the Falcons finish second in the NFC South. Cornerback Desmond Trufant led the team with four interceptions despite playing in just nine games. Safety Ricardo Allen started all 16 games and was third on the team with 84 tackles. The defense recorded 87 passes defended (5.4 a game).

In Henderson's third year with the Falcons in 2018, the defense recorded 15 interceptions, tied for the ninth-most in the league, and tallied 72 passes defended.

In 2017, Atlanta's pass defense saw a jump from year one to year two under Henderson's leadership, as the defense only allowed 232.8 passing yards per game and finished 11th in the NFL.

In Henderson's first Falcons season in 2016, he coached a young secondary that helped the defense rank in the top five in interceptions returned for touchdowns (three). The team's 279 interception return yards and 89 passes defended were both third in the NFL.

Henderson was the Dallas Cowboys' secondary coach from 2012-15.

In 2015, Dallas limited opponents to 227 passing yards per game, which ranked fifth in the NFL. The previous season, Henderson's unit improved in passing yards allowed, yards-per-attempt, interceptions, passing touchdowns, and passes of 25-plus yards. During the 2013 season, he led the defensive backfield as the entire unit made the switch from a 3-4 defense to a 4-3 scheme.

In his first year in Dallas, Henderson was tasked with integrating two new starting corners in veteran free agent Brandon Carr and first-round draft choice Morris Claiborne. Carr led the team with three interceptions - returning one for a touchdown - while Claiborne picked off one pass and had a fumble return for a touchdown.

Prior to his stint in Dallas, Henderson spent three seasons as a secondary coach in Cleveland, where his defensive backs recorded seven of the club's nine interceptions in 2011 and finished second in the NFL in passing defense. He was instrumental in the development of cornerback Joe Haden and safety T.J. Ward, both consensus All-Rookie selections in 2010.

Henderson was a member of the New York Jets' coaching staff from 2006-08.

He led the defensive backs in 2008, when cornerback Darrelle Revis earned a Pro Bowl berth after leading the team with five interceptions. Henderson split duties as an assistant defensive backs coach and director of player development in 2007 after originally joining the club in the latter position the previous year.

Henderson was selected by the New England Patriots in the second round of the 1991 NFL Draft, after starring at Clemson (1987-90). He played eight seasons in the NFL as a defensive back with the Patriots (1991-93, 1996), Buffalo Bills (1993-94), Philadelphia Eagles (1995), and Jets (1997-98). He appeared in 98 games with 34 starts and recorded nine career interceptions. Henderson played in Super Bowl XXVIII with the Bills and Super Bowl XXXI as a member of the Patriots.

Henderson grew up in Statesville, N.C. He and his wife, Traci, have three children, Jazmin and twins Taylor and Tyler.

Bobby Johnson, who has 28 years of coaching experience, including the last 13 in the NFL, is in his second season as the Giants' offensive line coach.

In 2022, the offensive line helped the Giants finish fourth in the NFL in rushing yardage with an average of 148.2 yards a game and fifth with 4.8 yards a carry and was instrumental in Saquon Barkley rushing for a career-high 1,312 yards. In addition, the protection given quarterback Daniel Jones enabled him to set a franchise record with a 67.2 completion percentage. Left tackle Andrew Thomas was selected second-team all-pro and rookie Evan Neal established himself as a long-term cornerstone at right tackle.

Johnson joined the Giants after a three-year stint as the Buffalo Bills' offensive line coach. In 2021, Johnson's O-line helped the Bills finish third in the NFL with an average of 28.4 points a game and win the AFC East title with an 11-6 record. Buffalo tackle Dion Dawkins was a Pro Bowler.

In 2020, Johnson's line helped a Bills team that advanced to the conference championship game lead the AFC and finish second in the NFL with an average of 31.3 points a game. When Johnson arrived in Buffalo in 2019, he directed a line that included four new starters and helped the Bills finish eighth in the NFL with 128.4 rushing yards a game.

Johnson moved to Buffalo after spending the 2018 season as the Indianapolis Colts' assistant offensive line coach.

From 2015-17, he served as the tight ends coach for the Oakland Raiders (2015-17). His 2017 unit of Jared Cook, Clive Walford and Lee Smith combined for 71 receptions for 844 yards and two touchdowns.

Prior to joining the Raiders, Johnson spent two seasons with the Detroit Lions, first as tight ends coach (2013) and then as assistant offensive line coach (2014). In his first season with the club, the Lions had one of the NFL's most productive tight end duos in Brandon Pettigrew and undrafted rookie Joseph Fauria, who combined for nine touchdowns.

Johnson served a one-year stint as tight ends coach with the Jacksonville Jaguars in 2012 and two years as assistant offensive line coach with the Bills (2010-11).

From 2005-09, Johnson was the offensive line coach at Indiana University, where he developed two NFL linemen in Rodger Saffold, a second-round selection of the St. Louis Rams in 2010, and James Brewer, the Giants' fourth-round pick in 2011.

Before his stint at Indiana, Johnson was an assistant coach at Miami (Ohio), his alma mater, from 1999-2004, helping the RedHawks to a 13-1 season, a MAC Championship and GMAC Bowl victory in 2003.

Johnson spent his final season at Miami as the offensive line coach after working with the tight ends from 1999-2003. He began his coaching career at the University of Akron as a graduate assistant (1995-96) and defensive line coach (1997-98).

Johnson, an Akron native, was a starting tackle at Miami (Ohio) from 1992-94 and helped the RedHawks average 156.7 rushing yards per game in 1992 and 174.4 yards in 1994. He graduated with a degree in health appraisal and sports organization.

Johnson and wife, Kristen, have two daughters, Madilyn and Olivia.

Christian Jones is in his second season on the Giants' coaching staff and his first as the assistant quarterbacks coach. Jones will partner with offensive coordinator Mike Kafka and quarterbacks coach Shea Tierney in tutoring the team's passers, including Daniel Jones and Tyrod Taylor.

In his first season with the Giants in 2002, Jones was an offensive assistant who worked closely with the team's quarterbacks.

Prior to joining the Giants, Jones spent three seasons with the Minnesota Vikings, the first as an offensive quality control coach and two as an assistant wide receivers coach.

In 2021, Minnesota led the NFL with an interception percentage of just 1.2 (seven picks on 604 attempts) while finishing 11th in the league with 249.3 passing yards a game. Second-year pro Justin Jefferson was second in the NFL with 1,616 receiving yards and fourth with 108 catches. Jefferson and Adam Thielen (67 catches for 726 yards) each had 10 touchdown receptions.

The previous year, Jefferson set an NFL rookie record with 1,400 yards and set Vikings rookie marks in yards, receptions (88) and 100-yard games (7) en route to second-team AP all-pro honors, a Pro Bowl berth and a spot on the PFWA All-Rookie team. Thielen had a career-best 14 touchdown catches.

While working with Jones in 2019, wideout Stefon Diggs recorded a career-high 1,130 receiving yards and led the NFL with eight receptions of 40+ yards.

In 2018, Jones was an offensive graduate assistant at the University of Texas, where he worked primarily with the wide receivers and tight ends. Jones helped the Longhorns offense average 31.1 points and 411.3 yards per game as the team finished 11-4, including a victory against Georgia in the Sugar Bowl.

A Northwestern University graduate, Jones assisted his alma mater as an offensive intern during the 2017 season, working with the offensive line. With Jones on staff the Wildcats ranked among the Big Ten's top five teams in scoring offense (29.2 pointers-per-game), total offense (408.0 yards-per-game) and rushing (174.2 yards a game).

Jones played wide receiver at Northwestern from 2011-15. In 51 games, he caught 128 passes for 1,509 yards and eight touchdowns. Jones led the Wildcats in receiving yards with 412 as a true sophomore in 2012. He did not play in 2014 while rehabbing an injury sustained during training camp but totaled 234 receiving yards his redshirt senior season in 2015.


Jones was a three-year member of Northwestern's 12-player Leadership Council, selected to the Academic All-Big Ten team and was a team captain in 2015.

JEFF NIXON



RUNNING BACKS COACH

NEW YORK FOOTBALL GIANTS

Jeff Nixon, whose 26-year coaching career includes 14 seasons in the NFL, is in his first season as the Giants' running backs coach.

Nixon was a member of the Carolina Panthers' staff the previous three seasons. Last year, Nixon was Carolina's assistant head coach/offense. In 2021, he was the team's offensive coordinator for the season's final five games. Nixon was the Panthers' senior offensive assistant and running backs coach his first two years with the team.

The Panthers finished 10th in the NFL in rushing yardage in 2022 with 130.0 yards-per-game, despite the midseason trade of star running back Christian McCaffrey. Free agent acquisition D'Onta Foreman led the Panthers ran for a team-high 914 yards.

When McCaffrey was limited to 10 total games the previous two seasons, Nixon coached a pair of former fourth-round draft choices who led Carolina in rushing. In 2021, rookie Chuba Hubbard led the Panthers with 612 yards and five touchdowns.

In Nixon's first season with the Panthers in 2020, he helped Mike Davis have a career-best season, topping 1,000 scrimmage yards for the first time. Davis had 642 rushing yards and 373 receiving yards and led Carolina with eight total touchdowns.

Nixon joined the Panthers after spending the previous three seasons as Baylor's co-offensive coordinator/play-caller. In 2019, Nixon helped lead Baylor to an 11-win season and an appearance in the Big 12 Championship game. The offense averaged 431.2 yards per game and ranked 17th in the nation with 35.2 points-per-game). The 2018 Bears ranked 22nd in the nation in total offense, averaging 459.1 yards per game, including 290 passing yards a game. In 2017, Nixon's offense at Baylor averaged 280 yards per game passing, which ranked 22nd in the nation.

Nixon spent the 2016 season coaching the San Francisco 49ers' tight ends.

From 2011-15, Nixon coached running backs for the Miami Dolphins, with whom he worked with Reggie Bush, Lamar Miller, and Jay Ajayi. In 2011, Nixon coached Bush to a career-high 1,086 rushing yards and six touchdowns. Three years later, Nixon helped Miller record a career-high 1,099 rushing yards and eight touchdowns. That year, the Dolphins ranked second in the NFL in average yards per carry (4.69).

Prior to Miami, Nixon was on the Philadelphia Eagles staff from 2007-10, serving as an offensive and special teams assistant. Nixon worked closely with All-Pro running backs Brian Westbrook and LeSean McCoy, as well as All-Pro fullback Leonard Weaver. On special teams, Nixon helped DeSean Jackson become one of the league's most explosive punt returners. In three of Nixon's four seasons with the Eagles, the team reached the playoffs, including a trip to the NFC Championship Game in 2008.

Before his time in the NFL, Nixon coached running backs and wide receivers at Temple University in 2006-2007.

From 2003-05, Nixon worked with running backs, tight ends, and as special teams coordinator at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga. He coached the running backs at Shippensburg University from 1999-2002, and at Princeton University in 1998. Nixon got his start in coaching as a student assistant coach at Penn State in 1997.

As a player, Nixon played running back at West Virginia in 1993 and 1994 before transferring to Penn State to finish his career.

Nixon earned a degree in elementary education from Penn State in 1998 and a master's degree in education administration from Shippensburg in 2003.

DEFENSIVE LINE COACH

NEW YORK FOOTBALL GIANTS

Andre Patterson, whose more than four decades of coaching experience include 19 years in the NFL, is in his second season as the Giants' defensive line coach.

In his first season with the Giants in 2022, Patterson was instrumental in the development of Dexter Lawrence, who was one of the league's very best defensive linemen. Lawrence set career highs with 68 tackles (35 solo) and a team-leading 7.5 sacks and was named second-team All-Pro by the Associated Press and to the NFC's Pro Bowl roster. Lawrence and Leonard Williams gave the Giants one of the NFL's most productive defensive line duos.

Prior to joining the Giants, Patterson spent eight seasons with the Minnesota Vikings, the first six as the team's defensive line coach. In 2020, Patterson added the titles of co-defensive coordinator and assistant head coach.

Patterson was previously the Vikings' defensive line coach in 1998-99. He has coached at each level, working five years as a high school coach and 15 years in the collegiate ranks in addition to his long tenure in the NFL.

In his second stint with Minnesota (2014-21), Patterson helped Danielle Hunter and Everson Griffen become two of the most productive defensive ends in the NFL. Hunter recorded 48.0 sacks prior to turning 25 years of age, an NFL record since sacks became an official stat in 1982 and became the youngest player (25 years and 40 days) to eclipse 50.0 career sacks. He had 14.5 sacks and was a Pro Bowler in both 2018 and 2019 before being derailed by injuries. Griffen is a four-time Pro Bowler who is seventh in franchise history with 79.5 sacks.

The 2018 Vikings recorded 50 sacks, the third-highest total in franchise history. The defense set a franchise record with 10 sacks vs. Detroit on Nov. 4 and had sacks vs. Miami on Dec. 16.

The previous year, the Vikings finished first in the league in scoring and total defense, allowing just 15.8 points per game and 275.9 yards per game. Griffen was selected to his third Pro Bowl and defensive tackle Linval Joseph his second. Griffen began the year with a streak of eight straight games with a sack, tied for the longest streak to start a season in NFL history.

Before joining the Vikings for the second time, Patterson spent the 2013 season as the assistant head coach/defensive line coach at Florida International University.

From 2010-2012, Patterson served as the defensive coordinator at Texas-El Paso. His most successful season at UTEP was 2011, when the Miners recorded 10 more sacks than the previous year in one less game.

Patterson was the assistant head coach/defensive line coach from 2008-2009 at UNLV.

From 1997-2006, Patterson worked in the NFL, primarily as a defensive line coach. He joined Mike Shanahan's Broncos staff for the 2005 and 2006 seasons. Patterson was a part of the 13-3 Broncos team in 2005 that reached the AFC Championship Game.

In 2003 and 2004, Patterson was the Cleveland Browns D-line coach. From 2000-2002, Patterson held the same position with the Dallas Cowboys.

Patterson's first stint in Minnesota was in the 1998-99 seasons. He coached the defensive line during the Vikings' 15-1 season in 1998, when they lost to Atlanta in the NFC Championship.

Starting his NFL career in 1997, Patterson joined Pete Carroll and the New England Patriots as a defensive assistant.

His only stint as a collegiate head coach came at Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo from 1994-96, when the team was 17-16. Patterson led his team to a league title in 1994 and was named American West Conference Coach of the Year. The 1994 season was Cal Poly's first in Division 1-AA.

Patterson was the D-line coach at Washington State in 1992-93 and at Cornell in 1990-91. The 1990 Cornell team won the Ivy League Championship.

Patterson served as the defensive coordinator at Western Washington in 1989. The year before, he coached the defensive line at Weber State.

Patterson was the head coach as St. Monica (Calif.) High School in 1987. From 1983-86 he was the defensive coordinator at Renton High School in Washington. Patterson began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Montana, in 1982.

A native of Richmond, Calif., Patterson and his wife, Donna, have a son, Andre, Jr. and a daughter, Ashmera. Patterson earned his bachelor's degree in secondary education from Montana in 1983. He played collegiately as an offensive lineman at Contra Costa College and Montana before suffering a career-ending knee injury.

In 2020, Patterson was inducted into the JFK High School Hall of Fame in his hometown of Richmond.

ASSISTANT OFFENSIVE LINE

Chris Smith is in his first season as the Giants’ assistant offensive line coach.

Smith spent the previous six seasons on the coaching staff at Holy Cross, his alma mater. He was the Crusaders’ offensive coordinator in 2022 after previously serving as the offensive line coach, run game coordinator, and recruiting coordinator.

Smith helped Holy Cross win four consecutive Patriot League championships and NCAA football championship subdivision berths.

With Smith as the offensive coordinator in 2022, that unit and Holy Cross football soared to new heights. The Crusaders set a program record with 12 victories, enjoyed their first undefeated regular season in 30 years, and advanced to the NCAA FCS quarterfinals for the first time since 1983.

In 2022, all five of Holy Cross’ starting offensive linemen were named All-Patriot League – C.J. Hanson, Luke Newman, Nick Olsafka, and Eric Schon on the first team and Grady Smith on the second team.

Holy Cross ranked first in the nation in plays over 15 yards and turnovers lost (6), including losing only one fumble. The Crusaders ranked second in FCS with an average of 16.2 yards-per-completion, sixth with 245.1 rushing yards a game, and eighth with 37.8 points-per-game. Twelve Crusaders earned All-Patriot League honors on offense, and for the first time in program history, two Holy Cross players (Matthew Sluka and Peter Oliver) rushed for more than 1,000 yards. Sluka ran for 1,406 yards and 11 touchdowns, Oliver added 1,029 yards and eight scores, and Jordan Fuller rushed for 13 touchdowns while contributing 543 yards.

During the spring 2021 season, delayed from the fall of 2020 due to COVID-19, Holy Cross defeated Bucknell in the first-ever Patriot League championship game. In 2019, Smith helped the Crusaders to their first Patriot League championship in 10 years, and just the third NCAA FCS berth in program history.

During his first five years coaching the offensive line, Smith’s players earned All-Patriot League honors seven times: James Murray in 2017, Brett Boddy in 2018 and 2019, Brian Foley in 2018, 2019 and spring 2021, and Nick Olsafka in spring 2021. Additionally, Foley was named

an All-American by Stats Perform and AFCA during the spring 2021 season. In the 2021 fall season, the Crusaders had three first-team all-league linemen in John Brekke, Newman and Olsafka and a second-teamer in Pat McMurtrie.

Smith came to Holy Cross from the University of New Haven, where he served as the offensive line coach and run game coordinator for three years. He helped lead the Chargers to a 19-8 record in Northeast-10 Conference games during that time, with the team finishing either second or third in the league standings every season. Smith coached three All-Americans and eight All-Northeast-10 selections along the offensive line during his three seasons at New Haven, with the team leading the conference in yards per rush during both the 2014 (4.4) and 2015 (5.0) seasons.

Prior to his time at New Haven, Smith spent two seasons as offensive line coach at the University of Northern Colorado. In two years with the Bears, he coached an offensive line which ranked sixth (2013) and fifth (2012) in the Big Sky Conference in sacks allowed. Smith also coached four honorable mention All-Big Sky selections in his two seasons at Northern Colorado.

Smith previously spent two seasons as a graduate assistant at the University at Buffalo where he worked with the linebackers. He also coordinated the scout team and assisted with all special team units.

Smith is a 2009 graduate of Holy Cross and was a four-year starting center for the Crusaders, for whom he started a school-record 45 consecutive games. He earned second team All-Patriot League honors as a senior, and still holds the school record for the most consecutive games started (45). Smith was a four-time Patriot League Academic Honor Roll selection and was a semifinalist for the 2009 William V. Campbell Trophy, given annually to the nation’s top scholar-athlete.

Smith and his wife, Natalie, have one son (Calvin) and one daughter (Eleanor).

Stephen Thomas, whose 17 years of coaching experience include six in the NFL, is in his first season as a Giants' assistant special teams coach.

Thomas spent the previous four seasons as the Detroit Lions' defensive quality control coach.

He joined the Lions in 2019 after spending six of the previous seven seasons (2012-14, 2016-18) at Princeton University, including the last two as the Tigers' special teams coordinator/inside linebackers coach.

In his final season at Princeton in 2018, Thomas coached a pair of first-team All-Ivy League linebackers (Mark Fossati and Tom Johnson). The Tigers' defense was fourth in the nation in points allowed and seventh in rushing defense. Thomas was Princeton's inside linebackers coach in 2016, when the Tigers led the league in scoring, total and rushing

defense.

In-between his two stints at Princeton, Thomas was the Philadelphia Eagles' defensive quality control coach in 2015.

Prior to his initial tenure at Princeton, Thomas was a graduate assistant who worked with the offensive line at Southern Mississippi in 2011, and the linebackers (2010) and secondary (2009) at Delaware. He began his coaching career at Cortland State, where he mentored the cornerbacks in 2007 and the entire secondary the following season.

A native of Brooklyn, Thomas played defensive back and earned a degree in chemical and biological engineering at University at Buffalo. He also earned a master's degree in sport management from Cortland.

Thomas and his wife, Erin, have a son, Justin, and a daughter, Olivia.

QUARTERBACKS COACH

Shea Tierney is in his second season as the Giants’ quarterbacks coach. In his first year working with Tierney in 2022, Daniel Jones had the best season of his career, setting a Giants’ single season completion percentage record of 67.2 and leading the team to its first postseason berth in six years and an NFC Wild Card victory in Minnesota.

Jones threw for 3,205 yards and rushed for a Giants quarterback-record 708 yards to join Philadelphia’s Jalen Hurts and Buffalo’s Josh Allen as the only NFL quarterbacks with 3,000+ passing yards and 500+ rushing yards. Jones threw a career-low five interceptions in 2022 to become just the second quarterback in history with 700+ rushing yards and five or fewer interceptions in a season, joining Washington’s Robert Griffin III in 2012.

Jones led with NFL and set a franchise record by throwing an interception on just 1.1% of his passes (5 in 472 throws). He led the Giants from deficits of 10+ points to victory three times in the season’s first six games, tying him for the highest total by a quarterback in the first six games of a season since 2000.

Prior to joining the Giants, Tierney spent four years working with Brian Daboll on the Buffalo Bills’ staff, the first two as an offensive assistant and the last two as the assistant quarterbacks coach.

In those two seasons, Josh Allen was one of the NFL’s most productive and successful quarterbacks. The Bills were 27-11 combined in the regular season and postseason, won two AFC East titles and advanced to the 2020 conference championship game. In those 38 games, Allen threw for 10,405 yards and 87 touchdowns. He finished second in the NFL Most Valuable Player voting in 2020.

Tierney joined the Bills in 2018 after spending the previous two seasons as an offensive analyst for the University of Alabama, which was 27-2 when he was on the staff. With the Crimson Tide, he worked closely with Billy Napier, the wide receivers coach in Tierney’s first season, who is now the head coach at the University of Florida. In his second season at Alabama, Tierney worked under Daboll, who was the offensive coordinator when the Crimson Tide won the 2017 national championship.

Tierney’s first NFL experience was as a football analyst/coaching intern with the Philadelphia Eagles from 2013-15.

His initial coaching position was at North Carolina State as an offensive graduate assistant from 2011-12.

Tierney is a graduate of Neshaminy High School in Langhorne, Pa. and N.C. State. He is married to the former Emily Seng of Macungie, Pa.

SAFETIES COACH

Mike Treier is in his fourth season with the Giants and his first as the team's safeties coach. He will continue to work closely with Jerome Henderson in coaching the Giants' secondary.

Treier spent the previous two seasons in the role of assistant defensive backs coach. In his debut season with the Giants in 2020, Treier was the team's defensive quality control coach, his first NFL position.

With significant contributions from the secondary, the Giants allowed 214.0 passing yards a game to finish 14th in the NFL in 2022, the team's highest ranking since it was 10th in 2013. The unit excelled despite multiple-game absences due to injury of cornerbacks Adoree' Jackson and Aaron Robinson and safety Xavier McKinney. Treier helped several newcomers become important contributors, including safety Jason Pinnock and rookies Cor'Dale Flott and Dane Belton.

In 2021, McKinney led the team with five interceptions, the highest total by an NFL safety that season. He earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors after his performance vs. Las Vegas on Nov. 2, when he twice picked off Raiders quarterback Derek Carr. McKinney returned the second interception 41 yards for a touchdown at the beginning of the third quarter. In his first season with the Giants, Jackson had 62 tackles and eight passes defensed, despite missing three games.

The defensive staff coached one of the NFL's most improved units in 2020. The defense ranked ninth in the league by allowing 357 points, 94 fewer than their total in 2019. The Giants were 12th in the league by allowing 349.3 yards-per-game after finishing 27th at 377.3 yards the previous season. Giants opponents averaged just 5.3 yards a play, the NFL's ninth-lowest figure.

Treier joined the Giants from Marshall University, where he coached from 2017-19 in his second stint with the school.

In 2019, Treier was the safeties coach and recruiting coordinator for a Thundering Herd team that finished 8-5, including 6-2 in Conference USA. In addition to his duties as safeties coach and recruiting coordinator, Treier was also heavily involved in Marshall's special teams, especially in the punt game where the Herd excelled during Treier's entire tenure.

Treier spent a second season as Marshall's cornerbacks coach in 2018, when the Herd was 9-4 overall and 6-2 in the conference and finished third in the league by allowing only 21.8 points a game. Marshall tied for fifth in the conference with 12 interceptions. Cornerback Chris Jackson was named second-team All-Conference USA and Steven Gilmore was selected to the league's all-freshman team.

Treier returned to Marshall as the cornerbacks coach in 2017. Jackson, then a sophomore, was chosen honorable mention all-conference after leading the team with three interceptions.


In 2016, Treier was named the secondary coach at UT-Martin. By the end of that season, he had been promoted to the SkyHawks' defensive coordinator position.

Treier first coached at Marshall in 2013-15, when he was a graduate assistant.

Treier was raised in Lancaster, Pa. and attend Penn Manor High School in Millersville, Pa. He has a bachelor's degree in business management from Temple University.

Drew Wilkins is in his second season as the Giants’ outside linebackers coach.

In his debut season with the team, Wilkins coached a unit that included Kayvon Thibodeaux, the fifth overall selection in the 2022 NFL Draft. Thibodeaux was selected to the All-Rookie Team by the PFWA and was named NFC Defensive Player of the Week for his dominant performance on Dec. 18 in Washington, where he recorded a team-high 12 tackles (9 solo), 3 tackles for loss, and a strip-sack of Taylor Heinicke, whose fumble he recovered and returned one yard for his first NFL touchdown. Thibodeaux also recorded a game-sealing strip-sack in the Giants’ Oct. 16 victory over the Baltimore Ravens. After missing the first two games due to injury, Thibodeaux continually improved as the season progressed and was named a Pro Bowl alternate.

Despite being limited to only seven regular season games, second year pro Azeem Ojulari finished second on the team with 5.5 sacks and led the team with three forced fumbles. Jihad Ward, who had previously played for Wilkins in Baltimore, recorded career-highs of 43 tackles, seven tackles for loss (tied for team-lead) and 3.0 sacks.

The 2022 Giants ranked fifth in the NFL in third-down defense, as their opponents converted just 35.1% of their opportunities. The Giants also ranked fifth in the NFL in red-zone defensive efficiency in 2022. The Giants allowed 45 fewer points and recorded seven more sacks than they had the previous season, a major reason their victory total increased by five games, and they earned their first playoff berth since 2016 and won their first playoff game since 2011.

Prior to joining the Giants, Wilkins spent 12 seasons with the Baltimore Ravens, the last 10 working with Giants defensive coordinator Wink Martindale, including the last four coaching the outside linebackers. That tenure included a Ravens victory in Super Bowl XLVII.

In 2021, the Ravens’ defense led the NFL against the run, allowing 84.5 yards a game. Baltimore was third in the league in third down defense, allowing a conversion percentage of just 34.8 (70 of 201). Wilkins mentored rookie outside linebacker Odafe Oweh, who was selected to the All-Rookie Team by the PFWA.

The previous season, the Ravens allowed the NFL’s second-fewest points per game (18.9), produced the No. 2 third-down defense (34.0%), and registered an NFL-high 25 forced fumbles. The 2019 Ravens produced a

franchise-best 14-2 record, winning a second straight AFC North title. Baltimore allowed the NFL’s third-fewest points (17.6) and fourth-fewest net yards (300.6) per game.

Outside linebacker Matthew Judon who was selected to two Pro Bowls (2019, 2020) during his tenure with Wilkins in Baltimore.

Wilkins debuted as Baltimore’s outside linebackers coach in 2018, when the Ravens had the league’s top-ranked defense, allowing 292.9 yards per game. Baltimore also permitted the league’s second-fewest points per game (17.9 a game). Wilkins coached outside linebacker Terrell Suggs, who registered 139.0 career sacks (8th in NFL history) and was selected to seven Pro Bowls.

In 2017, Wilkins worked with a defensive unit that led the league in both takeaways (34) and interceptions (22).

During Wilkins’ three seasons (2014-16) as a defensive assistant, he was responsible for the weekly production of the defensive playbook, scouting reports, film breakdown and assisting with the development of the defensive line in practice.

Wilkins joined the organization in 2010 as a football video operations intern before becoming a video coordinator in 2012, when the Ravens won the Super Bowl.

Wilkins graduated from the University of Maryland in 2010 with a double major in finance and supply chain management. While attending Maryland, he worked as a student assistant under former Maryland head coach Ralph Friedgen and current Penn State head coach James Franklin.


Wilkins hometown is Doylestown, Pa.. He attended La Salle College High School (Wyndmoor, Pa.), where he graduated in 2006 and earned all-league honors as a senior tight end.

Wilkins was selected to the East-West Shrine Game coaching staff (2017-19, 2022) for displaying extraordinary teaching and communication skills in the coaching profession. He also served as the West squad’s defensive coordinator in 2019 and the East squad’s defensive coordinator in 2022.

Wilkins and his wife, Nurit, have two sons Benjamin Clarence (5) and Leo Daniel (1), and a daughter, Emily Nina (3). His younger brother, Kevin, is a Giants defensive assistant.

Kevin Wilkins is in his second season as a Giants Defensive Assistant working with the inside linebackers. In his first season with the team, the Giants ranked fifth in the NFL in third down defense, fifth in the red zone and eighth in tackling percentage.

Prior to joining the Giants, Wilkins spent seven seasons with the Baltimore Ravens. His first season was 2015, when he began working with Giants defensive coordinator Wink Martindale. The 2023 season will be their ninth season together.

After two seasons as a football video intern, Wilkins spent three seasons as football video operations coordinator and began working on special projects for the Ravens coaching staff. His work there led to Wilkins

joining Martindale’s staff as a defensive assistant in 2021, when the unit allowed the fewest yards in the NFL.

Before his time in Baltimore, Wilkins spent four years at the University of South Carolina, where he graduated with a degree in business management. While attending school, Wilkins worked as a video assistant under Steve Spurrier. The team won the SEC East for the first time in school history, followed by three consecutive 11-win seasons.

Wilkins is a Doylestown, Pa. native and a graduate of La Salle College High School outside of Philadelphia.

His older brother, Drew, is the Giants’ outside linebackers coach.

Dennis Hickey, a former Miami Dolphins general manager, is in his second season as the Giants' assistant director of player personnel.

Prior to joining the Giants, Hickey spent five years working for the Buffalo Bills. His tenure mirrored Giants general manager Joe Schoen's time with the team. Hickey was the Bills' senior college scout in 2017-18 before being promoted to senior national scout in his third year with the team. Schoen and Hickey first worked together in 2014-15, when Hickey was the Dolphins' general manager and Schoen was the team's director of player personnel.

La Testa first worked with the Giants as a pro personnel training camp intern in 2015. The following season, he was a pro personnel intern.


Prior to joining the Giants, La Testa worked as a player personnel assistant for Rutgers' football program in the 2015 season.

GIANTS NOTES

- » Barkley rushed for 1,307 yards as a rookie and 1,003 yards in 2019 to become the first player in Giants history to rush for at least 1,000 yards in each of his first 2 seasons.
- » On Dec. 22, 2019, Barkley set a franchise record with 279 yards from scrimmage (189 rushing and 90 receiving) in an overtime victory at Washington...The previous record of 276 yards was set by Tiki Barber vs. Philadelphia on Dec. 28, 2002...Barber rushed for 203 yards and added 73 receiving yards...Barkley's 279 yards was the highest total by any NFL player in 2019.
- » Barkley, New Orleans' Alvin Kamara and Christian McCaffrey, then with Carolina, were the only NFL players who totaled more than 1,000 rushing and 1,000 receiving yards in 2018-19.
- » In 2018, Barkley was named the Offensive Rookie of the Year, matching the achievement of wide receiver Odell Beckham, Jr. in 2014...Barkley and Beckham are the only 2 Giants to win the award in its 60-year history...Beckham was the franchise's first Rookie of the Year since Hall of Fame linebacker Lawrence Taylor won the defensive award in 1981.
- » Barkley also received 2 significant though unofficial honors...He was named the Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Year, an award that is determined by a fan vote on NFL.com. In addition, he received the FedEx Ground NFL Player of the Year award...The other finalists were Dallas' Ezekiel Elliott and Todd Gurley. Kansas City quarterback Patrick Mahomes was named FedEx Air NFL Player of the Year...The FedEx Air & Ground NFL Players of the Year awards are a culmination of weekly awards presented by FedEx throughout the NFL season.
- » In his rookie season, Barkley was the first Giants running back chosen for the Pro Bowl since Barber made the last of his 3 consecutive appearances in 2006...He was the first Giants rookie to play in the game since Beckham in 2014, and the team's first rookie running back to be so honored since Tucker Frederickson in 1965...Frederickson was the top overall selection in that year's draft...Running back Ron Johnson was a Pro Bowler in his first season with the team in 1970, but he was acquired in a trade after spending his rookie year with the Cleveland Browns.
- » Barkley set Giants rookie records with 1,307 rushing yards, 91 receptions (tying the mark Beckham set in 2014), and 15 total touchdowns (11 rushing, 4 receiving)...He was the first rookie to lead the Giants in rushing since Andre Williams in 2014 (with 721 yards) and the first to lead the club in receptions since Beckham that season.
- » Barkley was the first running back to lead the Giants in catches since Barber did with 69 in 2003, and the first player to lead the team in rushing and receiving in the same season since Barber in 2003 (1,216 rushing yards, 69 catches).
- » Barkley finished 2nd in the NFL in rushing yardage, 127 yards behind Elliott (1,434 yards)...The 2nd-place finish was the highest by a Giants player since Barber was 2nd in 2005 with a team-record 1,860 yards – 20 yards behind NFL Most Valuable Player Shaun Alexander of Seattle.
- » Barkley's 91 receptions were a record for an NFL rookie running back...The former record of 88 was set by New Orleans' Reggie Bush in 2006.
- » The 91 catches easily surpassed the previous Giants running back record, Barber's 72 catches in 2001...Barkley needed only 6 games to break the former franchise record for receptions by a rookie running back, which had been 37 by Bobby Duhon in 1968.
- » Barkley set a Giants record with 14 receptions (for 80 yards) at Dallas (9/16)...The previous record of 13 was set by Barber, also in Dallas, on Jan. 2, 2000...Barkley's 14 catches were tied for the 3rd-highest total ever by an NFL running back.
- » Barkley's 14 receptions tied the NFL rookie record, regardless of position, set by Philadelphia receiver Don Looney against Washington on Dec. 1, 1940, and tied by Washington running back Roy Helu, Jr. vs. Carolina on Nov. 6, 2011.
- » Barkley led the NFL with a Giants rookie-record 2,028 yards from scrimmage, 27 more than Elliott...They were the only 2 players in the league with at least 2,000 scrimmage yards...Barkley was the first Giants player to lead the NFL in yards from scrimmage since Barber did in 2005 with a franchise-record 2,390 (1,860 rushing/530 receiving).
- » Barkley set the franchise rookie record for yards from scrimmage that had been held by Beckham, who had 1,340 yards in 2014.
- » Barkley's 15 total touchdowns broke the former Giants rookie record of 12 that had been shared by Bill Paschal (1943) and Beckham (2014)...It was the 6th time in Giants history a player scored at least 15 touchdowns in a season: Joe Morris (21 in 1985, 15 in 1986), Gene "Choo-Choo" Roberts (17 on 1949), Barber (15 in 2004), and Brandon Jacobs (15 in 2008).
- » Barkley's 11 rushing touchdowns were also a Giants rookie record. The former mark of 10 had been held by Paschal since 1943.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- » In 5 seasons, Barkley has started all 60 regular-season and 2 postseason games in which he played...Regular-season totals include 4,249 rushing yards on 954 carries (4.5-yard avg.) and 29 touchdowns, plus 247 receptions for 1,820 yards (7.4-yard avg.) and 8 scores...He has 6,069 scrimmage yards...In the playoffs, Barkley has run for 114 yards on 18 attempts (6.3-yard avg.) and 2 touchdowns, and caught 7 passes for 77 yards for 191 yards from scrimmage.
- » Barkley's 6,069 scrimmage yards are the highest total by a player in his first 5 seasons who began his career with the Giants...Rodney Hampton held the former record with 5,892 yards...Barkley ranks 10th in franchise history in career total yardage.
- » Barkley ended the 2022 season 6th on the franchise career rushing list, 389 yards behind Alex Webster...His 4,249 rushing yards are the 2nd-highest total in a player's first 5 seasons in Giants history, behind Hampton (4,807)...Barkley is one of 7 players to rush for more than 4,000 yards in a Giants uniform.
- » Barkley's 247 receptions tie him with Aaron Thomas (1962-70) for 16th place on the Giants' career list.
- » Barkley is one of 5 players in Giants history with 4,000+ rushing yards and 100+ receptions, joining Tiki Barber, Hampton, Webster and Ahmad Bradshaw...They are also the only 5 players in franchise history with 4,000+ rushing yards and 1,000+ receiving yards.
- » Barkley has rushed for more than 1,000 yards 3 times in 5 seasons, tying him with Joe Morris for the 3rd-highest total in Giants history, behind Barber (6) and Hampton (5)...Barkley's 4.45-yard average is the 4th-highest among the 10 running backs in Giants history with at least 900 attempts, behind Barber (4.71), Bradshaw (4.60) and Brandon Jacobs (4.48).
- » Barkley has rushed for at least 100 yards in 16 games, the 4th-highest total in franchise history, behind Barber (38), Morris (19) and Hampton (17)...The Giants are 9-7 when Barkley rushes for at least 100 yards (4-0 in 2022).
- » Barkley's 29 regular season rushing touchdowns place him 10th in Giants history, 3 behind Bradshaw.
- » Barkley had at least one reception in each of his first 30 games, a record for a Giants' running back to start a career...The streak ended when he did not have a reception at Chicago on Sept. 20, 2020...Ron Johnson had the previous record with 26 games (1970-72)...Barkley enters the 2023 season having caught at least one pass in 17 consecutive games.

2022

- » In 2022, Barkley started each of the first 16 regular-season games before he was one of numerous inactive regulars in the season finale at Philadelphia (1/8)...Also started both Giants postseason games...It was the first time since his 2018 Rookie of the Year season that Barkley did not miss a game due to injury.
- » Selected to his 2nd Pro Bowl and was one of 3 players nominated for the NFL Comeback Player of the Year award.
- » Finished with career-high totals of 295 carries for 1,312 yards – the NFL's 4th-highest total - and rushed for 10 touchdowns, one less than his career-high rookie total...Had 133 more attempts, 719 more yards and 8 more rushing touchdowns than he produced in 13 games in 2021... Barkley's 1,000-yard season was the 26th in Giants history...Ran for one touchdown in 10 of his 16 games, plus 2 in the postseason...Barkley rushed for more than 100 yards in a game 4 times, one less than his combined total for the 3 seasons from 2019-21.
- » Tied Richie James for the team lead with 57 receptions, for 338 yards, and was 7th in the NFL with 1,650 scrimmage yards, almost double his 2021 total of 856...Exceeded 100 scrimmage yards in 8 games.
- » Barkley was one of 3 players in 2022 to lead his team in rushing and receptions:

- » Barkley's 352 scrimmage touches (295 carries and 57 receptions) were the 3rd-most in the NFL, behind Las Vegas' Josh Jacobs' 393 (340, 53) and Tennessee's Derrick Henry 382 (349, 33).
- » Voted a team captain for the 4th consecutive season.
- » Earned his 3rd career NFC Offensive Player of the Week award at Tennessee (9/11), where he was the dominant performer in the Giants' 21-20 season-opening victory...Barkley scored the game-deciding points on a reception for a 2-point conversion with 1:06 to play.
- » Led the Giants' 238-yard rushing output with a season-high 164 yards on 18 carries, including a 4-yarder in the 3rd quarter for the Giants' first touchdown of the season...The 164 yards was the 3rd-highest total of his career and the most he's had in a game outside FedExField...Barkley ran for a career-high 189 yards on Dec. 22, 2019 and 170 yards on Dec. 9, 2018, both in Washington.
- » His 9.1-yard per-carry average was the highest by a Giants player with at least 18 rushing attempts since Dec. 30, 2006, when Barber averaged 10.2 yards (23 carries for 234 yards) in his final regular-season game...Barkley rushed for the highest total ever by a Giants back on opening day. The previous mark was 146 yards by Barber vs. St. Louis in 2003.
- » Barkley set up his touchdown with a 68-yard run on the Giants' first play of the third quarter. It was his fourth 68-yard run, which is tied for the 2nd-longest of his career.
- » Barkley also led the Giants with 6 receptions for 30 yards...His 194 yards from scrimmage were the 4th-highest total of his career...He totaled a franchise record 279 yards in Washington on Dec. 22, 2019, 229 yards against Philadelphia on Oct. 11, 2018, and 197 at Washington on Dec. 9, 2018.
- » Led the Giants with 81 yards on 14 carries, including a 36-yarder for the team's only touchdown, vs. Dallas (9/26)...The 36-yard touchdown run was his longest since he scored on a 68-yarder vs. Philadelphia on Dec. 29, 2019...Added 4 receptions to increase his career total to 203.
- » Ran for 146 yards on a then career-high 31 carries vs. Chicago (10/2)...His previous high was 27 carries (for 142 yards) vs. Tampa Bay on Nov. 18, 2018... The 31 carries are the most by a Giants back since Rashad Jennings had 34 (for 176 yards) vs. Houston on Sept. 21, 2014...Barkley caught 3 passes for 16 yards and took 3 snaps as a wildcat quarterback after Daniel Jones and Tyrod Taylor both left the game with injuries.
- » Led the Giants with 70 rushing yards on 13 carries, including the go-ahead 2-yard touchdown in the 4th quarter, and caught 3 passes for 36 yards, at Green Bay (10/9)...Ran for 83 yards on 22 carries, including the game-winning one-yard touchdown with 1:43 remaining, vs. Baltimore (10/16).
- » Ran for a team-high 110 rushing yards on 24 carries at Jacksonville (10/23)...Jones added 107 yards as they became the 3rd tandem of rushers to each top 100 rushing yards in a game in Giants history, and the first with a quarterback...On Dec. 23, 2007, Bradshaw rushed for 151 yards and Jacobs added 143 in a victory in Buffalo. The same duo each passed the century mark on Dec. 13, 2010, when Bradshaw ran for 116 yards and Jacobs 103 in a victory over Minnesota (that was played in Detroit).
- » Finished with a career-high 35 carries for 152 yards, including a 2-yard touchdown in the 3rd quarter, vs. Houston (11/13)...The 35 carries were the most by a Giants back since Dec. 5, 1999, when Joe Montgomery had 38 (for 111 yards) in a victory vs. the Jets...Barkley's 152 rushing yards were his 2nd-highest total of the season (164 at Tennessee).
- » Rushed for 87 yards on 18 carries, including a 3-yard touchdown, at Washington (12/18)... In 4 career games in Washington, Barkley has 665 scrimmage yards (166.3 a game) and 4 touchdowns.
- » Led the Giants with 84 rushing yards on 14 carries, (a 6.0-yard average), including a 27-yard touchdown, and had season-high totals of 8 receptions

for 49 yards at Minnesota (12/24). The 8 catches were the highest total Barkley had in a game since he had 9 on Oct. 28, 2018 (the last of 3 consecutive games in which he caught 9 passes).

- » In his postseason debut, Barkley rushed for 53 yards on 9 carries, including touchdown runs of 28 yards and the game-winning 2-yarder with 7:47 remaining, in the NFC Wild Card Game at Minnesota (1/15)...He was the first Giants back with 2 rushing touchdowns in a playoff game since Hampton scored twice on Jan. 9, 1994 – also against Minnesota...Barkley's 28-yard score was the Giants' longest postseason touchdown run since Hampton's 51-yarder in that game...Added 5 receptions for 56 yards for 109 scrimmage yards.
- » Had 9 rushing attempts for 61 yards, including a game-long 39-yard run, and caught 2 passes for 21 yards in the divisional playoff game at Philadelphia (1/21).

2021

- » In 2021, Barkley started all 13 games in which he played...Totaled 162 carries for 593 yards (3.7-yard avg.) and 2 touchdowns and 41 receptions for 263 yards and 2 scores...Barkley tied Devontae Booker for the most rushing yards on the team and was 2nd behind Booker (861) in scrimmage yards with 856...The Giants were the first team with 2 players sharing the team rushing title since the 1938 Chicago Bears, who had Ray Noling and Sam Francis each run for 297 yards...Team captain.
- » Returned from a torn ACL in the season opener and posted 10 carries for 26 yards and one catch for one yard vs. Denver (9/12)...Scored his first touchdown of the season on a one-yard run vs. Atlanta (9/26) and added 16 rushes for 51 yards along with 6 receptions for 43 yards.
- » Had his most productive game of the season when he ran 13 times for 52 yards and one touchdown to go with 5 receptions for 74 yards and one touchdown at New Orleans (10/3)...Scored on a 54-yard pass from Jones and also tallied the game-winning touchdown in overtime on a 6-yard rush...Was one of 6 NFC running backs with at least 125 scrimmage yards and 2 touchdowns in a game in 2021.
- » Injured his ankle at Dallas (10/10) and was inactive from Oct. 17-Nov. 7...Returned at Tampa Bay (11/22) and tallied 6 rushing attempts for 25 yards and 6 catches for 31 yards...Posted at least 40 rushing yards and 3 receptions in 4-straight games from Nov. 28-Dec. 19...Caught his 2nd touchdown of the season on an 18-yard pass from quarterback Mike Glennon at the L.A. Chargers (12/12)...Ran 21 times for 102 yards at Chicago (1/2).

2020

- » In 2020, Barkley started the season's first 2 games...Suffered a torn right ACL and meniscus on the first play of the 2nd quarter in Chicago (9/20) and missed the remainder of the season...He had 19 carries for 34 yards and 6 receptions for 60 yards...Elected one of the Giants' team captains.
- » Barkley had 15 carries for 6 yards and 6 receptions for 60 yards in the season opener vs. Pittsburgh (9/14)...It was his 2nd-lowest rushing total in a full game (he ran for one yard at the Jets on Nov. 10, 2019)...His 6 catches tied Darius Slayton and Sterling Shepard for the team lead.
- » Although he participated in just 8 offensive plays, Barkley led the Giants with 28 rushing yards on 4 carries at the Bears...He did not catch a pass, ending at 30 his Giants-record streak for the most consecutive games with a reception by a running back to start a career in a Giants uniform.

2019

- » In 2019, Barkley started all 13 games in which he played. He missed 3 games – the first absences of his career – because of a sprained ankle he suffered at Tampa Bay (9/22)...Did not play vs. Washington (9/29), Minnesota (10/6) and at New England (10/10)...Finished the season with team-leading figures of 217 carries for 1,003 yards and 6 touchdowns...Coupled with his 1,307 yards in his debut season, Barkley was the first Giants back with consecutive 1,000-yard seasons since Jacobs in 2007-08.
- » Rushed for more than 100 yards in 4 games – at Dallas (9/8), vs. Buffalo (9/15), vs. Miami (12/15) and at Washington (9/22).
- » Barkley was 2nd on the team with 52 receptions, for 438 yards and 2 touchdowns.
- » Barkley and Odell Beckham, Jr. are the only players in Giants history to exceed 1,000 scrimmage yards in each of their first 2 seasons... Barkley reached 2,500 scrimmage yards in his 21st career game, tying former Giants running back Otis Anderson (21 games with the Cardinals) and Billy Simms (21) for the 4th-fewest games to reach 2,500 career yards in NFL history...Through 25 career games, Barkley had registered at least 100 scrimmage yards in 17 games, tying Sims for the 4th-most such games by a player in his first 25 career games in league annals.
- » Barkley's 4 rushing touchdowns of at least 65 yards were the most in the NFL in 2018-19...Tennessee's Derrick Henry was 2nd with 3...In that same span, Barkley had 9 runs of at least 50 yards, 4 more than anyone else.
- » Opened the season by rushing for 120 yards on 11 carries and catching 4 passes for 19 yards at Dallas (9/8)...Barkley's first run of the season gained 59 yards, which was the longest first carry in any season by a Giants player since the 1970 merger...It was the longest first rushing attempt of a season by any player since Pittsburgh wide receiver Darrius Heyward-Bey's 60-yarder at Miami on Oct. 16, 2016 (his only rushing attempt of the season) and the longest by a running back since Oakland's Jalen Richard ran for 75 yards at New Orleans on Sept. 11, 2016.
- » Rushed for 107 yards on 18 carries, including a 27-yard touchdown on the game's first series, and caught 3 passes for 28 yards vs. Buffalo (9/15)...Became the 3rd player in Giants history to begin a season with two 100-yard rushing games, joining Eddie Price in 1952 and Rob Carpenter in 1983.
- » Barkley rushed for at least 100 yards for the 9th time in his first 18 games...The previous high total for 100-yard performances in the first 18 games by a Giants back was 5 by Price in 1950-51...The previous NFL player to rush for 100 or more yards in at least 9 of his first 18 games was Denver's Clinton Portis in 2002-03. Portis had 10 such games...Barkley also had 15 games with at least 100 yards from scrimmage, tying him with Pro Football Hall of Famer Eric Dickerson for the most such performances in the first 18 games in a career...Prior to Barkley, the highest total by a Giants player in his first 18 games with the team was 10 by Ron Johnson from 1970-72...Barkley reached career totals of 1,500 rushing yards and 500 receiving yards in his 18th game to join Pro Football Hall of Famer Edgerrin James as the only players in history to reach both of those marks that quickly.
- » Barkley rushed for a then career-low 10 yards on 8 carries and caught 4 passes for 27 yards at Tampa Bay (9/22) before leaving the game late in the first half with a sprained right ankle...His foot got caught under safety Mike Edwards after a 6-yard reception...Barkley missed the next 3 games.
- » Returned to run for 72 yards on 18 carries, including a 7-yard touchdown, and caught 3 passes for 8 yards vs. Arizona (10/20)...Totaled 143 scrimmage yards at Detroit (10/27) with 64 rushing yards and a season-high 8 receptions for 79 yards, including a 4-yarder for the Giants' final touchdown...Rushed for 28 yards and caught a season-long 65-yard pass vs. Dallas (11/4).
- » Finished with season-high totals of 24 carries and 2 touchdowns vs. Miami (12/15), when he rushed for 112 yards and scored on runs of one and 10 yards...Also caught 4 passes for 31 yards to gain 143 yards from scrimmage, tying his 2nd-highest total of the season.
- » Barkley set a franchise record with 279 yards from scrimmage (189 rushing and 90 receiving) in an overtime victory at Washington (12/22)...The previous record of 276 yards was set by Barber vs. Philadelphia on Dec. 28, 2002. Barber rushed for 203 yards and added 73 receiving yards...Barkley's 279 yards was the highest total by any NFL player in 2019.
- » Barkley is tied for 3rd on the Giants' single-game total yardage list...David Wilson is first with 327 yards (227 kickoff returns, 100 rushing) vs. New Orleans on Dec. 9, 2012...Domenik Hixon gained 303 yards (230 kickoff returns, 51 punt returns, 22 receiving) at New Orleans on Oct. 18, 2009...Barkley is tied with Joe Scott, who totaled 279 yards (22 rushing, 35 receiving, 207 kickoff returns, 15 after receiving a lateral) vs. the Los Angeles Rams on Nov. 14, 1948.
- » Barkley's 189 rushing yards were a career high...He had 22 carries, the longest a 67-yard touchdown run...He set his previous best in Washington on Dec. 9, 2018, when he ran for 170 yards, including a 78-yard touchdown.
- » Barkley had 108 rushing yards on his 4th carry...That was the fewest attempts a Giants back needed to reach 100 yards since Dec. 31, 2005, when

Barber did it in 3 carries at Oakland...One of those runs was a team-record 95-yarder...Barkley also caught 4 passes for a season-high 90 yards, including a 51-yarder and a 33-yard touchdown...He was the 2nd Giants player in 2019 to score rushing and receiving touchdowns in the same game and both players did it vs. Washington...On Sept. 29, Wayne Gallman, Jr. scored on a 6-yard catch and a one-yard run.

- » Barkley was the 5th player with at least 275 scrimmage yards and both a rushing and receiving touchdown in a single game since 1970, joining Priest Holmes (Week 13, 2001 and Week 12, 2002), Chris Johnson (Week 2, 2009), Herschel Walker (Week 15, 1986) and Delvin Williams (Week 9, 1976).
- » Barkley joined Billy Cannon (Dec. 10, 1961), Williams (Nov. 7, 1976) and Holmes (Nov. 24, 2002) as the only players in NFL history with at least 175 rushing yards, 90 receiving yards and 2 touchdowns in a game.
- » While Barkley was setting the franchise record with 279 yards from scrimmage, Daniel Jones threw for 352 yards and 5 touchdowns...The Giants were the first team in NFL history to have a player with 275+ scrimmage yards and a player with 5 touchdown passes in the same game.
- » In the season finale vs. Philadelphia (12/29), Barkley rushed for 92 yards on 17 carries, including a 68-yard touchdown, and caught 3 passes for 25 yards for 117 scrimmage yards.
- » With his 67 and 68-yard touchdown runs, Barkley became the first Giants player with touchdown runs of at least 65 yards in consecutive games...Barkley's 68-yard run was the Giants' longest of the season...The previous long was his 67-yarder one week earlier.
- » Barkley's 117 yards vs. Philadelphia was his 3rd consecutive game, 7th of the season and the 20th game in his career with at least 100 scrimmage yards, which tied him with Clinton Portis for the 4th-most of any player in his first 2 seasons...Pro Football Hall of Famers James and Dickerson had 27 and 26, respectively, and Billy Sims had 21.

2018

- » As a rookie in 2018, Barkley started all 16 games...He was the first rookie running back in Giants history to start every game, the first running back to do so since Rashad Jennings in 2015, the first rookie since Sterling Shepard in 2016, and the first Giants first-round draft choice to start each game since right tackle Justin Pugh in 2013.
- » Second-round draft choice Will Hernandez also started all 16 games, at left guard...It was just the 2nd time since the 1970 merger that the Giants had multiple rookies start every game; in 1981, linebacker Lawrence Taylor (first round) and nose tackle Bill Neill (5th round) were the starters.
- » Barkley finished the season with 261 rushing attempts for 1,307 yards (5.0-yard avg.) and 11 touchdowns, and 91 catches for 721 yards (7.9-yard avg.) and 4 scores...All totals but receiving yards and touchdowns led the team.
- » Barkley was the Giants' first 1,000-yard rusher since Bradshaw ran for 1,015 yards in 2012.
- » Barkley and Denver's Phillip Lindsay (1,037 yards) were the 57th and 58th rookies to rush for at least 1,000 yards since the NFL went to a 16-game season in 1978.
- » Barkley's 1,307 yards were 477 more than the No. 2 rookie on the franchise's list – Tuffy Leemans' previous record of 830 yards, set in 1936.
- » Barkley was the 3rd consecutive running back chosen within the top 5 draft selections to rush for more than 1,000 yards in his rookie season...Dallas' Ezekiel Elliott (4th overall in 2016) ran for 1,631 yards in his debut season, and Jacksonville's Leonard Fournette (4th overall in 2017) ran for 1,040 yards.
- » Barkley rushed for more than 100 yards 7 times, a Giants rookie record...Eddie Price had held the mark since 1950, when he hit the century mark 3 times...Barkley was the first Giants back with seven 100-yard games in a season since Barber had 8 in 2006.
- » In his NFL debut vs. Jacksonville (9/9), Barkley had 18 carries for 106 yards, including a 68-yard touchdown run in the 4th quarter, plus 2 receptions for 22 yards...He was the first Giants back to run for at least 100 yards in his NFL debut...His 68-yard run was the longest by a Giants player in his first game...And it was the longest run by a player in his NFL debut since Sept. 11, 2016, when Oakland's Jalen Richards scored on a 75-yarder at New Orleans.
- » Barkley was the first Giants rookie running back to start a season-opening game since Sean Bennett in 1999 (excluding fullback Shane Smith in 2017; Smith had no rushing attempts that season).
- » The following week, Barkley caught a Giants-record 14 passes, for 80 yards, at Dallas (9/16)...Barber held the previous mark with 13 receptions on Jan. 2, 2000, also in a road game vs. the Cowboys...Barkley ran for 28 yards on 11 carries in the game.
- » Rushed for 82 yards on 17 attempts, including a 15-yard touchdown, and caught 5 passes for 35 yards at Houston (9/23)...His 21 receptions are a record for a Giants rookie in his first 3 games and his 27 catches in his first 4 games broke Sterling Shepard's record of 20, set in 2016.
- » When he ran for 130 yards vs. Philadelphia (10/11), Barkley became the 2nd Giants rookie running back in the Super Bowl era to rush for at least 100 yards vs. the Eagles...Barber ran for 114 yards in Philadelphia on Dec. 7, 1997.
- » Barkley rushed for 142 yards vs. Tampa Bay (11/18) and 101 at Philadelphia (11/25) to become the 2nd Giants rookie in history with back-to-back 100-yard rushing games...The first was Price, who ran for 156 yards vs. the New York Yanks on Dec. 3, 1950, and 103 yards 7 days later at Philadelphia...Barkley extended his streak of 100-yard games to a Giants rookie record 4 with 125 vs. Chicago (12/2) and a season-high 170 at Washington (12/9)...He was the first Giants back with 4 consecutive 100-yard rushing games since Barber had 5 in a row from Nov. 20-Dec. 17, 2005.
- » Barkley's 170 rushing yards at Washington was the 2nd-highest total by a rookie in Giants history...Bill Paschal ran for 188 yards vs. Washington on Dec. 5, 1943...Barkley also has the 6th (142 vs. Tampa Bay), 8th (130 vs. Philadelphia), and 9th (125 vs. Chicago) biggest rushing games by a Giants rookie...Barkley has 7 of the top 12 single-game rookie rushing totals in Giants history.
- » Barkley's 170 rushing yards in Washington were the most by a Giants player since Jennings ran for 170 yards on Jan. 3, 2016, in a loss to Philadelphia.
- » In that 40-16 victory in Washington, Barkley rushed for 170 yards on 14 carries, a 12.1-yard average that was the 4th-highest in a game in Giants history – and the largest in a road game (minimum 10 attempts):

14.33 Derrick Ward, vs. Carolina, Dec. 21, 2008 (15-215)

13.30 Frank Reagan, vs. Rams, Dec. 1, 1946 (10-133)

12.23 Tuffy Leemans, vs. Green Bay, Nov. 20, 1938 (13-159)

12.14 Saquon Barkley, at Washington, Dec. 9, 2018 (14-170)

- » In Washington, Barkley scored on a 78-yard run that was the 2nd-longest by a rookie in Giants history; Bradshaw ran for an 88-yard touchdown at Buffalo on Dec. 23, 2007.
- » Barkley also had a 52-yard run to set up another Giants touchdown in Washington...He was the first Giants back with 2 runs of 50 or more yards in one game since Barber on Dec. 30, 2006 – also in a victory in FedExField. In his final career regular-season game, Barber scored touchdowns on runs of 55 and 50 yards.
- » Barkley had seven 40+ yard runs and six 50+ yard runs to lead the NFL in each category...The six 50-yard runs were the highest single-season total by a Giants player since the 1970 merger and were twice as many as any other NFL player had in 2018; Isaiah Crowell of the Jets was 2nd with 3.
- » Barkley's 91 receptions tied Beckham's Giants rookie record, was the highest total ever by a Giants player other than a wide receiver, and was tied for the 4th-highest total in franchise history:

- » Barkley finished 2nd among NFL running backs behind Christian McCaffrey, then with Carolina, who set an NFL record for running backs with 107 catches.
- » From Oct. 11-28, Barkley had 9 receptions vs. Philadelphia, at Atlanta and vs. Washington to become the first player in Giants history with at least 9 catches in each of 3 consecutive games...He was the first NFL running back to accomplish the feat since St. Louis' Steven Jackson in 2006.
- » Barkley's 721 receiving yards were a record for a Giants rookie running back...David Meggett held the former mark with 531 yards in 1989...The 721 receiving yards are the 7th-highest total ever by a Giants rookie.
- » Barkley had a 50-yard run and a 55-yard reception vs. Philadelphia (10/11) to become the first Giants player with a run and a catch of 50+ yards in the same game since Oct. 10, 2004, when Barber had a 58-yard run and a 55-yard reception in a victory in Dallas...In that game vs. the Eagles, Barkley almost became the first Giants player in history with 100 yards rushing and receiving in the same game. He had 130 and 99.
- » Barkley had receptions of 57 (a touchdown thrown by Beckham at Carolina) and 55 (from Manning vs. Philadelphia) yards. He was the first Giants running back with 2 catches of 55+ yards in a season since Barber in 2004, and the first Giants rookie back to do it since Meggett in 1989.
- » Barkley's 2,028 yards from scrimmage was the 4th 2,000-yard season in Giants history and the most by Giants players since Barber had 2,127 (1,662 rushing/465 receiving) in 2006, his final season.
- » Barkley was the 3rd rookie in NFL history with 2,000 yards from scrimmage:

- » Barkley finished with a season-high 229 yards from scrimmage vs. Philadelphia, which was then the 7th-highest total in Giants history.
- » Barkley was the 2nd player in NFL history to begin a career with at least 6 consecutive games with 100 or more scrimmage yards...The only other player to accomplish the feat was Kareem Hunt, whose streaks were 7 games and 885 yards.
- » Barkley had another streak of 6 consecutive 100-yard games later in the season...He is one of 7 rookies in NFL history with 6 consecutive games with at least 100 scrimmage yards, joining Eric Dickerson, L.A. Rams (1983-10 games), Edgerrin James, Indianapolis (1999-9 games), Kareem Hunt, Kansas City (2017-7 games), Kevin Jones, Detroit (2004-7 games), Jamal Lewis, Baltimore (2000-7 games), and Clark Gaines, Jets (1976-7 games).
- » Barkley was the first NFL rookie with at least 1,200 rushing yards and 600 receiving yards since Detroit's Billy Sims in 1980.
- » Barkley exceeded 100 yards from scrimmage in 13 games, tying Dickerson's NFL rookie record. James had 12 such games.
- » Barkley was also the 5th rookie with at least 1,900 scrimmage yards and 15 touchdowns in a single season in NFL history:

- » In 2018, Barkley accounted for 33.5% of the Giants' rushing and receiving yards, the 2nd-highest total by any NFL player. Elliott was 2nd, accounting for 33.5% of Dallas' offense.

With 11 scores on the ground, Barkley was the first Giants back with double-digit rushing touchdowns since Brandon Jacobs had 15 in 2008.

- » Barkley had 5 touchdowns from scrimmage of 50 or more yards, the most ever by a Giants rookie and the most by any Giants player since Beckham had 5 in 2015...Barkley was the first NFL rookie with five 50+ yard touchdowns from scrimmage since Minnesota wide receiver Randy Moss in 1998...Only Billy Howton of the 1952 Green Bay Packers had more such touchdowns as a rookie (6).
- » In the Giants' games vs. Tampa Bay (11/18) and at Philadelphia (11/25), Barkley scored both rushing and receiving touchdowns (on 5 and 2-yard runs and a 6-yard catch vs. the Buccaneers, and a 51-yard run and 13-yard catch vs. the Eagles)...He was the first Giants player to score on both a run and a reception in back-to-back games since Elvin (Kink) Richards on Dec. 3 and 10, 1933 vs. Pittsburgh and at Philadelphia...Before Barkley, the last Giants player to have multiple games with running and receiving touchdowns in the same season was Ron Johnson in 1973.
- » Barkley was one of 4 rookies in NFL history to hit that double in consecutive games...He was one of 2 rookies to accomplish the feat in November 2018 and one of 2 players to do it in a Giants uniform...Cleveland's Nick Chubb scored rushing and receiving touchdowns in Weeks 12 and 13...Richards of the 1933 Giants and Rodney Culver of the 1992 Indianapolis Colts are the only other rookies to score a rushing and receiving touchdown in consecutive games.
- » In the victory vs. Tampa Bay, Barkley was the first Giants running back to score 3 touchdowns in a game since David Wilson vs. New Orleans on Dec. 9, 2012 – but one of Wilson's scores was on a kickoff return (and 2 runs)...Before Barkley, the last Giants back to score 3 touchdowns from scrimmage had been Bradshaw, who had 3 one yard runs vs. Buffalo on Oct. 16, 2011.
- » The last Giants back to score on a run and reception in the same game had been Bradshaw, who scored touchdowns on a 5-yard run and 10-yard catch against Dallas on Jan. 1, 2012.
- » Barkley was the first Giants back with 2 rushing touchdowns in a game since Rashad Jennings at Jacksonville on Nov. 20, 2014 (runs of 2 and 17 yards).

COLLEGE

- » Barkley played in 38 games with 32 starts at Penn State...Finished his collegiate career with 671 rushing attempts for 3,843 yards (5.7-yard avg.) and 43 touchdowns...Averaged 101.1 yards per game on the ground...Also caught 102 passes for 1,195 yards (11.7-yard avg.) with 8 scores...Returned 18 kickoffs for a 27.8-yard average and 2 touchdowns...Amassed 5,538 total yards on 791 touches for averages of 7.0 yards per play and 145.7 yards per game...Barkley finished his career as Penn State's all-time leader in rushing touchdowns (43) and total touchdowns (53), surpassing Lydell Mitchell's marks of 38 rushing and 41 total touchdowns, respectively, from 1969-71...Barkley capped his career as the school's career all-purpose yards leader (5,538), surpassing Larry Johnson (5,045; 1999-2002)...Ranked No. 22 at the conclusion of his career on Penn State career receiving yards list (1,195).
- » Finished his career No. 2 on Penn State's career scoring list (318 points), which were the most in Penn State history by a non-kicker, besting Mitchell's 246 points...Set the school record with a touchdown scored in 15 straight games, a streak that began at Purdue (10/29/16) and ended at Michigan

- State (11/4/17)...Recorded 9 career games with 200-plus all-purpose yards (4 in 2016, 5 in 2017) and is one of just 2 Nittany Lions to reach the 5,000 all-purpose yard mark.
- » Barkley became the only player in Penn State history and just the 4th in the Big Ten to gain 3,000 rushing and 1,000 receiving yards in a career...Was the 7th player in Penn State history to reach 3,000 career rushing yards, finishing 2nd on Penn State's career rushing yards list (3,843), trailing only Evan Royster (3,932; 2007-10)...Joined Royster as the only 2 rushers in Penn State history with three 1,000-yard rushing seasons.
 - » As a junior in 2017, Barkley played in all 13 games with 12 starts...Selected team captain, named Penn State's Most Valuable Player and earned the Captain's Award at the team's annual awards banquet...Finished with 217 rushing attempts for 1,271 yards (5.9-yard avg.), and career-high-tying 18 touchdowns...Also caught 54 passes, more than his first 2 seasons combined (48), for 632 yards (11.7-yard avg.) and 3 touchdowns...Had a career-high 1,903 yards from scrimmage on 271 touchdowns (146.4 a game, 7.0 per touch)...Added 15 kickoff returns for 426 yards (28.4-yard avg.) and 2 touchdowns...Scored a career-high 23 touchdowns (1 more than his 2016 total).
 - » Led the Big Ten in rushing for the 2nd consecutive season...Set the Penn State single-game all-purpose yards mark with 358 at Iowa (9/23, including 211 yards rushing, 94 yards receiving, and 53 yards on kickoff return), topping Curt Warner's previous mark of 341 vs. Syracuse in 1981.
 - » Barkley's 92-yard touchdown run vs. Washington in the PlayStation Fiesta Bowl (12/30/17) was tied for the longest rush in program history, equaling the mark of Blair Thomas (1986; Syracuse - non-touchdown) and Bill Belton (2014; at Indiana).
 - » Received the Paul Hornung Award as college football's most versatile player...Finished No. 4 in the Heisman Trophy voting, the highest finish by a Penn State player since Larry Johnson finished 3rd in 2002...Became the 100th first-team All-American in Penn State history...Was Penn State's 42nd consensus All-American and first Nittany Lion offensive player since Johnson in 2002.
 - » Named the Big Ten's Graham-George Offensive Player of the Year for the 2nd straight season...Was the first Big Ten running back and 3rd Big Ten player to earn multiple Player of the Year awards in the conference's history, joining Miller (2012-13), and Purdue's Drew Brees (1998 & 2000)...Named first-team All-Big Ten at both running back and return specialist from both the coaches and media panels...Earned Big Ten Offensive Player of the Year, along with first-team all-conference at running back and all-purpose player from the AP.

- » Received his 5th career NFC Special Teams Player of the Week award after kicking field goals of 36 and 33 yards in the first quarter and 51 and 56 yards in the 4th, the latter providing the game's decisive points with 3:34 remaining in a 19-16 victory, vs. Carolina (9/18)...Gano has the only 2 games in Giants history in which a kicker boosted a pair of 50+-yard field goals in the 4th quarter or overtime. On Sept. 16, 2021, in Washington, he kicked 52 and 55-yarders – plus a 35-yarder – in the 4th.
- » Kicked a pair of 51-yard field goals and a 42-yarder in 4 attempts vs. Dallas (9/26)...It was the first time in his career he made two 50+-yard field goals in consecutive games and the 6th game in which a Giants kicker had 2 field goals of 50 or more yards in a game...Gano has 5 of the 6...The only other Giants kicker to do it was Raul Allegre, who kicked 53 and 52-yarders at Philadelphia on Nov. 15, 1987.
- » Tied the record for the longest field goal in Giants history with a 57-yarder at Dallas (11/24)...It was the longest field goal on the road in franchise history...Rosas kicked the Giants' only other 57-yarder, vs. Chicago on Dec. 2, 2018.
- » Kicked two 50-yard field goals at Washington (12/18) and two 44-yarders and a 55-yarder at Minnesota (12/24)...The Vikings' Greg Joseph booted a 61-yard game-winning field goal...It was the first game in Giants history in which each team kicked a field goal of at least 55 yards.
- » Booted a 25-yard field goal and 4 extra points in the NFC Wild Card Game at Minnesota (1/15).

2021

- » In 2021, Gano played in all 17 games for the Giants and made 29 of 33 attempts (87.9%) and all 17 of his extra points tries for 104 points, his ninth 100-point season...Gano entered the season with 30 consecutive field goal attempts and extended his streak to 37 before missing in Week 4.
- » Kicked a career-high 5 field goals at Washington (9/16), including 2 from 50+ yards...His 5 field goals made were tied for the most made in a game by a kicker in 2021...His 2 field goals vs. Atlanta (9/26), increased his consecutive successes to 37...Was wide left on a 35-yard try at New Orleans (10/3), his first unsuccessful attempt since Sept. 20, 2020 at Chicago...Later made field goals of 23 and 48 yards in an overtime victory.
- » Kicked 2 field goals from 51 yards at Dallas (10/10) to tie Joe Danelo's franchise record for the most made 50+ yard field goals...Earned NFC Player of the Week honors vs. Carolina (10/24), when he made field goals of 49, 53 and 44 yards...Converted all 3 of his field goal attempts vs. Las Vegas (11/1)...Made 3 of 4 tries, including a 51-yarder at Miami (12/5)...Made his final 4 field goal attempts of the season: 2 vs. Dallas (12/19), a 54-yarder at Philadelphia (12/26), and one at Chicago (1/2).
- » In his first season with the Giants in 2020, Gano had one of the finest seasons of his career and by a Giants kicker...Made 31 of 32 attempts, a .9687 percentage that is the 2nd highest in Giants history...In 2018, Rosas made 32 of 33 attempts, a success rate of .9696...Gano's .9687 percentage was the highest among the 21 NFL kickers who attempted at least 25 field goals in 2020... Gano missed more extra points (2) than field goal attempts (one) in 2020, when he made 21 of 23 PATs.
- » Gano's only miss was on a 57-yard try at Chicago (9/20)...After the miss, he made his next 30 field goal attempts, breaking Josh Brown's previous team record of 29 from 2014-15...The record-setter was a 50-yard field goal in the 4th quarter vs. Dallas (1/3)...It was Gano's fifth field goal of the season of 50 or more yards, including 4 vs. the Cowboys, which was a franchise single-season record.
- » Gano kicked field goals of 52, 42 and 47 yards vs. San Francisco (9/27) to become the 2nd kicker in Giants history with 3 field goals longer than 40 yards in a regular-season game...On Dec. 22, 2013 in Detroit, Brown kicked field goals of 41, 52 and 45 yards to become the first Giants kicker to accomplish the feat.
- » Gano tied an NFL record by becoming the first player in Giants history to kick 3 field goals of 50 or more yards in a game at Dallas (10/11)...He kicked field goals of 55, 50 and 54 yards, plus a 28-yarder...Gano was one of 3 players in 2020 to kick three 50+ yard field goals in a game...The others were Tennessee's Stephen Gostkowski (51, 54 and 55 at Minnesota on Sept. 27) and Buffalo's Tyler Bass (54, 55, 58 at Arizona on Nov. 15).
- » Received his 3rd career NFC Special Teams Player of the Week award for his contributions to the team's victory in Washington (11/8), where he kicked field goals of 38, 48 and 42 yards and 3 of his 6 kickoffs were touchbacks.

2019

- » In 2019, Gano did not play football because of an injury he suffered in practice to his left (plant) leg the previous year.

2018

- » In 2018, played in 12 games for Carolina before going on injured reserve...Converted 30 of 33 PAT attempts and 14 of 16 field goal tries for 72 points, his first sub 100-point season since 2012, his first year with the Panthers...Kicked 3 extra points and a season-high 4 field goals, including a game-winning, franchise-record 63-yarder vs. the Giants (10/7), a performance that earned him the NFC Special Teams Player of the Week and NFC Special Teams Player of the Month for October.

2017

- » In 2017, played in all 16 regular season games and one postseason game...Converted 29 of 30 field goal attempts for a then career high 96.7%...Turned 70 of 83 kickoffs into touchbacks, a career-best and franchise-record 84.8%...Scored 121 total points (29 field goals, 34 PATs), his 5th consecutive 100-point season...Set a career-high with 6 extra points vs. Miami (11/13)...Converted 4 of 5 field goal attempts in one postseason game, including a career and franchise playoff-long 58-yarder in an NFC Wild Card Game at New Orleans (1/7).

2016

- » In 2016, finished with 121 points...Kicked 30 field goals for the 2nd consecutive season (in 38 tries)...Scored 4 points vs. Minnesota (9/25) to pass Steve Smith (454 from 2001-13) for 2nd place on the Panthers' career scoring list...Set career high with 16 points (4 field goals and 4 PATs) vs. San Francisco (9/18)...Took over punting duties for an injured Andy Lee vs. Kansas City (11/13)...Punted 4 times for 180 yards with a long of 54.

Led the nation's kickers and Atlantic Coast Conference in scoring with 105 points...Handled punting duties for three seasons...Averaged 42.1 yards on 148 punts with a long of 64 yards.



- » Jones, who passed for 3,017 yards as a rookie in 2019, in one of 5 quarterbacks in Giants history with multiple 3,000-yard seasons, joining Eli Manning (14), Phil Simms (6), Kerry Collins (4) and Y.A. Tittle (2).
- » Jones threw only 5 interceptions in 2022 to become just the 2nd quarterback in history with 700+ rushing yards and 5 or fewer interceptions in a season, joining Washington's Robert Griffin III in 2012.
- » Jones led the Giants from deficits of 10+ points 3 times in the season's first 6 games, tying him for the highest total by a quarterback in the first 6 games of a season since 2000. Kansas City's Elvis Grbac (2000) and Trent Green (2003) and Philadelphia's Nick Foles (2014) also accomplished the feat. Green and Jones were the only 2 quarterbacks to lead their teams to the playoffs in those seasons.
- » Jones has completed 1,113 of 1,740 throws for a completion percentage of 63.96 that is the highest in franchise history. Manning is 2nd at 60.29 (4,895-8,119).
- » Jones has thrown 34 interceptions among those 1,740 passes, a 2.0 percentage that is the lowest in Giants history among quarterbacks with at least 1,000 attempts. Collins is 2nd at 2.8 (70 picks in 2,473 passes).
- » Jones - the first of the Giants' 3 first-round draft choices in 2019 - was just the 3rd quarterback selected by the Giants in the first round of the NFL Draft...The others were Phil Simms in 1979 and Philip Rivers in 2004...Rivers was soon sent to the Chargers in the trade that brought Manning to the Giants.
- » In 2019, Jones joined Arizona's Kyler Murray and Jacksonville's Gardner Minshew as rookie quarterbacks who passed for at least 20 touchdowns...It was just the 2nd season in NFL history in which at least 3 rookie quarterbacks threw at least 20 touchdown passes...In 2012, Russell Wilson, Andrew Luck and Griffin comprised the trio.
- » Jones was the first rookie quarterback in NFL history with 2 games of 300+ passing yards and 4+ touchdown passes - and he had 3 of them.
- » Jones threw at least one touchdown pass in each of his first 13 career starts, the 4th-longest streak among quarterbacks who started their careers since the 1970 merger:

- » Jones' streak was the 2nd-longest in Giants' history; Hall of Famer Y.A. Tittle threw a touchdown pass in 15 consecutive games from 1962-64...Manning had 3 separate 12-game streaks in his 16-year career...Jones' streak ended in Chicago on Sept. 20, 2020.
- » Jones has rushed for 1,708 yards - the record for a Giants quarterback - on 292 attempts, a 5.8-yard average that ranks first among the 87 players in Giants history with 100 or more carries.
- » Jones' 708 rushing yards in 2022 were the most by a quarterback in Giants history.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- » In his first 4 seasons, Jones played in 54 regular-season games with starts in each of his last 53 appearances and started both postseason games in which he played...He is the 6th quarterback in the Super Bowl era to start at least 50 regular-season games for the Giants, joining Eli Manning, Kerry Collins, Dave Brown, Kerry Collins and Fran Tarkenton.
- » Jones' totals are 1,740 attempts, 1,113 completions (a Giants-record 63.96%) for 11,603 yards, 60 touchdowns and 34 interceptions for a passer rating of 86.5...Jones' 1,113 completions and 11,603 yards are the highest totals in franchise history through the first 4 seasons among quarterbacks who began their careers with the Giants...His 1,740 pass attempts and 60 touchdown passes are 2nd (Manning had 1,805 passes and 77

touchdowns).

- » Jones' 1,113 completions are the 5th-highest total in franchise history, his 1,740 attempts and 11,603 yards are each 6th, and his 60 touchdown passes are 7th.
- » Jones 63.96 completion percentage is the highest in franchise history (minimum 1,000 attempts):

- » In 2 postseason games, Jones completed 39 of 62 passes (62.9%) for 436 yards, 2 touchdowns and one interception for a passer rating of 87.8.
- » Jones has thrown for at least 300 yards in 8 regular-season games (3-5) and one postseason game (1-0).
- » Jones has 292 rushing attempts for 1,708 yards (5.8-yard avg.) and 12 touchdowns with a long run of 80 yards. His 1,708 rushing yards are a record for a Giants quarterback and his 12 rushing touchdowns are the most by a Giants quarterback who began his career since 1950.
- » Since becoming the starter in Week 3 of the 2019 season, Jones has led the Giants in rushing in 14 regular-season games (plus one playoff game), the most by a Giants quarterback in the Super Bowl era...He has also had the team's longest run in 15 games, including 12 in which he was also the leading rusher.
- » Jones' record as a starter is 21-31-1 in the regular season starter and 1-1 in the postseason.
- » Jones has led the Giants to 7 victories in games in which they trailed or were tied in the fourth quarter: Sept. 22, 2019 at Tampa Bay in his first NFL start, Dec. 22, 2019 at Washington, Oct. 3, 2021 at New Orleans and 4 games in 2022, Sept. 11 at Tennessee, Sept. 18 vs. Carolina, Oct. 9 at Green Bay and Oct. 16 vs. Baltimore.

2022

- » In 2022, Jones started each of the first 16 regular-season games, a career high, and both Giants' postseason games...Did not start in the season finale at Philadelphia (1/8), where the Giants rested most of their starters after clinching the 6th seed in the NFC playoffs.
- » Jones led the Giants to 9 regular-season victories, their highest total since 2016, their first postseason berth since 2016, and their first playoff win in 11 years, an NFC Wild Card triumph in Minnesota...Won 4 consecutive starts for the first time in his career (Oct. 2-23)...Elected one of the Giants' team captains for the 3rd straight year.
- » Completed 317 of 472 passes (67.16%) for 3,205 yards, all career highs...Jones' 15 touchdown passes were the 2nd-highest total of his career, and his 5 interceptions were a career low...His passer rating was a career-best 92.5 and was the highest by a Giants quarterback since Eli Manning's 93.6 rating in 2015.
- » Jones' 67.16 completion percentage was a Giants' single season record, topping the former mark of 65.97 by Manning in 2018 (380-576). Jones owns 2 of the 3 highest single season completion percentages in Giants history, including 64.26 in 2021 (232-361).
- » Jones had each of his 5 highest single-game completion percentages in 2022: 80.9 at Tennessee, 80.6 vs. Washington, 79.2 vs. Indianapolis, 77.8 at Green Bay and 76.5 vs. Houston.
- » Jones led with NFL and set a franchise record by throwing an interception on just 1.1% of his passes (5 in 472 throws)...Kurt Warner (1.4 in 2004) and Jeff Hostetler (1.4 in 1991) are only other Giants quarterbacks in the Super Bowl era to lead qualified passers in interception percentage in a season...Jones did not throw an interception in 10 of his 16 starts, the highest number of starts without throwing a pick by an NFL quarterback in 2022.
- » Jones rushed for a Giants quarterback-record 708 yards and 7 touchdowns on 120 carries, all the 2nd-highest totals on the team...He averaged 5.9 yards a carry...Had 7 games with 9 or more rushing attempts...Only 4 quarterbacks (Justin Fields, Lamar Jackson, Josh Allen and Jalen Hurts) ran for more yards in 2022...Jones, Jackson and Arizona's Kyler Murray were the only quarterbacks with a 300-yard passing game and 100-yard rushing game.
- » Jones was one of 5 quarterbacks to rush for at least 50 yards in 6 different games in 2022, the most by a Giants quarterback in the Super Bowl era.
- » Jones joined Hurts as the only quarterbacks in 2022 and is one of 4 in NFL history with at least 3,200 passing yards, a 65+ completion percentage and 700 or more rushing yards in a season, joining (Robert Griffin III in 2012 and Murray in 2020).
- » Jones played the first 2 postseason games of his career and completed 39 of 62 passes for 436 yards, 2 touchdowns and one interception for a passer rating of 87.8...He also rushed for 102 yards on 23 carries (4.4-yard avg.).
- » Opened the season by completing a career-high 80.9% of his passes (17-21) for 188 yards, 2 touchdowns and one interception for a passer rating of 115.9...The completion percentage was the 5th-highest single-game figure by a Giants quarterback (minimum 20 attempts):

- » Threw a 65-yard touchdown pass to Sterling Shepard that held up as the Giants' longest completion of the season...It was the 2nd-longest scoring throw and tied for the 2nd-longest completion of his career, and it was the longest pass he's thrown to a wide receiver...In his first NFL start on Sept. 29, 2019 at Tampa Bay, Jones tossed a 75-yard touchdown pass to tight end Evan Engram. On Nov. 4 of that season, he completed a 65-yard to Saquon Barkley vs. Dallas.
- » Led a Giants comeback from deficits of 13-0 at halftime and 20-13 in the 4th quarter...Completed a one-yard touchdown pass to Chris Myarick and a 2-point conversion to Barkley with 1:06 left for the deciding points in a 21-20 victory.
- » Had 6 carries for 68 yards, including touchdowns of 21 and 8 yards, vs. Chicago (10/2)...The 21-yard touchdown run was the 2nd-longest of his career...It was the 2nd game in which Jones rushed for 2 touchdowns; the first was in his starting debut at Tampa Bay on Sept. 22, 2019...Jones is one of 2 quarterbacks in Giants history with at least 2 rushing touchdowns in multiple games, joining Super Bowl XXV winner Jeff Hostetler.
- » Completed 21 of 27 passes (77.8%) for 217 yards vs. Green Bay in London (10/9)...Led the Giants from a 17-3 deficit to a 27-20 victory...Jones completed 13 of 14 passes, including a career-high 11 in a row, when the Giants scored 17 unanswered points in the 2nd half.
- » Received his 3rd career NFC Offensive Player of the Week award after a victory at Jacksonville (10/23), where he completed 19 of 30 passes for 202 yards and one touchdown, and rushed for a career-high 107 yards and the go-ahead one-yard touchdown on 11 attempts...Jones' 107 yards were the 4th-highest total by a quarterback in Giants history and the most for a Giants quarterback in 76 years...Harry Newman ran for 114 yards vs. Green Bay on Nov. 11, 1934 and 108 yards at Boston on Oct. 8, 1933. Frank Filchock also had 108 rushing yards, on Oct. 6, 1946, at Pittsburgh.
- » Barkley rushed for 110 yards vs. the Jaguars. Jones and Barkley were the 3rd tandem of rushers to each top 100 rushing yards in a game in Giants history and for the first time, a quarterback was among them...On Dec. 23, 2007, Ahmad Bradshaw rushed for 151 yards and Brandon Jacobs added 143 in a victory in Buffalo...The same duo each passed the century mark on Dec. 13, 2010, when Bradshaw ran for 116 yards and Jacobs

103 in a victory against Minnesota (that was played in Detroit).

- » The win in Jacksonville was the 5th game in 2022 in which Jones led the Giants from a 4th quarter deficit or tie to a victory, which he accomplished 3 times in his first 3 seasons.
- » Recorded a career-high 153.3 passer rating vs. Houston (11/13), completing 13 of 17 passes for 197 yards, 2 touchdowns and, for the 6th consecutive game, no interceptions...The 153.3 rating was the 5th-highest by a Giants quarterback in a game with 15+ pass attempts since the rating system was implemented in 1973...The previous Giants quarterback with at least 15 attempts and a rating of 153.3 or higher was Eli Manning vs. Tampa Bay on Nov. 18, 2018 (155.8).
- » Set season highs for attempts (44, completing 27) and yards (341) while throwing one touchdown pass and 2 interceptions vs. Detroit (11/20)...Jones' streak of passes without an interception ended when rookie Aidan Hutchinson picked off his 2nd-quarter pass intended for Darius Slayton...Jones played more than 6 games and threw 153 passes without one of them ending up in enemy hands, which had been the NFL's longest active streak.
- » Completed 80.6% of his passes (25 of 31), the 2nd-highest figure of his career, vs. Washington (12/4)...Also had a career-high 12 rushing attempts for 71 yards, increasing his season total to 522 and becoming the first Giants quarterback to run for more than 500 yards in the Super Bowl era.
- » Started his 14th consecutive game, the longest streak of his 4-year career, and led the Giants to a victory in Washington (12/18).
- » Completed a career-high 30 passes on 42 attempts for 334 yards and one touchdown at Minnesota (12/24)...His previous best was 29 completions vs. the Rams on Oct. 17, 2021...Tied his career best with 11 consecutive completions...Jones' 334 passing yards were his 2nd-highest total of the season and the 5th-highest of his career...It was Jones' 8th career 300-yard game, the 5th-highest total in Giants history; Hall of Famer Y.A. Tittle is 4th with 9.
- » When Patrick Peterson intercepted a pass in the 4th quarter, it ended Jones' streak of 176 consecutive passes without a pick, the 2nd-longest streak of his career. He threw 177 passes without an interception in 2020.
- » In a playoff-clinching victory vs. Indianapolis (1/1), Jones completed 19 of 24 passes (79.2%) for 177 yards, 2 touchdowns and no interceptions for a 125.2 passer rating that was the 3rd highest of his career...It was the 12th time in 16 games Jones did not throw an interception...Also led the Giants in rushing with 91 rushing yards on 11 carries, including touchdown runs of 18 and 10 yards. The 91 yards were the 3rd-highest total of his career...This was the 2nd game in which he threw for 2 touchdowns and ran for 2 more; he also accomplished that double in his first career start at Tampa Bay on Sept. 22, 2019...Jones' 18-yard touchdown run was the 2nd-longest of his career (21 vs. the Bears on Oct. 2).
- » Made his postseason debut a success by completing 24 of 35 passes for 301 yards and 2 touchdowns and rushed for a team-high 78 yards in a NFC Wild Card victory at Minnesota (1/15)...Jones was the first quarterback in NFL postseason history with 300+ passing yards, 2 touchdown passes, and 70+ rushing yards in a game...He was the 3rd quarterback in postseason history to record 375+ offensive yards and win their first playoff start, joining the Rams' Kurt Warner in 1999 and the 49ers' Colin Kaepernick in 2012...Jones had the 5th 300-yard passing game in the postseason by a Giants quarterback. Kerry Collins and Eli Manning each had 2...He broke an 88-year-old record for the most rushing yards by a Giants quarterback in a playoff game. Ed Danowski set the previous record of 59 yards in the NFL Championship Game victory against the Chicago Bears on Dec. 9, 1934.

2021

- » In 2021, Jones started all 11 games in which he played...He was inactive from Dec. 5-Dec. 19 with a neck injury suffered vs. Philadelphia (11/28) before being placed on season-ending injured reserve for the final 3 games...Completed 232 of 361 passes (64.3%) for 2,428 yards, 10 touchdowns and 7 interceptions for a passer rating of 84.8...Finished 3rd on the Giants with 298 rushing yards on 62 carries (4.8-yard avg.) and 2 touchdowns.
- » Jones recorded a passer rating of 90.7 or better in each of the season's first 4 games.
- » Set a then Giants record for the most rushing yards by a quarterback since 1960 when he ran for 95 yards on 9 attempts (10.6-yard avg.) and one touchdown at Washington (9/16)...Eclipsed his own record of 92 yards, which he set at Philadelphia on Oct. 22, 2020...Also completed 22 of 32 passes for 249 yards, a 33-yard touchdown to Darius Slayton and no interceptions... It was his 2nd consecutive game and the 3rd of his career with at least one passing and one rushing touchdown.
- » Became just the 7th quarterback since 2011 with at least 200 passing yards, 90 rushing yards, one passing touchdown and one rushing touchdown in a game.
- » Named NFC Offensive Player of the Week after he set his single-game career highs in passing yards (402), pass yards per attempt (10.05) and passing first downs (17) in a comeback overtime win at New Orleans (10/3)...Threw 2 touchdowns, completed 28 of 40 passes and had one interception on a Hail Mary at the end of the first half for a 108.5 passer rating...The 400-yard game was the first by a Giants quarterback since Manning threw for 434 yards vs. Philadelphia on Dec. 17, 2017 and the first in a victory since Manning passes for 403 yards against Baltimore on Oct. 16, 2016...His 402 passing yards were the 4th-most on the road in Giants history...Jones' touchdown passes were 52 yards to John Ross and 54 yards to Saquon Barkley. It was the first game in which the Giants threw 2 touchdown passes of 50+ yards since Dec. 17, 2017, when Manning had scoring throws of 67 yards to Shepard and 57 yards to Tavarres King...Led the Giants on a 9-play, 75-yard drive in overtime which was capped off by Barkley's 6-yard touchdown run.
- » Threw a career-high 51 passes, completing 29 for 242 yards and 3 interceptions, vs. the L.A. Rams (10/17).
- » Threw at least one touchdown pass in each of his final 5 games from Oct. 24-Nov. 28...Completed 23 of 33 passing for 203 yards, one touchdown and no interceptions for a 95.9 passer rating vs. Carolina (10/24).
- » Rushed 8 times for 28 yards and caught one pass for 16 yards from wide receiver Dante Pettis on a spectacular one-hand grab for his first career reception...Became the first Giants quarterback since Kerry Collins (-2 yards) on Sept. 10, 2001 at Denver to catch a pass...Jones also joined Cam Newton (twice) and Russell Wilson as the only quarterbacks in NFL history with at least 200 passing, 25 rushing and 15 receiving yards in a single game.
- » Posted his 2nd game of the season with 2 touchdown passes while completing 22 of 33 attempts for 222 yards and one interception at Kansas City (11/1)...Tied his then career high by completing 75.0% of his passes (15 of 20) for 110 yards, one touchdown and no interceptions for a 104.2 passer rating vs. Las Vegas (11/7)...Jones completed all 9 of his passes in the first half. He was the first Giants quarterback to complete all his first half pass attempts with at least 5 throws since Oct. 10, 1993, when Phil Simms was 9-for-9 for 101 yards and 2 touchdowns in a 41-7 victory in Washington.
- » Completed 23 of 38 passes for 167 yards, one touchdown and 2 interceptions at Tampa Bay (11/22)...Threw the lone touchdown pass of the game to tackle Andrew Thomas for a 2-yard score.
- » Hit 19 of 30 passes for 202 yards and one touchdown for a 94.0 passer rating, his 8th game of the season with a rating of 90.0 or better, vs. Philadelphia (11/28)...Suffered a neck injury on the 2nd play but played the rest of the game...Was inactive the next 3 games before going on season-ending injured reserve on Dec. 20.

2020

- » In 2020, Jones started all 14 games in which he played...He was inactive at Seattle (12/6) with a hamstring injury and vs. Cleveland (12/20) with hamstring and ankle injuries...Completed 280 of 448 passes (62.5%) for 2,943 yards, 11 touchdowns and 10 interceptions for a passer rating of 80.4...Added 65 rushing attempts for 423 yards (6.5-yard average), then the record for a Giants quarterback in the Super Bowl era...Pro Football Hall of Famer Fran Tarkenton previously held the record with 306 yards in 1967.
- » Jones' 6.5-yard average was the NFL's highest among the 91 players with at least 50 rushing attempts in 2020...It was the 2nd-highest in a single

- season in Giants history among players with 50+ attempts behind Ward Cuff (6.54 average on 80 carries in 1943).
- » Jones was the first quarterback in Giants history with 2,500 passing yards and 400 rushing yards in a season...Led the Giants in rushing 6 times, a single-season record for a Giants quarterback in the Super Bowl era...Jones first set the mark with 3 leading performances as a rookie in 2019...Lamar Jackson, who led Baltimore in rushing 7 times, was the only quarterback to pace his team more often than Jones.
- » Elected one of the Giants' team captains for the first time.
- » From Nov. 2 vs. Tampa Bay until the season finale vs. Dallas on Jan. 3, Jones threw a career-high 177 passes without an interception...He did not throw a pick in 5 consecutive games...The streak ended when Cowboys safety Donovan Wilson picked off a Jones pass in the 3rd quarter.
- » Jones threw a season-high 41 passes 3 times: vs. Pittsburgh (9/14), vs. Tampa Bay (11/2) and at Baltimore (12/27)...He had season-high totals in completions (26) and yards (279) against the Steelers...Jones threw a season-high 2 touchdown passes in 4 games: vs. Pittsburgh, at Philadelphia (10/22), vs. Tampa Bay and vs. Dallas (1/3).
- » Completed 16 of 27 passes for 213 yards and no touchdowns or interceptions for a passer rating of 84.3 in Cincinnati (11/29) before leaving the game with a right hamstring injury he suffered on a 7-yard run in the 3rd quarter.
- » In the Giants' first victory of the season, vs. Washington (10/18), Jones led the Giants with 74 yards on 7 carries...The yardage total was the highest by a Giants quarterback since Jeff Hostetler ran for 82 yards at New England on Dec. 30, 1990...The 7 rushing attempts were the most by a Giants quarterback since Kerry Collins ran 7 times at St. Louis on Sept. 15, 2002.
- » In that game, Jones gained 49 yards on a 2nd quarter run around left end, then the longest run by a Giants quarterback in the Super Bowl era...The previous long was a 47-yarder by Hostetler at Phoenix on 10, 1991.
- » Four days later, Jones broke both rushing records in Philadelphia (10/22)...He led all rushers with 92 yards, the most yards by a Giants quarterback in a game since Frank Filchock had 108 against at Pittsburgh on Oct. 6, 1946...Jones gained most of his yards on an 80-yard run in the 3rd quarter...It was the longest run by a Giants' quarterback in the Super Bowl era, eclipsing his 49-yarder vs. Washington...The 80-yarder was also the longest run by a quarterback in NFL history that did not result in a touchdown...It was the longest run by an NFL quarterback since Tennessee's Marcus Mariota scored on an 87-yard run against Jacksonville on Dec. 6, 2015.
- » Jones's run tied for the 4th-longest in Giants history and was the 2nd-longest that was not a touchdown:

- » When Jones rushed for a 34-yard touchdown vs. Philadelphia (11/15), it was the 5th game in 2020 in which he had the Giants' longest run...Hostetler was the last Giants quarterback to do that, in 1991...The 34-yarder was the longest touchdown run by a Giants quarterback since Nov. 10, 1991, when Hostetler scored on a 47-yard run in a 21-14 victory at Phoenix.
- » Jones had 9 carries vs. both Philadelphia and Dallas, the highest total by a Giants quarterback since Hostetler had 10 at New England on Dec. 30, 1990, when he rushed for a team-high 82 yards in 13-10 victory vs. the Patriots.
- » In 2 games vs. the Eagles, Jones rushed for 156 yards, the highest single season total by a Giants quarterback against one opponent...The previous mark was Hostetler's 82 yards vs. New England in 1990.

2019

- » As a rookie in 2019, Jones played in 13 games, including starts in each of the last 12 contests in which he appeared...He set franchise rookie records with 459 passes, 284 completions, 3,027 yards and 24 touchdown passes...The former records had all stood since Charlie Conerly set them in 1948 (299 passes, 162 completions, 2,175 yards and 22 touchdown passes)...Jones threw 12 interceptions and had a passer rating of 87.7.
- » Jones' 24 touchdown passes led all rookie quarterbacks in 2019 and were the 4th-most by a rookie in a single season in NFL history...Only Baker Mayfield (27 in 2018), Peyton Manning (26 in 1998) and Russell Wilson (26 in 2012) had more.
- » Jones threw a touchdown pass in each of his last 12 games – all starts – the longest streak by a Giants quarterback since Eli Manning threw for a score in 12 straight games in 2008...The Giants' previous rookie record of 9 consecutive games with a touchdown pass to begin a career was set by Conerly in 1948.
- » In 2 games against Washington, Jones threw 6 touchdown passes, the highest total by a Giants rookie quarterback against a single opponent...The old mark of 5 was set by Conerly against the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1948.
- » Jones finished 2nd on the team with 289 rushing yards...Led the Giants in rushing yards 3 times, with 28 yards in his starting debut at Tampa Bay (9/22), a season-high 54 yards vs. Dallas (11/4) and 20 yards at the Jets (11/10)...He was the first Giants quarterback to lead the team in rushing yards 3 times in a season in the Super Bowl era...Jones had the Giants' longest run in 3 separate games, including a season-long 26-yarder at Chicago (11/24).
- » Jones made his NFL debut when he relieved Manning for the Giants' final series at Dallas (9/8)...He completed 3 of 4 passes for 17 yards, with a long completion of 6 yards, and ran once for 5 yards...Jones' first career completion was a 5-yarder to running back Wayne Gallman, Jr. on his initial snap...Gained 5 yards on his first pro rushing attempt but lost a fumble that was forced by linebacker Leighton Vander Esch and recovered by Chidobe Awuzie.
- » When Jones made his first career start at Tampa Bay (9/22) he became the first Giants rookie to start at quarterback since Jan. 2, 2005 – the final game of Manning's first season - and the first rookie quarterback to make his starting debut since Manning on Nov 21, 2004.
- » Jones completed 23 of 36 passes for 336 yards, 2 touchdowns and no interceptions for a passer rating of 112.7...He also ran for 2 touchdowns while leading the Giants with 28 rushing yards...The Giants overcame an 18-point halftime deficit to defeat the Buccaneers, 32-31.
- » Jones was the 2nd rookie quarterback in the Super Bowl era and to throw for at least 300 yards and 2 touchdowns and run for 2 scores in his starting debut...The first was Detroit's Eric Hipple who also passed for 336 yards and was responsible for 6 touchdowns – 4 passing and 2 rushing – in a 48-17 victory vs. Chicago on 19, 1981...Jones and Hipple are the only 2 quarterbacks since the merger with multiple touchdown passes and multiple rushing touchdowns in their first start...The previous rookie quarterback to hit that double in a game was Buffalo's Josh Allen, who threw for 3 scores and ran for 2 vs. Miami on Dec. 30, 2018 in his 11th career start.
- » Jones was the first quarterback to be responsible for 4 touchdowns in his starting debut since Mariota threw for 4 scores at Tampa Bay on Sept. 13, 2015.
- » Jones was the first Giants rookie quarterback to win his initial career start since Dec. 7, 1980, when Scott Brunner completed eight of 18 passes for 161 yards, 2 touchdowns and one interception in a 27-21 victory at Seattle.
- » Jones was the 14th quarterback since the 1970 merger to start his first NFL game in a Giants uniform...He joined Brunner as the only 2 of those 14 quarterbacks to throw 2 touchdown passes in their debut...His 36 passes were the 4th-highest total (strike-replacement starter Mike Busch threw 41 passes in 1987, Joe Pisarcik threw 38 in 1977, and Manning threw 37). But Jones' 23 completions were the most among the 14 first timers...The previous high was Manning's 17...And Jones not only became the first Giants quarterback to pass for more than 300 yards in his debut, he was the first to exceed 200 yards...The previous high was Danny Kanell's 198 yards on Oct. 12, 1997 at Arizona.

- » Jones was the first quarterback drafted by the Giants to start a game for them since Dec. 28, 2003 – the final game before Manning’s arrival the following spring – when Jesse Palmer, a 4th-round choice in 2001, played the entire game in a 37-24 loss to Carolina in Giants Stadium...Palmer completed 18 of 43 passes for 110 yards, 2 touchdowns and 4 interceptions.
- » The Giants had last won a game started by a quarterback they drafted on Oct. 31, 1999 at Philadelphia, 23-17 in overtime...Kent Graham, an 8th-round draft choice in 1992 who spent 3 seasons with the Giants, one with the Detroit Lions and 2 with Arizona, re-signed with the Giants as a free agent on Feb. 17, 1998...In that Halloween game vs. the Eagles, Graham completed 26 of 41 passes for 241 yards, one touchdown and no interceptions.
- » The Giants had last won a game started by a quarterback they drafted and who was still with the team after that initial transaction on Oct. 18, 1998, when Kanell led the team to a 34-7 victory vs. Arizona...Kanell, a 4th-round draft choice in 1996, completed 22 of 36 passes for 259 yards, 3 touchdowns and no interceptions.
- » Jones scored the Giants’ first touchdown on a 7-yard run in the 2nd quarter...It was the first rushing touchdown by a Giants quarterback since Manning scored on a one-yarder at Indianapolis on Dec. 23, 2018...The 7-yard run was the longest by a Giants quarterback since Manning’s 14-yarder on Oct. 1, 2017 – also at Tampa Bay.
- » Jones was the first Giants quarterback other than Manning with a rushing touchdown since David Carr scored on a 12-yard run against Oakland in Giants Stadium on Oct. 11, 2009.
- » Jones was the first quarterback whose team overcame an 18-point deficit (28-10) to win in his first career start since Dec. 14, 1997, when Jon Kitna and the Seattle Seahawks fell behind the Raiders in Oakland, 21-3, before rallying for a 22-21 victory.
- » Jones was the first NFL quarterback to throw for at least 336 yards in his starting debut since Green Bay’s Scott Tolzien passed for 339 yards on Nov. 17, 2013 – vs. the Giants in MetLife Stadium.
- » Jones was the first Giants quarterback other than Manning to throw for at least 300 yards since Nov. 2, 2003, when Kerry Collins passed for 303 yards in a victory against the Jets.
- » Jones was the first Giants quarterback to rush for 2 touchdowns in a game since Hostetler on Nov. 10, 1991 (runs of 47 and 4 yards in a 21-14 victory against the Cardinals) and the first with 2 rushing touchdowns in a season since Collins in 1999.
- » Jones was the first Giants quarterback with at least 2 passing and 2 rushing touchdowns in a game since Nov. 28, 1948, when Conerly threw scoring passes of 14 yards to Ray Poole and 23 yards to Bill Swiacki and scored on runs of one and 14 yards against the Boston Yankees.
- » Jones was credited with his first game-winning drive (leading his team from a 4th-quarter deficit or tie to a victory)...He was the first NFL quarterback to do so in his first start since Baltimore’s Lamar Jackson on Nov. 18, 2018 vs. Cincinnati.
- » Jones’ first career touchdown pass was a 75-yarder to tight end Eric Engram...It was the longest first touchdown pass by Giants quarterback since Hostetler’s 85-yarder to Stephen Baker at New Orleans on Nov. 26, 1988, and the longest by an NFL player since Arizona tight end Logan Thomas threw an 81-yarder to Andre Ellington on Oct. 5, 2014.
- » Jones was the first quarterback to lead the Giants in rushing since Oct. 1, 2000, when Collins ran for 19 yards in a loss at Tennessee.
- » Jones improved to 2-0 as a starter when he led the Giants to a 24-3 victory vs. Washington (9/29)...He became the first Giants quarterback to win his first 2 starts since Kanell in 1997 and the first rookie to do so since Simms in 1979...Jones was the 12th quarterback selected in the first round of the draft since the 1970 merger to win each of his first 2 starts with both starts coming in their rookie year.
- » In those 2 games, Jones completed 46 of 67 passes (68.7%) for 561 yards, 3 touchdowns and 2 interceptions...The yardage total was the highest among Giants quarterbacks who began their career in the Super Bowl era, easily topping Kanell’s 418 yards in his first 2 starts...Jones’ 68.7 completion percentage was the highest by a Giants quarterback in his first 2 starts in the Super Bowl era.
- » The quarterbacks for the majority of the Giants’ victory vs. Washington were Jones and Dwayne Haskins...It was the first Giants game in which a rookie quarterback threw a pass for each team since Dec. 18, 2004, when the players were Manning and Pittsburgh’s Ben Roethlisberger.
- » When Arizona’s Kyler Murray and Jones, the first and 6th players selected in the 2019 NFL Draft, started for the Cardinals and Giants, respectively, on Oct. 20, it was the first matchup of rookie starting quarterbacks in the NFL in 2019...It was also the first game in which the first 2 quarterbacks chosen in their draft squared off since Sept. 13, 2015, when Winston (No. 1) played against Mariota (No. 2)...In addition, it was just the 9th game since the 1970 merger in which rookie quarterbacks selected among the first 10 choices in the draft started against each other...Jones completed 22 of 35 passes for 253 yards, one touchdown and one interception.
- » The following week, Jones hit 28 of 41 passes for 322 yards, 4 touchdowns and no interceptions at Detroit (10/27)...He was the 2nd rookie quarterback in history to avoid an interception while throwing for at least 300 yards and 4 scores...The first was Mariota, who on Nov. 8, 2015 had a 371-4-0 line in a 34-28 victory in New Orleans...Jones later accomplished the feat twice more, at the Jets and at Washington.
- » In another Oct. 27 game, Jacksonville rookie quarterback Gardner Minshew passed for 279 yards with 3 touchdowns and no interceptions in the Jaguars’ 29-15 win vs. the Jets...With Jones and Minshew, Week 8 was the 2nd in NFL history in which 2 rookie quarterbacks each passed for at least 3 touchdowns and 0 interceptions in the same week, joining Week 16 of the 2018 season (the Jets’ quarterback Sam Darnold and Cleveland’s Baker Mayfield).
- » Jones was the first rookie quarterback to throw 4 touchdown passes in a game since Mayfield on Nov. 25, 2018, at Cincinnati.
- » Jones set his then career high with his 3rd touchdown pass in Detroit...He was the first Giants rookie with 3 touchdown passes in a game since Manning on Jan. 2, 2005 vs. Dallas, and the first to do it on the road since Simms on Dec. 9, 1979 at St. Louis.
- » Completed 26 of 40 passes for 308 yards, 4 touchdowns and no interceptions at the Jets (11/10)...In a 3-game span, Jones completed 80 of 122 passes (65.6%) for 840 yards, 9 touchdowns and one interception.
- » Returned after missing 2 games with a sprained ankle to complete 28 of 42 passes for 352 yards, 5 touchdowns and no interceptions for a season-high passer rating of 132.1 in the 41-34 overtime victory in Washington (12/22)...Jones was the first rookie in NFL history with at least 350 passing yards, 5 touchdown passes and zero interceptions in a game.
- » Jones was the first rookie in Giants history to throw 5 touchdown passes in a game...He shared the previous record of 4 touchdown passes, which was set by Conerly on Oct. 17, 1948 vs. the Chicago Cardinals and tied by Tom Kennedy on Dec. 11, 1966 vs. Pittsburgh. Jones tied the mark at Detroit (10/27) and at the Jets (11/10).
- » Jones was the 5th rookie in NFL history to throw 5 touchdown passes in a game...The others were Detroit’s Matthew Stafford vs. Cleveland on Nov. 22, 2009; Tampa Bay’s Jameis Winston at Philadelphia on Nov. 22, 2015; and Houston’s Deshaun Watson vs. Kansas City on Oct. 8, 2017 and Ray Buivid, who played for the Chicago Bears in 1937-38...On Dec. 5, 1937, he threw 5 touchdown passes in the season finale in Wrigley Field vs. the Chicago Cardinals.
- » While Jones threw for 5 touchdowns, Barkley set a franchise record with 279 yards from scrimmage...The Giants were the first team in NFL history to have one player with 275+ scrimmage yards and another with 5 touchdown passes in the same game.
- » Jones joined Dallas’ Dak Prescott (twice in 2016) as the only rookie quarterbacks in NFL history with 2 games of at least 300 passing yards, 2 touchdown passes and zero interceptions...The game in Washington was Jones’ 3rd with at least 4 touchdown passes...The only other rookies in NFL history to do that were Watson and Pro Football Hall of Famer Fran Tarkenton in 1961.
- » Jones was the first Giants quarterback to throw 4 or more touchdowns in at least 3 games in one season since Manning (3) in 2015...He was the first player in Giants history to throw at least 4 touchdown passes without an interception 3 times in one season.
- » The 5 touchdown passes were tied for the 3rd-highest total in Giants history...Hall of Famer Y.A. Tittle threw for 7 scores vs. Washington on Oct. 28, 1962...Tittle (Dec. 16, 1962 vs. Dallas) and Manning (Nov. 1, 2015 at New Orleans) each threw 6 touchdown passes in a game...Jones was the 4th

player to throw 5...The others were Manning (Dec. 30, 2012 vs. Philadelphia), Phil Simms (Sept. 7, 1980 at St. Louis) and Tarkenton (Oct. 25, 1970 vs. St. Louis).

- » Jones' 352 passing yards in Washington was the 2nd-highest total by a Giants rookie, behind Conerly's 363 yards at Pittsburgh on Dec. 5, 1948.
- » Each of Jones' first four 300-yard games occurred when the Giants were the visiting team: at Tampa Bay, Detroit, the Jets and Washington...He was the first NFL quarterback to record his first four 300-yard games on the road since Kirk Cousins did it his first 5 such games for Washington from 2012-15...Manning's first eight 300-yard games all occurred when the Giants were visitors.
- » Jones had 15 touchdown passes and no interceptions in his first four 300-yard games...Only 2 other quarterbacks in history have thrown at least 15 touchdown passes in their first four 300-yard games, but they didn't avoid turnovers like Jones: Pro Football Hall of Famer Sammy Baugh (20 touchdowns and 8 interceptions from 1943-47) and Earl Morrall (15 touchdowns and 9 interceptions from 1963-70 – the only four 300-yard games of his career).
- » In the season finale vs. Philadelphia (12/29), Jones threw a then career-high 47 passes and tied another with 28 completions (the 3rd time he hit that total, and the 2nd week in a row)...Jones threw for 301 yards, one touchdown and one interception for a passer rating of 76.6...The 300-yard game was Jones' 2nd in a row and his Giants rookie-record 5th of the season...The five 300-yard games are tied for the 3rd-highest single-season total in franchise history...Manning had 8 in 2011 and 6 in 2015, plus 5 in both 2014 and 2018...Collins had five 300-yard games in 2001.

- » Jones started all 36 games in which he played at Duke from 2016-18...Was a team captain in 2017-18...Two-time recipient of the Carmen Falcone Award as Duke's Most Valuable Player (2016 & 2018)...Three-time Academic All-ACC selection (2016-18)...Two-time ACC Quarterback of the Week (vs. Northwestern and North Carolina in 2018)...Four-time Manning Award Star of the Week recipient (vs. Notre Dame and North Carolina in 2016, and Northwestern and North Carolina in 2018)...MVP of the 2017 Quick Lane Bowl vs. Northern Illinois...Offensive Player of the Game of the 2018 Walk-On's Independence Bowl vs. Temple.
- » Completed 764 of 1,275 passes (60%) for 8,201 yards, 52 touchdowns, and 29 interceptions...Added 406 rushing attempts for 1,323 yards (3.3-yard avg.) and 17 touchdowns, caught 2 passes for 6 yards, and punted 5 times for 170 yards...Compiled 9,524 yards of total offense...Averaged 8 passing yards per game...Played 2,603 career snaps...Recorded 300+ yards of total offense in 13 games, including a career-high 547 (186 rushing & 361 passing) vs. North Carolina in 2018...Threw multiple touchdown passes in 16 games, including a career-high 5 vs. Temple in his final game in 2018...Completed 20+ passes in 20 games, including a career-high 34 vs. Miami in 2016...Threw for 300+ yards in 9 games, including a career-high 423 yards vs. Temple in 2018.
- » Holds Duke single-game records for total offensive yards (547 vs. North Carolina, 2018) and rushing yards by a quarterback (186 vs. North Carolina, 2018) while sharing the school game marks for touchdown passes of 50+ yards (2 vs. Pittsburgh, 2018).
- » In 2018, Jones started all 11 games in which he played...Suffered fractured left clavicle in the 3rd quarter vs. Northwestern (9/8) and underwent surgery on Sept. 9, forcing him to miss games vs. Baylor and N.C. Central...Received the program's Carmen Falcone Award as Duke's Most Valuable Player, becoming the sixth 2-time recipient of the honor.
- » Completed 237 of 392 passes (60.5%) for 2,674 yards, 22 touchdowns and 9 interceptions while rushing 104 times for 319 yards (3.1-yard avg.)...Compiled 2,993 total offensive yards...Averaged 243.1 passing yards per game...Caught one pass for 6 yards...Punted twice for 54 yards with both kicks downed inside the opponent 20-yard line...Threw for more than 300 yards in 3 games: Pittsburgh (396), North Carolina (361) and Temple (423)...Tossed 3+ TD passes vs. Northwestern (3), Georgia Tech (3), Pittsburgh (4), North Carolina (3) and Temple (5).
- » Tallied season-high totals of 31 completions on 54 attempts for 361 yards, 3 touchdowns and one interception, plus 15 rushing attempts for 186 yards with a long of 68 yards and one score vs. North Carolina...Totaled a season-high 547 offensive yards to become the 3rd player in ACC history to post multiple 300-yard passing and 100-yard rushing games, joining Louisville's Lamar Jackson (5) and Clemson's Tahj Boyd (2)...Jones' 547 yards vs. North Carolina was a Duke single-game record, as were his 186 rushing yards by a quarterback.
- » Named MVP of the Reese's Senior Bowl after completing 8 of 11 passes (72.7%) for 115 yards and 1 touchdown while rushing for another score in a 34-24 North team victory.
- » In 2017, was a team captain...Quick Lane Bowl MVP...Recipient of Duke's Ace Parker Award, an honor presented annually to an individual who displays unparalleled commitment to the team and overcomes adversity to contribute...Started all 13 games and Completed 257 of 453 passes (56.7%) for 2,691 yards, 14 touchdowns and 11 interceptions...Had 161 carries for 518 yards (3.2-yard avg.) and 7 touchdowns...Compiled 3,209 total offensive yards...One of 6 quarterbacks among Power 5 schools to amass 2,500+ passing yards and 500+ rushing yards.
- » In 2016, Received the Carmen Falcone Award as Duke's Most Valuable Player...Academic All-ACC selection...Started all 12 games...Completed 270 of 430 passes (62.8%) for 2,836 yards, 16 touchdowns and 9 interceptions while rushing 141 times for 486 yards (3.5-yard avg.) and 7 touchdowns.

- » Shepard twice set his career high with 11 receptions and had the Giants' only three 100-yard receiving games of the season...Had 11 catches for a career-high 142 yards at San Francisco (11/12) and 11 receptions for 139 yards vs. Philadelphia (12/17)...Shepard's 11-catch game vs. the 49ers was the first by a Giants player since Beckham had 11 at Philadelphia on Dec. 22, 2016...Shepard also caught 7 passes for 133 yards at Philadelphia (9/24).
- » Shepard scored both of his touchdowns on long catch-and-runs vs. Philadelphia: a career-long 77-yard reception in Lincoln Financial Field (9/24), and a 67-yarder in MetLife Stadium (12/17).
- » As a rookie in 2016, Shepard started all 16 regular-season games and the NFC Wild Card Game...It was the 2nd consecutive season the Giants' 2nd-round draft choice started every game; safety Landon Collins did it in 2015 (defensive tackle Dalvin Tomlinson made it 3 in a row in 2017)...Shepard was the Giants' first offensive rookie to start every game of his rookie season since Justin Pugh started every game at right tackle in 2013...He was the first rookie wide receiver to start every game for the Giants since Bobby Johnson in 1984, and the first in the NFL since Buffalo's Sammy Watkins in 2014.
- » Shepard finished 2nd on the team with 65 catches for 683 yards and 8 touchdowns...Caught at least 2 passes in every game except the victory at Cleveland (11/27), where he did not have a reception...Shepard placed 2nd among NFL rookies in all 3 major statistical categories, trailing only New Orleans' Michael Thomas, who had 92 catches for 1,137 yards and 9 scores.
- » Shepard had one of the finest seasons by a rookie pass-catcher in Giants history:

**Running Back

- » Shepard caught 3 passes for 43 yards, including a 9-yard touchdown, in his NFL debut at Dallas (9/11)...He was the first Giants player to catch a touchdown pass in his first game since Beckham on Oct. 5, 2014.
- » Had season-high totals of 8 receptions for 117 yards vs. New Orleans (9/18) and followed with 5 catches for 73 yards and a 23-yard touchdown vs. Washington (9/25).
- » Shepard was the first player in Giants history to score a touchdown and have more than 100 receiving yards in a game in his first 3 NFL games and was the first NFL player to do it since Pittsburgh's Martavis Bryant in 2014.
- » In a 27-23 victory vs. Philadelphia (11/6), Shepard caught 3 passes for 50 yards, including a 32-yard touchdown, and rookie free agent Roger Lewis, Jr. had a 30-yard touchdown reception...It was the first time the Giants had 2 rookie wide receivers with touchdown catches in the same game since Oct. 5, 1987 when Lewis Bennett and Reggie McGowan accomplished the feat in a strike replacement game vs. San Francisco...Excluding replacement games, it had last happened on 12, 1954, when Ken MacAfee and Bob Topp did it at Philadelphia.
- » With Victor Cruz sidelined with an ankle injury, the Giants started rookie wide receivers Shepard and Lewis in a Monday night game vs. Cincinnati

(11/14)...They were the first pair of rookie wideouts to start for the Giants since Dec. 15, 1984, when Bobby Johnson and Lionel Manuel started the regular-season finale vs. New Orleans.

- » Shepard had 4 receptions for 56 yards and a 6-yard touchdown vs. Detroit (12/18), and 7 catches for 61 yards and his 8th score of the season on a 13-yard pass at Philadelphia (12/22)...Had 4 catches for 63 yards in his postseason debut in the NFC Wild Card Game at Green Bay (1/8).

COLLEGE

- » In 4 seasons at Oklahoma, Shepard played in 50 games with 41 starts...Started all 37 games in his final 3 seasons...Career totals included 233 receptions for 3,482 yards (14.9-yard avg.) and 26 touchdowns, with a long catch of 75 yards...Also returned 30 punts for a 7.3-yard average with a long runback of 27 yards...His career receptions (233) and receiving yards (3,482) each rank 2nd in Oklahoma history...He is tied for 4th in school history in career touchdown receptions (26) and is 4th in 100-yard receiving games (12)...Ranks 3rd in OU history in single-season receptions (86 as a senior)...Shares the school record for single-game receptions (15 vs. Kansas State as a junior)...Also had a 14-catch game vs. Baylor as a senior.
- » As a senior in 2015, he was a semifinalist for the Biletnikoff Award, given to the nation's top wide receiver...Named to All-Big 12 first team by the league's coaches...Started all 13 games at receiver and also served as team's primary punt returner...Caught a career-high 86 passes for 1,288 yards (15.0-yard avg.) and 11 touchdowns, with a long catch of 74 yards...Also returned 30 punts for 148 yards, a 7.9-yard average, with a long of 27 yards...In 2014, was named to All-Big 12 first team by league's...Semifinalist for Biletnikoff Award...Started all 12 games and finished with 51 receptions for 970 yards and 5 touchdowns, with a long catch of 75 yards...Also returned 11 punts for 73 yards (6.6-yard avg.)...Tied school record with 15 receptions and tallied 197 receiving yards and a touchdown vs. Kansas State (10/18)...In 2013, started all 12 games in which he played...Did not play vs. Iowa State (11/16) due to injury...Concluded the season with 51 catches for 603 yards and 7 touchdowns with a long reception of 57 yards...As a freshman in 2012, he played in all 13 games with 4 starts...His 621 receiving yards were the 3rd-highest total by an Oklahoma freshman, while his 45 receptions ranked 4th all-time among the school's freshmen.





THE VINCE LOMBARDI TROPHY

The Vince Lombardi Trophy is the trophy awarded each year to the winning team of the National Football League's annual championship game, the Super Bowl. It is considered to be the NFL's most prestigious award. The trophy was originally called the "World Championship Game Trophy" when the Super Bowl was originally named the AFL-NFL World Championship Game. It was renamed in 1970 in honor of legendary Green Bay Packers head coach Vince Lombardi.

Since Super Bowl XXX, it is presented to the winning team's owner on the field following the game. Previously, the trophy was presented inside the winning team's locker room.

Unlike trophies such as the Stanley Cup and the Grey Cup, a new Vince Lombardi Trophy is made every year and the winning team maintains permanent possession of that trophy.

Each trophy is handcrafted by Tiffany & Co. master artisans at their workshop in Parsippany, New Jersey. The trophy depicts a regulation-size football in kicking position that is made entirely of sterling silver. It stands 22 inches (55 cm) tall, weighs seven pounds (3 kg), and takes approximately four months and 72 man-hours to create. The words "Vince Lombardi Trophy" and the NFL logo are engraved on the base. After the trophy is awarded, it is sent back to Tiffany & Co. to be engraved with the winning team's name, score, logo and roster if the team wishes.



WHY GIANTS? HOW THE NEW YORK FOOTBALL GIANTS GOT ITS NAME

Owner Tim Mara "borrowed" the Giants' name from the city's Major League Baseball team of the same name. This was not unusual among early day pro football franchises. At one time or another there were NFL franchises named the New York Yankees, Brooklyn Dodgers, Cleveland Indians, Cincinnati Reds, and Detroit Tigers.

1925

Tim Mara purchased a National Football League franchise for New York for \$500. Bob Folwell was named head coach and all-time great Jim Thorpe was signed. Thorpe was later released by the team after the third game of the season. The Giants played their first game at the Polo Grounds, losing to the Frankford Yellow Jackets, 14-0. Later that season, more than 70,000 jammed the Polo Grounds to see the Giants play Red Grange and the Chicago Bears. The Giants went 8-4 in their first season.

1926

Bob Folwell left and was replaced by Dr. Joseph Alexander as head coach. Despite an 8-4-1 record in 1926, Tim Mara lost \$40,000. After the season concluded, the seventh place Giants faced the American Football League champion Philadelphia Quakers. The Giants won convincingly, 31-0.

1927

Earl Potteiger replaced Dr. Joseph Alexander in 1927 and the Giants won their first title with an 11-1-1 record. (Note: until the NFL's playoff system was established in 1933, the team with the league's best record was awarded the championship title.) In the 13-game season the Giants defense posted ten shutouts and allowed only 20 points all year.

1928

After a dismal 4-7-2 season in 1928, Tim Mara decided it was best to clean house. Head coach Earl Potteiger and eighteen players were not asked to return for the following season. Tackle Steve Owen would be the only returning starter from that season. It still ranks as one of the most massive turnovers in football history.

1929

Before the season began, Tim Mara purchased a struggling Detroit Wolverines franchise in order to obtain the rights to quarterback Benny Friedman and the best of the Detroit players for the Giants. LeRoy Andrews became the new head coach. The 13-1-1 Giants averaged 25,000 fans, turned a small profit and narrowly lost the NFL title to the Green Bay Packers, who finished 12-0-1.

1930


For the second consecutive season the Green Bay Packers edged out the Giants for the title. Ownership of the club was turned over to Jack and Wellington Mara, the two sons of the founder. On December 14, the Giants played a team of former Notre Dame All-Stars coached by the legendary Knute Rockne. Fifty-five thousand fans turned out at the Polo Grounds to see the Giants win the contest, 22-0. The proceeds of \$115,153 went to the New York Unemployment Fund to help those suffering due to the Great Depression.

1931

After an All-American season at Washington State, center Mel Hein wrote to three NFL teams offering his service. The Giants bid the most at \$150 per game and Hein was signed to a contract. Former tackle Steve Owen was named head coach. The Giants finished in 5th place with a 7-6-1 record.

1932

Considered a rebuilding year, the Giants finished the season with a 4-6-2 record. On November 20, the Giants faced the defending champion Green Bay Packers. Expected to be an easy win for the undefeated Packers, 8-0-1 at the time, the Giants displayed promise for the future with a hard-fought, 6-0, victory. End Ray Flaherty became the NFL's first official pass-reception champion with 21 catches.



1933

The Giants won the Eastern Division of the newly-divided NFL with an impressive 11-3 record. 1933 was also the year the NFL established a new playoff system and in the league's first championship game, the Giants lost to the Western Division champion Chicago Bears, 23-21, at Wrigley Field in Chicago.

1934

In what is now known as the "Sneakers Game," the Giants defeated the Chicago Bears 30-13 for the NFL title. Trailing 13-3 in the third quarter, some of the Giants players changed into basketball shoes to increase traction on the icy Polo Grounds turf. The Giants responded with a 27-point fourth quarter to capture the championship.

1935

After beginning the season with a 4-3 record, the Giants rolled off five consecutive victories, shutting out their opponents four times, and finished with a 9-3 record and first place in the Eastern Division. The Giants advanced to their third straight NFL championship game, but lost to the Detroit Lions, 26-7, at Detroit.

1936

The initial NFL draft was held in 1936, and the Giants first pick was Art Lewis, a tackle from Ohio University. The Giants finished with a 5-6-1 record, marking only the third time in the team's twelve-year history that it did not have a winning record.

1937

Seventeen rookies helped make up the 25-man roster in 1937, a season that also marked the debut of the now-familiar blue jerseys. The Giants lost to the Washington Redskins on the last day of the season and finished as a runner-up in the Eastern Division with a 6-3-2 record.

1938

A 23-17 victory over the Green Bay Packers produced the Giants third NFL title. A crowd of 48,120 fans attended the title game at the Polo Grounds in New York, a playoff record at the time. With the victory, the Giants earned the distinction of being the first NFL team to win two championship games.

1939

On January 15, the Giants defeated the Pro All-Stars, 13-10, in the first Pro Bowl held at Wrigley Field, Chicago. During the 1939 season, in front of 32,279 fans at Milwaukee State

Fair Park, the Green Bay Packers avenged the 1938 loss with a 27-0 drubbing of the Giants in the NFL title game.

1940

The Giants finished third in the East with a 6-4-1 record. Midway through the season, leading rusher Tuffy Leemans was lost for the year with a back injury. Center Mel Hein was the only Giant to win All-Pro honors, accomplishing the feat for the 10th year in a row.

1941

With just 50 seconds to go in the 1941 Eastern Division championship game, the Washington Redskins held a 13-10 lead, but the Giants scored a field goal and a touchdown to win, 20-13, and advance to the NFL title game. In the wake of Pearl Harbor, only 13,341 spectators turned out to see Chicago top the Giants in the title game, 37-9.

1942

After losing many players to the service, the Giants finished with a 5-5-1 record and in third place in the Eastern Division. The Giants recorded a memorable victory in the season opener, defeating the Washington Redskins, 14-7, although they didn't have a first down, gained only one yard rushing and completed just one pass. That pass happened to go for a touchdown. The Giants also scored on an intercepted return and handed the Redskins their only defeat in their championship season.

1943

With the league down to just nine teams due to World War II, the Giants overcame a 2-2-1 start to finish with a 6-3-1 record. The Giants advanced to the Eastern Division championship game where they dropped a 28-0 decision to the Washington Redskins.

1944

Luring quarterback Arnie Herber and back Ken Strong out of retirement, the Giants scored five shutouts en route to the Eastern Division title, but lost the NFL championship game at the Polo Grounds in New York to the Green Bay Packers, 14-7.

1945

The War ended in 1945, but the Giants finished with their worst record to date. The Giants started the year off with a 34-6 win at Pittsburgh, but everything seemed to collapse after the opener. The Giants 3-6-1 record was only one game better than the last place Pittsburgh Steelers.

1946

Quarterback Frankie Filchock, an understudy to Sammy Baugh at Washington, signed with the Giants for a reported \$35,000. Filchock and teammate, back Merle Hapes, were questioned about an attempt by a New York man to fix the championship game with the Chicago Bears. Hapes was suspended indefinitely for the alleged gambling involvement, but Filchock was allowed to continue playing. The Giants went on to lose the title game to Chicago, 24-14.

1947

The Giants went from the title game in 1946 to the cellar, finishing with a 2-8-2 record, including a seven-game losing streak. Halfback Frank Reagan tied for the league lead with ten interceptions for 203 yards. Reagan also tied for the league's punting championship with 61 kicks for a 42.8 average.

1948

The Giants renovation was accelerated in 1948 when they acquired quarterback Charlie Conerly from the Washington Redskins. The franchise reached another milestone in its illustrious exis-

tence, but it had nothing to do with their 4-8 record. That season, the Giants signed their first black player, defensive back Emlen Tunnell.

1949

Giants head coach Steve Owen switched from the "A" formation to the "T," which helped the Giants improve to a 6-6 record. Allie Sherman was hired to work with quarterback Charlie Conerly. The Giants shared the Polo Grounds with another NFL team, the New York Bulldogs.

1950

The Giants and New York Bulldogs divided the players of the former All-American Football Conference Yankees. The Giants received a young defensive back from Texas, Tom Landry, and a defensive tackle from Washington, Arnie Weinmeister. The Giants finished with a surprising 10-2 record and tied for first place with the Cleveland Browns, their first season above .500 since the Eastern Division championship season of 1946. The Browns defeated the Giants, 8-3, in the American Conference playoff game.

1951

End Kyle Rote of Southern Methodist was the Giants bonus pick in the draft, but he was injured in the preseason and saw little action. The Giants finished in second place with a 9-2-1 record, behind the only team they would lose to all season, the Cleveland Browns. Fullback Eddie Price led the NFL in rushing with 971 yards.

1952

Tailback Frank Gifford of USC was drafted number one. Playing in his fifth year, Emlen Tunnell gained more yardage on kick returns and interceptions (924) than the league's leading rusher, Dan Towler (894), of the Los Angeles Rams.

1953

Tackle Roosevelt "Rosie" Brown Jr. of Morgan State, a future Hall of Famer, was the Giants 27th pick in the 1953 NFL draft. Steve Owen retired at the end of the season after 23 years as the Giants head coach. Owen was asked to keep his affiliation with the Giants as a scout in the personnel department, a position he held for one year.

1954

Former Giants end Jim Lee Howell was promoted from end coach to head coach. The Canadian Football League began a series of raids on NFL teams, signing Giants three-time Pro-Bowl defensive tackle Arnie Weinmeister, among others. In an effort to save the Giants and the NFL, Wellington Mara went out and signed the best player in the CFL, Montreal Alouettes halfback Alex Webster.

1955

On August 28, the sudden-death rule was used for the first time in a preseason game between the Giants and the Los Angeles Rams in Portland, Oregon. The Rams won, 23-17, three minutes into overtime. After opening with three straight losses, the Giants got their act together and finished with a 6-5-1 record.

1956

Defensive end Andy Robustelli was obtained from the Los Angeles Rams. The Giants switched their home games from the Polo Grounds to Yankee Stadium. A 47-7 rout of the Chicago Bears produced New York's first NFL championship since 1938. Linebacker Sam Huff, who was originally drafted as an offensive lineman but was switched to MLB when Ray Beck went down with an injury, was voted Rookie of the Year. Frank Gifford was named NFL Player of the Year and tackle Rosie Brown was named the NFL's Lineman of the Year.

1957

The Giants were still in the running for the title in 1957 until they dropped their final three games. For the second straight season Frank Gifford finished in the top ten in both receiving (fourth) and rushing (tenth), with 588 yards receiving and 528 yards rushing. Gifford also completed four of six passes for 143 yards and two touchdowns.

1958

After completing the season at 9-3, the Giants faced a Cleveland Browns team led by running back Jim Brown in the Eastern Conference playoff game. Brown, who had gained an NFL-record 1,527 yards rushing, was held to just eight yards by the stingy New York defense as the Giants prevailed, 10-0. Advancing to the title game, the Giants lost to the Baltimore Colts, 23-17, in the first sudden death overtime in an NFL championship game. That game has been referred to as, "The Greatest Game Ever Played."

1959


On February 4, assistant offensive coach Vince Lombardi left to join the Green Bay Packers as their new head coach. On February 17, Giants co-founder Tim Mara died. The Baltimore Colts exploded for 24 points in the fourth quarter to defeat New York in the NFL title game for the second straight year.

1960

In February, defensive coach Tom Landry left the team to become the first ever head coach of the expansion Dallas Cowboys. The Giants finished an injury-plagued 1960 season with a 6-4-2 record. Head coach Jim Lee Howell announced his retirement at the end of the season.

1961

The NY logo was added to the helmets for the 1961 season. Allie Sherman replaced the retired Jim Lee Howell as head coach. The Giants obtained quarterback Y.A. Tittle (San Francisco) and end Del Shofner (Los Angeles) in trades. Back Alex Webster gained 928 yards to help the Giants reach the NFL title game. With the league championship on the line, the Giants were no match for the Green Bay Packers, losing 37-0.

**1962**

Back Frank Gifford, who returned to the team from retirement, quarterback Y.A. Tittle, and Del Shofner and back Alex Webster led the Giants into the NFL title game against the Green Bay Packers. Held in Yankee Stadium, 64,892 fans watched as Green Bay prevailed, 16-7. Defensive end Andy Robustelli was named the NFL's top player.

1963

Quarterback Y.A. Tittle threw 36 touchdown passes and kicker Don Chandler led the league with 106 points (52-pat, 18-fg) in scoring as the Giants romped to their third straight conference title. Halfback Dick Lynch tied for the league lead with nine interceptions for 251 return yards and a record-setting three touchdowns. With Tittle injured in the second quarter, New York lost yet another bid for the league championship, dropping a 14-10 decision to the Chicago Bears.

1964

Defensive end Andy Robustelli ended his long playing career with the Giants and became a full-time defensive coach. For the first time in 17 years, the Giants finished in last place in their conference with a 2-10-2 record. Baks Alex Webster and Frank Gifford announced their retirement at the end of the season.

1965

Quarterback Y.A. Tittle announced his retirement on January 22 at Mamma Leone's restaurant in New York City. Offensive lineman Jack Stroud also retired. On June 15, Jack Mara died after serving as team president for thirty-one years. The Giants rebounded with a 7-7 record, good enough for second place in the Eastern Conference.

1966

Before the season began, tackle Rosie Brown retired after 13 years of service to the team. The Giants had their worst season to date, finishing with a 1-12-1 record. They allowed a then NFL-record 501 points. Kicker Pete Gogolak became the first American Football League player to cross to the NFL.

1967

On March 7, the Giants announced the acquisition of quarterback Fran Tarkenton from the Minnesota Vikings. To get Tarkenton, the Giants gave up their first and second-round picks in 1967, number one pick in 1968, and second-round pick in 1969. Tarkenton's 29 touchdown passes led the Giants to a 7-7 record and a second place finish in the newly named Century Division of the Eastern Conference.

1968

Opening the season with four straight wins and concluding it with four consecutive losses, the Giants finished with a 7-7 record in Allie Sherman's last season as head coach. End Homer Jones became only the second Giant, behind end Del Shofner, to record 1,000 receiving yards or more in three successive seasons.

1969

The Giants lost, 37-14, to the New York Jets in the first of the annual preseason meetings. Former back Alex Webster replaced Allie Sherman as head coach. After losing seven games in a row, the Giants finished with three straight victories to capture second place in the Century Division with a 6-8 record.

1970

After losing their first three games, the Giants won six in a row, including an upset win over the first place Dallas Cowboys, 23-20. Heading into the final game of the season, the Giants were still in a position to make the playoffs, but they lost a home game against the Los Angeles Rams, 31-3, and were left out of the postseason with a 9-5 record. Running back Ron Johnson became the Giants first 1,000-yard rusher, totaling 1,027 yards.

1971

After a disappointing 4-10 finish in 1971, quarterback Fran Tarkenton asked for a trade. The Giants obliged and traded him back to the Minnesota Vikings for quarterback Norm Snead, two additional players and draft choices. Bob Tucker became the first tight end in Giants history to lead the league in receptions with 59 catches.

1972

Quarterback Norm Snead, obtained in the Fran Tarkenton trade, led the league in passing and the Giants finished above .500 for only the second time in nine years with an 8-6 record. On November 26, the Giants offense scored eight touchdowns against the Philadelphia Eagles, setting a Giants all time one-game scoring record. Kicker Pete Gogolak added a pair of field goals to bring the final score to 62-10.

1973

Prior to the final game of the season, head coach Alex Webster announced his retirement. New York lost the game 31-7 to the Minnesota Vikings to close out the year at 2-11-1. After two games at Yankee Stadium, the Giants played the rest of their home games at the Yale Bowl in New Haven, Connecticut.

1974

Bill Arnsparger was named the Giants ninth head coach. Quarterback Norm Snead was traded to the San Francisco 49ers. In addition, quarterback Craig Morton was obtained from the Dallas Cowboys. For the second straight season, the Giants won only two games and finished in fifth place in the NFC East with a 2-12 record.

1975

The Giants finished in fourth place in the NFC East with a 5-9 record. The team played all of its home games at Shea Stadium while they waited for Giants Stadium to open. DE George Martin made the team as an 11th round draft choice out of Oregon.

**1976**

Larry Csonka, the former Miami running back who had played in the World Football League, signed as a free agent. Snead was reacquired from San Francisco. The Giants moved to Giants Stadium in East Rutherford, New Jersey. Arnsperger was fired in midseason and replaced by assistant coach John McVay, who signed a long-term contract following the 3-11 season.

1977

Morton was traded to Denver. The Giants improved to a 5-9 record. McVay went with Joe Pisarcik and Jerry Golsteyn at quarterback. Csonka rushed for 100 yards on the last day of the season and finished the year with 464 yards.

1978

The Giants had a 5-3 record at the halfway point of the season but lost seven of its final eight games and finished 6-10. Punter Dave Jennings and linebackers Harry Carson and Brad Van Pelt were named to the NFC Pro Bowl team. McVay was fired in late December. Robustelli, who had been the Giants' director of operations since 1974, resigned. George Young was named general manager in January, 1979. He announced the appointment of San Diego Chargers assistant Ray Perkins as head coach.

1979

Before the season began, tragedy struck as defensive tackle Troy Archer was killed in a traffic accident on June 22. Rookie Phil Simms, a first round choice, took over at quarterback. But the Giants had another 6-10 record. Dave Jennings led the NFC with a 42.7-yard punting average.

1980

A porous defense allowed opponents to score 425 points, the second-highest total in the NFL. The Giants fell to 4-12. A highlight was a 38-35 defeat of Dallas that ended an eight-game losing streak. Dave Jennings led NFL punters with a 44.8-yard average.

1981

With the second selection in the draft, New York chose Lawrence Taylor, a linebacker from North Carolina. The Giants started slowly, going 2-3, before obtaining running back Rob Carpenter from Houston. Carpenter sparked a three-game winning streak. The Giants lost three straight to drop to 5-6. Second-year quarterback Scott Brunner replaced an injured Phil Simms and the team responded with four victories in the final five weeks, including a 13-10 overtime defeat of Dallas in the season finale that sent them into the playoffs. On December 27, the Giants defeated the Eagles 27-21 in the NFC wild card game. The season ended for New York on January 3 when it was defeated by the 49ers 38-24 in a divisional playoff game.

**1982**

A wild and turbulent year in which the NFL players' strike shortened the season to just nine games. The final game played before the strike pitted the Giants and Packers on a Monday night from Giants Stadium in which a power failure caused a blackout during the game. Rob Carpenter was a holdout until late November, returning to play in just the final five games. On December 15, head coach Ray Perkins resigned to accept the head coaching job at Alabama, with defensive coordinator Bill Parcells being named to replace him in 1983. The Giants then lost two straight after the Perkins' announcement, and missed the playoffs on the final day of the season with a 4-5 record. Despite the adversity, four Giants — Lawrence Taylor, Harry Carson, Mark Haynes and Dave Jennings — were named to the Pro Bowl.

1983

After breaking even in their first four games for a 2-2 record, the Giants were decimated by injuries during the rest of the year, with a total of 25 players appearing on the injured reserve list at one time or another. With players such as Harry Carson, Phil Simms and Rob Carpenter missing most of the season, and with the club leading the entire NFL in turnovers with 58 on 31 interceptions and 27 lost fumbles, the record tumbled to 3-12-1. The year was also marred by the tragic deaths of assistant coach Bob Ledbetter and former star running back Doug Kotar. Four players were nonetheless named to the Pro Bowl again—Lawrence Taylor, Harry Carson, Mark Haynes and rookie place-kicker Ali Haji-Sheikh who set an NFL record with 35 field goals.

1984

With Phil Simms enjoying his first full season at quarterback, the Giants earned the NFC Wild Card playoff berth, finishing with a 9-7 mark and second place in the NFC East. Simms set three single-season club records with 286 completions in 533 attempts for 4,044 yards. The Giants knocked off the Los Angeles Rams 16-13 in that wild card game, then bowed to the eventual Super Bowl champion San Francisco 49ers 21-10 in the divisional playoff. Taylor, Carson and Haynes were again named to the Pro Bowl, while head coach Bill Parcells was named NFC East Coach of the Year and five rookies—Karl Nelson, Gary Reasons, Carl Banks, Perry Williams and Bobby Johnson—were named to the All-NFL Rookie team.

1985

With a final 10-6 mark, the Giants put back-to-back winning seasons on the board for the first time in 22 years, won another trip to the playoffs and had their first home playoff game since 1962, winning 17-3 over the defending Super Bowl champion 49ers. Again, the club lost in the divisional playoffs to the eventual Super Bowl champion team, the Chicago Bears, 21-0. Five players Lawrence Taylor, Harry Carson, Phil Simms, Joe Morris and Leonard Marshall were named to the Pro Bowl. There were 12 team records set by this club, and 16 individual club records. Morris set team records with 1,336 rushing yards and 21 touchdowns. Simms set club marks with 40 completions and 513 passing yards in a game. Marshall added another club mark with 15 1/2 QB sacks in a season, while rookie TE Mark Bavaro, an All-NFL Rookie team choice set a club mark with 12 receptions in one game.

1986


The club's first Super Bowl championship, an all-time final record of 17-2, as well as a club record 12 straight victories, made this year the greatest in team history. The Giants also set a record for all-time composite margin of victory in the playoffs, outscoring three opponents 105-23, for an 82-point domination, the most ever in NFL playoff history. Phil Simms was the MVP of the 39-20 Super Bowl victory over Denver after completing a playoff record 88% of his passes (22-25). Lawrence Taylor was named the league's MVP, Joe Morris broke his own club rushing record with 1,516 yards, and eight players—Taylor, Morris, Harry Carson, Leonard Marshall, Jim Burt, Brad Benson, Mark Bavaro and Sean Landeta, were named to the Pro Bowl. Coach Bill Parcells was a unanimous NFL Coach of the Year in all the national polls, the Giants were 10-0 at home, including regular season and the two playoff games, and the team set attendance records at home and on the road.

1987

After winning the Super Bowl, the Giants dropped to a 6-9 record, thanks to an 0-5 start in a season that included a players strike and three games with replacement players. In addition, injuries sidelined 11 starters. While the Giants finished with six wins in its final ten games, it was a case of too little, too late. Despite the final record, four players—Lawrence Taylor, Carl Banks, Harry Carson and Mark Bavaro—were selected to the Pro Bowl and all four also were named to various All-NFL teams.

1988

The Giants bounced back and after splitting the first six games, engineered a 7-2 run which had them all alone in first-place in the NFC East with a 10-5 record heading into the final weekend of the season. But an upset loss to the Jets not only knocked the Giants out of first-place, but also cost them a playoff berth. The Giants 10-6 record gave them a five-year mark of 54-32 (.628), including postseason play. Those 54 victories were the most in club history for any five-year span. Joe Morris set a club record with his third 1,000-plus rushing season and Lionel Manuel had his first 1,000-yard receiving year. Morris also surpassed Alex Webster as the Giants' career rushing leader, moving past the 5,000-yard plateau. Lawrence Taylor was named to his eighth straight Pro Bowl and All-NFL designation and safety Terry Kinard was selected for his first Pro Bowl appearance.



1989

Despite the loss of several starters due to injuries, the Giants won their second NFC East championship in four years with a 12-4 record. Ottis Anderson rushed for 1,023 yards at the age of 32 as the replacement for the injured Joe Morris and rookie David Meggett set club marks with 582 punt return yards and a 12.7 average, while also accounting for 1,807 all-purpose yards. Linebacker Lawrence Taylor equaled an NFL record by being named to his ninth consecutive Pro Bowl, and also ran his league record sack total to 104. Meggett also went to the Pro Bowl and scored a touchdown.

1990

The Giants started the season by winning their first ten games, and eventually won the division with a 13-3 record despite losing Phil Simms late in the year. With Jeff Hostetler at the helm, the club surged through the playoffs to win their second Super Bowl title with a stirring 20-19 win over the Buffalo Bills. Seven Giant players were named to the Pro Bowl, including Lawrence Taylor for a record-setting 10th straight year. Veteran running back Ottis Anderson won Super Bowl MVP honors after rushing for 102 yards. At season's end, the Mara family's sole ownership ended when Tim Mara sold his 50% share of the club to Preston Robert Tisch, who became Chairman and Co-Chief Executive Officer. In May, 1991, head coach Bill Parcells resigned after a career mark of 85-52-1 and was succeeded by offensive coordinator Ray Handley.

1991

In Ray Handley's first year as head coach, the Giants were in contention for another playoff spot late in the year with a 7-5 record, then dropped three straight to finish at 8-8 and out of the playoffs. Jeff Hostetler became the starting quarterback, but was injured late in the season and Phil Simms finished the campaign. Simms added his 15th club record when he passed Charlie Conerly for career TD passes with 179. Rodney Hampton became the fourth back in club history to rush for 1,000 yards when he finished the year with 1,059. Center Bart Oates was named to his second consecutive Pro Bowl.

1992

Ray Handley's team struggled through a 6–10 season as injuries to key players hurt the team. Phil Simms regained his starting quarterback spot, but was limited to starting the first four games before an elbow injury forced him to miss the rest of the season. Before his injury, Simms became just the 14th player in NFL history to surpass 30,000 passing yards. Jeff Hostetler started the next nine games before being forced to the sidelines with a concussion. In the ninth game of the season against Green Bay, Lawrence Taylor injured his Achilles tendon that placed his career in jeopardy. After announcing plans to retire following the season, Taylor re-considered and decided to re-join the Giants. RB Rodney Hampton turned in another outstanding season, rushing for 1,141 yards and earning his first trip to the Pro Bowl. After dismissing Handley, George Young hired former Denver Broncos head coach Dan Reeves to lead the team in 1993.

1993

Dan Reeves and a rejuvenated Phil Simms led the Giants to an 11-5 regular season record. The Giants finished second to Dallas in the NFC East race, a race that was decided on the final Sunday of the regular season when Dallas defeated the Giants, 16-13, in overtime at Giants Stadium. Reeves became the first Giants head coach to lead his team to the playoffs in his initial campaign since Allie Sherman in 1963. Reeves was selected as NFL Coach of the Year by several organizations, including the Associated Press, which bases its honor on voting by coaches around the league. The Giants earned a wild card berth in the playoffs and defeated the Minnesota Vikings at Giants Stadium, 17-10, in the Wild Card game. San Francisco defeated the Giants, 44-3, at Candlestick Park in an NFC divisional playoff game. Following the San Francisco game, LB Lawrence Taylor announced his retirement, capping a 13-year career that altered the nature of the game. Taylor was elected into the Pro Football Hall of Fame at the conclusion of the 1998 season.

1994

After a 3-7 start, the Giants climbed back into playoff contention with a six-game winning streak that resulted in a 9-7 record. The Giants came into Week 16 needing a victory over the World Champion Dallas Cowboys, combined with a Tampa Bay Buccaneers victory over the Green Bay Packers, to win a wild card berth. The Giants defeated Dallas, 15-10, but the season ended when the Bucs lost to the Packers, 34-19. Dave Brown won the starting quarterback job in training camp and responded by leading the team to a 9-6 record in games that he started. Rodney Hampton finished the season with 1,075 yards to become the first Giant in history to record four career 1,000-yard seasons. The 1994 season was the first in many years that the Giants roster did not include Lawrence Taylor or Phil Simms. Taylor's jersey number 56 was officially retired at halftime of the Giants-Minnesota Monday Night game on Oct. 10. Simms was released on June 15, prior to the start of training camp.

1995

The Giants concluded the 1995 season with a 5-11 record, their worst mark since 1983 when they were 3-12-1. The Giants lost seven games that were decided on the final drive of the game. In six of those games, the Giants were either tied or leading at some point in the fourth quarter. A highlight of the 1995 season was the play of Rodney Hampton, who turned in the best season of his six-year career with 1,182 yards rushing on 306 carries. Hampton became the Giants all-time leading rusher (5,989) on 10-29 at Washington on his third carry of the game, a workmanlike two-yard run for a first down. Phil Simms jersey number 11 was officially retired at halftime of the Giants-Dallas Monday Night game on Sept. 4, 1995.

**1996**

For the first time since 1982-83, the Giants finished with a losing record in consecutive seasons as they closed out the 1996 campaign with a 6-10 record. Following the 23-22 defeat to New England in the season finale, the Giants dismissed head coach Dan Reeves. On January 15, the Giants hired Jim Fassel as the 15th head coach in the team's history. The Giants stood at 5-7 on December 1 after a 20-6 upset of the defending world champion Dallas Cowboys and headed into a game against the Philadelphia Eagles with a chance at the NFC playoff field. In one of the lowest moments of the year, the Giants were officially eliminated from playoff contention with a 24-0 loss to the Eagles. The Giants improved to 6-8 but dropped two consecutive home contests and secured a last place finish in the NFC East for the first time in a non-strike season since 1983. The Giants defense played solid all season, but the offense struggled, finishing last in the National Football League. The Giants ground game failed to generate a 100-yard rushing performer and averaged just 100.3 yards per game, the lowest non-strike total since the Giants had 100.3 in 1964. The Giants defense held the opposition to 10 points or less in six games and had a streak of 7.5 straight games (30 quarters) without allowing the opponent's offense a touchdown pass.

1997

In his first season as head coach of the Giants, Jim Fassel led his team to a 10-5-1 record and the team's first NFC East Championship since the 1990 Super Bowl season. The Giants started the year with a 1-3 record before rebounding to become the 15th team in NFL history to finish in first place in their division the season after finishing in last place. The Giants finished the 1997 season with a 7-0-1 Division record to become the first team ever to go undefeated in NFC East Division play. Second-year QB Danny Kanell filled in for an injured Dave Brown and led the Giants to a victory over the Dallas Cowboys in Week Six. Kanell was eventually named the new starting quarterback and finished with a 7-2-1 record. His season was highlighted by a three-touchdown performance at Philadelphia in a key NFC East victory on December 7. The Giants defense blossomed into one of the NFL's strongest, finishing first in the league with a franchise-record 44 takeaways. The Giants defense led the league in interceptions with 27 and finished third in the NFL with 54 sacks. The season ended when the Minnesota Vikings overcame a 19-3 second half deficit to pull out a 23-22 victory at Giants Stadium in a Wild Card game. Fassel was named NFL Coach of the Year by numerous publications, including *The Sporting News*, which is determined by a vote of NFL coaches. Jessie Armstead set a team-record with 134 total tackles and was named a starter on the NFC Pro Bowl squad. DE Michael Strahan set

a career-mark in sacks, finishing tied for third in the NFL with 14. Strahan was also named a starter for the NFC Pro Bowl squad. At the end of the season, George Young announced that he was leaving the Giants to become Vice President of Football Operations in the National Football League office. Ernie Accorsi was named the team's new General Manager.

1998

After overcoming a 3-7 start, the Giants remained in the hunt for a playoff berth until the final week and finished with an 8-8 record. The Giants won five out of their last six games, including a 20-16 victory over the previously undefeated (13-0) and eventual Super Bowl Champion Denver Broncos. Entering the final game, the Giants needed a victory over Philadelphia, combined with a Tampa Bay loss and an Arizona loss, to qualify as the third wild card participant in the NFC playoff field. The Giants beat the Eagles at Veterans Stadium, but the Buccaneers and Cardinals were victorious to spoil the Giants playoff hopes. Kent Graham replaced Danny Kanell at quarterback after the team fell to 3-7 and finished with a 5-1 record in the starting role. Gary Brown emerged as the Giants top running back, reaching the 1,000-yard mark with a career-best 1,063 yards that included six 100-yard games. Jessie Armstead and Michael Strahan were selected to represent the NFC in the Pro Bowl for the second straight season. Armstead eclipsed the 100-tackle mark for the third straight year with 101 tackles (75 solos). Strahan set a career-high with 15 sacks as he triggered a Giants defense that led the league with 54 sacks.

1999

For the second straight year, the Giants entered the final week of the regular season with a chance to make the NFL's postseason field. The difference between the two seasons is that in 1998 the Giants won five of their last six games. In 1999, victories over the Jets and at Buffalo raised the Giants' record to 7-6; however, the Giants dropped their last three games to finish 7-9. It was the team's first losing season in three years under head coach Jim Fassel. The final blow was a 26-18 loss at Dallas, a game that followed the Giants' elimination from the playoff race with Green Bay's victory over Arizona earlier in the day. In spite of the obvious disappointment, a few bright spots emerged for the Giants in 1999. The Giants set records on offense, led by Amani Toomer, who established a team single-season record with 79 receptions (breaking Earnest Gray's record of 78 receptions set in 1983). Toomer fell 26 yards shy of the team record of 1,209 receiving yards, set by Homer Jones in 1967. Also, for the first time in the 75-year history of the team, the Giants had four receivers record over 50 receptions in a season: Toomer (79), Ike Hilliard (72), Tiki Barber (66), and Pete Mitchell (58). Jessie Armstead and Michael Strahan were selected to represent the NFC in the Pro Bowl for the third consecutive season. Armstead surpassed the 100-tackle mark for the fourth straight year with 124 tackles (97 solos) and recorded a career-high 9.0 sacks. Strahan recorded 56 tackles (41 solos) and posted 5.5 sacks. QB Kerry Collins started the final six games of the season after replacing Kent Graham in the lineup following the 10th game.



2000

The Giants enjoyed their finest season in a decade, winning the NFC East and home-field advantage in the playoffs with a 12-4 record before defeating Philadelphia and Minnesota to advance to Super Bowl XXXV. The highlight of the season was a 41-0 victory over Minnesota in the NFC Championship game at Giants Stadium. In their first Super Bowl appearance in 10 years, the Giants lost to Baltimore, 34-7. The Giants took a seven-game winning streak into the Super Bowl, a surge that began after Jim Fassel issued his now-famous playoff guarantee on November 22. The Giants finished 7-1 in the division and 7-1 away from Giants Stadium. The seven road victories tied a franchise record set in 1930 (when three of the road games were in Newark, Staten Island and Brooklyn) and marked the first time since 1963 that the Giants lost just one game as visitors. The Giants averaged 125.6 rushing yards a game, a robust 37.5-yard gain over the 1999 average. Quarterback Kerry Collins was sacked 28 times; in 1999 Giants quarterbacks were sacked 42 times. Collins had the best season of his career, setting career highs in passes (529), completions (311), completion percentage (58.8) and touchdown passes (22). Halfback Tiki Barber set a Giants record of 2,085 all-purpose yards (1,006 rushing, 719 receiving, 332 punt returns and 28 on kickoff returns). Amani Toomer caught 78 passes (one less than the franchise record he set in 1999). Ike Hilliard led the team with a 14.3-yard average and eight touchdown catches. The defense was second in the NFL against the run (72.3 yards a game) and fifth in points allowed (15.4 per game). In 359 rushing attempts, opponents had an NFL-best two runs of longer than 20 yards. Jessie Armstead led the team with 102 tackles — his fifth consecutive season with more than a hundred tackles — and was selected to his fourth straight Pro Bowl. Defensive tackle Keith Hamilton had the best season of his nine-year career. He was a dominating run-stopper and he led the Giants with 10 sacks, an impressive feat for a tackle. Defensive end Michael Strahan had perhaps his finest all-around season and raised his sack total from 5.5 in 1999 to 9.5 in 2000.

2001

After a strong 3-1 start, the Giants lost eight of their last 12 games and finished 7-9 and in third place in the NFC East, the third time in as many tries they failed to make the playoffs a season after reaching the Super Bowl. The terrorist attacks in New York and Washington on Sept. 11 — the day after the Giants lost their Monday night opener in Denver — made the rest of season a minor footnote by comparison.

After the attacks, many players reached out to victims' families, firefighters, police officers and other rescue workers and their children. Despite the disappointing record, the season included many highlights, notably Michael Strahan setting a new NFL single-season record with 22.5 sacks. Kerry Collins became the first quarterback in league history to throw every one of his team's passes in two consecutive seasons. Collins set team marks for passes (568) and completions (327). Tiki Barber accounted for 1,782 total yards, Mike Barrow set a team record with 135 tackles, Morten Andersen became the second-leading scorer in NFL history, Howard Cross set a new franchise record for games played (207), Amani Toomer caught more than 70 passes for the third season in a row, rookie Rodney Williams established a team record with a 90-yard punt against the Broncos and Jessie Armstead played in his fifth consecutive Pro Bowl (and was joined in Hawaii by Strahan and Ron Stone). Although they struggled with two

three-game losing streaks, the Giants thrilled their fans with scintillating last-second victories over Dallas (in overtime), Arizona and Seattle. After the defeat in Denver — and a week off after the NFL's decision not to play the Sunday after the attacks — the Giants won three straight, against Kansas City, New Orleans and Washington. The winning streak was followed by consecutive heartbreaking 1-point losses to St. Louis and Philadelphia, and a defeat at Washington. The Giants then rebounded with victories over Dallas and Arizona before again dropping three straight to Minnesota, Oakland and Dallas. They played their way back into playoff contention with dramatic triumphs over Arizona and Seattle, but closed the season with losses to Philadelphia and Green Bay.

2002

An exciting and rewarding season concluded with the Giants winning their final four regular season games to finish 10-6 and in second place in the NFC East. More importantly, they earned a Wild Card berth in the NFC playoffs, where they lost a heartbreaking 39-38 game to the San Francisco 49ers. But the game did not diminish the season's many team and individual achievements. The Giants made their 26th appearance in the playoffs, tying them with the Dallas Cowboys for the most postseason appearances in NFL history. They finished the regular season ranked sixth in the NFL in total offense, with 364.1 yards a game. It was their highest ranking and most yards per game since the 1985 Giants finished fifth in total offense with 367.8 yards a game. The Giants improved to 19-5 in regular season December games under Jim Fassel. Many individuals enjoyed outstanding seasons. Kerry Collins completed 335 passes, a Giants record, and was 1st in the NFC and 4th in the NFL with 4,073 passing yards, breaking the previous team record of 4,044, set by Phil Simms in 1984. Collins completed 61.5 percent of his passes, a career-high and the third-best percentage in team history. Tiki Barber was 4th in the NFL and 1st in the NFC with 1,984 yards from scrimmage (1,387 rushing and 597 receiving). He rushed for 1,387 rushing yards, the second-highest total in team history after Joe Morris' 1,516 yards in 1986. Amani Toomer set team records with 82 receptions for 1,343 yards and established a career-high with eight touchdown catches. Pro Bowler Jeremy Shockey caught 74 passes, the fifth-highest total in Giants history, and a team record for both rookies (shattering the mark of 48 set by Bobby Johnson in 1984) and tight ends (eclipsing the 66 passes Mark Bavaro caught in 1986). Michael Strahan was selected to his 4th Pro Bowl in 5 years and from Sept. 22 through Dec. 1, he had at least a half-sack in 10 consecutive games, tying the NFL record set by Denver's Simon Fletcher in 1991 and tied by Tennessee's Jevon Kearse in 1999.

2003

The Giants endured one of their most unpleasant seasons in recent memory, losing their last eight games to finish 4-12. The Giants were 4-4 at midseason. In Game 9, they were tied at halftime with Atlanta, 7-7. But the Falcons scored 20 unanswered second-half points to send the Giants to a defeat from which they would never recover. The Giants finished the season 1-7 at home, the first time since 1983 they won a single home game. Despite their poor record, the Giants had several individual highlights. Michael Strahan led the NFL with 18.5 sacks, the second-highest total of his career, and became the first Giant to twice lead the league in sacks. For the second consecutive year, Strahan and tight end Jeremy Shockey were the only Giants selected to the Pro Bowl. Shockey became the first Giant to be selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first two seasons since Taylor in 1981-82. Running back Tiki Barber had team-high totals of 1,216 rushing yards (the second-highest total of his career) and 69 receptions. He became the first Giant to lead the team in both rushing and receptions since Joe Dawkins in 1974. Barber finished the season as the franchise's all-time leader in total yards (10,746) and receptions (422) and is second in rushing (5,409 yards). Amani Toomer extended his own team record with his fifth consecutive 1,000-yard season. Quarterbacks Kerry Collins and Jesse Palmer combined to throw a franchise-record 616 passes in 2003. Right guard David Diehl became the first Giants rookie to start all 16 games since Mark Bavaro in 1985. He was one of 14 NFL rookies to start all 16 games in 2003. The team announced with two games remaining that Jim Fassel

would not return as head coach. Fassel was replaced by Tom Coughlin on January 6, 2004.

2004

A new era dawned in Giants Stadium in 2004 with the arrival of Tom Coughlin as the 16th head coach in franchise history. With Coughlin at the helm, the Giants revamped their roster and started the season 5-2. But the Giants couldn't sustain the momentum and lost eight consecutive games before winning the season finale against the Dallas Cowboys. The Giants finished in second place in the NFC East with a 6-10 record, a two-game improvement over their 2003 mark. Running back Tiki Barber set four significant team records and was selected to his first Pro Bowl. He finished first in the NFL with a Giants-record 2,096 yards from scrimmage. Barber was fifth in the league and second in the conference with a team-record 1,518 rushing yards, two more than Joe Morris' total in 1986. He set the record on a game-winning three-yard run with 11 seconds remaining in the finale against Dallas. Barber tied a career high by averaging 4.7 yards a carry. Barber rushed for at least 100 yards in nine games, breaking the team's previous single-season record of eight, set by Morris in 1986. Barber finished the season with 6,927 career rushing yards, eclipsing Hampton's former team record of 6,897. The Giants had other standout performers. Willie Ponder averaged an NFL-best 26.9 yards on kickoff returns, the highest average by a Giant since Leon McQuay averaged 27.6 yards in 1974. The Giants finished first in the NFL with a 25.1-yard kickoff return average, the first time since 1953 they led the NFL in that statistical category. Ponder was the first Giant to lead the NFL in average kickoff return yardage since Clarence Childs in 1964. Jeremy Shockey led the Giants with 61 receptions to become the first tight end to top the team since Mark Bavaro had 55 catches in 1987. Bavaro had 55 catches that season. Shockey's team-leading six touchdown receptions were two more than he had in his first two seasons combined. Amani Toomer led the team's wide receivers with 51 catches for 747 yards. It was the sixth consecutive season Toomer had more than 50 receptions and 700 yards. Eli Manning, selected with the top pick in the 2004 draft and then acquired by the Giants in a trade, started the last seven games and finished the season with 95 completions in 197 attempts for 1,043 yards, six touchdowns and nine interceptions. Osi Umenyiora, a second-year defensive end, led the Giants with 7.0 sacks, six more than he had as a rookie. Linebacker Carlos Emmons led the team with 97 tackles (62 solo) and David Tyree had a team-high 23 special teams tackles.

2005

The 2005 season was marked by soaring success and searing tragedy. The Giants finished 11-5 and earned their first playoff berth since 2002 and their first NFC East championship since 2000 before losing an NFC Wild Card Game to Carolina, 23-0. But the Giants' beloved owners, Wellington Mara and Bob Tisch, passed away within three weeks of each other, both from cancer. Mara, an NFL patriarch who was one of the most respected and influential figures in league history, and who had been with the Giants for their entire 81-year history, died on Oct. 25. Tisch, who purchased 50 percent of the franchise in 1991, was a business titan, renowned philanthropist and nonpareil New York City mover and shaker, died on Nov. 15. The Giants were only the fifth team in NFL history to have five different players score at least seven touchdowns. Tiki Barber scored 11, and Jeremy Shockey, Plaxico Burress, Amani Toomer and Brandon Jacobs scored seven apiece. The Giants had five players selected to the Pro Bowl, their largest contingent since the 1990 Super Bowl champions sent seven players to Hawaii. The Pro Bowlers were Barber, Shockey, Osi Umenyiora, Michael Strahan and David Tyree.

Barber had the greatest season by a running back in Giants history and was selected NFL Player of the Year by Sports Illustrated and a first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press and Pro Football Weekly. He was second in the NFL with a team-record 1,860 rushing yards, shattering the franchise mark of 1,518 he set in 2004. Barber also had 530 receiving yards to become the only player in NFL history with at least 1,800 rushing yards and 500 receiving yards in the same season. His 2,390 total yards were second-most in NFL history. St. Louis' Marshall Faulk had 2,429 yards in 1999 (1,381 rushing, 1,048 receiving). Barber led the NFL in runs of 20 or more yards (16), 40 or more yards (seven) and 50 or more yards (five). His 263 scrimmage

yards at Oakland, 220 rushing yards against Kansas City and 95-yard run against the Raiders were all NFL single-game highs in 2005. Barber's 95-yard run at Oakland was the longest in Giants history and broke a record that stood for 75 years — Hap Moran's 91-yard run vs. Green Bay on Nov. 23, 1930.

Eli Manning threw 557 passes this season, the second-highest total in team history. His 294 completions place him fourth on the Giants' career list and his 24 touchdown passes were the most by a Giant since Fran Tarkenton had 29 in 1967.

Jacobs was the first Giants rookie to score seven touchdowns since Bobby Johnson in 1984



and the first to rush for seven touchdowns since Bill Paschal ran for 10 scores in 1943.

Umenyiora was selected to his first Pro Bowl and was named first-team All-Pro by both the Associated Press and Pro Football Weekly. He was first in the NFC and second in the NFL with 14.5 sacks, the highest total by a Giants player other than Strahan since Hall of Famer Lawrence Taylor had 15 in 1989.

Strahan was third in the NFC with 11.5 sacks. He and Umenyiora combined for 26 sacks, the most by any pair of NFL teammates.

Jay Feely led all NFL kickers with a team-record and career-high 148 points, the first Giants kicker to hold the top spot since Dan Chandler in 1963 (106 points). Jeff Feagles played in all 16 games for the 18th consecutive season (third with the Giants). On Nov. 27 in Seattle, Feagles played in his 283rd consecutive game, a new NFL record. Former Minnesota defensive end Jim Marshall had held the old mark of 282 since retiring in 1979.

Tyree was selected to his first Pro Bowl despite missing three games with an elbow injury, the Giants' first special teams player chosen since Reyna Thompson in 1990.

2006

The Giants finished 8-8 and earned their second consecutive postseason berth, the first time they accomplished that feat since 1989-90. The record was incongruously fashioned with a 3-5 home record and a 5-3 mark away from Giants Stadium.

Tiki Barber ended his record-setting career by rushing for 1,662 yards and catching 58 passes. Eli Manning was tied for fourth in the NFL with 24 touchdown passes. Tight end Jeremy Shockey led the team with 66 receptions and was voted to the Pro Bowl for the fourth time in his five-year career. Plaxico Burress caught 10 touchdown passes, the most by a Giant in 26 years, and was right behind Shockey with 63 catches. Linemen Chris Snee, David Diehl, Shaun O'Hara

and Kareem McKenzie played solidly while missing just two games among them.

Defensively, middle linebacker Antonio Pierce led the Giants with 159 tackles (38 more than anyone else on the team), including 93 solo. He was selected to play in his first Pro Bowl as an injury replacement for Brian Urlacher. Safeties Gibril Wilson and Will Demps had 121 and 116 tackles, respectively. Osi Umenyiora led the team in sacks for the third consecutive year (despite missing five games) and tackle Fred Robbins had a solid all-around season.

On the debit side, the Giants were never at full strength in the second half of the season because several key players suffered injuries that forced them to go on injured reserve. The group included wide receiver Amani Toomer (knee), seven-time Pro Bowl defensive end Michael Strahan (Lisfranc foot sprain), left tackle Luke Petitgout, three-time Pro Bowl linebacker LaVar Arrington, reserve defensive end Justin Tuck and, late in the year, return specialist Chad Morton.

2007

The 2007 season was one of the most successful, rewarding and memorable in franchise history.

The Giants stumbled to a 0-2 start — then fell behind by two touchdowns at halftime of their third game — before beginning a remarkable turnaround. They rallied to win that game, 14 of their next 18 and concluded the season with an exhilarating and unforgettable 17-14 victory over the New England Patriots in Super Bowl XLII. It was one of the greatest upsets and most exciting championship games in the long history of the National Football League.

Eli Manning threw the game-winning 13-yard touchdown pass to Plaxico Burress with just 35 seconds remaining, giving the Giants a victory over a New England team that entered the game with an 18-0 record, including a three-point win over the Giants in the regular season finale. After New England had taken a 14-10 lead with just 2:42 remaining in the fourth quarter, Manning completed five passes on an 83-yard drive — including a 32-yarder on the greatest play in Super Bowl history, when he slipped the clutches of the Patriots' pass rusher and threw down field to David Tyree, who somehow secured the ball against his helmet and away from safety Rodney Harrison.

Two days after bringing the Vince Lombardi Trophy back to the metropolitan area, the Giants were lauded by more than a million fans at a ticker tape parade up Manhattan's famed Canyon of Heroes, and later at a rally in Giants Stadium.

The Giants triumphed for the third time in four Super Bowl appearances, won their



sixth title game and seventh overall championship. They won Super Bowls following the 1986, 1990 and 2007 seasons, NFL Championship Games in 1934, 1938 and 1956 and the league title in 1927, before the advent of championship games.

But this title was the most improbable of all. The Giants were just the fourth team to start a season 0-2 and reach the Super Bowl (and the third to win it). They finished the regular season at 10-6 and became the first six-loss team to win the Super Bowl since the 1988 San Francisco 49ers. The Giants won just three home games — none after October 21 — to become the first team with a losing home record to ever make the Super Bowl. The Giants were the fifth wild card team — and first from the NFC — to win the Super Bowl. They were the third team to reach the

Super Bowl by winning three road playoff games, the second such team to win the Super Bowl and the first from the NFC. The Giants sent an NFL single-season record with 11 consecutive victories away from home (seven regular season, four postseason, including the Super Bowl). Many individuals enjoyed outstanding seasons, games or moments. Eli Manning started every game and threw for 3,336 yards and 23 touchdowns to become the first Giants quarterback since Phil Simms (1984-86) to top 3,000 yards and 20 touchdown passes in each of three consecutive seasons. Brandon Jacobs rushed for 1,009 yards despite missing five games and most of a sixth with injuries. Burrell was unable to practice virtually the entire season because of an ankle injury, but led the team with 70 receptions for 1,025 yards and 12 touchdowns, the highest total by a Giants receiver since Homer Jones had 13 in 1967. Amani Toomer caught 59 passes and became the franchise's all-time leader in receptions with 620. The offensive line — and fullback Madison Hedgecock, acquired off waivers after he was cut by St. Louis — played well throughout the year, a big reason the Giants finished fourth in the NFL in rushing yards, averaging 134.3 a game.

Under new coordinator Steve Spagnuolo, the defense ranked seventh in the NFL, allowing 305.0 yards a game. The Giants led the NFL with 53.0 sacks and set a franchise record with 12 in a victory over Philadelphia on Sept. 30. Osi Umenyiora was third in the NFC and fifth in the NFL with 13.0 sacks and was the lone Giant voted to the Pro Bowl. Justin Tuck became a force on the defensive line and had 10.0 sacks. Michael Strahan, in the final season of his great career, added 9.0 sacks and moved to fifth on the NFL's career list with 141.5. Middle linebacker Antonio Pierce led the Giants with 116 tackles (63 solo). Corey Webster stepped up to play superbly in the playoffs. R.W. McQuarters has intercepted a pass in each of the first three postseason games.

The special teams also played well. Punter Jeff Feagles was one of the NFL's most effective punters in the 20th season of his remarkable career. Kicker Lawrence Tynes, acquired in an offseason trade with Kansas City, succeeded on 23 of 27 field goal attempts and booted the game-winning 47-yarder in overtime in the NFC Championship Game. Domenik Hixon, acquired off waivers in October, became the primary kickoff returner late in the season and brought one back 74 yards for a touchdown in the regular season game against the Patriots.



2008

When the 2008 NFL season began, the Giants had the Vince Lombardi Trophy on display in their lobby and legions of skeptics and doubters who were convinced they had won it more through luck and timing than skill. A popular refrain was that the Giants had simply become a hot team at the right time in the 2007 playoffs. For evidence, the disbelievers cited the Giants' stirring Super Bowl XLII victory over the previously-undefeated New England Patriots. When it was time to make predictions for the 2008 season, most prognosticators placed the Giants second or third in the NFC East.

But the Giants proved them all wrong. No, they didn't win another Super Bowl. But they did capture the division title and the No. 1 seed in the NFC playoffs. They started the season

11-1 and winning 12 regular season games, they became only the fifth defending Super Bowl champion to win more games the season following a championship than they did on their way to winning the title (not counting the strike-shortened 1982 season).

The Giants achieved their success despite losing several key players from the 2007 championship team, including seven-time Pro Bowl defensive end Michael Strahan (retirement), two-time Pro Bowl defensive end Osi Umenyiora (knee injury suffered in the preseason), four-time Pro Bowl tight end Jeremy Shockey (traded to New Orleans) and wide receiver Plaxico Burress,



(who did not play in the season's final month after he was wounded in an accidental shooting).

The day after the season ended with a loss to the Philadelphia Eagles in an NFC Divisional Playoff Game, Coach Tom Coughlin addressed many of the issues that had been raised in training camp.

"What I thought I would start with this morning is to think back to last spring and last summer when all of your questions concerned how this team would respond to winning the Super Bowl," Coughlin said. "Would they be, for lack of a better word, satisfied? Would they be as hungry coming into training camp and beyond training camp as they were in working our way to a Super Bowl championship? I think that our team responded and answered that question. I think we came out, we transitioned, we bridged from the Super Bowl year to the next season very well. Our competitiveness was there, our fire, our attempt to take the success of the Super Bowl season on into the next season was very successful. We were 11-1 and we did come out of camp and play very, very well for a very long time. We, of course, played well and the record stood for that. We didn't finish the season as well as we would have liked to, but I think we answered the questions of what this team was about."

"Twelve and five is not a bad season," general manager Jerry Reese said. "When you set the bar high like that and then all of sudden you get eliminated in the second round it stings. Overall, we had a real good season. It's not where we want it to be, but we said we wanted to be the organization that put our team in position to win the Super Bowl every year. For the last couple of years we have been able to put our team in position to do that. We fell short this time."

The loss to Philadelphia did not mitigate the achievements of a successful regular season. The Giants were one of only two teams to finish in the top nine in both the NFL's offensive and defensive rankings. They rushed for an NFL-leading and franchise record 2,518 yards and also topped the league with a Giants-best 5.0 yards per carry. The Giants were the first team since 1985 to have two running backs rush for 1,000 yards each (Brandon Jacobs and Derrick Ward).

Seven Giants were selected to the NFC Pro Bowl team: quarterback Eli Manning, center Shaun O'Hara, guard Chris Snee, defensive end Justin Tuck, punter Jeff Feagles and kicker John Carney. Two weeks before the game, long-snapper Zak DeOssie was added as the NFC's need player.

Snee and Tuck were named first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press and fullback Madison Hedgecock, O'Hara and Carney finished second in the voting at their positions. O'Hara, Hedgecock and defensive tackle Fred Robbins were named first-team All-Pro by Sports Illustrated and O'Hara and Snee were selected to The Sporting News' All-Pro first team.

The Giants opened their season at home against NFC East rival Washington in the traditional Thursday night opener showcasing the previous season's Super Bowl champions.

Before the game, the Giants' three Super Bowl championship teams were honored during an inspiring and exciting pre-game ceremony that featured a surprise appearance by Michael Strahan.

A huge inflatable replica of the Lombardi Trophy was wheeled out to midfield as the stadium video boards showed highlights from Super Bowls XXI and XXV. Bob Papa, the voice of the Giants, then introduced the players from those teams that were in attendance: Hall of Famer Harry Carson, Stacy Robinson, Karl Nelson, Brad Benson, Bill Ard, Howard Cross, Rodney Hampton, Otis Anderson, Carl Banks and Mark

Bavaro.

"Giants Stadium, you thought I was never coming back," said Strahan, who had announced his retirement three months previously after 15 stellar seasons with the team. "But I had to come back to celebrate the championship with the greatest fans in all of sports. And for one final time, salute my teammates for an incredible championship run. So what I want you to do is, I want you to get on your feet, I want you to make some noise and I want you to be ready to stomp somebody out and welcome the New York Giants Super Bowl champions."

With that, the 79,742 fans in attendance screamed in delight as the 2008 Giants took the field for the first time. At the other end of the stadium, a championship banner was raised.

2009

When the Giants embarked on their 2009 season, the popular belief was that they could succeed because of the strength of a retooled defense, particularly the reinforced front, and a running game that had been the NFL's best in 2008. If a weakness, or at least a unit with multiple questions, existed, it was the untested group of wide receivers.

But someone shredded that script when the games began. The defense did not play as well as anticipated and the rushing attack wasn't as productive as it had been in previous seasons. But the passing game, with Eli Manning having the finest year of his career and record-setting Steve Smith leading a group of receivers that exceeded expectations, was the strongest facet of the team.

The Giants' fortunes unfolded in a similarly unexpected fashion. Playing their 34th and final season in Giants Stadium, they hoped to win their second consecutive NFC East title and extend their franchise record with a fifth consecutive postseason berth. The journey began smoothly, as the Giants won their first five games. But they soon took a wrong turn, veered completely off course and ultimately hit a dead end. The Giants won just three times after that burst from the gate and finished with an 8-8 record and in third place in the division. They finished out of the playoffs for the first time since Tom Coughlin's inaugural season as head coach in 2004.

The Giants were hit by a debilitating series of injuries. Safety Kenny Phillips, their first round draft choice in 2008, played superbly in the first two games but missed the rest of the season because of an arthritic condition in his knee that required surgery. Middle linebacker Antonio Pierce, a team leader, captain and the top tackler, sat out the final seven games with a bulging disk in his neck. Two of the free agents acquired to strengthen the defense, Chris



Canty and Michael Boley, missed significant chunks of the season with injuries. Defensive tackle Jay Alford missed the entire year with a knee injury. Gerris Wilkinson led the team in special teams tackles when he was placed on injured reserve with a wrist injury. Running backs Brandon Jacobs and Ahmad Bradshaw and defensive end Justin Tuck played hurt most of the year and offensive linemen Rich Seubert and Kareem McKenzie were sidelined at the end of the season with injuries.

Manning finished the season with 317 completions in 509 attempts (62.3 percent) for 4,021 yards, 27 touchdowns, 14 interceptions and a passer rating of 93.1. The completions, percentage, yards, touchdowns and rating were all career highs. Manning is the third quarterback in Giants history to throw for more than 4,000 yards in a season, joining Kerry Collins (4,073 in 2002) and Phil Simms (4,044 in 1984).

Smith was first in the NFC and second in the NFL with 107 receptions, 25 more than the franchise's previous single-season record-holder (Amani Toomer had 82 in 2002) and 50 more than this season's runner-up, Mario Manningham. Smith's 1,220 receiving yards were the second-highest total in franchise history. Toomer had 1,343 in 2002. Smith joined Toomer, Plaxico Burress (1,214 yards in 2005) and Homer Jones (1,209 yards in 1967) as the only Giants with 1,200-yard receiving seasons. Smith led the NFL with 38 receptions on third down.

Manningham had a break through season with 57 catches (in 14 games) and Hakeem Nicks had 47 receptions for 790 yards, both the third-highest total in history among Giants rookies. Nicks' six touchdown receptions were the most by a Giants rookie since Johnson had seven.

Center Shaun O'Hara and guard Chris Snee were selected to their second consecutive Pro Bowls and tackle David Diehl to his first. Tight end Kevin Boss had a solid season with 42 catches and five touchdowns. Cornerback Terrell Thomas started every game and led the team with 101 tackles (67 solo). Defensive end Osi Umenyiora returned from the knee surgery that cost him the 2008 season to record a team-high 7.0 sacks, the fifth time in six seasons he has led the team. Kicker Lawrence Tynes scored a career-high 126 points and Chase Blackburn and Bryan Kehl tied for the team lead with 16 special teams tackles.

The Giants finished with a record of 155-117 in regular season games in Giants Stadium, including 4-4 in 2009. They were 7-4 in postseason games for a total record of 162-121.

Giants Stadium hosted 477 NFL regular season game played in Giants Stadium, easily the most in league history. Chicago's Wrigley Field is second with 365.

2010

The 2010 season will always elicit mixed reactions from the New York Giants.

Playing their 86th season, the Giants moved into a beautiful new home, New Meadowlands Stadium, which is located just a few yards away from where Giants Stadium, their home from 1976-2009, once stood. The Giants were 10-6, one of a record-tying 13 teams to finish with double-digit victories. They finished the season with the same record as the NFC East champion Philadelphia Eagles, the same record as the eventual Super Bowl XLV champion Green Bay Packers and the same record as the 2007 Giants team that won Super Bowl XLII.

But ultimately, the season did not meet their expectations because the Giants did not make the playoffs. Two losses to the Eagles and another to the Packers in the final seven weeks of the season first cost the Giants the NFC East title and then an opportunity to participate in the postseason. The Giants lost the NFC's last postseason berth on a tiebreaker.

The Giants ended their season with an unusual blend of emotions. They accepted their fate and took responsibility for coming up short, but they were equally defiant in their belief that they are better than a playoff non-qualifier.

"I'm really disappointed to be here talking to you guys about 10-6," general manager Jerry Reese said at his season-ending news conference. "I really felt like we had an opportunity to get into the playoffs and really do some damage when we got there, but it didn't work out that way. I'm really disappointed, even more so than last year because we put ourselves in position and that's what our goal is every year, to put ourselves in a position and we put ourselves in position and we just did not finish the job and that's very disappointing."

Although disappointed at missing the playoffs for the second season in a row, Coach Tom

Coughlin had high praise for his players.

"I love this team, I love these guys, I think they're strong character people, we work together on everything, we're all in it together, we're all for one, one for all and that's the way that it has to be," Coughlin said. "It's a group of guys that don't make excuses for anything, they accept responsibility, they accept whatever takes place. They've done an outstanding job this year of adjusting to some very unusual circumstances that surround the game. They've done a good job of that. We've had a couple of huge disappointments, emotionally we weren't to where we should have been. We did come back to a certain level (in the season finale vs. Washington), but it's an outstanding group of guys who by and large are on the same



page, they're focused, they come to work, they prepare themselves, they play hard, there are all kinds of personalities just like there always is, but as I said, I'm very, very appreciative of the kind of effort, the attitude, the enthusiasm, and the fact that this year's team was a very responsive team."

The Giants had many impressive statistical achievements in 2010. The offense (fifth) and defense (seventh) each finished in the top 10 of the NFL rankings. Eli Manning set franchise records for completions and completion percentage and became the first Giants quarterback with two 4,000-yard seasons and the second with more than 30 touchdown passes. Ahmad Bradshaw (1,235) and Brandon Jacobs (823) rushed for a combined 2,058 yards. Despite missing three games with injuries, Hakeem Nicks had one of the finest seasons by a wide receiver in Giants history with 79 catches for 1,052 yards and 11 touchdowns. Mario Manningham caught 60 passes, including 85- and 92-yard touchdowns. Osi Umenyiora (10 forced fumbles) and Justin Tuck (five fumble recoveries) tied for the team lead with 11.5 sacks.

But those players and the rest of the team and coaches ultimately exited the season with an empty feeling.

“Overall, I’m disappointed in the outcome of the season,” said quarterback Eli Manning, who threw for 4,002 yards and 31 touchdowns, but also tossed 25 interceptions. “We thought we had potential. We thought we had players to make it in the playoffs and make a run, and we didn’t accomplish that. We didn’t play well enough at times of the season to make it into the playoffs.”

“We had a good year,” Tuck said. “Ten and six is nothing to hold your head down about. Obviously, it wasn’t good enough, and we always have a goal of reaching the playoffs and going deep in the playoffs and hopefully winning the Super Bowl. It didn’t happen this year, but we’re not going to hold our heads about it. We had opportunities, and you try your best to learn from them. Hopefully, that’s being carried over to next year and it gets us to work a little harder in running and work a little harder in lifting and propel us to where we want to be next year.”

2011

Late in the afternoon on Dec. 18, 2011, the Giants trudged off the field in MetLife Stadium after a lackluster 23-10 loss to the Washington Redskins. The Giants had not scored a touchdown until 33 seconds remained in the defeat, their fifth in a six-game stretch that included a four-game losing streak. More importantly, the Giants fell to 7-7 and were one defeat from missing the playoffs for a third consecutive season.

But instead of continuing their freefall, the Giants rose up and concluded the season with one of the most inspiring and memorable runs in the 87-year history of the franchise, one that ended with a victory over New England in Super Bowl XLVI — their second championship in five seasons.

The surge began with a Dec. 24 victory over the Jets in which the Giants were the visiting team. Eight days later, the Giants routed Dallas in a winner-take-all showdown for the NFC East title. The Giants finished 9-7 and became the first team to win the division with fewer than 10 wins since the 1970 merger.

The Giants opened their playoff run with a 24-2 rout of Atlanta in MetLife Stadium. They followed that up with road victories that avenged regular season losses to Green Bay and San Francisco, the latter a 20-17 overtime thriller in the NFC Championship Game.

That advanced the Giants to the Super Bowl, where they found a familiar foe in the Patriots, the same team they defeated four years earlier in Super Bowl XLII. This time, Ahmad Bradshaw scored the game-winning touchdown on a six-yard run with 57 seconds remaining and the defense knocked down Tom Brady’s last-play pass into the end zone to clinch the 21-17 victory.

Eli Manning completed 30 of 40 passes for 296 yards to win his second Super Bowl MVP award as the Giants became the first seven-loss team to win a Super Bowl.

During the regular season, the Giants set franchise records with 6,161 total yards and 4,734 net passing yards. Manning set Giants marks with 589 passes and 359 completions. Wide receiver Victor Cruz established a team record with 1,536 receiving yards while catching 82 passes. Hakeem Nicks had 1,192 yards to give the Giants two 1,000-yard receivers for the first time in franchise history.

Ahmad Bradshaw missed four games with a foot injury, but led the team with 659 rushing yards and nine touchdowns.

Second-year pro Jason Pierre-Paul had 16.5 sacks, the fourth-highest total in team history.

2012

The 2012 Giants finished 9-7 and in second place in the NFC East. It was the eighth consecutive season in which the Giants finished .500 or better, their longest such streak since they played 10 seasons in a row without a losing record from 1954-63. The Giants finished with a winning record for the third consecutive season, the first time they had done that since 1988-90 (when they were 10-6, 12-4, 13-3).

Despite extending those streaks, they did not earn a postseason berth. The Giants lost con-



rol of their playoff destiny with back-to-back late-season defeats in Atlanta and Baltimore. They routed Philadelphia in their finale, but soon learned they were eliminated when Chicago beat Detroit.

The Giants compiled numerous impressive statistics in 2012. They scored 429 points, the second-highest total in franchise history; the 1963 Giants scored 448. The 2012 season was the fifth in the 88-year history of the franchise in which the Giants scored more than 400 points. The Giants scored a franchise-record 278 points at home, shattering the old mark of 248, set in 2007. In their last three home games — victories over Green Bay, New Orleans and Philadelphia — the Giants scored 38, 52 and 42 points.

The 2012 team allowed an NFL-low 20 sacks. The Giants were fourth in the NFL in both takeaways (35, four more than they had in 2011) and turnover differential (plus-14, a significant improvement over 2011’s plus-7). The plus-14 was the Giants’ best turnover differential since they were plus-25 in 1997. The Giants intercepted 21 passes in 2012, their highest total since they had 27 picks, also in 1997.

The Giants finished the 2012 season with 72 penalties for 578 yards, both franchise-low totals for a 16-game schedule.

Eli Manning passed Phil Simms and became the Giants’ career leader in completions (2,612) and touchdown passes (211).

Four Giants were selected to the Pro Bowl: Manning, guard Chris Snee, wide receiver Victor Cruz and defensive end Jason Pierre-Paul.

2013

In 2013, a strong finish was not enough for the Giants to overcome a poor start and they finished 7-9, their first losing record since they were 6-10 in 2004. They were third in the NFC East for the second season in a row.

The Giants put themselves in a deep hole by losing their first six games for the first time

since 1976, when they lost their first nine games. They did, however, follow their 0-6 start with four consecutive victories to become just the second team in NFL history to lose its first six games and win the next four (the other team was the 2009 Tennessee Titans). Overall, the Giants won seven of their last 10 games.

All nine of the Giants' losses were to teams that finished .500 or better, the first time that happened since their 5-11 season in 1995. The Giants lost home games to both of the teams that played in Super Bowl XLVIII, Seattle and Denver.

The offense struggled much of the season. The Giants' offense ranked 28th in the NFL in both yards per game (307.5) and points per game (18.4). The Giants scored 294 points, their lowest total in Tom Coughlin's 10 seasons as head coach. They were shutout at Carolina and vs. Seattle, the first time since 1996 they did not score twice in the same season. The Giants scored more than 27 points just once, in their 36-31 opening night loss in Dallas.

The Giants committed an NFL-high 44 turnovers. It was their highest turnover total since 1983, when they had 58 turnovers. The Giants' minus-15 turnover differential was their worst since they were minus-16, also in 1983.

Defensively, the Giants improved throughout the season. The defense ranked 26th in the NFL entering Week 6, when it was allowing an average of 395.2 yards per game, finished the season ranked eighth, giving up 332.3 yards a game. That was a significant improvement over the 2012 season, when the defense was ranked 31st, allowing 383.4 yards per game. The unit was 14th in the league against the run (108.9 yards a game) and 10th vs. the pass (223.3). The Giants were 18th in scoring defense, allowing 23.9 points a game. Entering Week 6, they were 32nd and last in scoring defense, giving up 36.4 points a game.

The defense was not responsible for nine of the 42 touchdowns allowed by the Giants, who surrendered an NFL-high nine return touchdowns (three apiece on interceptions, fumble returns and punt returns).

2014

The 2014 Giants finished 6-10, their first double-digit loss season since 2004 and their first back-to-back losing seasons since 2003-04. They were a streaky team, with a seven-game losing streak surrounded on both sides by three-game winning streaks.

The Giants were the third-place team in the NFC East for the second year in a row. They were 2-4 in NFC East games. The Giants swept Washington and were swept by Dallas and Philadelphia.

The Giants scored 380 points and allowed 400. It was just the fifth time in franchise history they gave up at least 400 points.

The offense finished 10th in the NFL with an average of 367.2 yards a game, a 59.7 yards-per-game improvement over their 2013 average of 307.5. It was the team's largest one-year jump since 2005, when the Giants were ranked fourth in the league with an average of 361.7 yards a game. That was a 66.6 yards-per-game increase over their 2004 average of 295.1.

The Giants set franchise records for completed passes with 383 (shattering the former mark of 359, set in 2011) and completion percentage with 63.1 (the former record of 62.9 was set in 2010). They finished with their second-highest totals in franchise history in passes attempted (607) and net passing yards (4,272).

The Giants' defense allowed 6,012 net yards, the third-highest total by their opponents in franchise history. They yielded 6,134 yards in 2012 and 6,022 in the 2011 championship season.

The Giants were ranked 29th in the NFL in total defense, allowing 375.8 yards a game, after finishing eighth (332.3 yards per game) in 2013. The run defense ranked 30th (135.1 yards a game), while the Giants were 18th vs. the pass (240.6). The Giants finished the season with 47 sacks, their highest total since they had 48 in 2011.

2015

The Giants were 6-10 for the second season in a row in 2015, their first back-to-back double-digit loss seasons since 2003-04 when they were 4-12 in Jim Fassel's final season

as head coach and 6-10 in Tom Coughlin's first. Eight of the 10 losses were by six or fewer points. The Giants lost six games in which they held a lead or were tied in the fourth quarter.

The Giants finished under .500 for the third consecutive season, the first time that's happened since they had eight straight losing seasons from 1973-80. They missed the playoffs for the fourth consecutive season, their longest drought since they went 17 years about a postseason berth from 1964-80.

The 2015 Giants scored 420 points, the fifth-highest total in franchise history. Their 331 first downs were tied for the fourth-highest total in team history, and were just five fewer than their 2014 total. The Giants' 5,956 net yards were the third-highest total in their history.

With an average of 372.3 yards per game, the Giants finished eighth in the NFL in total offense, one season after finishing 10th in yardage. It is their first back-to-back top 10 finishes since they had a streak of four consecutive seasons from 2008-11.

In 2015, the Giants set franchise records for pass attempts (623, the old record was 616 in 2003), and completions (392, the old record was 383 in 2014). The Giants totaled 4,347 net passing yards, the second-highest total in franchise history. The record of 4,734 was set in 2011. The Giants threw 36 touchdown passes in 2015 (35 by Eli Manning), the second-highest total in franchise history; the 1963 Giants threw 39 touchdown passes.

The Giants allowed 442 points the second-highest total in franchise history (501 in 1966).

2016

The Giants sharply improved their fortunes in Ben McAdoo's first season as head coach in 2016, when they finished the regular season with an 11-5 record and in second-place in the NFC East, after finishing 6-10 each of the previous two years. The five-game improvement in victories is their biggest since 2005, when they were also 11-5 one year after finishing 6-10. The Giants qualified for their first playoff berth since 2011, when they won Super Bowl XLVI. It was their 32nd postseason appearance, tying them with Dallas and Green Bay for the most in NFL history. The Giants' season ended with a 38-13 loss to the Packers in an NFC Wild Card Game. The Giants finished 7-1 at home, their best record in the seven-year history of MetLife Stadium (previous best: 6-2 in 2012) and their best home record since they were 7-1 in Giants Stadium in 2008. They won their last six home games, their longest such streak since they won their first six games at home in 2008. The Giants finished 4-2 in NFC East games, their best record within the division since they were 4-2 in 2013. Their 2-1 record in division road games was their best since they were 2-1 in 2013. With their 27-23 victory against Baltimore on Oct. 16, the Giants became the third NFL franchise with 700 combined regular-season and postseason victories. At the conclusion of their 92nd season, the Giants were 708-597-33. The Packers were 764-575-37, and the Chicago Bears were 761-586-42. The Giants had a vastly-improved defense in 2016. They were second in the NFL with 284 points allowed, one season after they were ranked 30th after giving up 442 points. The Giants allowed 17.8 points per game, the lowest average by their opponents since 2002, when they gave up 17.4 points a game.

2017

The 2017 season began with optimism but ended in disappointment for the Giants, who lost their first five games on their way to a 3-13 record. The 13 losses were a franchise record, and the three victories were the team's fewest since 1983, when the Giants finished 3-12-1. The Giants finished 2-6 in MetLife Stadium, their fewest home victories since they were 1-7 in 2003. They scored 246 points, their lowest total since they scored 243 in 2003. On Dec. 4, the Giants were 2-10 when general manager Jerry Reese and head coach Ben McAdoo were dismissed from their duties. Assistant general manager Kevin Abrams was named interim G.M. and defensive coordinator Steve Spagnuolo became the interim head coach. The Giants were 1-3 under Spagnuolo, defeating the Washington Redskins in their season finale. When Eli Manning did not play at Oakland on Dec. 3, it ended his streak of 210 consecutive regular-season starts (plus 12 in the postseason) dating back to his rookie season in 2004. Tight Evan Engram, the Giants' 2017 first-round draft choice, finished the season with team-high



totals of 64 catches and six touchdowns. Safety Landon Collins was the Giants' only Pro Bowl representative, but was unable to play in the game after fracturing his arm in Week 16. On Jan. 22, the Giants named Pat Shurmur their new head coach.

2018

The Giants finished the season 5-11 and in fourth place in the NFC East in Pat Shurmur's first season as head coach. Twelve of the Giants' 16 games were decided by seven or fewer points, tying them with Philadelphia and Pittsburgh for the most in the NFL. The Giants were 4-8 in those games. The Giants scored 369 points after scoring 246 in 2017. The 123-point increase was the Giants' largest from one season to the next in 85 years, and their largest ever when the seasons had the same number of games. In 1933, the Giants scored 244 points in a 14-game regular season, one year after scoring 93 points in 12 games, an increase of 151 points. The team's per-game averages in points, and total, rushing, and passing yards all improved in 2018. When Eli Manning took his first snap of the season he played in his franchise-record 217th regular-season game. Saquon Barkley had the greatest rookie season in Giants history and was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year. Barkley set numerous franchise rookie records, including rushing yards (1,307), Touchdowns (15), rushing touchdowns (11) and receptions (91, tied with Odell Beckham, Jr.). Aldrick Rosas was named second-year All-Pro after making 32 of his 33 field goal attempts, a Giants-record a .970 percentage. Rosas was one of five Giants selected to the Pro Bowl, including Barkley, safety Landon Collins, linebacker Olivier Vernon and safety Michael Thomas (as a special teamer) were later named to the NFC team. Left tackle Nate Solder and rookie left guard Will Hernandez participated in all 1,027 offensive snaps. Linebacker Alec Ogletree led the Giants and all NFL linebackers with five interceptions. He tied the single-season record for interceptions by a Giants linebacker, set by Jerry Hillebrand in 1963. Ogletree returned two of the interceptions for touchdowns; he was the only NFL player with two interception return touchdowns in 2018, and the first linebacker in Giants history to score twice on interception returns in a season.

2019

The Giants were 4-12 and third-place finishers in the NFC East in Pat Shurmur's second and final season as coach. Eli Manning played the final four games of his career and won his last start, on Dec. 15 vs. Miami, to finish with a regular-season record of 117-117. Manning is the only player in Giants history to play 16 seasons with the team. He played in a franchise-record 236 regular-season games (234 starts). Quarterback Daniel Jones started 12 games and set

franchise rookie records with 459 passes, 284 completions, 3,027 yards and 24 touchdown passes. The former records had all stood since Charlie Conerly set them in 1948. Jones' 24 touchdown passes led all rookie quarterbacks in 2019 and were the fourth-most by a rookie in a single season in NFL history. Only Baker Mayfield (27 in 2018), Peyton Manning (26 in 1998) and Russell Wilson (26 in 2012) had more. Despite missing three games with an ankle injury, Saquon Barkley led the team with 217 carries for 1,003 yards and six touchdowns. Coupled with his 1,307 yards in his debut season, Barkley is the first player in Giants history to rush for at least 1,000 yards in each of his first two seasons. Barkley set a franchise record with 279 yards from scrimmage at Washington on Dec. 22. Jones threw a team rookie-record five touchdown passes in that game as the Giants became the first team in NFL history to have a player with 275+ scrimmage yards and a player with five touchdown passes in the same game. Sterling Shepard missed six games with a concussion but led the Giants with 57 catches. Rookie receiver Darius Slayton had a team-high 740 receiving yards and eight touchdowns and was fourth with 48 catches. Safety Antoine Bethea led the Giants with 110 tackles (81 solo) and Markus Golden 10.0 sacks more than doubled the total of anyone else on the team.

2020

Joe Judge was hired as the Giants' 19th head coach in January and in his first season, the team finished in second place in the NFC East at 6-10, their best record since they were 11-5 in 2016. The Giants were 4-2 in NFC East games, also their best since 2016, when they were 4-2. They swept division foes Dallas, Philadelphia and Washington at home for the first time since 2005.

The Giants held a double-digit lead in six consecutive games from Oct. 11-Nov. 15, their longest such streak in a single season since 1989, when they had a lead of 10 or more points in nine straight games. From Oct. 11 through Nov. 8, the Giants' five games were decided by a total of 10 points, the first time in their history they played five consecutive games with such a small cumulative margin. The Giants also played five straight games decided by three or fewer points in a single season for the first time in their history.

Cornerback James Bradberry and tight end Evan Engram earned their first Pro Bowl selections although the game was not actually played because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Daniel Jones started all 14 games in which he played and completed 280 of 448 passes (62.5%) for 2,943 yards, 11 touchdowns and 10 interceptions for a passer rating of 80.4. His two-year totals are 907 attempts, 564 completions (62.2%) for 5,970 yards, 35 touchdowns and 22 interceptions for a passer rating of 84.1. Jones rushed for 423 yards on 65 carries, the record for a Giants quarterback in the Super Bowl era. Pro Football Hall of Famer Fran

Tarkenton previously held the record with 306 yards in 1967. Jones' 6.5-yard average was the NFL's highest among the 91 players with at least 50 rushing attempts in 2020.

In his first season with the Giants, inside linebacker Blake Martinez started all 16 games for the fourth consecutive season. He was one of the team's captains and led the Giants and was third in the NFL with 151 tackles (86 solo). Martinez tallied at least 147 tackles for the fourth consecutive season.

In his first Giants season, Graham Gano had one of the finest seasons of his 12-year career and one of the best seasons by a kicker in franchise history. He made 31 of 32 attempts this season, a .9687 percentage that is the second highest in Giants history. In 2018, Aldrick Rosas made 32 of 33 attempts, a success rate of .9696.

2021

The Giants won three of the final five games that quarterback Daniel Jones started in 2021, losing only Monday night road encounters with the previous season's Super Bowl teams, Kansas City and Tampa Bay. But after Jones suffered a season-ending neck injury against Philadelphia on Nov. 28, the Giants lost their final six games and finished 4-13 and in fourth place in the NFC East.

With Jones in the lineup, the Giants averaged 18.4 points a game. Without him, that number was almost halved (9.3).

In his third season, Jones completed 232 of 361 passes (64.3%) for 2,428 yards, 10 touchdowns and seven interceptions.

Saquon Barkley and Devontae Booker each rushed for a team-high 593 yards. They were the first pair of teammates to share a rushing title since Ray Nolting and Sam Francis each ran for 297 yards for the 1938 Chicago Bears.

Tight end Evan Engram led the Giants with 46 receptions, followed by Barkley (41) and Booker (40). The leading wide receiver was rookie Kadarius Toney, who caught 39 passes while playing in just 10 games. Toney set a franchise rookie record with 189 receiving yards at Dallas on Oct. 10.

Two second-year pros led the defense. Linebacker Tae Crowder started all 17 games and tallied a team-high 130 tackles. Safety Xavier McKinney led the Giants with five interceptions, including one he returned for a touchdown.

Graham Gano made 29 of 33 field goal attempts and all 17 of his PATs for a team-high 104 points. Gano extended his team-record streak to 37 consecutive successes before missing a 35-yard try at New Orleans on Oct. 3.

2022

Brian Daboll's debut season as head coach included a 9-7-1 regular-season record, the Giants' first playoff berth in six years and their first postseason victory in 11 seasons, a wild card triumph in Minnesota. The season ended with a divisional round playoff loss in Philadelphia.

Daboll was the fifth coach in Giants history to lead the team to the playoffs in his debut season, joining Allie Sherman (1961), Dan Reeves (1993), Jim Fassel (1997) and Ben McAdoo (2016). Rookie coach Earl Pottenger led the Giants to the 1927 NFL championship in the era before playoffs. Daboll was the first Giants coach to win his postseason debut since Dan Reeves in 1993. The other Giants coaches to win their first playoff games were Jim Lee Howell in 1956, Ray Perkins in 1981, and Bill Parcells in 1981.

Fourth-year quarterback Daniel Jones completed 317 of 472 passes (a franchise-record 67.16%) for 3,205 yards, all career highs. His passer rating was a career-best 92.5 and was the highest by a Giants quarterback since Eli Manning's 93.6 rating in 2015. Jones led with NFL and set a franchise record by throwing an interception on just 1.1% of his passes (5 in 472 throws). He rushed for a Giants quarterback-record 708 yards and 7 touchdowns on 120 carries.

Saquon Barkley was selected to his second Pro Bowl and finished with career-high totals of 295 carries for 1,312 yards — the NFL's 4th-highest total — and rushed for 10 touchdowns,

one less than his career-high rookie total. He also tied Richie James for the team lead with 57 receptions for 338 yards and was 7th in the NFL with 1,650 scrimmage yards.

James and Isaiah Hodgins tied for the team lead with 4 touchdown receptions.

Safety Julian Love led the Giants in total (116) and solo (74 tackles) and tied rookie Dane Belton for the team interceptions lead with two. Defensive lineman Dexter Lawrence had a team and career-high 7.5 sacks.

Kicker Graham Gano made 29 of 32 field goal attempts and scored a team-high 119 points.

STADIUMS OF THE NEW YORK GIANTS

The Giants shared the Polo Grounds with the New York Baseball Giants from the time they entered the league in 1925 until they moved to the larger Yankee Stadium for the start of the 1956 season.

In 1973, the Giants announced plans to move to a new stadium in New Jersey for the 1976 season, and the city of New York announced that Yankee Stadium was planning a two-year renovation after the 1973 baseball season. The Giants were allowed to play their first two games of the 1973 season at Yankee Stadium before moving to a new location.

The Giants spent the offseason searching for a place to play their games. The Giants' first choice was the Yale Bowl, but the Yale Bowl representatives turned down the team's first request because it would have meant a blackout for the local schedule due to the blackout rule. The Giants' next choice was to play at Princeton University, but they also turned down the Giants. Things were so bad that when the league announced the 1973 schedule, it didn't even say where the games would be played. In light of the Giants' problems, Commissioner Pete Rozelle, with the help from national politicians, modified the blackout rule so that the rule was only in effect if the game was not sold out in advance. With the rule change came a change of heart by the Yale Bowl representatives. It was official. The Giants would play their first two games of the 1973 season at Yankee Stadium and would play the rest of the schedule and the 1974 season at the Yale Bowl in New Haven, Connecticut.

After the 1974 season, it was announced that the Giants were going back to New York


City to play at Shea Stadium until the opening of Giants Stadium in 1976. The Giants played the first four games of the 1976 season on the road just in case there were any delays with the opening of the new stadium. The Giants made their debut at Giants Stadium on October 10, 1976 against the Dallas Cowboys before a sellout crowd.

In 2010, the Giants moved into beautiful, new, state-of-the-art MetLife Stadium built just a few yards from where Giants Stadium sat for more than three decades. The nation's finest football stadium, it seats 82,500 fans. It is one of the NFL's most technologically advanced stadiums and took more than four million man-hours and \$1.6 billion to build. The stadium features 10,000 club seats, 222 suites and 130,000 square feet of state-of-the-art club lounges. The first row of seats is just 46 feet from the sidelines and the sightlines are superb. MetLife Stadium is 2.1 million square feet, compared to Giants Stadium's 900,000 square feet. It has four 30' by 118' high definition video screens, a 350,000 square foot outdoor plaza filled with interactive activities for fans of all ages.

The 2022 season will be the Giants' 13th in MetLife Stadium. They are 45-53 in regular-season games and 1-0 in the postseason, defeating Atlanta in a 2011 NFC Wild Card game on their way to winning Super Bowl XLVI. MetLife Stadium has hosted numerous prestigious events, including NFL, college football and soccer games, and concerts. In 2014, the stadium was the site of Super Bowl XLVIII, the first outdoor Super Bowl played in a "cold weather" city. Seattle defeated Denver, 43-8.







wore a patch in remembrance of Carl "Spider" Lockhart. In 2001, a "GBY" patch honored longtime general manager George Bernard Young. Most recently, Wellington T. Mara was remembered during the 2005 season with a "WTM" patch after his passing, and a few weeks later, Preston Robert Tisch was added to a patch with Wellington Mara separated by the NY logo.



The Giants honored Hall of Famer, player and coach, Rosie Brown with a "79" decal on the back of their helmets in after his passing in 2004.

In addition, the team has also worn patches in Super Bowls XXV, XLII and XLVI. Those patches were representations of the

NFL's Super Bowl logos for those years.

In 2014, the team wore a patch commemorating its 90th season in the league.




For the 2015 season, the team wore a "ATM" patch on its jerseys honoring the passing of Ann Mara, wife of Wellington Mara.

NEW YORK GIANTS CLASSIC UNIFORM



The New York Giants classic uniform was released in 2022, and worn for the Bears and Washington home games that season. The classic uniform, which the team wore from 1980-99, starts at the top with the return of the navy helmet, providing a base for the white face-mask, solid scarlet red stripe, classic numbers, side decals, and a raised wordmark — all reminiscent of the '80s and '90s style. Meanwhile, the red and blue trim on the jerseys and pants are all done in a color palette from that era.

The Giants also accented the inside of the collar with the timeless words of late owner Wellington Mara: "Once a Giant, Always a Giant."

Wellington Mara, along with CB Mike Haynes, Coach Don Shula and C Mike Webster, was a member of the four-man 1997 class of the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Mara and his father Tim, who was the founder of the Giants and a charter member of the Hall of Fame, were the first father and son to be accorded pro football's highest honor. Mara was one of the

most influential and beloved figures in American sports history. His entire working lifetime was dedicated to the Giants and the NFL and he helped the Giants produce 21 NFL/NFC first place finishes, 27 postseason appearances and six NFL championships during a 68-season tenure that began with his graduation from Fordham in 1937. Mara passed away on Oct. 25, 2005.

Tim Mara introduced the city of New York to pro football when he purchased the franchise for a reported \$500 in 1925, thus giving the National Football League a vital showcase in the nation's largest city. Mara withstood heavy financial losses his first year until the Giants were saved in the last home game of the season. Mara needed a good showing at the gate to keep the team alive. The Chicago Bears arrived at the Polo Grounds with the most heralded college player of the era, Red


Grange, who helped draw a crowd of more than 70,000 people. After seeing so many people attend a Giants game, Mara decided that professional football could be a big success under the right circumstances. Mara bore the brunt of the fight against the rival American Football League in 1926 and the All-American Football Conference from 1946-49. He helped build the Giants into a perennial powerhouse and was honored in 1963 as one of 17 charter members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Badgro joined the Giants in 1930 and played six seasons at end. He excelled as a superior defender, excellent blocker and big-play receiver. Badgro helped lead the Giants to the NFL's inaugural championship game in 1933 and he scored the first touchdown in the league's title game history on a 29-yard pass from Harry Newman in the second quarter. Badgro tied for the NFL receiving title in 1934 with 16 receptions for 206 yards, including one touchdown. He was named to the All-NFL team three times: 1931, 1933 and


1934. Before joining the Giants, Badgro played with the Red Grange-led New York Yankees in the American Football League (13 games in 1927-28). He played pro baseball for three seasons, one with Tulsa in the minor leagues and two with the St. Louis Browns. Badgro was 77 when he was elected to the Hall of Fame in 1981 and has the distinction of being the oldest player ever enshrined in Canton.





Brown played for the Giants from 1953 through 1965 after joining the team as a 27th round draft choice, regarded as one of the greatest "sleeper" picks of all time. Brown held the starting tackle spot for 13 consecutive seasons. During that period, he was named to nine Pro Bowls and was selected All-NFL eight consecutive seasons. When the Giants won the league

title in 1956, Brown was named Lineman of the Year by the Associated Press. Brown was a big, strong tackle who had the speed to make a block downfield. He was also deployed in the defensive front on goal-line stands. Brown helped the Giants advance to the NFL Championship game in 1956, 1958, 1959, 1961, 1962 and 1963. He was immediately named assistant line coach by the Giants after a phlebitis condition forced him to retire in 1966. Brown continued his Giants affiliation as a scout from 1971 until his death on June 9, 2004.








Carson played his entire 13-year NFL career with the Giants. An inside linebacker, he was selected to nine Pro Bowls, including seven in a row from 1982-88. Carson led the Giants in tackles six times, was a two-time All-NFL first-team selection and was the sole captain of the 1986 Super Bowl champions. Carson joined the Giants as a fourth-round draft choice in 1976

from South Carolina State, where he never missed a game in four seasons, was a two-year captain and an AP Little All-America selection. A defensive end in college, Carson moved to linebacker with the Giants so successfully he was voted to the NFL All-Rookie team. Carson played 173 games for the Giants and was a punishing run defender who also intercepted 11 passes. Carson had 17 sacks, 14 fumble recoveries and seven forced fumbles. He had 25 tackles (20 solo) in a Monday night game against Green Bay in 1982 and seven tackles in the Giants' 39-20 victory over Denver in Super Bowl XXI. In his prime, Carson was the best run-stopping linebacker in the NFL. In the seven seasons from 1981 to 1987, Giants' opponents averaged only 3.59 yards per rushing attempt, a remarkable achievement for so long a period. During that period, Carson was credited with 856 tackles, including 627 unassisted stops.

One of the most versatile players in NFL history, Gifford played for the Giants from 1952-64, although he voluntarily retired in 1961 due to a serious injury suffered the previous season. Gifford was the first choice in the 1952 NFL Draft by the Giants after an All-America career at Southern California. With the Giants, Gifford totaled 9,862 combined yards, including 3,609 rushing, caught 367 passes, and scored 484 points. He was named to the Pro Bowl


as a defensive back in 1953 and as an offensive back the following year - a first in NFL history. The NFL Player of the Year in 1956, Gifford played in seven Pro Bowls and was selected All-NFL four times. He holds the Giants record with 78 touchdowns. A true triple-threat back, Gifford threw 14 touchdown passes in 60 attempts on the halfback option. He retired after the 1960 season and returned in 1962 at a new position, flanker. The Giants reached the NFL Championship game five times during his career, including their victory in 1956.





Hein joined the Giants in 1931 and played 15 seasons, tying him with Phil Simms and Michael Strahan for the second-longest tenure in franchise history, behind only Eli Manning (16 seasons). A member of the Hall of Fame's inaugural class in 1963, Hein was named All-NFL eight consecutive years from 1933-40. Following a successful college career at Washington State, Hein wrote to three NFL clubs offering his services. He joined the Giants after the team submitted the highest salary bid at

\$150 per game. Hein was a 60-minute regular for 15 years, playing in 172 games. He never missed a game in high school or college and sat out just one with the Giants, on Nov. 30, 1933 at Brooklyn. He was named the league's Most Valuable Player in 1938 after anchoring a line that helped guide the Giants to the NFL Championship with a 23-17 victory over the Green Bay Packers in the Polo Grounds.


Hubbard played for the Giants from 1927-28 and again in 1936. He was one of the 17 charter members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1963. Hubbard was named All-NFL six consecutive years from 1928-33. He played for the Green Bay Packers from 1929-35 and the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1936 before returning to the Giants. He was acquired before the start of the 1927 season to help improve the Giants' defense. That season, the defense surrendered only 20 points as the Giants captured

their first NFL championship. He went to Green Bay in 1929 in a move that would haunt the Giants, as Hubbard led the Packers to a 12-0-1 record to edge out the 13-1-1 Giants for the league title. The Packers handed the Giants their only loss of the season by a 20-6 score.

Huff became an immediate star at middle linebacker after he was drafted by the Giants in the third round in 1956 following an All-America career at West Virginia. He played in five Pro Bowls and was named All-NFL four years. Huff won recognition for his great individual efforts against the premier running backs of his era, including Jim Brown of Cleveland, Rick Casares of Chicago and Alan Ameche of Baltimore. He was named the NFL's Outstanding Lineman in 1959. Huff anchored a defense that helped the Giants reach the championship game in 1956, 1958, 1959, 1961, 1962 and 1963. He was traded to the Washington Redskins prior to the 1964 season and has been a color analyst on the Redskins radio broadcasts for many years.

Landry was with the Giants as a defensive back from 1950-55 and an assistant coach from 1954-59. The Giants' 1956 championship team had one of history's greatest coaching staffs. Head coach Jim Lee Howell had Vince Lombardi coaching the offense and Landry coaching the defense. When the Dallas Cowboys entered the league in 1960, Wellington Mara recommended the Cowboys hire Landry as head coach. Landry coached the Cowboys from 1960 through 1988 and led Dallas to 20 consecutive winning seasons, two Super Bowl victories and five NFC titles.

Leemans played for the Giants from 1936-43. He was personally scouted by Wellington Mara and was a second-round draft choice in the inaugural NFL Draft in 1936 out of George Washington. Mara sent a telegram setting up a meeting with Leemans to convince him to pursue an NFL career with the Giants. Leemans was the 1936 College Football All-Star Game MVP. He led NFL rushers as a rookie in 1936 with 830 yards on 206 attempts. Leemans was named All-NFL in 1936 and 1939. An aggressive, dedicated do-everything team leader, he totaled 3,142 yards rushing, 2,324 yards passing, 442 yards receiving and threw 16 touchdown passes during his career.

Lombardi was an offensive assistant coach with the Giants from 1954-58 and the head coach of the Green Bay Packers (1959-67) and Washington Redskins (1969). With Lombardi running the offense, the Giants captured the NFL championship in 1956. In 10 years as head coach, Lombardi had a 105-36-6 record. He directed the Packers to five NFL championships in seven years (1961-62 and 65-66-67) and victories in Super Bowls I and II, a feat without equal in pro football history. A guard, Lombardi


played his collegiate football at Fordham, where he was one of the legendary "Seven Blocks of Granite."



ANDY ROBUSTELLI
DEFENSIVE END
ARNOLD COLLEGE
ENSHRINED IN 1971

Robustelli was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams in 1951 and played on two Rams championship teams. In 1956, Wellington traded for Robustelli, who provided a tremendous lift in the Giants' title drive that season. Robustelli, who stayed with the Giants through the 1964 season, played on a winning team in 13 of his 14 pro seasons. He played in eight NFL championship title games and seven Pro Bowls. Robustelli was named All-NFL seven times, two with

the Rams and five with the Giants. Robustelli was a durable player who missed only one game in his 14-year career.



STEVE OWEN
COACH
PHILLIPS UNIVERSITY ENSHRINED
IN 1966

Owen was a four-time All-NFL tackle who played for the Giants from 1926-31, plus a one-game return in 1933. He captained the 1927 team that won the NFL title and held its foes to a record-low total of 20 points. But Owen made his greatest imprint on the sideline, where he coached the Giants for 23 years. He was a co-coach with Benny Friedman in 1930, then assumed the full head coaching responsibility in 1931, a position he kept until 1953. Owens had a coaching record of 153-100-17 and won

eight division and two NFL titles. The 153 victories are a Giants record. Some of his coaching innovations include the A-formation offense, the umbrella defense and the two-platoon system.



KEN STRONG
HALFBACK
NEW YORK UNIVERSITY ENSHRINED
IN 1967

Strong played for the Giants from 1933-35, 1939 and from 1944-47. He excelled in every phase of the game - blocking, running, passing, punting, placekicking and defense. At the time of his retirement, Strong was the Giants' career scoring leader with 324 points on 13 touchdowns, 35 field goals and 141 extra points. He scored 17 of the Giants' 30 points in their victory against Chicago in the 1934 championship - the famous "Sneakers Game." Strong scored a league-high 64 points in 1933

and was All-NFL in 1934. He began his career with the Staten Island Stapletons in 1932. After four seasons, he joined the Giants. In 1936, he began a two-year stint in the rival AFL. Strong served as a placekicking specialist only when he returned to the Giants from 1944 until 1947. He scored 479 points in his career.



BILL PARCELLS
COACH
WICHITA STATE
ENSHRINED 2013

Parcells was head coach of the Giants for eight years (1983-90) and later held the same position with the New England Patriots, New York Jets and Dallas Cowboys. He led the Giants to victories in Super Bowls XXI and XXV and is one of 13 head coaches with more than one Super Bowl victory. With the Giants, Parcells was 77-49-1 (.610) in the regular season and 8-3 (.727) in the postseason for an overall mark of 85-52-1 (.620). In 19 seasons as a head coach, Parcells was 172-139-1 (.569)


in the regular season and 11-8 (.579) in the postseason. His overall record was 183-138-1 (.570). The 172 regular-season victories are the 10th-highest total in NFL history, as are the 183 total victories.



MICHAEL STRAHAN
DEFENSIVE END
TEXAS SOUTHERN
ENSHRINED IN 2014

Strahan played his entire career with the Giants from 1993-2007. A standout run stopper and pass rusher, Strahan joins Eli Manning (16), and Hall of Famer Mel Hein and Phil Simms as the only players in Giants history to play at least 15 years with the team. Strahan's 216 regular-season games are the second-highest total in franchise history, trailing only Manning's 236. He was a four-time first-team All-Pro (1997, 1998, 2001 and 2003), a seven-time Pro Bowler and the 2001 NFL AP


Defensive Player of the Year. Strahan had 141.5 career regular season sacks, which is the Giants' franchise record and the sixth-highest total in NFL history. Strahan holds the NFL single-season record with 22.5 sacks in 2001 (which was tied by Pittsburgh's T.J. Watt in 2021). He also led the NFL in 2003 with 18.5 sacks and is the only Giants player to twice lead the league in sacks. Strahan was a captain of the 2007 Giants team that won Super Bowl XLII.



LAWRENCE TAYLOR
LINEBACKER
NORTH CAROLINA
ENSHRINED IN 1999

Taylor joined the Giants as the second overall selection of the 1981 NFL Draft and played his entire 13-year career for the team. When Taylor retired, he was the NFL's No. 2 all-time sack leader in the NFL with 132.5. That total does not include the 9.5 he accumulated as a rookie in 1981 before the sack was an official NFL statistic. Taylor established an NFL record by appearing in 10 consecutive Pro Bowls from 1981-1990. He was named the NFL

Rookie of the Year in 1981 and the NFC's Defensive Player of the Week nine times (the award was established in 1984), as well as the conference's Defensive Player of the Month twice, in October 1986 and September 1989. Taylor was a unanimous choice to the NFL's All-1980s team. He was a unanimous selection as the NFL's Most Valuable Player in 1986, when he had a career-high 20.5 sacks, 105 tackles, five passes defensed and two forced fumbles.



Y.A. TITTLE
QUARTERBACK
LOUISIANA ST.
ENSHRINED IN 1971

The Giants engineered one of the best trades in their long history prior to the 1961 season when they sent guard Lou Cordileone to the San Francisco 49ers for Tittle. Then 35, he promptly led the Giants to their 12th Eastern Division championship. Tittle played two seasons in the All-American Conference and 11 in the NFL before joining the Giants. In 1962, Tittle set an NFL record by throwing 33 touchdown passes and tied another mark with seven scoring throws in one game.


Tittle had his greatest year as a pro in 1963, when he led the league in passing with 221 completions in 367 attempts for 3,145 yards. His 36 touchdown passes broke his own league mark and set a Giants record that still stands. Tittle's career totals include 2,427 completions, 33,070 yards, 242 touchdowns and 13 games with more than 300 yards passing. He was the NFL Player of the Year in 1957, when he led the 49ers to a tie for the Western Division title, and won the honor again in 1961 and 1963, as he took the Giants to Eastern championships. Tittle was named All-NFL in 1957, 1962 and 1963, and played in six Pro Bowls.



EMLÉN TUNNELL
DEFENSIVE BACK
TOLEDO/IOWA
ENSHRINED IN 1967

Tunnell was signed by the Giants as a free agent out of Iowa in 1948 and played 11 seasons for the teams. Ignored in the NFL draft, Tunnell walked into the Giants office and asked Tim Mara for a tryout. Tunnell was the first African-American player signed by the Giants. He holds Giants records with 74 interceptions and 261 punt returns. In 1952, Tunnell gained more yards (923) on interceptions and kickoff returns than the NFL rushing leader did running the ball. He earned the nick-

name "offense on defense." Tunnell was named All-NFL four times and played in nine Pro Bowls.



GEORGE YOUNG
GENERAL MANAGER
BUCKNELL
ENSHRINED IN 2020

Young was the Giants general manager from 1979-97 and a five-time NFL Executive of the Year. When he was hired, Young took charge of a team that had not reached the playoffs in 15 consecutive years. The Giants were postseason participants in his third season and eight times in his 19 seasons as head of the franchise's football operations (three times – in 1982, 88 and 94 – they were eliminated on the final day of the season). They won three NFC East titles and Super Bowls XXI and


XXV. Young was a charter inductee into the franchise's Ring of Honor in 2010. Following the 1997 season, Young left the Giants to take a position as an advisor to commissioner Paul Tagliabue in the NFL office.



ARNOLD WEINMEISTER
DEFENSIVE TACKLE
WASHINGTON
ENSHRINED IN 1984

Weinmeister played for the Giants from 1950-53. He was one of the first defensive players to captivate the masses in the same manner a star running back or quarterback could. A big and extremely fast player with great ability to diagnose plays, Weinmeister began his pro career with the New York Yankees in the All-American Football Conference in 1950. He moved to the NFL during the 1950 merger. Weinmeister played two ways in the AFC,

but was used exclusively on defense in the NFL.








MICHAEL STRAHAN'S HELMET WORN THE DAY HE SET THE NFL SINGLE SEASON SACK RECORD


Csonka played for the Giants from 1976-78. He was originally drafted by the Miami Dolphins in the first round in 1968. Csonka left the Dolphins following the 1974 season and played for the Memphis Southmen of the World Football League in 1975. He returned to the Dolphins to finish his career in 1979. A five-time Pro Bowl selection, Csonka put together three consecutive 1,000-yard seasons (1971-73) as Miami advanced to the Super Bowl each year. He excelled in those Super Bowls,

averaging 6.3 yards a carry and rushing for more than 100 yards in two of them. Csonka finished his career with 8,081 yards, a 4.3-yard average and 64 touchdowns.



JOE GUYON
HALFBACK
CARLISLE
ENSHRINED IN 1966

Guyon played for the Giants during the championship season in 1927. His career highlight was catching a touchdown pass that gave the Giants a win over the Bears for the 1927 NFL championship. He also played for the Canton Bulldogs in 1920, the Cleveland Indians in 1921, Oorang Indians from 1922-23, the Rock Island Independents in 1924 and the Kansas City Cowboys from 1924-25.



RAY FLAHERTY
END, COACH
GONZAGA
ENSHRINED IN 1976


Flaherty played for the Giants from 1928-29 and 1931-35 and helped them advance to the NFL Championship Game in 1933, 1934 and 1935. He spent the 1930 season coaching at Gonzaga. Flaherty finished with an 80-37-5 record as a coach with Boston, Washington, New York Yankees and Chicago Hornets. Flaherty introduced the screen pass in the 1937 title game when the Washington Redskins scored a 28-21 victory over the Chicago Bears. He suggested to Coach Steve Owen that the Giants wear sneakers in the icy conditions at the Polo Grounds in the 1934 championship game, known as the "Sneakers Game."

ENSHRINED IN 1963

Henry played for the Giants during the championship season in 1927. He was the largest player of his time at 250 pounds. Henry was the bulwark of the Canton Bulldogs' championship lines in the 1920s. He played for the Canton Bulldogs and the Pottsville Maroons in addition to the Giants.



BENNIE FRIEDMAN
QUARTERBACK
MICHIGAN
ENSHRINED IN 2005


Friedman, a two-time All-America quarterback at Michigan, played with the Cleveland Bulldogs (1927), Detroit Wolverines (1928), Giants (1929-1931) and Brooklyn Dodgers (1932-1934). Following the 1928 season Giants owner Tim Mara purchased the Detroit franchise just to secure the services of Friedman. A versatile player, Friedman could run, kick and pass the ball better than any player who preceded him. From 1927-30, Friedman threw 11, 9, 20, and 13

touchdown passes, leading the league each year. In 1928, he topped the league in both rushing and passing touchdowns; no other player has ever accomplished that feat. His 20 touchdown passes in 1929, including four in one game, were both NFL records for many years. Although very durable, a knee injury coupled with the rigors of serving as an assistant coach at Yale, Friedman's productivity dropped in 1931. The player-coach still managed to earn third-team All-NFL honors that year and second-team All-NFL honors in 1933.



ARNIE HERBER
QUARTERBACK
REGIS COLLEGE
ENSHRINED IN 1966


Herber played for the Giants in 1944 and 1945. Pro football's first great long passer, Herber was the NFL passing leader in 1932, 1934 and 1936. Herber came out of retirement in 1944 to lead the Giants to the NFL Eastern Division crown. He also played for the Green Bay Packers from 1930-40 and ranks sixth in Packers annals with 66 career touchdowns.



DON MAYNARD
WIDE RECEIVER
TEXAS WESTERN
ENSHRINED IN 1987

Maynard played for the Giants in 1958. He went on to play for the New York Titans from 1960-62, the New York Jets from 1963-72 and the St. Louis Cardinals in 1973. He caught 633 passes for 11,834 yards (18.7-yard average) and 88 touchdowns. He had at least 50 catches and 1,000 yards in five different seasons. Maynard caught eight passes for 118 yards, including the winning touchdown, against Oakland in the AFL Championship game to



ENSHRINED IN 1986

Tarkenton played for the Giants from 1967-71. He began his career with the Minnesota Vikings in 1961 before moving to the Giants in 1967 and back to the Vikings in 1972 in blockbuster trades. He retired as the NFL's record holder for career passing yards with 47,003. An elusive scrambler, Tarkenton rushed for 3,674 yards and 32 touchdowns. A four-time All-NFL and nine-time Pro Bowl selection, he led the Vikings

to Super Bowl appearances in 1973, 1974 and 1976.



HUGH McELHENNY
HALFBACK
WASHINGTON
ENSHRINED IN 1970

McElhenny played for the Giants in 1963, when he helped them advance to the championship game. His career totals include 5,281 yards rushing and 360 points. On his first play as a professional, McElhenny scored on a 40-yard touchdown run. He also played with the San Francisco 49ers from 1952-60, the Minnesota Vikings from 1961-62 and the Detroit Lions in 1964.



JIM THORPE
HALFBACK
CARLISLE
ENSHRINED IN 1963

Thorpe played for the Giants during their first season in 1925. He was a charter inductee into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1963. Thorpe was the biggest name in football at the time the Giants signed him at the age of 37. He also played for the Canton Bulldogs, Cleveland Indians, Oorang Indians, Toledo Maroons, Rock Island Independents and the Chicago Cardinals. He was the first president of the American Professional Football

Association in 1920.

1 RAY FLAHERTY

Flaherty was an end and an assistant coach for the Giants from 1928-29 and 1931-35 and helped the Giants advance to three NFL Championships. . . Introduced the screen pass in the 1937 title game. . . Suggested the Giants wear sneakers in the 1934 championship game, known as the "Sneakers Game."

4 TUFFY LEEMANS

Leemans played for the Giants from 1936 through 1943. . . Was personally scouted by Giants co-owner Wellington Mara. . . Totaled 3,142 yards rushing, 2,324 yards passing, 442 receiving yards and threw 16 touchdowns.

7 MEL HEIN

Joined the Giants in 1931 and enjoyed a 15-year career. . . Was named All-NFL eight straight years from 1933-40. . . Member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame's inaugural class in 1963. . . Never missed a game in high school or college and sat out just in the NFL, on Nov. 30, 1933 vs. Brooklyn. . . Named League MVP in 1938.

10 ELI MANNING

Manning played in a Giants-record 236 regular-season games (plus 12 in the postseason). . . MVP in Super Bowls XLII and XLVI, when the Giants defeated New England. . . Holds most of the franchise's passing records, including 4,895 completions, 57,023 yards and 366 touchdowns in the regular season and 242 completions, 2,815 yards and 18 touchdowns in the playoffs.

11 PHIL SIMMS

Owned 19 team records for the Giants, including all-time records with 2,576 completions in 4,647 attempts for 33,462 yards. . . Owns a .597 winning percentage (95-64, including 6-4 in postseason play) as a starter over his 15-year career. . . Named MVP of the Super Bowl after leading the Giants to a 39-20 victory over Denver in Super Bowl XXI.

*14 WARD CUFF AND YA. TITTLE

Cuff joined the Giants as a fourth-round draft choice from Marquette in 1937 and excelled at several positions in a stint that ended in 1945. A wingback, fullback, halfback, defensive back and kicker, he rushed for 1,766 yards on 330 carries (a 5.3-yard average) and caught 101 passes for 1,477 yards. Cuff scored 18 touchdowns (six rushing, 12 receiving) and made 31 of 70 field goal attempts and 98 of 102 extra point tries. He also had a 12.1-yard punt return average and 13 interceptions.

Tittle played for the Giants from 1961-64 season. . . In 1962, Tittle completed 200 passes in 375 attempts for 3,224 yards. . . His 33 touchdowns that season set an NFL record and his seven touchdown passes against Washington tied another mark. . . Had his greatest year as a pro in 1963, leading the league in passing with 221 completions in 367 attempts for 3,145 yards and 36 touchdowns.

16 FRANK GIFFORD

Played for the Giants from 1952-64, though he voluntarily retired in 1961 season because of an injury. . . Made the Pro Bowl as both an offensive back and defensive back. . . Seven-time Pro Bowler and 1956 NFL player of the year. . . Holds three Giants records: Touchdowns (78), highest average gain (500 attempts) rushing (4.3 yards) and most receiving yards (5,434). . . Is fifth on team's all-time rushing list with 3,609 yards and second with 367 receptions. . . Totaled 9,753 yards in his career.

32 AL BLOZIS

Made an immediate impression on the Giants after arriving in 1942 and quickly earned a starting assignment at tackle. . . Played in the 1944 championship game with the Giants, he then was sent almost immediately overseas where as a lieutenant in the army he was killed in action in France a brief six weeks later.

40 JOE MORRISON

Was a back and an end for the Giants from 1959 through 1972. . . Was a dominant figure during his 14-year career with the Giants, accumulating 2,472 yards rushing with 18 touchdowns. . . A versatile player, Morrison played six different positions: fullback, halfback, flanker, tight end, split end and defensive back.

42 CHARLIE CONERLY

Played for the Giants from 1948 through 1961. . . Represented the Giants in three Pro Bowls (1951, 1952 and 1957) and was named the NFL's Most Valuable Player in 1959. . . Ended his career with 1,418 completions and 19,488 yards, both Giants records at the time of his retirement.

50 KEN STRONG

Played for the Giants from 1933-35, 1939 and 1944-47. . . At the time of his retirement, Strong was the Giants all-time leading scorer with 324 points on 13 touchdowns, 35 field goals and 141 extra points. . . He scored 17 points to lead the Giants to victory in the 1934 Championship game against Chicago.


56 LAWRENCE TAYLOR

Taylor finished his 13-year career (1981-93) No. 2 on the NFL's career sack list with 132.5. . . Established an NFL record by appearing in 10 consecutive Pro Bowls from 1981-90. . . Finest statistical season was in 1986, when he had a career-high 20.5 sacks, 105 total tackles, five passes defensed and two forced fumbles, numbers that earned him a unanimous selection as the NFL's Most Valuable Player.

92 MICHAEL STRAHAN

Strahan played in 216 regular season and 10 postseason games in a 15-year career spent entirely with the Giants. . . Finished his career with a Giants-record 141.5 sacks, the sixth-highest total in NFL history. . . Set an NFL single-season record with 22.5 sacks in 2001, a mark that was tied by Pittsburgh's T.J. Watt in 2021. . . Captain on the Giants team that won Super Bowl XLII in 2007.

*The Giants retired No. 3 in 1938, when Len Grant, a tackle from 1930-37 and a team captain, was killed by lightning on a golf course. Kicker Pete Gogolak joined the Giants in 1966 and requested No. 3 because he was superstitious. Gogolak wore it through the 1974 season. Several other Giants have since worn No. 3, including Brad Daluiso, Jesse Palmer and Sterling Shepard.



In 2010, the Giants unveiled their Ring of Honor, which commemorates some of the most prominent and influential figures in the 87-year history of the franchise. The original class of 30 players, coaches, executives and owners was joined by five more honorees in 2011. These men have helped the Giants win eight NFL championships and more than 650 games and contributed to them becoming one of the most respected and admired organizations in professional sports.

The names of the men in the Ring of Honor are prominently displayed at each Giants home game in MetLife Stadium above the club level on each sideline.

CLASS OF 2010

TIM MARA

Tim Mara introduced the city of New York to pro football when he purchased the franchise for a reported \$500 in 1925, thus giving the National Football League a vital showcase in the nation's largest city. Mara withstood heavy financial losses his first year until the Giants were saved in the last home game of the season. Mara needed a good showing at the gate to keep the team alive. The Chicago Bears arrived at the Polo Grounds with the most heralded college player of the era, Red Grange, who helped draw a crowd of more than 70,000 people. After seeing so many people attend a Giants game, Mara decided that professional football could be a big success under the right circumstances. He bore the brunt of the fight against the rival American Football League in 1926 and the All-American Football Conference from 1946-49. Mara helped build the Giants into a perennial powerhouse and was honored in 1963 as one of 17 charter members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

WELLINGTON MARA

It is impossible to overstate the influence Wellington Mara had on the Giants and in the NFL. He was one of the most important and influential figures in the history of professional football, a man credited with many of the ideas and innovations that have made the NFL the nation's most popular professional sports league. Mara is the most beloved and influential Giant in history and one of the most significant figures not just in the NFL, but in American sports. He was a vital member of the franchise for each of its first 81 years until his death in 2005. Mara was instrumental in helping the Giants make 26 postseason appearances, including 18 divisional championships and six NFL championships, among them the Super Bowl XXI and Super Bowl XXV titles. Despite his ties to the team, Mara

was recognized for always putting the league's interests ahead of what was best for the Giants. He was an invaluable contributor to the NFL as a member of many ownership committees. In 1997, Mara was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, joining his father, Tim Mara, as the first father-son duo elected to the Hall.

JACK MARA

During the very first game the Giants ever played in 1925, Jack Mara followed each play along the sidelines as he held the first down marker. It wasn't long before he held far more important jobs in the organization. Mara was only 22 year old in 1930 when his father, Tim, turned over the ownership of the Giants to him and his younger brother Wellington, who was all of 14. He served as the team's president for 31 years and was in charge of the Giants' business operations. Jack Mara was the driving force behind one of the most significant decisions in franchise history, to move the Giants' home games to Yankee Stadium from the crumbling Polo Grounds prior to the 1956 season. Tim Mara detested Yankees owner Dan Topping, so it was Jack who negotiated the deal that saved the financial future of the franchise. Jack Mara also lobbied the owners to share television revenue, which helped create the parity that has made pro football America's favorite spectator sport.

BOB TISCH

Preston Robert Tisch – "Bob" to everyone who knew him - realized a longtime dream in 1991, when he became co-owner of the Giants. Soon after the Giants won Super Bowl XXV, Tisch completed negotiations with Tim Mara (son of Jack Mara) and his family for a 50 percent interest in the team. That commenced Tisch's career as an owner of a professional sports franchise, one of many he simultaneously pursued. Tisch led an extraordinarily accomplished life. He was an enormously successful businessman, an extremely generous philanthropist, a postmaster general, a friend of presidents, governors and mayors and a nonpareil New York City mover and shaker. But nothing gave Tisch more pleasure and pride than being the co-owner of the Giants and working on several influential NFL ownership committees. As a member of the National Football League's Finance and Super Bowl Policy Committees, he attained a prominence in the sports arena equal to his position in the world of business.

GEORGE YOUNG

George Young was hired as the Giants general manager on Feb. 14, 1979 and stayed in that position through the 1997 season. He led the franchise out of the bleak 1970s and brought in great players such as Taylor, Simms, Joe Morris, Mark Bavaro and Carl Banks. Young hired Parcells, the head coach of two Super Bowl champions. During his tenure, the Giants earned eight playoff berths, highlighted by victories in Super Bowls XXI and XXV, and compiled an overall record of 155-139-2. He was named NFL Executive of the Year an unprecedented five times — 1984, 1986, 1990, 1993, and 1997. Young also served as chairman of the NFL's Competition Committee.

STEVE OWEN

Owen was a four-time All-NFL tackle who played for the Giants from 1926-31, plus a one-game return in 1933. He captained the 1927 team that won the NFL title and held its feet to a record-low total of 20 points. But Owen made his greatest imprint on the sideline, where he coached the Giants for 23 years. He was a co-coach with Benny Friedman in 1930, then assumed the full head coaching responsibility in 1931, a position he kept until 1953. Owen had a coaching record of 153-100-17 and won eight division and two NFL titles. The 153 victories are still the Giants record. Some of his coaching innovations included the A-formation offense, the umbrella defense and the two-platoon system. Owen was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1966.

JIM LEE HOWELL

Jim Lee Howell was the Giants' head coach from 1954-60. He quickly added two future Hall of Fame coaches to his staff, Vince Lombardi to lead the offense and Tom Landry, whom he converted from a player, to coach the defense. In Howell's seven seasons as head coach, the Giants played in three NFL Championship Games and defeated George Halas's Chicago Bears, 47-7, in 1956. Howell's regular season record was 53-27-4 record, a .630 winning percentage. He coached six future Pro Football Hall of Fame players in Huff, Robustelli, Brown, Tunnell, Gifford and Don Maynard. Howell stayed with the Giants as Director of Player Personnel until his retirement in 1981.

BILL PARCELLS

When Parcells began coaching the Giants in 1983, the team had finished with a winning record just once in the previous 10 seasons. Parcells led the Giants to the playoffs in his second and third seasons. In 1986, he coached one of the greatest teams in Giants history. That year, the Giants won their last 12 games and finished 17-2, including a 39-20 rout of the Denver Broncos in Super Bowl XXI. Four years later, Parcells led the Giants to a 20-19 victory over the favored Buffalo Bills in Super Bowl XXV. He left the team after that season with a 77-49-1 regular season record. The 77 victories are the second-most in team history, behind Owen's 153. Parcells holds the Giants' record with eight postseason wins.

MEL HEIN

Hein joined the Giants in 1931 and played 15 seasons, which ties him with Phil Simms and Michael Strahan for the second-longest tenure in franchise history, behind only Eli Manning's 16-year career. He was named All-NFL eight consecutive years from 1933-40. Following a successful college career at Washington State, Hein wrote to three NFL clubs offering his services. He joined the Giants after the team submitted the highest salary bid at \$150 per game. Hein was a 60-minute regular for 15 years, playing in 172 games. He never missed a game in high school or college and sat out just one in his NFL career — Nov. 30, 1933 vs. the Brooklyn Dodgers. Hein was named the league's Most Valuable Player in 1938 after anchoring a line that helped guide the Giants to the NFL Championship with a 23-17 victory over the Green Bay Packers in the Polo Grounds. Hein was a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame's inaugural class in 1963.

KEN STRONG

Strong played for the Giants from 1933-35, in 1939 and from 1944-47. He excelled in every phase of the game - blocking, running, passing, punting, placekicking and defense. At the time of his retirement, Strong was the Giants' career scoring leader with 324 points on 13 touchdowns, 35 field goals and 141 extra points. He scored 17 points to pace the Giants to the 1934 championship game over the Chicago Bears in the famous "Sneakers Game." Strong scored a league-high 64 points in 1933 and was All-NFL in 1934. He began his career with the Staten Island Stapletons in 1932. After four seasons, he joined the Giants. In 1936, he began a two-year stint in the rival AFL. Strong served as a place-kicking specialist only when he returned to the Giants from 1944 until 1947. He scored

479 points in his career. Strong was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1967.

TUFFY LEEMANS

Leemans played for the Giants from 1936-43. He was personally scouted by Wellington Mara and was a second-round draft choice in the inaugural NFL draft in 1936 out of George Washington. Mara sent a telegram setting up a meeting with Leemans to convince him to accept a career in the NFL with the Giants. Leemans was the 1936 College Football All-Star game MVP. He led NFL rushers as a rookie in 1936 with 830 yards on 206 attempts. Leemans was named All-NFL in 1936 and 1939. An aggressive, dedicated do-everything team leader, he totaled 3,142 yards rushing, 2,324 yards passing, 442 yards receiving and threw 16 touchdown passes during his career. He was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1978.

EMLÉN TUNNELL

Tunnell was signed by the Giants as a free agent out of Iowa in 1948 and played 11 seasons for the team. Ignored in the NFL draft, Tunnell walked into the Giants office and asked Tim Mara for a tryout. Tunnell was the first African-American player signed by the Giants. Fifty-two years after playing his last game for the team, he still holds Giants records with 74 interceptions and 261 punt returns. In 1952, Tunnell gained more yards (923) on interceptions and kickoff returns than the NFL rushing leader did running the ball. He earned the nickname "offense on defense." Tunnell was named All-NFL four times and played in nine Pro Bowls. Tunnell was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1967.

FRANK GIFFORD

A Pro Football Hall of Fame inductee in 1977, Gifford played for the Giants from 1952-64, although he voluntarily retired in 1961 due to a serious injury suffered the previous season. He was known as one of the most versatile backs in NFL history. Gifford was the first choice in the draft by the Giants in 1952 after an All-America career at Southern California. He totaled 9,862 combined yards during his career. He rushed for 3,609 yards, caught 367 passes and scored 484 points. Gifford was named to the Pro Bowl as a defensive back in 1953 and as an offensive back the following year - a first in NFL history. He played in seven Pro Bowls and was named All-NFL four times and NFL Player of the Year in 1956. Gifford holds the Giants record with 78 touchdowns. A true triple-threat back, Gifford threw 14 touchdown passes in 60 attempts on the halfback option. He retired after the 1960 season and returned in 1962 at a new position, flanker. The Giants reached the NFL Championship game five times during his career, including their victory in 1956.

ROSIE BROWN

Roosevelt Brown played for the Giants from 1953 through 1965 after joining the team as a 27th round draft choice, regarded as one of the greatest "sleeper" picks of all time. Brown held the starting tackle spot for 13 straight seasons. During that period, he was named to the Pro Bowl nine times and was selected All-NFL eight consecutive seasons. In 1956, when the Giants won the league title, Brown was named Lineman of the Year by the Associated Press. Brown was a big, strong blocker who had the speed to make a block downfield. He was also used along the defensive front on goal-line stands. Brown helped the Giants advance to the NFL Championship game in 1956, 1958, 1959, 1961, 1962 and 1963. After his playing career, Brown continued his Giants affiliation as a coach before being appointed as a scout, a position he held from 1971 until his death in 2004. He was immediately named assistant line coach by the Giants after a phlebitis condition forced him to retire in 1966. Brown was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1975.

SAM HUFF

Huff became an immediate star at middle linebacker after he was drafted by the Giants in the third round in 1956 following an All-America career at West Virginia. He played in five Pro Bowls and was named All-NFL four times. Huff won recognition for his great individual efforts against the premier running backs of his era, including Jim Brown of Cleveland, Rick Casares of Chicago and Alan Ameche of Baltimore. He was named the NFL's Outstanding Lineman in 1959. Huff anchored a defense that helped the Giants reach the championship game in 1956, 1958, 1959, 1961, 1962 and 1963. He was traded to the Washington Redskins prior to the 1964 season and has been a color analyst on the Redskins radio broadcasts for many years. Huff was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1982.

ANDY ROBUSTELLI

Robustelli was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams in 1951 and played on two Rams championship teams. In 1956, Wellington Mara traded for Robustelli, who provided a tremendous lift in the Giants' title drive that season. Robustelli, who stayed with the Giants through the 1964 season, played on a winning team in 13 of his 14 pro seasons. He played in eight NFL championship title games and seven Pro Bowls. Robustelli was named All-NFL seven times, two with the Rams and five with the Giants. Robustelli was a durable player who missed only one game in his 14-year career. He was the Giants' general manager prior to George Young. He was a 1971 Pro Football Hall of Fame inductee.

Y.A. TITTLE

The Giants engineered one of the best trades in their long history prior to the 1961 season when they sent guard Lou Cordileone to the San Francisco 49ers for Tittle. The then 35-year old Tittle promptly led the Giants to their 12th Eastern Division championship. Tittle played two seasons in the All-American Conference and 11 in the NFL before joining the Giants. In 1962, Tittle set an NFL record by throwing 33 touchdown passes and tied another mark with seven scoring throws in one game. Tittle had his greatest year as a pro in 1963, when he led the league in passing with 221 completions in 367 attempts for 3,145 yards. His 36 touchdown passes broke his own league mark and set a Giants record that still stands. Tittle's career totals include 2,427 completions, 33,070 yards, 242 touchdowns and 13 games with more than 300 yards passing. He was the NFL Player of the Year in 1957, when he led the 49ers to a tie for the Western Division title, and won the honor again in 1961 and 1963, as he took the Giants to Eastern championships. Tittle was named All-NFL in 1957, 1962 and 1963, and also played in six Pro Bowls. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1971.

HARRY CARSON

Carson played his entire career with the Giants from 1976-88. An inside linebacker, he was selected to play in nine Pro Bowls, including seven in a row from 1982-88. Carson led the Giants in tackles six times, was a two-time All-NFL first team selection and was the sole captain of the 1986 Super Bowl champions. Carson joined the Giants as a fourth-round draft choice from South Carolina State, where he never missed a game in four seasons, was a two-year captain and a Little All-America selection by the Associated Press. A defensive end in college, Carson successfully moved to linebacker with the Giants so quickly and so successfully that he was voted to the NFL All-Rookie team. Carson played 173 games in a Giants uniform — tying him with Keith Hamilton for seventh all-time — and he was a punishing run defender who also intercepted 11 passes. Carson had 17 sacks, 14 fumble recoveries and seven forced fumbles. He had 25 tackles (20 solo) in a Monday night game against Green Bay in 1982 and seven tackles in the Giants' 39-20 victory over Denver in Super Bowl XXI. During his prime, Carson was the best run-stopping linebacker in the NFL. In the seven seasons from 1981 to 1987, Giants' opponents averaged only 3.59 yards per rushing attempt, a remarkable achievement for so long a period. During that period, Carson was credited with 856 tackles, including 627 unassisted tackles. He was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2006.

LAWRENCE TAYLOR

Taylor joined the Giants as the second overall selection of the 1981 NFL Draft and played his entire 13-year career for the team. When Taylor retired, he was the NFL's No. 2 all-time sack leader in the NFL with 132.5. That total does not include the 9.5 he accumulated as a rookie in 1981 before the sack was an official NFL statistic. Taylor established an NFL record by appearing in 10 consecutive Pro Bowls from 1981-1990. He was named the NFL Rookie of the Year in 1981 and the NFC's Defensive Player of the Week nine times (the award was established in 1984), as well as the conference's Defensive Player of the Month twice, in October 1986 and September 1989. Taylor was a unanimous choice to the NFL's All-1980s team. He was a unanimous selection as the NFL's Most Valuable Player in 1986, when he had a career-high 20.5 sacks, 105 tackles, five passes defended and two forced fumbles. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1999.

AL BLOZIS

Al Blozis played just three seasons for the Giants, 1942-44. He immediately made a favorable impression on the team after arriving in 1942 and quickly earned a starting assignment at tackle. Blozis played in the 1944 championship game against Green Bay. Immediately after the Giants' loss to the Packers, Blozis was sent overseas to fight in World War II. An Army lieutenant, he was killed in action in France just six weeks later.

The Giants retired Blozis' No. 32 jersey.

CHARLIE CONERLY

Conerly is often called the best Giants player not in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. He played his entire career with the Giants from 1948-61 and was a vital member of the 1956 NFL Championship team. Conerly was the NFL Rookie of the Year in 1948, the league's Most Valuable Player in 1959 and a Pro Bowler in 1950 and '56. Conerly ranks third in franchise history in pass attempts (2,833), fourth in completions (1,418), third in yards (19,488) and third in touchdown passes (173).

DICK LYNCH

Lynch was traded to the Giants by the Washington Redskins following the 1958 season for a 1960 fourth-round draft choice. He played for the Giants from 1959-66, a period in which the team played in four NFL Championship Games. Lynch played in 97 regular season games for the Giants (109 in his career) and intercepted 35 passes. In both 1961 and 1963, he led the NFL with nine interceptions. In '63, he also led the league with 251 return yards and three touchdowns. Lynch scored seven career touchdowns, four on interception returns and three on fumble returns.

Although he had a great playing career, Lynch is best known to legions of Giants fans for his 40 years as the analyst on the team's radio broadcast. His last game in the booth was the Giants' epic Super Bowl XLII victory over New England. Lynch died nine months later. "Dick was such an important part of our organization for so many years that we really considered him part of the family," John Mara said.

JOE MORRISON

Morrison was a back and an end for the Giants from 1959 through 1972. A dominant figure during his 14-year career, he totaled 2,472 rushing yards and 18 touchdowns. He also caught 395 passes — the third-highest total in franchise history - for 4,993 yards and 47 scores. A versatile player, Morrison played six different positions: fullback, halfback, flanker, tight end, split end and defensive back. Morrison's No. 40 jersey has been retired by the franchise.

PETE GOGOLAK

Gogolak played for the Giants from 1966-74 and is the highest-scoring player in the history of the franchise with 646 points — 120 more than runner-up Brad Daluiso. He also owns the franchise records for field goals (126) and extra points (268). Beyond his prowess as a kicker, Gogolak is a significant figure in the history of pro football. When he moved from the Buffalo Bills to the Giants, Gogolak became the first prominent player to leave the upstart American Football League for the NFL. Wellington Mara signed him after watching rookie Bob Timberlake miss 13 consecutive field goal attempts. Gogolak was also pro football's first soccer style kicker. Prior to Gogolak, placekickers approached the ball straight on, with the toe making first contact with the ball. Gogolak, who was born and played soccer in Hungary, approached the ball at an angle and kicked it with his instep — the style all kickers use today.

GEORGE MARTIN

Martin joined the Giants as an 11th-round draft choice in 1975, the 262nd overall pick. A long shot to survive his first training camp, Martin stayed with the Giants for his entire 14-year career. He played in 201 regular season games to become one of just three players in team history to cross the 200-games barrier (Strahan played in 216 games and Howard Cross played in 207). Martin was a leader and catalyst on the 1986 Super Bowl champions (he sacked John Elway for a safety in Super Bowl XXI). He had a knack for making the big play, scoring six touchdowns, a record for NFL defensive linemen since broken by Miami's Jason Taylor. Martin also caught a touchdown pass when he lined up as a tight end in 1980. He is perhaps happiest that he is joining his close friend Carson in the Ring of Honor.

PHIL SIMMS

Simms was George Young's first draft choice in 1979 and he played his entire 15-year with the Giants. He overcame a series of injuries early in his career to become the most productive quarterback in team history. Simms holds the Giants career records for pass attempts (4,647), completions (2,576), yards (33,462) and touchdowns (199). He was 95-64 (.597) as a regular season starter and 6-4 in the playoffs. But Simms is best remembered for his almost flawless performance in leading the Giants to victory in Super Bowl XXI. He completed 22 of 25 passes — including all 10 of his throws in the second half — for 268 yards,

three touchdowns and no interceptions in a 39-20 rout of the Denver Broncos. In one of the easiest votes in history, he was selected the game's Most Valuable Player.

MICHAEL STRAHAN

Few players in Giants history were as dependable and productive as Strahan. He seldom missed a practice and played in a franchise-record 216 regular season games. Beginning in 1996, he played in 136 consecutive games before tearing his pectoral muscle midway through the 2004 season. Strahan was selected to seven Pro Bowls, was named the 2001 NFL Defensive Player of the Year and was the Giants' Most Valuable Player that year and in 1998. He was a captain on the 2007 Super Bowl championship team. His 141.5 sacks are the highest official total in team history (Taylor had 142.0 but 9.5 as a rookie in 1981, the year before sacks became an official statistic) and the fifth-highest total in NFL history. He set the league's single-season sack record with 22.5 in 2001 and his NFL-best 18.5 sacks in 2003 made him the Giants' only two-time league leader in that category. Strahan's 868 tackles indicates he was also an excellent defender against the run.

JESSIE ARMSTEAD

Armstead, a five-time Pro Bowler, was the 207th player chosen in the 1993 draft, and the last of the Giants' seven selections (the first-round pick had been used on quarterback Dave Brown in the previous year's supplemental draft). Three of the seven players taken were linebackers: Marcus Buckley (No. 66) and Tommy Thigpen (No. 123), who never did much, and Armstead, who did it all. Armstead's draft was the last that had an eighth round. He was a special teams dynamo and top-flight reserve his first three seasons before becoming the starting weakside linebacker in 1996. Armstead had a team-high 114 tackles, the first of five consecutive seasons with more than 100. The next year, he had a career-best 134 stops, was selected to his first Pro Bowl and was a catalyst as the Giants won the NFC East title. In 2000 he had one of his best seasons and the Giants routed Minnesota, 41-0, in the NFC Championship Game.

AMANI TOOMER

Toomer joined the Giants in 1996 as a second-round draft choice from Michigan and played his entire 13-year career with the team. He played in 190 regular season games, the fourth-highest total in Giants history. He also played in 11 postseason games, scoring two touchdowns in the Giants' victory over the Cowboys in a 2007 NFC Divisional Playoff Game and finishing with a team-high six receptions in the Super Bowl XLII triumph over New England. Toomer holds franchise records for catches (668), receiving yards (9,497), touchdown catches (54) and 100-yard receiving games (22). He finished his career with 82 more receptions than runner-up Barber (586) and 4,063 more yards than former record-holder Gifford (5,434). Toomer caught at least one pass in a Giants-record 98 consecutive games before the streak ended in the 2005 season opener vs. Arizona. He holds the Giants' single-season record with 1,343 receiving yards in 2002. Toomer had the three highest single-season receptions totals in team history until Steve Smith shattered his former mark of 82 with 107 catches last year. Toomer also holds the Giants postseason records for receptions (44), yards (608) and touchdowns (seven). No one else in Giants playoff history has more than three postseason touchdown catches. In addition, Toomer is second in Giants history with 10,924 total yards (Barber is first with 17,359). His total includes 1,060 yards on punt returns, 257 yards on kickoff returns and 110 yards rushing.

TIKI BARBER

Barber joined the Giants as a second-round draft choice in 1997. When he retired following his 10th season in 2006, his name was all over the franchise's record book. Barber owns the Giants marks for rushing attempts in a career (2,217) and in a season (357 in 2005) and rushing yards in a career (10,440), a season (1,860 in 2005) and a game (234 at Washington on Dec. 20, 2006 in his final regular season game). Barber has the top three and four of the top five single-season rushing totals in Giants history and the two highest game totals. His 38 100-yard games are twice as many as No. 2 Joe Morris and his nine 100-yard games in 2004 is another record. Barber has the longest run from scrimmage in Giants history (95 yards at Oakland on Dec. 31, 2005) and his 55 rushing touchdowns are another one of his records. Barber's 17,359 all-purpose yards give him another record. He owns the Giants' top five single-season total yardage figures. Another one of his records is 13 catches at Dallas on Jan. 2, 2000. Barber is also second in franchise history with 586 career receptions. He was selected to three Pro Bowls (2004-06).

CLASS OF 2011

ALEX WEBSTER

Webster played his entire 10-year career (1955-64) for the Giants. He played in 109 games and 47 years after his retirement, he is fourth on the Giants' career lists with 4,638 rushing yards and 1,196 carries. He also caught 240 passes for 2,679 yards and scored 56 touchdowns (39 rushing, 17 receiving). Webster was the second-leading rusher and scorer and the third-leading receiver for the 1956 NFL champion Giants. He was selected to the Pro Bowl in 1958 and 1961, when he ran for a career-high 928 yards. Webster was the Giants' head coach from 1969-73. Webster passed away on March 3, 2012, just three months after being inducted into the Ring of Honor.

BRAD VAN PELT

Van Pelt played for the Giants from 1973-83, when the team had only one winning record, but he was one of the team's very best players. Van Pelt joined Carson, Brian Kelley and later Lawrence Taylor to form the famed group of linebackers known as the "Crunch Bunch." He was selected to play in the Pro Bowl every season from 1976-80. Van Pelt played in 143 games for the Giants in four home stadiums - Yankee Stadium, Yale Bowl, Shea Stadium and Giants Stadium - and for five head coaches - Bill Arnsparger, John McVay, Ray Perkins and Bill Parcells. He had 16 interceptions for the Giants. Van Pelt died on Feb. 17, 2009.

CARL BANKS

Banks was the third overall selection of the 1984 NFL Draft and played for the Giants through the 1992 season. He was one of the premier run-stoppers of his era, a standout on the teams that won Super Bowls XXI and XXV, a Pro Bowler in 1987 and a member of the NFL 1980's All-Decade Team. Banks played in 126 regular season games and had 36.0 sacks, three interceptions and approximately 500 tackles. Banks is still closely affiliated with the Giants; since 2007, he has been an analyst on the Giants' radio broadcasts.

MARK BAVARO

Bavaro is one of the finest all-around tight ends in Giants history. An outstanding blocker, he is also 10th on the franchise's career list with 266 receptions and 15th with 3,722 yards. Bavaro was a starter on the Giants' 1986 and 1990 Super Bowl championship teams and a Pro Bowler in 1986 and '87. In the Giants' first Super Bowl season, Bavaro led the team with 66 catches - twice as many as any teammate - for 1,001 yards to become the only tight end in Giants history with 1,000 receiving yards in a season.

DAVE JENNINGS

Jennings is the most prolific punter in Giants history. A member of the team from 1974-84, Jennings holds the franchise records for punts (931) and yards (38,792). He was selected to play in the Pro Bowl in 1978, '79, '80 and '82. He punted a career-high 104 times in 1979, twice punted for more than 4,000 yards in a season and had a career-best 44.8-yard average in 1980.

CLASS OF 2015

CHRIS SNEE

Snee joined the Giants as a second-round draft choice in 2004 from Boston College. That preseason, he became the starter at right guard and stayed in that position for 10 years. Snee was a two-time Super Bowl champion, a four-time Pro Bowler and an All-Pro in 2010. He started all 141 regular-season games and 11 postseason games in which he played. From 2005-11, he started 101 consecutive regular-season games (plus seven postseason games) before missing a game with a concussion. Snee missed only 19 games in his 10 seasons, including 13 in 2013, his final year.

OSI UMENYIORA

Umenyiora was a member of the Giants Super Bowl XLII and XLVI championship teams. A second-round draft choice in 2003, he played 10 seasons for the Giants. Umenyiora was selected to two Pro Bowls and is fourth on the franchise's career list with 75.0 regular-season sacks. XLVI. He was the only member of the 2007 world champions to play in the Pro Bowl. That season, the Giants had an NFL-high 53 sacks, thanks largely to their three outstanding defensive ends. Umenyiora led the way with 13.0. Tuck, another two-time Pro Bowler, had 10.0, and Strahan had 9.0 in his final season. On Sept. 23, 2007,

Umenyiora set the Giants' single-game franchise record with 6.0 sacks of Philadelphia's Donovan McNabb in Giants Stadium. In 10 postseason games, Umenyiora had 5.5 sacks, tying him with Tuck for fourth on that franchise list.

JOHN JOHNSON

Johnson joined the team as an athletic trainer in 1948. He retired at age 90 following the 2007 season, ending a remarkable 60-year career with the franchise. Johnson was on the Giants' sideline for 874 regular-season and 34 postseason games, and he attended thousands of practices. Johnson worked with 12 head coaches, from Steve Owen to Tom Coughlin, and helped keep the Giants running through those 908 games. Generations of players revered Johnson for his wisdom, his friendship and his unique ability to perfectly tape an ankle. Johnson passed away on Feb. 28, 2016, a month shy of his 99th birthday.

JACK LUMMUS

Lummus' entire Giants career consisted of nine games in 1941. He was a 6-3, 200-pound two-way end who that season caught one five-yard pass for a Giants team that finished 8-3 before losing to the Bears in the NFL Championship Game on Dec. 21, two weeks after the attack on Pearl Harbor. On Jan. 30, 1942, with the United States fully engaged in World War II, Lummus gave up his football career to enlist in the Marine Corps Reserves. He was killed in the Battle of Iwo Jima in 1945. He becomes the second member of the Ring of Honor who was killed in a World War II battle. Al Blozis, an Army lieutenant, lost his life in combat in France just six weeks after he played in the 1944 NFL Championship Game vs. Green Bay.

CLASS OF 2016

TOM COUGHLIN

Coughlin was the Giants' head coach from 2004-15. His signature achievements were the Giants' victories against the New England Patriots in Super Bowls XLII and XLVI. Coughlin was just the second man to coach the Giants for at least 12 seasons. Only Hall of Famer Steve Owen, who reigned for 23 full seasons from 1931-53, led the team for a longer time period. With the Giants, Coughlin was 102-90 in the regular season, and 8-3 in the postseason. The 102 victories are second in franchise history to Owen's 151. Coughlin led the Giants to three NFC East titles and five playoff berths. His eight postseason triumphs tie him with Bill Parcells for the most ever by a Giants coach. Coughlin was the team's wide receivers coach from 1988-90, a tenure that ended with the team's victory in Super Bowl XXV.

ERNIE ACCORSI

Accorsi was the Giants' general manager from 1998-2006 after serving as an assistant under George Young for four seasons. In Accorsi's nine years as G.M., the Giants won two NFC East titles, earned four postseason berths, and advanced to Super Bowl XXXV. He was instrumental in hiring two-time Super Bowl-winning coach Tom Coughlin. Accorsi made the most significant trade in Giants history when he acquired Eli Manning in a draft day deal in 2004. Manning led the Giants to a pair of Super Bowl victories and is without peer among quarterbacks in Giants history. Accorsi also brought in several other key players to the team that won Super Bowl XLII, including Antonio Pierce, Osi Umenyiora, and Plaxico Burress.

JUSTIN TUCK

A third-round draft choice from Notre Dame in 2005, Tuck played in 127 regular-season games with 90 starts in nine Giants seasons. He was a defensive catalyst on the teams that won Super Bowl XLII and Super Bowl XLVI, a two-time Pro Bowler, and four-time team captain. Tuck was credited with more than 500 tackles. His 60.5 sacks are officially the sixth-highest total in franchise history. Tuck also played in 10 postseason games. He had 5.5 sacks, including two sacks of Tom Brady in each of the Super Bowl victories, when a dominant defensive line was one of the vital components of the Giants' success.

CLASS OF 2021

ELI MANNING

Manning played his entire career for the Giants after the San Diego Chargers selected

him first overall in the 2004 NFL Draft and then traded him to the Giants. He played 16 seasons and in 248 regular season and postseason games, both franchise records. From his first start vs. Atlanta on Nov. 21, 2004 through Nov. 23, 2017, Manning started 210 consecutive regular-season games, then the second-longest streak by a quarterback in NFL history. After sitting out one game, he started the next 22 in a row, giving him 232 starts in 233 games — plus 12 postseason games. Manning never missed a game because of injury. He was the most valuable player in the Giants' victories against New England in Super Bowls XLII and XLVI. Manning was a four-time Pro Bowler. His Giants records include 8,199 passes, 4,895 completions, 57,013 passing yards, and 366 touchdowns in the regular season and 400 throws, 242 completions, 2,815 yards and 18 scores in the postseason.

CLASS OF 2022

JOE MORRIS

Morris joined the Giants as a second-round draft choice from Syracuse in 1982. He is third in Giants history with 5,296 rushing yards and 1,318 carries, fourth with 48 rushing touchdowns and second with 19 100-yard games. He holds the single-season franchise record with 21 touchdowns in 1985 (four more than anyone else has had in a season). Morris has the fourth and sixth-highest single-season rushing totals in Giants history, with 1,516 yards in the 1986 championship season and 1,336 yards in 1985. Morris also caught 98 passes for 884 yards and two touchdowns and played in two Pro Bowls. He is the Giants' postseason leader with 140 carries, 550 yards and four touchdowns (tied with Brandon Jacobs). In 1986, the Giants were 5-2 when they came home to play Washington on a Monday night and then Dallas. Morris rushed for 181 yards and two touchdowns in each game (27-20 and 17-14 victories) and the Giants never lost again that season.

OTTIS ANDERSON

Anderson joined the Giants in a trade with the St. Louis Cardinals on Oct. 8, 1986. He played on the Giants' Super Bowl XXI and XXV championship teams and was voted the MVP of Super Bowl XXV after rushing for 102 yards and a touchdown in the 20-19 victory against the Buffalo Bills. Anderson is one of only four running backs in NFL history to score rushing touchdowns in two Super Bowls and win Super Bowl MVP, joining Franco Harris, John Riggins and Emmitt Smith. In 83 regular-season games with the Giants, Anderson had 704 rushing attempts for 2,274 yards and 35 touchdowns (the sixth-highest total in franchise history). He added 77 receptions for 567 yards. Anderson became the team's primary back in 1989 and was named the NFL Comeback Player of the Year after scoring a career-high 14 touchdowns while running for 1,023 yards on 325 carries.

RODNEY HAMPTON

Hampton was the Giants' first-round draft choice in 1990 and played his entire eight-year career for them. He is second in franchise history with 6,897 rushing yards and 1,824 carries. Hampton had five consecutive 1,000-yard seasons (1991-95) and is third with 17 100-yard games and 49 rushing touchdowns. He is one of eight players in Giants history with at least 3,000 rushing yards and 100 receptions and one of eight with 3,000 rushing yards and 1,000 receiving yards. Hampton played in three postseason games, amassing 194 rushing yards, eight catches and two touchdowns. In a wild card victory against Minnesota on Jan. 9, 1994, Hampton carried 33 times for 161 yards, matching the Giants' postseason records set by Rob Carpenter in 1981. Hampton's 51-yard run in that game is the longest in Giants playoff history.

LEONARD MARSHALL

Marshall joined the Giants as a second-round draft choice out of LSU in 1983 and played in 149 regular-season games and 11 postseason games for the team. He played on the Giants' Super Bowl XXI and XXV title teams and was a Pro Bowler in 1985-86, when he totaled 27.5 sacks. Marshall was credited with 660 tackles (388 solo). His 79.5 career regular-season sacks place him third in franchise history, behind two Pro Football Hall of Famers: Michael Strahan (141.5) and Lawrence Taylor (132.5, not counting Taylor's 9.5 sacks as a rookie in 1981, the year before they became an official stat). In 11 postseason games, Marshall recorded 7.0 sacks, which is second in Giants history after Strahan's 9.5. Taylor had 6.5 postseason sacks. Marshall collected 3.0 sacks in both the 1986 and 1990 postseasons, when the Giants won the Super Bowl.

JIMMY PATTON

Patton was an eighth-round draft choice in 1955 who went on to become one of the great defensive backs in franchise history. He played on the 1956 championship team and on teams that advanced to the title game in 1958, '59 and '61-63. Patton was a five-time first-team All-Pro (1958-62), a second-team All-Pro in 1963, and a five-time Pro Bowler (1958-62). His 52 interceptions are second in Giants history, 11 more than No. 3 Spider Lockhart. Patton led the NFL with 11 interceptions in 1958, which ties Otto Schelbacher (1951) for the franchise single-season record. His 712 yards on interception returns are second in Giants history to Emlen Tunnell's 1,240. Patton also recovered 15 fumbles and returned 37 punts and 28 kickoffs, scoring once on each.

KYLE ROTE

Rote was the first overall selection in the 1951 NFL Draft. He played on the 1956 championship team and in the 1958, '59 and '61 title games. Rote played two years at running back before switching to wide receiver because of a knee injury. He was selected to four Pro Bowls (1953-56) and was a two-time second-team All-Pro (1956 and 1960). Rote is second in Giants history with 48 touchdown receptions, 13th with 300 catches and seventh with 4,797 receiving yards (he was the franchise leader in all three categories when he retired). He also rushed for 871 yards and four scores before switching from running back to wide receiver. Rote was the Giants' backfield coach in 1962-63 before beginning a long career in broadcasting.

RONNIE BARNES

Barnes has been with the Giants organization since 1976 and the team's head athletic trainer since 1980. He was promoted to the position of Vice President of Medical Services in 2003 and to Senior Vice President in 2011. During his 47 seasons with the team, Barnes has treated, counseled and befriended hundreds of players, coaches and staffers. One of the most respected athletic trainers in professional sports, Barnes was elected to the National Athletic Trainers Association Hall of Fame in June 1999. In 2002, he was voted the Athletic Trainer of the Year by NFL physicians. That same year, his alma mater, East Carolina University, honored Barnes for his many contributions to the school by opening the Ronnie Barnes African American Resource Center at the school's Joyner Library. Barnes was the first African American graduate of the Sports Medicine Department at ECU. He has since been elected to the East Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame and been named a winner of the Outstanding Alumni Award. In January 2019, Barnes was presented with a lifetime achievement award by the Fritz Pollard Alliance, a foundation which promotes diversity and minority hiring throughout the NFL. Barnes was inducted into the North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame in 2022.

The Giants' season ended with a shocking and heartbreaking defeat as they wasted a 38-14 third-quarter lead and fell to the 49ers. Four touchdown passes by Kerry Collins — three to Amani Toomer and one to Jeremy Shockey — a touchdown run by Tiki Barber and Matt Bryant's field goal gave the Giants what seemed to be a commanding 24-point lead with 4:27 left in the third quarter. But the 49ers mounted a quick and complete comeback. Terrell Owens caught a 26-yard touchdown pass from Jeff Garcia, who then ran 14 yards for another score. Jeff Chandler's 25-yard field goal pulled San Francisco to within 38-33. With 1:00 remaining, Garcia threw a 13-yard touchdown pass to Tai Streets. The 2-point conversion attempt failed, but the Niners had a 1-point lead. The Giants had a chance to pull the game out. After Delvin Joyce's 32-yard kickoff return, the Giants drove from their own 48-yard line to the San Francisco 23. Matt Bryant lined up for what could have been the game-winning 41-yard field goal. But Trey Junkin's snap was low and wide. Holder Matt Allen took off and threw a desperation pass toward Rich Seubert, a guard who was an eligible receiver on the play. Seubert was interfered with by Chike Okefor, but the officials did not throw a flag and the game ended as a huge disappointment for the Giants.

The Giants lost a playoff game in Giants Stadium for just the third time when they fell to the Carolina Panthers, 23-0. Carolina dominated the game, holding big advantages in offensive plays (71-35), time of possession (42:45-17:15), first downs (23-9), total yards (335-132) and rushing yards (223-41). The Giants hurt themselves with five turnovers, including three Eli Manning interceptions on consecutive possessions in the second half (two by Marlon McCree and one by Ken Lucas). Manning also fumbled late in the game. The Giants converted just one of seven third-down opportunities. Steve Smith caught a touchdown pass and ran in for another score and John Kasay kicked three field goals for the Panthers. DeShaun Foster rushed for 151 yards on 27 carries, a 5.6-yard average that was reflective of the Giants' tackling difficulties throughout the game. Jake Delhomme completed 15 of 22 passes for 140 yards. Smith had 10 of those receptions. For the Giants, Tiki Barber rushed for 41 yards, or 75 yards less than his regular season average. Manning completed 10 of 18 passes for 113 yards and was sacked four times. Jeremy Shockey, Amani Toomer and Barber had three catches apiece. Smith scored the game's first points on a 22-yard touchdown reception. Later in the second quarter, a Carolina punt bounced off Gibril Wilson's leg and was recovered by the Panthers, setting up Kasay's 21-yard field goal. Smith scored on a 12-yard reverse immediately following Manning's first interception and Kasay added two fourth-quarter field goals.

David Akers' 38-yard field goal as time expired sent the Giants to a second Wild Card game defeat in as many seasons, 23-20, to the Eagles in Philadelphia. The Giants overcame a 10-point fourth-quarter deficit to tie the score, but couldn't prevent the Eagles from driving 46 yards in the final 5:04 for the game-winning score. Tiki Barber rushed for 137 yards in his final NFL game, Eli Manning completed 16 of 27 passes for 161 yards and Plaxico Burress had two touchdown receptions. The Giants also got a pair of field goals from Jay Feely. The Eagles scored on a 49-yard touchdown run by Brian Westbrook, Jeff Garcia's 28-yard touchdown pass to Donte Stallworth and three Akers field goals. Akers' 48-yard field goal — the longest in Philadelphia postseason history — increased the Eagles' advantage to 20-10 with 2:37 remaining in the third quarter. Feely's 24-yard field goal pulled the Giants to within 20-13 just 10 seconds into

the fourth quarter. They tied the game at 20-20 when Eli Manning found Burress in the end zone for an 11-yard touchdown pass with 5:04 remaining. Burress' second touchdown capped a 13-play, 80-yard drive in the rain that took 7:09 to complete. The Giants needed a stop so they could get the ball back and try to win a game. But they never owed the ball again. Westbrook's 13-yard run gave Philly a first down on the Giants' 19-yard line with 1:48 remaining. From there, the Eagles bled the clock until they called timeout with three seconds left. Akers then booted the game-winner.

Before the Giants opened postseason play in an NFC Wild Card Game at Tampa Bay, Tom Coughlin had a simple message for his players: "Let's keep playing." So they did. Carrying their season-long road success into the playoffs, the Giants prevailed, 24-14, over the NFC South champion Buccaneers. They broke a four-game postseason losing streak that began in Super Bowl XXXV — in Raymond James Stadium, the home of the Bucs. The Giants also won their first playoff road game since the 1990 NFC Championship Game in San Francisco. They defeated Bucs quarterback Jeff Garcia, who had beaten them in the playoffs with the 49ers in 2002 and Philadelphia in 2006. Brandon Jacobs scored two touchdowns for the Giants, one on a five-yard reception, the other on an eight-yard run. Jacobs became the first Giants player in history with a rushing and receiving touchdown in the same postseason game. Amani Toomer caught a touchdown pass and Lawrence Tynes kicked a 25-yard field goal for the Giants. Eli Manning completed 20 of 27 passes for 185 yards, the two touchdowns and no interceptions as the Giants won a postseason game for the first time with him taking the snaps. The Giants entered the game with a minus-nine turnover differential, or minus-24 relative to the Bucs' plus-15. Yet they had three takeaways to none for the Bucs. The first, a fumble recovery by Corey Webster on the second-half kickoff, led to Tynes' field goal. The second, a Webster interception in the end zone, likely denied the Bucs points. The third, a pick by R.W. McQuarters with 1:53 remaining, sealed the deal. The Giants played without center Shaun O'Hara (knee) and cornerback Sam Madison (abdominal). But Grey Ruegamer and Webster filled in superbly (the corner holding Joey Galloway to one nine-yard reception). They were among a large cast of key contributors. Toomer had a game-high seven catches for 74 yards. Rookie Ahmad Bradshaw came off the bench to rush for a game-high 66 yards. Michael Strahan had a career postseason high of nine tackles (eight solo). Gerris Wilkinson, who started for Kawika Mitchell (knee) had seven tackles (five solo). Tank Daniels had two special teams tackles and forced the fumble that Webster recovered. Zak DeOssie also had two special teams tackles. The offensive line allowed only one sack. Tampa Bay took an early lead on Earnest Graham's one-yard run, but Jacobs' two touchdowns gave the Giants a 14-7 halftime advantage. The first score successfully concluded an eight-play, 53-yard drive that took 4:04 to complete. Manning completed five passes for 49 yards in the series. Toomer accounted for 40 yards on three catches. On their next series, the Giants drove 65 yards in seven plays. The biggest play of the series was Manning's 21-yard pass to Steve Smith on third-and-two. Tynes' field goal and Toomer's touchdown midway through the fourth quarter extended the Giants' lead to 24-7 before Tampa Bay added a late score. Toomer scored at the end of a 15-play, 92-yard drive that featured 38 yards rushing by Bradshaw and three Toomer receptions for 27 yards.

The Giants avenged their only road defeat of the season, a 45-35 opening-night loss, with a 21-17 victory over the top-seeded Dallas Cowboys in an NFC Divisional Playoff Game in Texas Stadium. The Cowboys had defeated the Giants twice in the regular season. The Giants became the first team to beat the NFC's No. 1 seed in the divisional round since the current postseason format (six teams from each conference) was adopted in 1990. Amani Toomer scored a pair of touchdowns on receptions of 52 and four yards from Eli Manning. Brandon Jacobs' one-yard touchdown run with 13:29 remaining provided the Giants with the game-winning points. But the victory was not assured until R.W. McQuarters intercepted Tony Romo's pass for Terry Glenn in the end zone with nine seconds remaining. It was the game's only takeaway. Manning had a career-high 132.4 passer rating after completing 12 of 18 passes for 163 yards, the two scores to Toomer and no interceptions. The Giants played with a severely depleted secondary. Sam Madison (stomach) and Kevin Dockery (hip flexor) were inactive. A third cornerback, Aaron Ross, left the game for good in the third quarter with a shoulder injury. That left Corey Webster, McQuarters and Geoffrey Pope — who spent the entire regular season on the practice squad before joining on the active roster on Dec. 31 — as the only healthy corners. All played extensively in the second half. The secondary, aided by a relentless second-half pass rush, stayed strong throughout the game. The Cowboys scored on Tony Romo's five-yard touchdown pass to Terrell Owens and Marion Barber's one-yard run in the second quarter and Nick Folk's 34-yard field goal in the third. Romo completed 18 of 36 passes for 201 yards and his 64.7 rating was less than half of Manning's. Toomer turned a short Manning pass into a 52-yard touchdown on the Giants' fifth offensive play. After Dallas took a 14-7 lead, Manning led the Giants on a 71-yard drive in the final minute of the half that ended with a four-yard scoring pass to Toomer and a 14-14 halftime tie. Folk gave the Cowboys a 17-14 lead before Jacobs' touchdown on the third play of the fourth quarter gave the Giants the lead for good. But the Cowboys had one last chance when they took possession at the Giants' 48-yard line with 1:50 remaining. Dallas soon faced second-and-11 at the 23. Two incomplete passes left them staring at a fourth down with the seasons of both teams hanging in the balance. Owens was double covered, so Romo threw to the center of the end zone for Terry Glenn. But McQuarters stepped up and picked off the pass, sending the Giants to the NFC Championship Game.

The coldest game in Giants history was also one of the most memorable and satisfying the franchise has ever played. The Giants overcame the elements — and the Packers — to defeat Green Bay in overtime, 23-20, in the NFC Championship Game in frigid Lambeau Field. Lawrence Tynes provided the game-winning points when he kicked a 47-yard field goal with 2:35 elapsed in overtime. Tynes had missed his previous two attempts, including one on the final play of regulation. It was the first time in the history of Lambeau that a visiting player had kicked a field goal of more than 40 yards in a postseason game. The score was set up by Corey Webster's interception on the second play of overtime. The temperature at game time was minus-one degree with winds of 12 miles-an-hour — a numbing wind chill of minus-23. In terms of temperature alone, this was the third-coldest NFL game on record. At the famed Ice Bowl between the Packers and Dallas Cowboys in Lambeau on Dec. 31, 1967, it was 13 below zero at kickoff. In the 1981 Chargers-Bengals AFC Championship Game in Cincinnati, it was nine below. Brandon Jacobs (one-yard run) and Ahmad Bradshaw (four-yard run) scored touchdowns and Tynes added a 29-yard field goal for the Giants. Eli Manning set career postseason highs with 40 passes, 21 completions and 251 yards. Plaxico Burress established a franchise postseason record with 11 catches, for 151 yards. The old mark of 10 was set by Ike Hilliard in the 2000 NFC Championship Game victory over Minnesota. Defensively, the Giants held Green Bay to 28 rushing yards, forced Favre into two late interceptions and limited the Packers to one successful third down conversion on 10 tries. The Giants dominated the game statistically, outgaining Green Bay (380-264), rolling up 11 more first downs (24-13) and owning the ball for 40:01 to just 22:34 for the Packers. The Packers scored on Driver's 90-yard catch-and-run and Favre's 12-yard touchdown pass to Donald Lee, plus field goals by rookie Mason Crosby of 36 and 37 yards. Crosby's second field goal, with 11:46 remaining in the fourth quarter, tied the score at 20-20. The Giants had a chance to prevent the score when R.W. McQuarters intercepted a Favre pass at the eight-yard line. But McQuarters was hit by Ryan Grant and fumbled and the ball bounced right to Packers tackle Mark Tauscher, who plucked it out of the air at the 19. It was the Giants' first turnover of the postseason... In overtime, Favre threw a pass to Driver, but Webster stepped up and picked off the ball, returning it nine yards to the Green Bay 34-yard line. Ahmad Bradshaw gained five yards on two runs before Manning's pass for Steve Smith fell incomplete. Tynes then sent the Giants to the Super Bowl with one of the biggest field goals in franchise history.

WORLD CHAMPIONS

Super Bowl XLII had a perfect ending, but the unexpected twist was that it belonged to the Giants. Eli Manning engineered a fourth quarter comeback drive for the ages and concluded perhaps the greatest postseason run in NFL history as the underdog Giants upset the previously undefeated New England Patriots, 17-14, in Super Bowl XLII in University of Phoenix Stadium in Glendale, Ariz. The Giants won their third championship of the Super Bowl era – the first in 17 years - and seventh overall in what will surely be remembered as one of the most exciting title games in NFL history. It was the first of 42 Super Bowls in which the lead changed hands three times in the fourth quarter. Plaxico Burress scored the game-winning points with only 35 seconds remaining on a 13-yard pass from Manning. The score concluded a 12-play, 83-yard drive that commenced immediately after New England had taken a 14-10 lead with less than three minutes remaining. Manning, voted the game's most valuable player, completed 19 of 34 passes for 255 yards, two touchdowns and an interception, which deflected off Steve Smith's hands. David Tyree scored the Giants' first touchdown and made an unbelievable catch on the game-winning drive. Ahmad Bradshaw and Brandon Jacobs combined for 87 rushing yards. Amani Toomer caught six passes for 84 yards and Smith added five for 50 yards. Lawrence Tynes kicked a 32-yard field goal, which ultimately proved to be the deciding points. The Giants' defense was magnificent. New England averaged almost 37 points a game in the regular season. The Giants held them to 14. The Patriots averaged 411.3 yards a game, but totaled only 274 in the Super Bowl. The Patriots rushed for only 45 yards and did not have a run longer than nine yards. Tom Brady was sacked five times. Brady's six-yard touchdown pass to Randy Moss gave the Pats a 14-10 lead with just 2:42 remaining. Cornerback Corey Webster slipped on the play and New England reached the end zone at the end of a 12-play, 80-yard drive. Manning responded by completing five of nine passes for 77 yards on the game-winning drive. The one everyone will long remember came on a third-and-five from the Giants' 44. Manning, seemingly about to be sacked, escaped, steadied himself and fired a pass down the middle of the field for Tyree, who was closely covered by safety Rodney Harrison. Both players jumped for the ball, which somehow landed on top of Tyree's helmet. But the receiver wrestled the ball away from Harrison for what may well be the greatest catch in Super Bowl history. The 32-yard gain gave

the Giants a first down at the New England 24. Three players later, Smith picked up a huge first down and Manning followed with the game-winning throw to Burress.

The Giants picked a bad day to have a bad day and saw their championship reign come to an end in a 23-11 home loss to the Philadelphia Eagles. The Giants lost just two home games in the 2008 season - both to Philadelphia. They outgained the Eagles, 307-276, including 138-59 on the ground, but were doomed by an inability to take advantage of opportunities in close. The Giants advanced as far as Philadelphia's 17-yard line three times - and had a first down on the 11 on their initial possession - but settled for field goals each time. The Giants converted only three of 13 third down opportunities. Their last five possessions ended, in order, with a missed field goal, twice on downs, an interception and a fumble. The Giants scored on John Carney field goals of 22, 34 and 36 yards and a safety when Donovan McNabb was penalized for intentional grounding in the end zone. Carney also missed field goal attempts of 46 and 47 yards. Philadelphia got a one-yard touchdown run from McNabb, a one-yard scoring pass to tight end Brent Celek and David Akers field goals of 25, 35 yards and 20 yards. Brian Westbrook was held to 36 rushing yards and 10 receiving yards (on two catches).

The Giants used a smothering defense and an opportunistic, big-play offense to rout the Falcons, 24-2, their first postseason victory since Super Bowl XLII and their first home playoff win since the 2000 NFC Championship Game triumph over Minnesota. Eli Manning threw three touchdown passes - four and 72 yards to Hakeem Nicks and 27 yards to Mario Manningham. The Giants also got a 22-yard field goal from Lawrence Tynes. Manning completed 23 of 32 passes for 277 yards. Brandon Jacobs ran for a career postseason high 92 yards and Ahmad Bradshaw added 63 as the Giants ran for 172 yards, 50 more than their previous high total in the 2011 season. The Giants' 442 net yards was their third-highest total in a postseason game. The defense was even more dominant. The unit did not allow a point - the Falcons' only score was on a safety. Atlanta rushed for only 64 yards, including 41 on 15 carries by Michael Turner, who ran for 1,340 yards in the regular season. The Giants stopped the Falcons on 10 of 14 third down attempts and all three of their fourth-down conversion tries, including a pair of fourth-and-one quarterback sneaks by Matt Ryan.

For the second time in five seasons, the Giants traveled to Wisconsin in January and stunned a higher-seeded Green Bay Packers team. They rode a terrific defensive effort and three Eli Manning touchdown passes to defeat the top-seeded, 15-1, defending Super Bowl Champion Packers, 37-20, an NFC Divisional Playoff Game in Lambeau Field. It was the third time the Giants eliminated the defending Super Bowl champions from the playoffs. In 1985, they defeated the 49ers in an NFC Wild Card Game in Giants Stadium, 17-3 and five years later, they beat the Niners in San Francisco in the NFC Championship Game. The defense held a Packers team that had averaged 40.1 points at home to half its average and forced four turnovers. Manning completed 21 of 33 passes for a career postseason-high 330 yards and three touchdowns – 66 and 37 yards to Hakeem Nicks and four yards to Mario Manningham. The Giants again showed they know how to play exciting NFC championship games. More importantly, they know how to win them. Just as they did four years earlier, the Giants advanced to the Super Bowl with a thrilling overtime victory on the road in the conference title game. In rainy and windy Candlestick Park, Lawrence Tynes kicked a 31-yard field goal with 7:54 elapsed in the extra period to give the Giants a 20-17 victory over the San Francisco 49ers. The game-winning kick was set up by an overtime takeaway when Devin Thomas recovered a Kyle Williams fumble on a punt return that was forced by Jacquian Williams. In the fourth quarter, Thomas had recovered a Kyle Williams fumble on a punt, setting up Eli Manning's 17-yard touchdown pass to Mario Manningham. The officials originally ruled that Williams didn't touch the ball and that Thomas had merely downed it. Tom Coughlin challenged the ruling and after review, referee changed the call to a fumble and a recovery. Manning threw for 316 yards and two touchdowns while setting Giants postseason records with 58 passes and 32 completions. The other touchdown was scored by Bear Pascoe, his first as a professional. Tynes kick another 31-yard field goal. Victor Cruz had 10 receptions for 142 yards, including eight for 125 in the first half. Ahmad Bradshaw totaled 126 yards from scrimmage, including 74 on the ground. Chase Blackburn had a team-high seven tackles (five solo). Jason Pierre-Paul had six tackles (five solo), a half-sack and deflected a pass. The 49ers scored on Alex Smith touchdown passes of 73 and 28 yards to tight end Vernon Davis and David Akers' 25-yard field goal.

History happily repeated itself for the Giants in Super Bowl XLVI. Ahmad Bradshaw's scored on a six-yard run with 57 seconds remaining in the game and the defense withstood one final assault from Tom Brady as the Giants defeated the Patriots, 21-17, in Lucas Oil Stadium. The Giants won their fourth Super Bowl and eighth championship in franchise history in a game that was eerily similar to their victory over the same opponent in Super Bowl XLII four years before. Eli Manning completed his first nine passes and 30 of 40 overall for 296 yards and a touchdown to win his second Pete Rozelle Trophy as the game's Most Valuable Player. He was at his best in the fourth quarter, when he hit 10 of 14 passes for 118 yard, including a pinpoint 38-yarder to Mario Manningham to start the game-winning 88-yard, nine-play masterpiece that was completed in 2:49. In addition to Bradshaw's touchdown, the Giants scored on Manning's two-yard touchdown pass to Victor Cruz, Lawrence Tynes field goals of 38 and 33 yards and a safety when Brady was penalized for intentional grounding in the end zone. New England's points came on Brady touchdown passes of four yards to Danny Woodhead and 12 yards to Aaron Hernandez and Steve Gostkowski's 29-yard field goal.

Despite being sack five times, Green Bay quarterback Aaron Rodgers threw for 362 yards, and became the first Giants opponent to throw four touchdown passes in a playoff game. Randall Cobb scored on three of them, another record, including one on a Hail Mary on the final play of the first half. Davante Adams caught Rodgers' other touchdown pass. Aaron Ripkowski scored on a one-yard run and Mason Crosby kicked a 32-yard field goal for Green Bay's other points. The Giants took an early 6-0 lead on Robbie Gould field goals of 26 and 40 yards. Their only other score was Eli Manning's 41-yard touchdown pass, which pulled the Giants to within 14-13 in the third quarter. But the Packers scored the game's final 24 points.

In their first playoff appearance since 2016, the Giants earned their first postseason victory since beating New England in Super Bowl XLVI. In his postseason debut, quarterback Daniel Jones threw for 301 yards and two touchdowns without an interception.
