AL DAVIS

JULY 4, 1929 - OCT. 8, 2011

Al Davis, a true legend, was a maverick, a giant among giants, a star among stars, a hero, a mentor and a friend.

When Davis passed away during the 2011 season, football lost an innovator, a pioneer with a deep love and passion for the game, a man who most assuredly will never be forgotten or duplicated. A Pro Football Hall of Famer who arguably did more to change the game than any other individual, Davis was honored the day after his passing with a moment of silence at every NFL stadium.

At one of those venues, Houston's Reliant Stadium, Davis' players took the field without his guidance for the first time in 17,710 days. And in one of so many franchise games for the ages, this comeback featuring key contributions from three of his first-round draft choices, the Raiders that day honored Davis by doing what he cared about most – they won.

"Just win," Davis once said. "Play hard. Try not to make mistakes, but don't worry about mistakes because there's only one thing that counts: Just win."

Before that win in Houston, Davis' death spawned an overwhelming outpouring of statements from football executives, coaches and players, past and present. A clear common thread in those expressions of remembrance was that anyone with any level of affinity for football should acknowledge that the game would not be what it is without Davis.

That's not just because Davis held the titles of general manager, head coach, league commissioner and principal owner, and led the Raiders to more wins than any other team. The game would not be what it is because, through his unyielding efforts to build the finest franchise in sports, Davis broke social barriers, creating opportunities for countless individuals, and cared selflessly about people, treating them the way they wanted to be treated. No one has had a more profound and lasting impact on pro football.

SEEDS OF GENIUS

Had Davis remained in coaching, fellow innovator Bill Walsh once theorized, Davis would be considered one of the greatest coaches of all-time.


On Jan. 19, 1963, the American Football League Raiders made a 33-year-old Davis the youngest general manager and head coach in pro history. And before the budding genius called his first play, Davis took complete control over all phases of the franchise, including changing Oakland's uniform colors to silver and black, to resemble the great Army teams he had idolized during the 1940s, and re-branded the Raiders into an image that is today instantly recognized worldwide.

"If there's anything that we've done that I'm particularly proud of," Davis recalled later in his life, "I would have to say the perpetuation of the greatness of the Raiders; to take a professional football team and give it a distinct characteristic, that's different from all others."

That characteristic in his first season on the Raiders sideline became forever linked to winning. Davis earned Coach of the Year honors after leading the Raiders, 1-13 the season before, to the most significant year-to-year improvement in pro football history, a 10-4 mark. Although he sacrificed his coaching career to become AFL Commissioner following the 1965 season, the profession always remained important to him, partly because it served as the foundation for his contributions to football.

That foundation was first poured in his hometown, the borough of Brooklyn, N.Y., where he played basketball and learned some of his unshakable principles under Coach Al Badain at Erasmus Hall High School.

Davis graduated with a degree in English literature from Syracuse University, which later honored him with a Letterman of Distinction award, and shortly after, in 1950, launched his career as line coach at Adelphi College.



After entering the Army in 1952, Davis served as head football coach at Ft. Belvoir, Va. There, he molded a national power, finishing with a win over Maryland, the reigning national champion.

Davis worked in the player personnel office of the Baltimore Colts for one year (1954), then spent two seasons (1955-56) as line coach and chief recruiter at The Citadel, before becoming in 1957 the University of Southern California's line coach.

His next job didn't take him very far, moving across town from USC to the Los Angeles Chargers of the new AFL, but the move to pro football was a major step. Hired by Sid Gillman in 1960 as the Chargers' offensive ends coach, Davis helped the team to a pair of division titles in just three years.

That rise gave Davis the opportunity to lead his own team in 1963. Several factors influenced his head-coach blueprints. In addition to his coaching career, the precision of the Black Knights of the Hudson, their quickness and explosion with Doc Blanchard and Glenn Davis, left an indelible impression on Davis growing up. He also took several chapters from another sport.

"As a young guy," he said, "I had a dream that someday I would build the finest organization in professional sports. I had a lot of thoughts on how I would do it. I had the inspiration of two great organizations when I was growing up.

"The Yankees to me personified the size of the players, power, the home run, and intimidation and fear. Very important characteristics to me of what I thought a great team and a great organization should have. The Dodgers, under Branch Rickey, were totally different in my mind. They represented speed. They represented development of players, a way of playing the game, the Dodger way of playing the game. And I always thought that someone intelligent could take all the qualities, the great qualities of both, and put them together and use them."

In addition to those qualities, he also instilled in the Raiders tenets that were all his own, and in the process, he revolutionized pro football.

Offensively, Davis created the vertical game, now known as stretching the field.


"When we came out of the huddle," he remembered about his Raiders, "we weren't looking for first downs. We didn't want to move the chains. We wanted touchdowns. We wanted the big play, the quick strike. It's No. 1 to say that you want to do that, it's No. 2 to say that you have the players to do it, but it's No. 3 to do it. Do it on first down of any football game, on that defense that you're playing against. For those cornerbacks that play out there on the corners, to know that the Raiders are coming at you, they're coming at you on top, they've got the speed to do it, and they will do it. It's like having the bomb and being willing to drop it. The adage that goes around in professional football, and I hear everyone say it, 'Take what they give you.' That all sounds good to everybody, but I always went the other way: We're going to take what we want."

On the other side of the line, Davis also wanted to attack, to put pressure on the pocket, and do more than just disrupt the offense physically.

"I do believe that this is a game, psychologically, of intimidation and of fear. I don't mean cowardly fear, but fear. I think this: That somewhere within the first five to 10 plays of the game that the other team's quarterback must go down, and he must go down hard. That alone sets the tempo for a game."

Once that tempo was established, taking a cue from college basketball, Davis was the first to utilize his cornerbacks in a bump-and-run principle.

"We used to call it the press. We got the idea from John Wooden, when he had his great zone press, with his great basketball teams, where they picked you up as soon as you took the ball out, and they pressured you. And we got the idea and called it press. And then I think Don Shula started calling it bump-and-run, so we changed to bump-and-run."



Davis' vision to see where the game was headed, or to pave a new road to winning, led future successful coaches like Bill Parcells and Bill Belichick to regard Davis as the NFL's most intelligent individual.

From 1963-2002, the Raiders dominated pro football, posting the game's best cumulative won-loss record. Earning the moniker "Team of the Decades," the franchise posted 17 winning seasons over an 18-year stretch from 1963-80. The Raiders then posted 11 more winning campaigns from 1982-2002, including double-digit wins in 1983, 1984, 1985, 1990, 1993, 2000, 2001 and 2002. All told under Davis, the Raiders won four league championships -- Super Bowls XI, XV and XVIII and the 1967 AFL title.

FROM HEAD COACH TO COMMISSIONER, TO MERGER

Persuaded by American Football League owners who viewed him as the perfect person to lead their battle against the established NFL, Davis reluctantly became league commissioner on April 8, 1966. Remarkably, Davis would spend less than 16 weeks in that role, but the shots his administration fired during that short period still reverberate today.

For the first half of the 1960s, the AFL and NFL fought a tenacious fight for college talent, but they battled with a significant unwritten rule that veterans were off limits. A little more than a month after Davis took office, the NFL's New York Giants violated that rule, signing veteran Buffalo kicker Pete Gogolak. As longtime Raiders executive Al LoCasale remembered, the NFL took a shot with a revolver and Davis shot back using a machine gun.

Davis passionately and strategically convinced AFL owners to go after established NFL stars. In a short period, the AFL had signed many of the NFL's veteran playmakers, including the NFL's leading passer John Brodie, and Roman Gabriel from the Los Angeles Rams.



"We had about four or five quarterbacks all lined up," Davis said. "Three or four of their other great players had already signed. It was a preliminary strike to let them know what's going to happen if they continue this."

Within months, the two leagues had agreed to a merger that formed the league familiar to today's fans, including as part of the agreement a world championship game now known as the Super Bowl. Having served as the driving force behind that merger, Davis resigned on July 25, 1966, returned to Oakland as head of football operations and purchased an interest in the franchise. Davis, who became managing general partner in 1972, teamed with head-coach successors John Rauch, John Madden and Tom Flores in building a stalwart that would become the league's most successful franchise.

A CHAMPION OF DIVERSITY AND EQUALITY

A trailblazer, Davis innovated not only how the game was played and coached, but also changed who held those roles, opening countless doors for qualified individuals, regardless of skin color.

Davis was 17 when, a short distance from his home, Jackie Robinson broke the color barrier in Major League Baseball. Shortly after, at Syracuse, Davis befriended Bernie Custis, who would fight racism and become pro football's first black quarterback. At USC, Davis started recruiting players from historically black colleges, and convinced future Pro Football Hall of Famer Willie Wood to remain at the school as the Trojans' quarterback. Wood and Ron Mix became the school's first interracial co-captains, and Davis helped Mix understand how athletics could serve as a leader in ushering needed social change.

With the Chargers, Davis teamed with Gillman to lead the fight for equality. In addition to refusing to stay at segregated team hotels, the team, inspired by Davis, recruited players from black programs, creating what Eddie Robinson called a new day for players of color and giving them a sense of belonging in the American Football League.

Davis supported both his Raiders and other AFL players when two specific instances of racism reared its ugly head in the 1960s. The Raiders scheduled a 1963 preseason game with the Jets in Mobile, Alabama, where the seating would be segregated. Several Black players raised objections with Davis, the team's coach and general manager, who backed his players, and the game was relocated to Oakland.

In 1965, upon arriving in New Orleans before the AFL All-Star Game, Black players from both squads, angered over discrimination, were set to boycott the contest. They agreed to play when Davis and other team executives moved the game to Houston.

Later that decade, Davis brought to the Raiders guard Gene Upshaw and tackle Art Shell, eventual Hall of Famers. Upshaw and Shell joked that a convention of pro football's black offensive linemen could be held in a phone booth. But Davis gave them an opportunity, and Upshaw said he never experienced racism on the Raiders because Davis would never tolerate it.

And neither would Davis tolerate discrimination at the game's most important position. A year after Upshaw as a rookie helped the Raiders to an AFL championship, Davis in 1968 made Eldridge Dickey the first African-American quarterback ever selected in the first round. Again, Davis cared about one thing: Winning.

"We called it an untapped reservoir," Davis recalled. "We wanted to win. We wanted the players. We weren't interested in who they were, or exactly where they came from. I've always said, it's not important to be consistent; it's important to be right. It was done because it was right and fair, and to help the team win, and continue to win.

"The Raiders did become a proving ground for great minority players. I think it was an evolution, an evolution of equity and fairness, and we hope that's one legacy we leave."

Another legacy Davis left was hiring in 1989 the NFL's first African-American head coach, Shell. Davis told Shell the reason he hired him was not because he was black, but because he was the best available candidate for the job, and because he was a Raider. Upon winning his coaching debut, Shell had to remind reporters that he was not the game's first minority head coach. A decade before, Davis had hired Tom Flores to lead the Raiders to two Super Bowl victories. Additionally, Davis later made Amy Trask the NFL's first female chief executive.

THE RAIDER MYSTIQUE

To Davis, shattering barriers wasn't only about race or gender. He defined it on a larger scale, by creating an environment that allowed any individual the chance to succeed, and in the process fostered a unique brotherhood.

"The fire that burns brightest in me," Davis said, "and the fire that burns brightest in this organization is the will to win."

That philosophy evolved the Raiders' locker room into an us-versus-them mentality, a group that like its owner valued being feared more than respected. Davis brought in mavericks and molded them into champions, a group of rugged and colorful individualists that carried Davis' torch with swagger and intimidation.

Many of the players that won for the Raiders were rejected by other teams. But Davis did not treat them like misfits. He treated them like men, and those men brought him three Super Bowl titles and dominated the league like no other team.

"We may take a player in who doesn't have good social habits, or has been a failure somewhere else," Davis explained. "But it's predicated on bringing them into an environment, that can inspire them the will to do great, and they have done great."

A BELIEF IN HOW TO TREAT PEOPLE

Part of Davis' ability to acquire the right players and put them in an environment that bred success was his belief in how to deal with people. Davis always said that the Golden Rule was not good enough.

"When you have to lead men, you don't do unto others as you would have others do unto you," Davis said. "You do unto them, in a paramilitary situation, as they want to be done unto. You have to treat them the way they want to be treated."

That way of treating people led friends and former players to remember Davis as the epitome of loyalty. And in turn, he showed the rest of the NFL how to treat former players. Of all the awards he received, the recognition from men that played the game meant the most to Davis. In 1997, the NFL Alumni inducted Davis into the Order of the Leather Helmet, a lifetime-achievement award. Six years earlier, the NFL Players Association honored Davis with its inaugural Retired Players Award of Excellence, citing the care he had shown players long after they retired.



"I feel we're one of the last bastions of hope, as a team image, as a team organization," Davis explained. "I don't want to give that up with the Raiders. We believe in tradition. We believe in the glory. We believe in the debt we owe to our players from the past."

No question, the way Davis treated people led to a record nine Hall of Famers asking him to present them in Canton, Ohio, at their induction ceremonies, an exceptional fact that exists nowhere else in sports, and speaks volumes of Davis' compassion for others.

In 1992, Davis earned his own enshrinement in the Pro Football Hall of Fame, and for the first time stood at the familiar podium after someone else – his most successful Raiders coach, Madden – had introduced him. Davis took the opportunity to look back on the team that mirrored his life.

"Enshrinement is a reflection of a life's work, a reflection of a love affair with the greatest game the world has ever known. This honor is a testament to a great organization, and to all the capable people that have poured their talent and enthusiasm and loyalty into the greatness of the Raiders, and the Raiders legend and mystique."



She has more than two decades of leadership experience in the sports, gaming, legal and corporate sectors, and has served as a chief regulator, director, attorney, and advisor to integrated resorts, casinos, and telecommunications companies. Having an adept understanding of the community as a native Las Vegas, Sandra is incredibly proud to lead the Silver and Black in her hometown.

Prior to her joining the Raiders, Sandra served as Chairwoman of the Nevada Gaming Control Board. As the chief regulator for Nevada's dominant billion-dollar gaming industry, Sandra led the passage and implementation of cashless wagering regulations, ensured that gaming licensees adopted policies prohibiting discrimination and harassment, and led a team of 400 employees in five cities across the state of Nevada. Sandra also served as a Commissioner on the Nevada State Athletic Commission and was the first Black City Attorney in the State of Nevada when she was the chief legal officer for the City of North Las Vegas, where she served from 2008 to 2016.

Sandra was previously with Covington & Burling, LLP and served as an advisor to the State of Nevada's COVID-19 task force charged with finding solutions for access to personal protection equipment, virtual education options, and expanding testing capabilities so that the state could reopen its doors to tens of millions of visitors from across the globe.

Sandra has served on a variety of nonprofit boards and was most recently the Vice Chair of the Super Bowl LVIII Host Committee. Additionally, Sandra serves on the Board of Directors of Allegiant Travel Company and Fidelity National Financial, Inc., and is on the Board of Trustees for the UNLV Foundation. She is also a member of the State Bar of Nevada and the District of Columbia Bar.

Sandra graduated from the University of Nevada, Reno with a degree in Political Science and holds a Juris Doctor from the William S. Boyd School of Law at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. She resides in Las Vegas with her husband Don and their two children, Dylan and Dana.

30th Season in NFL

1st Season with Raiders

Tom Telesco was named General Manager of the Las Vegas Raiders by Owner Mark Davis on Jan. 23, 2024. He is the fifth General Manager in franchise history.

Telesco enters his 29th year in the NFL after spending the previous 11 seasons as the General Manager of the Chargers. During his time in San Diego and Los Angeles, he helped guide the team to three playoff appearances and two postseason victories.

In his first offseason with the Raiders, Telesco added impactful talent to the roster on both sides of the ball through free agency and the draft. The Raiders signed DT Christian Wilkins and QB Gardner Minshew in the early part of the free agency period, while re-signing key contributors like C Andre James, DT John Jenkins, and RB Ameer Abdullah. Telesco and the Raiders selected eight players in his first draft at the helm, adding potential playmakers and increasing depth and competition throughout the roster.

He also drafted six players in the first round that went on to be selected for a Pro Bowl with the team in Jason Verrett, Melvin Gordon III, Joey Bosa, Derwin James Jr., Justin Herbert and Rashawn Slater. In 2022, Telesco constructed a roster that featured eight former Pro Bowlers who were acquired by draft, trades, or free agency.

Prior to joining the Chargers, Telesco spent 15 seasons with the Indianapolis Colts, serving as the Vice President of Football Operations (2012), Director of Player Personnel (2006-11), Director of Pro Scouting (2004-05), a pro scout (2001-03) and an area scout (1998-2000). Telesco was involved in Colts drafts that selected four-time Pro Bowl running back Edgerrin James, five-time Pro Bowl wide receiver Reggie Wayne, seven-time Pro Bowler Dwight Freeney and four-time Pro Bowl quarterback Andrew Luck. During his tenure in Indianapolis, the Colts played in two Super Bowls, won eight division titles, and appeared in the playoffs 12 times.

Telesco began his NFL career as a scouting assistant for the Carolina Panthers in 1995, where he served for two seasons before becoming an area scout in 1997. He also worked as a summer intern for the Buffalo Bills from 1991-1994.

A native of Buffalo, N.Y., Telesco graduated from John Carroll University with a degree in business management. He played wide receiver for the Blue Streaks and was a starter on the Ohio Athletic Conference title team in 1994. He was invited to be a speaker at the NFL's Career Development Symposium in 2015 and 2018 and serves as the co-chairman of the NFL General Manager Advisory Committee. Telesco and his wife, Larah, have a daughter, Elena, and two sons, Thomas, and Nicholas.

ANTONIO PIERCE

3rd Season with Raiders

Antonio Pierce was named Head Coach of the Las Vegas Raiders by Owner Mark Davis on Jan. 19, 2024. He was named to the post following a nine-game stint as the team's Interim Head Coach during the 2023 season. Pierce, a nine-year NFL veteran player and a former Super Bowl Champion, team captain and Pro Bowl selection, enters his third season with the Silver and Black after originally joining the Raiders as linebackers coach in 2022.

Pierce assumed Interim Head Coach duties prior to Week 9 of the 2023 season and posted a 5-4 record in nine games, highlighted by a 3-1 mark against AFC West opponents. Pierce's leadership rejuvenated the franchise midseason and inspired several outstanding performances, including a franchise-record 63 points in a Week 15 win over the Chargers, and an emphatic road victory over the Kansas City Chiefs on Christmas Day that featured two defensive scores for the Silver and Black.

Under his guidance, the Raiders finished the season with the fewest penalties in the NFL (75) and twice completed games without a single penalty flag. After Pierce took the helm on Oct. 31, the Raiders were tied for 10th in the NFL in takeaways (14), tied for fifth in turnover margin (+6), and tied for third in sacks (30). The defense also allowed a league-low 16.0 points per game.

His presence was felt in all three phases last season, as rookie Aidan O'Connell was named the starting quarterback prior to Week 9 and promptly led the Raiders to victories in the first two games of Pierce's tenure. The Raiders later became just one of three NFL teams to score 20-or-more points in each of the last four games of the regular season. The opportunistic defense finished the season with five touchdowns, the second-highest total in the NFL and the second most in a season in franchise history. On special teams, Pro Bowl selection AJ Cole continued to emerge as one of the NFL's elite punters and two players finished ranked among the league's top-20 in special teams tackles.

Pierce's linebacker corps was a key catalyst for the defense, as free agent acquisition Robert Spillane paced the team with 148 tackles and rarely missed a snap, starting all 17 games and earning AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors following a two-interception performance in a win over Green Bay. Divine Deablo also eclipsed the century mark for tackles, totaling 105 stops to give the Raiders two 100-tackle performers at linebacker for the first time since 2013.

In his first season with the Silver and Black in 2022, Pierce tutored a linebacker group that included two undrafted rookie free agents in Luke Masterson and Darien Butler. Masterson played in all 17 games with seven starts, and his 50 tackles ranked third-most in the NFL among undrafted rookies and second-most in a single season in Raiders history by a UDFA. Pierce also guided Deablo's progression, as he averaged 9.25 tackles per game, the 11th best average in the league, while veteran Denzel Perryman established a career high with two interceptions on the year.

Before entering the NFL coaching ranks, Pierce spent four seasons at Arizona State, serving as linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator before adding the titles of associate head coach and defensive coordinator. As a part of Head Coach Herm Edwards' staff, Pierce established himself as one of the nation's elite recruiters as the Sun Devils posted a 25-18 overall record and appeared in three bowl games during that stretch.

In 2021, Pierce was promoted to defensive coordinator and helped the Sun Devils rank first in the Pac-12 in scoring defense (20.8), first in total yards allowed per game (326.3), tied for first in defensive touchdowns (three), second in interceptions (16) and second in sacks (27). A highly decorated unit, Arizona State's defense was rewarded with seven All-Pac-12 selections, including a first-team honor for defensive tackle Tyler Johnson and second-team recognition for both defensive lineman D.J. Davidson and linebacker Darien Butler. Jack Jones, Chase Lucas, and De'Andre Pierce were among the defensive backs tabbed for honorable mention notice in addition to linebacker Merlin Robertson. Four different players on Pierce's defense recorded multiple interceptions as Arizona State posted an 8-5 record and appeared in the Las Vegas Bowl.

Pierce added co-defensive coordinator responsibilities to his role in 2020, helping lead Arizona State to a 2-2 record in an abbreviated season that saw the defenders Tyler Johnson and Chase Lucas earn second-team All-Pac-12 honors. His defense held rival Arizona to just seven points in a 70-7 Territorial Cup triumph that marked the second-largest margin of victory in the annual series between the two schools. Prior to the season, Arizona State's 2020 recruiting class was ranked 23rd in the nation and fourth in the Pac-12, according to 247Sports.com. Of the 18 individuals in that incoming freshman class, 11 players were regarded as four-star prospects by at least one recruiting service.

In 2019, Arizona State finished 35th in the nation in scoring defense, allowing just 22.4 points per game, and ranked 21st nationally in rushing defense, allowing just 115.8 yards per contest. Pierce's linebacker corps included Khaylan Kearse-Thomas, who garnered All-Pac-12 honorable mention honors, as well as Darien Butler, who led the team with 79 tackles and became the first true sophomore in program history to be named a team captain.

In Pierce's first season at Arizona State, he tutored linebacker Merlin Robertson, who was named the Pac-12 Defensive Freshman of the Year after leading the team with 77 tackles, five sacks and 8.5 tackles for loss. In all, Pierce's group finished the season with three first-year starters at linebacker, including Robertson, true freshman Darien Butler and redshirt freshman Tyler Johnson.

Prior to entering the collegiate coaching ranks, Pierce was the head coach of traditional California prep powerhouse Long Beach Poly High School from 2014-17. In his four years at the helm, the Jackrabbits posted a 31-15 overall record, including a 21-3 mark against Moore League competition. Long Beach Poly posted three undefeated 6-0 records in league play in Pierce's four seasons as head coach, and his 2017 team advanced to the CIF Southern Section quarterfinals.

During his time at Long Beach Poly, 54 of Pierce's student-athletes earned collegiate scholarships to continue their education, 24 of whom did so at the NCAA Division I level. He helped develop future NFL draft picks in defensive back Alex Austin, quarterback Matt Corral and cornerback Jack Jones, who in 2023 joined the Raiders in midseason.


Pierce played nine years in the NFL, entering the league as an undrafted free agent with Washington, and playing in 55 games with 25 starts over four seasons before signing with the New York Giants as an unrestricted free agent in 2005. He was named to the Pro Bowl in 2006 after posting a career-high 139 tackles, including 10 tackles for loss. A team captain with the Giants, Pierce helped lead New York to victory in Super Bowl XLII. Over his nine-year career, Pierce played in 115 games with 85 starts, totaling 732 tackles (462 solo), eight sacks, seven interceptions, eight forced fumbles and 11 fumble recoveries.

PERSONAL: A native of Long Beach, Calif., Pierce grew up in Compton, Calif., and attended Paramount (Calif.) High School, where he was an All-CIF Southern Section selection as a linebacker and also played fullback...He played two years at Arizona, seeing action in 23 games and totaling 152 tackles, 20 tackles for loss and seven sacks...As a senior, he recorded 77 tackles, three sacks, two forced fumbles, one interception and one blocked kick for the Wildcats...Prior to Arizona, he played two years at Mt. Gerald Alexander is entering his first season with the Las Vegas Raiders in 2024 as the safeties coach, bringing with him 11 years of coaching experience, including four seasons in the NFL.

Prior to Las Vegas, Alexander spent two seasons (2022-23) with the Pittsburgh Steelers as the assistant defensive backs coach. Over his time in Pittsburgh, the Steelers secondary recorded 36 interceptions, tied for the second-most in the NFL. Last season (2023), the Steelers defense allowed just an 84.7 passer rating to opponents, the 10th lowest mark in the NFL. In 2022, Alexander assisted with a unit posted 20 interceptions, tied for the league lead. His unit was led by S Minkah Fitzpatrick who recorded a career-high six interceptions, the most in the NFL and the most in a single season by a Steeler since 2010 (Troy Polamalu, 7) – earning a Pro Bowl nod and his third career AP First Team All-Pro selection.

Alexander started his coaching career in the NFL in 2020 with the Miami Dolphins, serving as defensive backs coach for two seasons (2020-21). In 2021 the Dolphins defense allowed just an 85.4 passer rating to opponents, the seventh best mark in the NFL. In 2020, Alexander's unit tied for first in the NFL in interceptions (18) with the help of a career year from CB Xavier Howard under his guidance here he led the league in interceptions (10) and pass breakups (20), was named to the Pro Bowl and earned First Team All-Pro honors for the first time. Alexander also held three National Football League minority coaching internships with Tennessee (2015), Tampa Bay (2016), and Miami Dolphins (2019).

Prior to the NFL, Alexander coached at the college level, making stops at California (2017-19), Montana State (2016), Indiana State (2015), Washington (2014) and Arkansas State (2013). Before his stint with the Dolphins, Alexander coached defensive backs at California for three seasons (2017-19).

In 2019, Alexander mentored two All-Pac-12 defensive backs in Camryn Bynum and Ashtyn Davis. Davis began his career as a walk-on and was one of three finalists for the Bursworth Trophy, given annually to the nation's top player who began his collegiate career as a walk-on. Davis was a third-round pick of the N.Y. Jets in the 2020 NFL Draft. Bynum was selected in the fourth round of the 2021 NFL Draft by Minnesota.

Alexander's unit was one of the nation's best in 2018. Cal led the Pac-12 and ranked ninth nationally in passing defense, allowing just 175.1 passing yards per game, while leading the Pac-12 and ranking second nationally with 21 interceptions.

In Alexander's first season at California in 2017, he helped the Bears defense improve in 14 of the 15 primary team defensive statistics. Bynum was named the team's Most Valuable Freshman after leading all defensive backs on the team with 58 tackles.


Alexander also coached defensive backs at Montana State (2016) and Indiana State (2015), his first position coach jobs. He was a graduate assistant working with defensive backs at Washington in 2014, tutoring two future second-round NFL draft picks in Sidney Jones and Budda Baker. Before Washington, Alexander got his start in the collegiate coaching ranks as a graduate assistant at Arkansas State in 2013 and got his start in coaching in 2012 at Rancho Cucamonga (Calif.) High School, where he was a volunteer assistant.

As a player, Alexander was chosen in the second round (61st overall) of the 2007 NFL Draft. Alexander appeared in 44 games, starting 30 at safety over his five-year NFL career with Detroit (2007-08), Jacksonville (2009-10), Carolina (2010), Miami (2011) and the New York Jets (2011). He finished with 154 tackles (116 solo), 14 passes defensed, four forced fumbles, four interceptions, three fumble recoveries and 2.0 sacks.

PERSONAL: A native of Rancho Cucamonga, Calif. ... Played five seasons in the NFL with stops in Detroit (2007-08), Jacksonville (2009-10), Carolina (2010), Miami (2011) and the New York Jets (2011)... Played in a total of 44 games with 30 starts, totaling 154 tackles (116 solo), two sacks, four interceptions, 14 passes defensed, three forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries... Originally entered the NFL as a second-round pick (61st overall) by Detroit in the 2007 NFL Draft... Alexander played safety at Boise State (2003-06) and graduated with a degree in communications... Helped Boise State to four consecutive conference titles and a 46-6 record... He was a senior on Boise State's 2006 squad that went 13-0 and won the Fiesta Bowl... He and his wife, Krystina, have three sons – Kaelin, Kamari and Kaleel – and one daughter, Kahrye.

D'Anthony Batiste enters his 15th NFL season in 2024 and seventh as a Raiders strength and conditioning assistant. He brings 12 years of playing experience as an offensive lineman to the post, competing at the sport's highest levels.

Using his experience as a former offensive lineman, Batiste has worked extensively with offensive and defensive linemen during his time with the Silver and Black on and off the field, tailoring his training to increase their skill sets in the trenches.

Last season (2023), Batiste helped DE Maxx Crosby earn his third-straight Pro Bowl selection and his second career AP Second Team All-Pro selection after finishing with a single-season career-high 23 tackles for loss - tied for the most in the NFL in 2023 and tied with Khalil Mack (23) for the most tackles for loss in a single season in Raiders history. Crosby also recorded a career-high 14.5 sacks in 2023, the sixth most in the NFL.

In 2022, Batiste's strength training helped the offensive line unit tie for the ninth-fewest sacks allowed (35) in the NFL. The Raiders offensive line paved the way for 2,059 rushing yards, the most in a single season since 2011. He was also instrumental in helping to produce five Pro Bowlers in WR Davante Adams, DE Maxx Crosby, RB Josh Jacobs, QB Derek Carr and P AJ Cole, the most by the Raiders since 2016.

In 2021, Batiste helped the Raiders finish with a 10-7 record, earning their first postseason berth since 2016. He also saw the Silver and Black produce four Pro Bowlers in P AJ Cole, DE Maxx Crosby, LB Denzel Perry and WR Hunter Renfrow, marking the first career selection for all four players.

In 2020, Batiste saw RB Josh Jacobs and TE Darren Waller both earn their first Pro Bowl selections. Waller led the team in all major receiving categories, setting a new club record with 107 receptions and posting career highs in receiving yards (1,196) and touchdowns (nine), while Jacobs surpassed the 1,000-yard mark with 1,065 yards on the ground and set a career high with 12 touchdowns.

In 2019, Batiste's training helped T Trent Brown and C Rodney Hudson as they each earned Pro Bowl honors, while G Richie Incognito was named a Pro Bowl alternate. The Raiders offensive line also paved the way for Pro Bowl alternate Jacobs, who was the first-ever 1,000-yard rookie rusher in team history.

Batiste helped the 2019 rookie class successfully transition from college to the NFL as they combined to lead the NFL in scrimmage touchdowns (17), sacks (14.5), yards after the catch (676), rushing yards (1,167) and rushing touchdowns (seven) among their rookie peers.

In 2018, his work with the men upfront helped produced Pro Bowl alternates in Hudson and G/T Kelechi Osemele. Batiste also worked with TE Jared Cook as he earned his first Pro Bowl selection, while setting career highs in receptions (68), receiving yards (896) and touchdowns (six). Cook tied for third-most among tight ends with four 100-yard games, including a franchise best performance among his position group in Week 1 with 180 yards.

Batiste came to the Raiders following his playing career in the Canadian Football League for the Edmonton Eskimos. He played in 56 games for Edmonton, helping the team capture the Grey Cup in 2015.

EDGAR BENNETT

WIDE RECEIVERS

32nd Season in NFL
(8 as a player)

7th Season with Raiders

Edgar Bennett, now entering his 32nd season in the NFL, embarks upon his seventh year with the Silver and Black as the club's wide receivers coach.

Last season, Bennett coached WR Davante Adams to reach his fourth consecutive season with 100+ catches and 1,000+ receiving yards. He also saw newly acquired WR Jakobi Meyers post a career-high eight receiving touchdowns, while adding 71 receptions and 807 yards. Bennett also coached rookie WR Tre Tucker who finished with 331 yards and two touchdowns, averaging 17.4 yards per reception — the best average among rookie wide receivers with at least 15 catches.

In 2022, Bennett coached WR Davante Adams to his sixth consecutive Pro Bowl selection. In his first season with the Raiders, Adams set a franchise record with 1,526 receiving yards on 100 receptions, while his 14 receiving touchdowns ranked as the most in the NFL and tied for second-most in a single season in franchise history. Bennett also coached WR Mack Hollins to career highs with 57 receptions, 690 receiving yards and four touchdowns. His position group accounted for 21 of the team's 28 receiving touchdowns, the ninth-most receiving touchdowns by any team in the league and a seven-spot improvement from the previous season's ranking.

Under Bennett's guidance in 2021, WR Hunter Renfrow put together one of his greatest seasons in franchise history by a Raiders wide receiver to earn his first Pro Bowl selection. In his third season, Renfrow joined Hall of Fame WR Tim Brown as the only Raiders wide receiver to eclipse 100-plus receptions with a career-high 103. Bennett also saw Renfrow set a career high with 1,039 receiving yards, becoming the first Raiders wide receiver to surpass 1,000-plus receiving yards since 2016.

In 2020, Bennett toiled a wide receiver group that was paramount to the offense's success. The position group posted 14 receiving touchdowns on the campaign and recorded an NFL-best average of 15.2 yards per reception. It marked the highest average yards per reception by a Raiders wide receiving corps since 2004.

Highlighted among the receivers was newly acquired WR Nelson Agholor, who posted 48 receptions for a career-high 896 receiving yards while tying a career high with eight touchdown receptions. Agholor recorded six touchdown receptions of at least 20 yards this past season, including five of which that were at least 40 yards, ranking second and tied for fourth in the NFL among all players, respectively. His 18.7 yards per receptions marked a career high, as he finished first in the AFC and second in the NFL, while being etched in Raiders lore as the 10th-best mark all-time.

Bennett also coached Renfrow to a successful sophomore campaign, as he recorded then career highs in receptions (56) and receiving yards (656), while adding two touchdown receptions. Renfrow's 105 receptions are the third-most by a player through his first two seasons in Raiders history.

Bennett's ability to develop young players was magnified in his second season with the Silver and Black in 2019, as rookie receiver Renfrow recorded one of the most prolific campaigns by a rookie receiver in club history. Renfrow logged 49 receptions for 605 yards and four touchdowns, marks that rank second, sixth and tied for fourth, respectively, in franchise annals among all rookie players. Under Bennett, Renfrow became a third-down machine, notching 16 first-down receptions on third down, the second-most in the NFL among rookies in 2019. Furthermore, Renfrow was one of two players in the NFL, joining WR DeSean Jackson, to tally multiple receiving touchdowns of at least 50 yards on third down.

With another year of constant change at the wide receiver position, Bennett worked to provide a seamless transition between his receivers and QB Derek Carr, who set career highs in yards, completion percentage, yards per attempt and passer rating, while connecting with 10 different wide receivers throughout the year. Bennett was also tasked with mentoring newly acquired free agent signing WR Tyrell Williams. Although hampered by a foot injury for the majority of the season, Williams led the club with six touchdown receptions in addition to his 42 catches and 651 receiving yards. Among players with at least 40 receptions in 2019, Williams' average of 15.5 yards per reception was tied for 13th-most in the NFL.

In Bennett's first season with the Raiders in 2018, he oversaw a group of wide receivers that provided flexibility and interchangeability in the offense. Leading the way was WR Jordy Nelson, who spent 10 years in Green Bay under Bennett. Nelson finished second on the team in both yards (739) and touchdown receptions (three), while finishing third in receptions (63). Under Bennett's direction, WR Seth Roberts set career highs in both receptions (45) and yards (494), while adding two scores to his campaign.

Bennett came aboard the staff in 2018 having spent the previous 17 seasons with the Packers' club in multiple roles, serving as the team's offensive coordinator from 2015-17, wide receivers coach from 2011-14, running backs coach from 2005-10 and as the team's director of player development from 2001-04. Bennett also spent five seasons playing running back for the Packers. As a player and coach, Bennett has won 11 division titles, appeared in six conference championships and won both Super Bowl XXXI in 1996 and XLV in 2010.

During his tenure as the offensive coordinator, Bennett helped orchestrate an offense that finished with 96 touchdown passes since 2015, the most in the NFC and second most in the NFL during that time frame despite missing All-Pro quarterback Aaron Rodgers for nine games in 2017 due to injury. As a former running back, Bennett was able to guide his running back corps to an average of 4.41 yards per carry in the same time frame, a mark that ranked sixth in the NFL. Additionally, Bennett led an offense that ranked eighth since 2015 with a 58.8 percent conversion rate in the red zone, including a third-place finish in 2017 with a success rate of 61.9 percent.

In 2017, Bennett's offense ranked fifth in the NFL in yards per rush (4.47 avg.), despite having to shuffle the backfield due to numerous injuries, including starting RB Ty Montgomery who missed eight games. The offense also tied for sixth in the NFC with 25 touchdown passes on the season.

Guided by Bennett, Rodgers put together one of the most prolific passing seasons in club history in 2016, tossing for 4,428 yards, completing over 400 passes for a completion percentage of 65.7, while adding an NFL-high 40 touchdowns through the air to just seven interceptions. In wake of Rodgers' success under Bennett's tutelage, Nelson and WR Davante Adams combined for a league-best 26 touchdown receptions. Nelson led the league with 14 scores of his own, adding 1,257 yards receiving and 97 receptions, the fifth most in the Packers history, en route to earning the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year Award. Additionally, the offense as a whole averaged 27.0 points per game, the fourth-best mark in the league.

At the helm of the offense for the first time in 2015, Bennett emphasized ball security, as the team's 17 turnovers were the fifth fewest in club history and also ranked fourth fewest in the NFL that year. Bennett's primary focus was most apparent with Rodgers, as he posted

the third-best pass interception percentage (1.4) in the NFL, throwing just seven interceptions on 572 attempts. Bennett oversaw an offense that saw its quarterback post over 30 touchdown passes (31) for the fifth time in career. Green Bay also rostered four wide receivers that notched at least 50 receptions in the same season, just the third time (1983 and 2002) the feat has been accomplished since 1940. The offense's incredibly efficient play helped guide the club to a franchise record seventh consecutive playoff berth (2009-15). From 2011-14, Bennett put together one of the finest receiving trios in the NFL, as WRs Randall Cobb, James Jones and Nelson made the Packers one of just three teams to roster three receivers with at least 20 receiving scores each during that span. The three combined for 92 receiving touchdowns. Nelson accounted for 43 of those, the fourth-most in the NFL since 2011 and also finished sixth in the league with 4,841 receiving yards in the same time frame.

In 2014, Bennett mentored Cobb and Nelson to one of the greatest single-season performances the NFL has seen by two teammates, as they became the first duo in league history to each record 90-plus receptions, 1,200-plus yards and 12-plus receiving touchdowns. Nelson's 1,519 receiving yards set a club record, while his 98 receptions were fourth-most in franchise annals. For Cobb, it was the first 1,000-yard season of his career. The two both earned Pro Bowl selections after becoming the first pair of Packers players to notch at least 90 receptions in the same season.

A 2013 campaign saw Green Bay receiving corps account for 3,319 yards receiving, the second most in a single season in club history, despite dealing with the loss of Rodgers for seven games due to injury. With four different quarterbacks taking the snap from under center that season, the group of receivers still managed to average 207.4 yards per game, second most in the league.

In 2012, Jones led the NFL with 14 receiving touchdowns, becoming the first Packer to lead the league in receiving scores since WR Shannon Sharpe (18) accomplished the feat in 1994. With the absence of two of their top wide receivers for multiple games, Bennett helped second-year receiver Cobb emerge as a versatile threat, as he led the team with 80 receptions and 954 yards, while also hauling in eight touchdown passes.

In 2011, the receivers posted some of the best numbers in club history, accounting for a team-record 3,667 yards receiving and 38 touchdowns, the second-highest touchdown total in NFL history by a receiving group at the time. Bennett coached Nelson to a career-high 15 touchdown receptions, the third most in team history, adding 68 receptions for 1,263 yards (18.6 avg.), marking the second-best receiving average in the league that year among wide receivers with at least 50 receptions. WR Greg Jennings earned a Pro Bowl selection that season, posting 949 yards and nine touchdowns in just 13 games played.

Prior to his move to wide receivers, Bennett served six years as a running backs coach for the Packers from 2005-10. In his six years, Bennett coached running backs to 1,000-yard seasons three different times.

In his last season as running backs coach, Bennett oversaw the development of sixth-round draft pick RB James Starks, who set a franchise rookie playoff-record with 123 rushing yards in 2010 in the NFC Wild Card round and was instrumental down the stretch during the Packers' Super Bowl XLV title run. From 2008-09, Bennett coached RB Ryan Grant to over 1,200 yards on the ground in consecutive seasons, just the third tailback in team history to accomplish the feat. Grant also finished second in the NFC in 2009 with 11 rushing scores, the most by a Packers running back since 2003.

Bennett was key to the initial progress of Grant in 2007, Grant's first season with the team, as he totaled five 100-yard performances and set a Green Bay postseason record with 201 yards on the ground against the Seahawks. In 2006, Bennett helped lead the Packers' all-time leading rusher RB Ahman Green to his final 1,000-yard season. Due to injuries in Year 1 as running backs coach in 2005, Bennett mentored undrafted rookie RB Samkon Gado to the second-most productive season by a first-year running back in club history, as Gado posted 582 yards and six scores on the ground.

Prior to his move to coaching, Bennett spent four years in the Packers front office, serving as the team's director of player development from 2001-04. Bennett and his developmental cast around him were recognized in 2003 as the NFC's best player development department.

PERSONAL: Native of Jacksonville, Fla. ... Played eight seasons in the NFL for the Green Bay Packers and Chicago Bears ... Was the Packers' fourth-round selection in the 1992 NFL Draft ... Played in 112 games, starting 77 of them and tallied 3,992 yards rushing on 1,115 carries and added 21 touchdowns ... Also added 284 receptions for 2,245 yards and 10 receiving touchdowns ... MIKE CALDWELL

RUN GAME COORDINATOR / LINEBACKERS

1st Season with Raiders

Mike Caldwell joins the Raiders as the run game coordinator/linebackers coach in 2024, bringing with him 16 years of NFL coaching experience and 11 years of playing experience in the NFL.

Caldwell comes to Las Vegas after spending the last two seasons (2022-23) with the Jacksonville Jaguars as the defensive coordinator. Under his leadership, the Jaguars defense only allowed 103.1 rushing yards per game in 2023, the ninth fewest in the NFL. OLB Josh Allen broke the single-season franchise sack record with 17.5 sacks, tied for the second most in the NFL in 2023. The Jaguars defense also recorded 27 takeaways in 2023, tied for the eighth most in the NFL. With 27 takeaways in 2022, this was the first time since 2004-05 a Jaguars defense recorded 25+ takeaways in back-to-back seasons.

In 2022, his first season with the Jaguars, Caldwell's defense finished first in the NFL in passes defended (95) and tied for fourth in takeaways (27), as well as 12th in rushing yards allowed per game (114.8). LB Foye Oluokun led the league in tackles with 184 and also set the franchise record for tackles in a season.

Caldwell spent the previous three seasons (2019-21) with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as the inside linebackers coach. During that span, the Buccaneers led the NFL in rushing defense, allowing only 82.5 rushing yards per game and 3.72 yards per carry to opponents. The Buccaneers defense also produced the NFL's third-most takeaways (82), third-most sacks (142) and allowed the league's ninth-fewest yards per game (334.1). Under Caldwell, LB Lavonte David was named Associated Press Second Team All-Pro in 2020, while LB Devin White was named Associated Press Second Team All-Pro in 2020 and was selected to the Pro Bowl in 2021. In 2021, the Buccaneers defense allowed just 92.5 rushing yards per game, the third-fewest in the league, along with 20.8 points per game, the fifth-fewest in the NFL. LB Devin White finished with a team-high 128 tackles, while LB Lavonte David finished second with 97 tackles.

In 2020, Caldwell was part of a Buccaneers defense that led the NFL in rushing yards allowed per game (80.6) and ranked sixth in total yards allowed per game (327.1), finishing the season with a 11-5 record and a Super Bowl LV victory. Caldwell's unit included LB Devin White, who finished the year ranked third in the NFL in solo tackles (97), tied for third in tackles for loss (15) and fifth in total tackles (140), adding 9.0 sacks. LB Lavonte David also continued his run as one of the league's most consistently productive linebackers, compiling 117 tackles (12 for loss), six passes defended, three forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and one interception.

In 2019, Caldwell's first season with the Buccaneers, LB Lavonte David posted his seventh season with 100-or-more tackles and joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Ray Lewis as the only two players with at least 1,000 tackles, 20.0 sacks and 10 interceptions through eight seasons since sacks became an official statistic in 1982. LB Devin White overcame an early-season injury to lead the 2019 rookie class with 7.0 tackles per game and earn NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month honors in both November and December.

Prior to his time in Tampa Bay, Caldwell spent four seasons (2015-18) working as the assistant head coach/inside linebackers coach with the New York Jets under head coach Todd Bowles. During his time in New York, Jets defenses held opponents to 4.0 yards per carry, the sixth-lowest figure in the NFL over that span. In Caldwell's first season with the Jets (2015), New York allowed a franchise-low 83.4 rushing yards allowed per game, which ranked second in the NFL. Under Caldwell's guidance, LBs Demario Davis (135 in 2017) and Avery Williamson (120 in 2018) each posted career highs in total tackles.

Before his time with the Jets, Caldwell spent two seasons (2013-14) coaching linebackers for the Arizona Cardinals. The Cardinals' 2013 unit led allowed the fewest rushing yards per game in the NFL (84.4) and the sixth fewest total yards allowed per game (317.4).

Caldwell began his coaching career with the Philadelphia Eagles, working first as a training camp intern in 2007 before spending two seasons (2008-09) as a defensive quality control coach. He then spent the 2010 season as the Eagles assistant linebackers coach before being elevated to linebackers coach in 2011, a position he held for two seasons (2011-12). Over his two seasons as linebackers coach in Philadelphia, the Eagles defense ranked in the top half of the league in total defense, allowing the eighth fewest yards in the NFL (324.9) in 2011 and the 15th fewest yards allowed in 2012 (343.2).

PERSONAL: An Oak Ridge, Tenn. Native...Played 11 seasons in the NFL as a linebacker, making stops with the Cleveland Browns (1993-95), Baltimore Ravens (1996), Arizona Cardinals (1997), Philadelphia Eagles (1998-2001), Chicago Bears (2002) and Carolina Panthers (2003)...Played in 159 career games (49 starts) and racked up 562 total tackles (412 solo), 21 tackles for loss, eight interceptions (three INTs returned for a touchdown), 22 passes defended, six forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries...Attended Middle Tennessee State University, where his collegiate career earned him a spot in the Football Hall of Fame at MTSU...He and his wife, Sue, have two daughters, Sydnei and Saniah, and a son, Simeon.

1st Season with Raiders

Andre Carter joins the Raiders in 2024 as the pass rush specialist, bringing with him seven years of coaching experience, including five seasons coaching in the NFL ranks. A former player, Carter also brings with him 13 years of playing experience in the NFL. Carter also has two years of coaching experience at the college level, most recently serving as the defensive line coach at LSU in 2021.

In his lone season at LSU, Carter mentored DT Maason Smith, who earned Freshman All-SEC honors and Freshman All-America honors after recording 4.0 sacks and 5 TFLs in nine games. Carter also coached sophomore DE BJ Ojulari, who led the team with 7.0 sacks and ranked second with 11.5 TFLs.

Before LSU, Carter coached the defensive line with the New York Jets for two seasons (2019-20). In 2020, Carter continued to develop second-year DT Quinnen Williams, who totaled 55 tackles, 7.0 sacks and 10 TFLs. During his first year with the Jets (2019), Carter oversaw a defensive line that contributed to the NFL's second-ranked run defense (86.9) that held opposing ball carriers to just 3.34 yards per carry (2nd in NFL). Carter's defensive line also held opposing offenses to 117 carries of zero or negative yards, the most in the NFL. Several defensive linemen saw an increase in their production under Carter, including 10-year veteran Steve McLendon who posted single-season bests in tackles for loss (10) and quarterback hits (seven). He also helped rookie DE Kyle Phillips finish first among undrafted rookies in the NFL with seven TFLs and ranked 5th in total tackles (39).

Before his time in New York, Carter spent two seasons (2017-18) with the Miami Dolphins, serving as the assistant defensive line coach. In his two seasons in Miami, DE Cameron Wake produced 16.5 sacks and 44 quarterback hits, both top 10 totals among AFC defensive linemen, despite being 35 and 36 in those seasons. Over his time in Miami, Carter's unit produced 140 quarterback hits, the seventh-best total in the NFL over that span. Additionally, Miami's defensive line accounted for 86 tackles for loss, tied for the ninth-most in the league from 2017-18.

Prior to his time in Miami, Carter was a Bill Walsh NFL Diversity Coaching Fellowship participant with San Francisco in 2016. He began his coaching career in 2015 as a graduate student assistant at his alma mater, California

JAMES CREGG

OFFENSIVE LINE

9th Season in NFL

3rd Season with Raiders

James Cregg is entering his first season with the Las Vegas Raiders in 2024 as the offensive line coach, bringing with him 26 years of coaching experience, including eight years as a coach in the NFL.

Cregg joins the Raiders after spending two seasons as the assistant offensive line coach with the San Francisco 49ers (2022-23). Last season (2023), Cregg assisted an offensive line that only allowed 34 sacks, tied for the sixth fewest in the NFL. Cregg's unit also paved the way for 140.5 rushing yards per game in 2023, the third most in the NFL and the highest average in a single season by San Francisco since 2019 (144.1). The 49ers' offensive line played a part in RB Christian McCaffrey's league-leading 1,459 rushing yards, winning the 2023 NFL rushing title and AP Offensive Player of the Year.

In his first season with the 49ers (2022), Cregg assisted with a unit that allowed just 31 sacks, the sixth fewest in the NFL, including five games without allowing a sack, matching the most registered by the 49ers in a single season since 1980 (2000). The line also blocked for 138.8 rushing yards per game, the eighth best average in the league. In both seasons with San Francisco (2022-23), Cregg saw T Trent Williams earn Pro Bowl and AP First Team All-Pro Honors.

He joined the 49ers after spending three seasons (2018-20) as the offensive line coach at Louisiana State University. In 2020 with LSU, Cregg saw the Tigers rush for an average of 121.7 yards per game. The year prior, LSU had eight players start on the offensive line, using a different starting lineup on the offensive line in every game until games 8 and 9 (wins over Auburn and Alabama). Cregg led C Loyd Cushenberry, who was later drafted in the third round of the 2020 NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos, and RG Damien Lewis, who was later drafted in the third round of the 2020 NFL Draft by the Seattle Seahawks – both players started every game for the Tigers and both earned All-America honors. LSU's offensive line in 2019 helped pave the way for the first offense in NCAA history to feature a 5,000-yard passer, two 1,000-yard receivers and a 1,000-yard rusher. LSU's offense led the country in both scoring (32.0) and total offense (433.9) and set numerous SEC and school records on its way to a 15-0 record and a national title. Cregg's unit was also selected as the winner of the Joe Moore Award in 2019 for the Most Outstanding Offensive Line Unit in college football that season.

The 2018 Tigers had an offensive line that returned only two starters (Garrett Brumfield and Saahdiq Charles), and Cregg's unit helped pave the way for 1,000-yard rusher RB Nick Brossette. LSU had eight different players start at least one game on the offensive line in Cregg's first season at LSU and the Tigers used a total of seven combinations on the offensive line in 13 games.

Cregg joined LSU after one season (2017) with the Los Angeles Chargers where he assisted with an offensive line that allowed the fewest sacks in the NFL (18) and helped RB Melvin Gordon III rush for a career-high 1,105 yards.

Cregg went to the Chargers following three seasons (2014-16) as the assistant offensive line coach with the Denver Broncos. In his first year with the Broncos in 2014, Denver's offensive line allowed the fewest sacks in the NFL (17) and ranked fourth in the League in total offense (402.9 yards per game). T Ryan Clady earned his fourth-career Pro Bowl selection. The Broncos won Super Bowl 50 in Cregg's second season in Denver, as the Broncos defeated the Carolina Panthers, 24-10, at Levi's Stadium. The Broncos featured six new additions who made starts along the offensive line. In 2014, he assisted an offensive line that allowed the fewest sacks in the NFL (17) and helped the offense finish fourth in total offense (402.9) and second in scoring offense (30.1).

From 2010-13, Cregg worked as the offensive line coach at the University of Southern California. Cregg coached First-Team All-Pac-12 selections in each of his four years with the school, including future NFL first-round picks T Tyron Smith (number nine overall to the Dallas Cowboys in 2011) and Matt Kalil (number four overall to the Minnesota Vikings in 2012). In 2011, USC finished second in the nation in sacks allowed (eight), and Kalil was named a First-Team All-American, while G Marcus Martin was a First-Team Freshman All-American. Before USC, Cregg spent the 2009 season at the University of Tennessee coaching the offensive line, where the Volunteers allowed just 12 sacks, tied for fewest in the SEC.

Cregg first entered the NFL with the Oakland Raiders, working as the team's assistant offensive line coach for two seasons (2007-08). The Raiders averaged 124.2 rushing yards per game in 2008 (10th in NFL) after finishing the 2007 season with the sixth-best rushing offense (130.4).

Before his first stint with the Raiders, Cregg spent three seasons (2004-06) as defensive line coach at the University of Idaho. He joined Idaho after spending the 2000-03 seasons at Colgate University coaching the defensive line. He began his coaching career at Colorado State University, where he served as a defensive graduate assistant from 1997-99.

PERSONAL: A native of Norco, Calif. ...Played four years (1992-95) at Colorado State, where he started on the offensive line his final two seasons and earned All-WAC honors as a senior in 1995...Cregg and his wife, Dayna, have one daughter, McKenzie.

3rd Season in NFL

3rd Season with Raiders

Matt Feeney enters his third season in the NFL and the third with the Silver and Black. After spending the past two seasons as a defensive quality control coach, Feeney enters 2024 as the team's assistant defensive backs coach.

In 2023, Feeney supported a defense that ranked ninth in the league for fewest points allowed per game (19.5) and 12th for fewest passing yards allowed per game (212.4). Once Antonio Pierce took over as interim head coach in Week 9, Feeney took over the linebacker room on an interim basis. In Feeney's second week leading linebackers, Robert Spillane won his first-ever AFC Defensive Player of the Week title after finishing with seven tackles, one tackle for loss, one pass defended, and a game-winning interception in Week 10 versus the New York Jets. Spillane went on to set single-season career highs with 148 total tackles (10th-most in the NFL), 3.5 sacks and three interceptions. Feeney also saw LB Divine Deablo register 100+ tackles for the first time in his career.

In 2022, Feeney worked closely with the linebackers and aided in the development of undrafted rookie linebacker Luke Masterson, who finished with 50 tackles (26 solo), ranking third-most in the NFL among undrafted rookies and second-most in a single season in Raiders' history by an undrafted rookie. With Feeney's assistance, the Raiders saw four undrafted free agents play significant snaps on defense in Masterson, CB Sam Webb, S Isaiah Pola-Mao and LB Darien Butler. Prior to joining the Silver and Black, Feeney spent three seasons (2019-21) as the defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach at the University of Akron.

During his tenure at Akron, Feeney mentored LB John Lako and CB Alvin Davis Jr. to All-Mid-American Conference honors in 2019. Lako received first-team All-MAC recognition as he was the Zips' defensive leader for the second consecutive season, finishing with 138 tackles and recording double-digit tackles in nine games. Davis was the top defensive back on the team, recording 79 tackles and garnering third-team All-MAC honors after being named a first-team All-MAC selection in 2018 and second-team selection in 2017. In 2020, DB AJ Watts was named third-team All-MAC.

Prior to that, Feeney spent two seasons at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga. He served as the team's defensive coordinator in 2018 after coaching the linebackers in 2017.

In 2018, Feeney's defense was ranked No. 1 in the Southern Conference in scoring defense (18.5), pass defense (172.0) and fumbles recovered (20). Under Feeney's tutelage, DL Isaiah Mack earned Southern Conference Defensive Player of the Year honors after finishing second in the conference and 19th in the FCS with 8.5 sacks. In total, Feeney saw six players from his defensive unit earn All-Conference honors. Mack and CB Kareem Orr both signed with the Tennessee Titans as undrafted free agents in 2019.

In 2017, Feeney's defense ranked No. 1 in the Southern Conference and No. 25 in the FCS in total defense (326.4). He mentored LB Tae Davis, who converted from safety and finished his senior season with 74 tackles in nine games and was signed as an undrafted free agent by the Cleveland Browns.

Feeney entered the collegiate coaching rankings with his alma mater, John Carroll University, where he coached linebacker from 2014-16. During each of his three seasons, the Blue Streaks defense finished in the top-15 among all Division III schools.

In 2016, Feeney helped LB Mason McKenrick earn All-OAC first team honors and be named a first-team All-America selection. LB Andy Bryan earned first-team All-OAC honors in 2015 under Feeney's guidance. In 2014, he coached LB Kevin Cope to All-American honors, while LB Jimmy King earned second-team All-League honors.

PERSONAL: Feeney was a standout linebacker and team captain at John Carroll University from 2010-13, earning the Gene Slaughter Most Outstanding Linebacker Award as a senior as the top linebacker in the Ohio Athletic Conference... He earned his degree in marketing... Feeney and his wife, Katie, have three daughters.

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

10th Season in NFL

1st Season with Raiders

Luke Getsy enters his first season as offensive coordinator with the Las Vegas Raiders in 2024.

Getsy joins the Silver and Black after two seasons as the offensive coordinator for the Chicago Bears, bringing with him 17 years of coaching experience, including nine in the NFL.

In 2023, Getsy led an offense that ranked second in the NFL in rushing attempts (534), rushing yards (2,399) and rushing yards per game (141.1). Under his guidance, wide receiver DJ Moore registered career highs in receptions (96), receiving yards (1,364) and touchdowns (eight). He also helped tight end Cole Kmet set career bests for receptions (73) and receiving yards (719).

In his first season as the Bears' coordinator in 2022, Getsy helped guide the offense to a franchise record 3,014 total rushing yards and a league-best 177.3 rushing yards per game. He helped QB Justin Fields set a Bears' single-season franchise rushing record by a quarterback with 1,143 rushing yards, becoming just 1-of-3 quarterbacks in league history to rush for 1,000-plus yards in single season, joining Lamar Jackson (2019, 2020) and Michael Vick (2006).

Prior to joining Chicago, Getsy spent seven seasons with the Green Bay Packers in multiple roles, serving as the team's quarterbacks/passing game coordinator from 2020-21, quarterbacks coach in 2019, wide receivers coach from 2016-17 and offensive quality control coach from 2014-15. During his time in Green Bay, he was part of five NFC North Division Championships and six postseason appearances.

In 2021, Getsy completed his second season as the club's quarterbacks coach and passing game coordinator, where he helped guide Aaron Rodgers to MVP and first-team AP All-Pro honors for the second-straight season after he threw for 4,115 yards and 37 touchdowns.

In his first season as passing game coordinator in 2020, Getsy helped guide a Packers' offense that led the league in scoring (31.8 ppg), set an NFL record for red-zone touchdown percentage (80.0 percent) and posted the team's highest third-down percentage since 1970 (49.4 percent). He also tutored Rodgers as he earned his third career MVP honors and led the NFL in passer rating (121.5), passing touchdowns (48), completion percentage (70.7) and interception percentage (0.95).

Getsy returned for his second stint with the Packers in 2019, serving as the team's quarterbacks coach and helping Rodgers earn his eighth-career Pro Bowl selection after throwing for 4,002 yards and 26 touchdowns. Under his tutelage, Rodgers became the only quarterback in NFL history to finish with 4,000-plus passing yards, 25-plus passing touchdowns and fewer than four interceptions in a single season. Rodgers led the league in interception percentage (0.7), the second-best mark in team history, and tied for the league-lead with 12 zero interception games.

In his lone season at Mississippi State in 2018, Getsy served as offensive coordinator/wide receivers coach and helped the Bulldogs rank No. 2 in the SEC in rushing (223.6 yards per game) and yards per carry (5.66). His offense rushed for 300-plus yards in four games, the most in the SEC and tied for 13th-most in the FBS. Under his guidance, QB Nick Fitzgerald led all FBS quarterbacks in 100-yard rushing games (7) and was one of only three quarterbacks in the FBS to rush for more than 1,000 yards and throw for 1,700-plus yards.

As wide receivers coach with the Packers in 2016-17, Getsy worked with WR Davante Adams, who was the only player in the NFL with 70-plus receptions and 10-plus receiving touchdowns in both of those seasons. Adams led the team with 74 catches for a team-high 885 yards (12.0 avg.) and 10 touchdowns in 2017, earning his first career Pro Bowl selection.

In his first year as receivers coach in 2016, the Packers were 1-of-2 teams in the NFL to have three wide receivers (Jordy Nelson, Adams, Randall Cobb) with 60-plus receptions and 600-plus receiving yards. Getsy coached Nelson to AP NFL Comeback Player of the Year honors after leading the team in receptions (97), receiving yards (1,257) and receiving touchdowns (14). Nelson led the league with 14 receiving touchdowns and Adams ranked second with 12, becoming only the second teammate duo in franchise history with 12-plus touchdown receptions in the same season (Nelson and Cobb, 2014).

In 2015, Getsy assisted with an offense that posted eight zero-turnover games, tied for No. 1 (2009) in franchise history. Green Bay's 17 giveaways were the fifth fewest in team history. Additionally, he worked with an offense that had four players with 50-plus receptions.

Getsy was part of an offensive staff in 2014 that helped the Packers lead the league in scoring (30.4 ppg) and tie for first in the NFL in fewest giveaways (13). Cobb and Nelson both earned Pro Bowl selections after becoming the first duo in league history to each record 90-plus receptions, 1,200-plus yards and 12-plus receiving touchdowns. Getsy also worked with Rodgers as he was named the NFL's Most Valuable Player by The Associated Press after finishing second in the league in passer rating (112.2), third in TD passes (38), first in TD/INT ratio (7.60, 38/5) and second in yards per attempt (8.43).

Getsy spent the 2013 season as wide receivers coach at Western Michigan where he tutored WR Corey Davis, who earned second-team All-Mid-American Conference honors and was named Freshman of the Year after recording 67 catches for 941 yards and six touchdowns.

As the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Indiana University of Pennsylvania (2011-12), Getsy helped guide the Crimson Hawks to the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference title in 2012, leading an offense that ranked No. 10 nationally with 259.3 rushing yards per game. His offense was led by a pair of 1,000-yard rushers in Harvie Tuck (1,660) and De'Antwan Williams (1,325).

Getsy served as an offensive graduate assistant at Pittsburgh in 2010 and was part of a staff that helped guide the Panthers to a share of the Big East title. In 2009, he was the offensive coordinator at West Virginia Wesleyan College.

He began his coaching career at his alma mater, the University of Akron, serving as a graduate assistant from 2007-08.

PATRICK GRAHAM

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

16th Season in NFL

3rd Season with Raiders

Patrick Graham enters his third season as defensive coordinator with the Silver and Black, bringing with him 15 years of experience in the NFL, including five years as a defensive coordinator.

In his NFL career, Graham has coached in the playoffs in eight seasons, winning seven division titles, two conference championships and one Super Bowl (XLIX).

Last season, Graham oversaw a defensive unit that ranked 9th overall in points allowed per game (19.5), a 17-place improvement from 2022. Similarly, Graham's total defense in 2023 finished 15th in the league after previously holding the 28th spot in 2022. Over the second half of the season, the Raiders defense was one of the best units in the NFL. From Week 9-18, the defense led the NFL in points allowed (16.0), ranked tied for 10th in the NFL in takeaways (14) and ranked tied for third in sacks (30). Under Graham's guidance, DE Maxx Crosby finished the season ranked tied for first in the NFL in tackles for loss (23), sixth in sacks (14.5) and third among NFL defensive linemen in tackles (90), en route to his third-straight Pro Bowl, second-career AP Second Team All-Pro selection and third-consecutive PFWA All-AFC selection. Graham also saw free agent acquisition LB Robert Spillane have a career year with 82 tackles (66), 3.5 sacks, three interceptions, four passes defended, seven tackles for loss, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery.

In his first season with the Raiders, Graham oversaw a unit that scored three defensive touchdowns, tied for the third-most in the NFL in 2022. His defense ranked 19th in rushing yards allowed per game (122.8) and saw a slight improvement in tackles for loss (68) and stuffs (39) from the 2021 season.

Under Graham's guidance, DE Maxx Crosby was named to his second career Pro Bowl after registering career highs in tackles (88), tackles for loss (22) and sacks (12.5). Crosby's 88 tackles are the most in a single season by a Raiders defensive lineman and he became only the second defensive lineman in franchise history to record 20+ tackles for loss in a single season. Graham also aided in the development of several young players who got significant playing time, including undrafted rookie CB Sam Webb, who posted 33 tackles, the fifth-most in the NFL among undrafted rookies. LB Luke Masterson finished with 50 tackles (26 solo), ranking third-most in the NFL among undrafted rookies and second-most in a single season in Raiders' history by an undrafted rookie.

Graham served his second stint with the New York Giants from 2020-21, serving as the club's assistant head coach/defensive coordinator. In 2021, Graham oversaw a defense that tied for fourth in the league in passes defended (83), a mark that ranked 12th in franchise history, and tied for 12th in interceptions (15). Graham's defense was effective against the pass, holding teams to 225.8 passing yards per game, which ranked 15th in the NFL.

Under Graham's guidance, the Giants defense improved significantly in 2020, ranking ninth with 357 points allowed, which marked 94 fewer than their total in 2019. The defense was 12th in the NFL by allowing 349.3 yards per game after finishing 27th at 377.3 yards the previous season. It marked the club's best defensive finish since 2016 when they ranked 10th in the league with 339.7 yards a game. Additionally, the Giants defense allowed an average 5.3 yards a play in 2020, the NFL's ninth-lowest figure.

After placing 20th in the NFL in 2019, Graham helped the rushing defense rank 10th 111.4 yards a game and mark a season best since 2016 when they tied for third at 88.6 rushing yards a game. The pass defense improved from 28th in the NFL in 2019 to tie for 16th with 237.9 yards allowed a game, the team's best since 2013 when the Giants allowed 223.3 yards a game and ranked 10th in the league. Graham saw the Giants record 40 sacks in 2020, their highest total since 2014. DE Leonard Williams led the team with 11.5 sacks, the most by a Giants' player since OLB Jason Pierre-Paul's 14.5 in 2014.

With Graham's direction, veterans LB Blake Martinez, Pro Bowl CB James Bradberry and S Logan Ryan excelled in their first season in a new defense. Martinez led the Giants and ranked third in the NFL with 151 tackles (86 solo). Bradberry started all 15 games in which he played, leading the team with three interceptions and tied for second in the NFL with 18 passes defended. Ryan, a cornerback most of his career, started 13 games at safety in Graham's defense and finished second on the team with 92 tackles (67), one sack, one interception, nine passes defended, three forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries.

Graham earned his first defensive coordinator role with the Miami Dolphins in 2019. He led a unit that had a constantly evolving cast of players because of roster transactions and injuries. The secondary's best player, former first-round draft choice Minkah Fitzpatrick, was traded to Pittsburgh on Sept. 17. CB Xavien Howard played in five games before going on injured reserve with a knee injury. S Reshad Jones, a two-time Pro Bowler, and Bobby McCain appeared in four and nine games, respectively, before they were placed on the injured reserve list on the same day.

Prior to joining the Dolphins, Graham spent the 2018 season as the Green Bay Packers inside linebackers coach and defensive run game coordinator. Under his tutelage, Martinez totaled 144 tackles (91) and a career-high five sacks. Green Bay's defense limited opponents to 4.3 yards per rush, which ranked 13th in the league.

In his first stint with the Giants, Graham coached the defensive line from 2016-17. In 2017, Graham helped Pierre-Paul lead the team with 8.5 sacks and DT Damon Harrison posted 76 tackles, which led all NFL defensive tackles.

In 2016, Graham's unit was instrumental in the Giants defense becoming the most improved in the NFL. The team allowed 158 fewer points and 1,290 fewer yards than it did in 2015. Their 17.8 points per game allowed was second in the NFL and the team's best since 2002.

Graham began his NFL coaching career in New England, where he spent seven seasons with the Patriots (2009-15). He was a coaching assistant in 2009 before being promoted to defensive assistant in 2010 and linebackers coach in 2011. Graham moved to defensive line from 2012-13 before returning to linebackers in 2014-15.

During his tenure in New England, the Patriots won the AFC East title all seven seasons, the conference championship twice and Super Bowl XLIX. In his five years as a position coach (2011-15), New England led the NFL in takeaways (150) and was tied for fourth in sacks (214).

Graham's linebacker unit helped the team finish ninth in total yards allowed (339.4) in 2015 and 10th in points allowed (19.7). LB Jamie Collins tied a franchise record with five forced fumbles, earning the first Pro Bowl selection of his career and was named second-team All-Pro.

In 2014 Patriots finished their season with a Super Bowl victory against Seattle. Graham's linebackers helped the team's defense rank eighth in the league in points allowed (19.6) and ninth in rushing yards allowed (104.3) despite LBs Jerod Mayo and Don't'a Hightower missing 14 games combined due to injury. Collins led the team with 115 tackles (74) and also totaled four sacks and four forced fumbles. Graham worked with the defensive line for the second straight year in 2013. Despite DT Vince Wilfork suffering a season ending injury in Week 4, New England's defense finished fifth in the league in sacks (48) and 10th in points allowed (21.1). The team's five top sack totals all came from defensive linemen, topped by DE Chandler Jones (11.5).

In 2012, Graham helped Wilfork earn his fifth Pro Bowl selection and first-team All-Pro honors, after totaling 59 tackles (41) with three sacks, two forced fumbles and six fumble recoveries. Additionally, Graham helped Rob Ninkovich transitioned from linebacker to defensive end in 2012, while totaling eight sacks.


Graham's first season as a position coach was in 2011 with the linebackers. New England finished with a 13-3 record, winning the AFC Championship. Mayo led the team with 103 tackles (97) and became the first player in franchise history to total 100-plus tackles in each of his first four seasons.

In 2010, Graham served as a defensive assistant with the Patriots, who finished second in the NFL with 38 takeaways and eighth in points allowed (19.6). He began his NFL coaching career in 2009 as a coaching assistant with New England.

Graham joined New England following two seasons (2007-08) as a graduate assistant at Notre Dame, where he worked with the defense. He spent three seasons (2004-06) as an assistant coach at Richmond, mentoring tight ends from 2005-06 and the defensive line in 2004.

Graham began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Wagner (2002-03). He coached the junior varsity team to an undefeated season, while also serving as strength and conditioning coach and academic coordinator.

PERSONAL: Graham played collegiately at Yale, where he was a defensive lineman for the 1999 team that shared an Ivy League title with Brown...He earned a bachelor's degree in sociology with a concentration in economics and African American studies...A native of Waterbury, Conn., Graham and his wife, Pamela, have two children, Morgan and Silas.



DUCE GRUDEN

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING ASSISTANT

9th Season in NFL

7th Season with Raiders

Deuce Gruden enters his ninth season in the NFL and seventh with the Silver and Black as a strength and conditioning assistant.

Gruden works extensively with all position groups throughout the roster with a focus on strength training. His responsibilities also include assisting the athletic training staff in transitioning players back from injury into participation and managing performance data for the team's strength and conditioning staff.

In 2023, Gruden helped DE Maxx Crosby earn his third-straight Pro Bowl selection after finishing with career highs in total tackles (90), TFLs (23) and sacks (14.5). His strength training allowed LB Divine Deablo to start a career-high 15 games and finish second on the team with 105 tackles, while his work with the defensive line aided DE Malcolm Koonce, who registered a career-high eight sacks, and DT John Jenkins, who set career highs in starts (17), tackles (61), tackles for loss (four) and passes defended (four).

In 2022, Gruden saw five Raiders players make the Pro Bowl in WR Davante Adams, DE Maxx Crosby, RB Josh Jacobs, QB Derek Carr and P AJ Cole. He also assisted in the strength development of four undrafted free agents who made the final 53-man roster, tied for the most over the last 10 seasons by the Raiders and the most since 2019.

In 2021, Gruden helped the Raiders finish with a 10-7 record, earning their first postseason berth since 2016. Gruden also saw the Silver and Black produce four Pro Bowlers in P AJ Cole, DE Maxx Crosby, LB Denzel Perry and WR Hunter Renfrow, marking the first career selection for all four players.

Gruden's assistance in the weight room helped the Raiders produce two Pro Bowlers in 2020, as RB Josh Jacobs and TE Darren Waller each earned the nod for the first time in their careers. Waller set a new club record with 107 receptions and posted career highs in receiving yards (1,196) and touchdowns (nine), while Jacobs surpassed the 1,000-yard mark with 1,065 yards on the ground and a career-high 12 touchdowns.

In 2019, Gruden continued his work with implementing the team's strength and conditioning program and saw T Trent Brown and C Rodney Hudson earn Pro Bowl honors, while G Richie Incognito, FB Alec Ingold, Jacobs and Waller were named as alternates. Gruden also saw the 2019 rookie class combine to lead the NFL in scrimmage touchdowns (17), sacks (14.5), yards after the catch (676), rushing yards (1,167), rushing touchdowns (seven) and rushing first downs (60) among their rookie peers. The Raiders rookies also ranked second in receptions (107) and receiving yards (1,112).

During his first season with the Raiders in 2018, Gruden worked with TE Jared Cook as he earned his first Pro Bowl selection in 2018. Gruden also helped train Hudson and G/T Kelechi Osemele in 2018, who were named Pro Bowl alternates.

Prior to joining the Raiders, Gruden served as a strength and conditioning assistant with the Washington Redskins for two seasons (2016-17). He was promoted as a full-time strength and conditioning coach during the 2017 offseason after initially joining Washington as a strength and conditioning intern during the 2016 season, a year in which the strength staff helped produce five Pro Bowlers.

In addition to his coaching responsibilities, Gruden played an integral role in training athletes at ESPN's Wide World of Sports in Orlando for Jon Gruden's QB Camp, where he led workouts for college players preparing to participate in the NFL Combine.

Still University in Kinesiology with a focus in corrective exercise...Certified in USA weightlifting coaching and as a Strength and Conditioning Specialist...A competitive powerlifter who won gold at the 2017 International Powerlifting Federation's World Classic Powerlifting Championships in Belarus...Attended Lafayette University where he earned a degree in biology, while also playing running back for the Leopards from 2012-15.

12th Season in NFL

2nd Season with Raiders

Rob Leonard enters his second season as the defensive line coach for the Las Vegas Raiders in 2024. Leonard now has 14 years of coaching experience, including 11 seasons coaching in the NFL ranks. Last season (2023), the Raiders defense recorded 46 total sacks, tied for the 13th most in the NFL. The Raiders' 46 sacks were also the most in a single season by the Silver and Black since 2010 (47). Under Leonard, DE Maxx Crosby finished the season ranked tied for first in the NFL in tackles for loss (23), sixth in sacks (14.5) and third among NFL defensive linemen in tackles (90), en route to his third-straight Pro Bowl, second-career AP Second Team All-Pro selection and third-consecutive PFWA All-AFC selection. Leonard also saw DE Malcolm Koonce make a big improvement, recording a single-season career-high 8.0 sacks, the second most on the team and tied for the fourth most in a single season in Raiders history by a player in their first three seasons.

Leonard joined the Raiders after spending one season with the Baltimore Ravens as an outside linebackers coach in 2022. In 2022, Leonard helped Baltimore's defense rank in the top-5 in four categories: No. 3 in points allowed per game (18.5), No. 3 in defensive red zone TD percentage (46.4), No. 3 in rushing yards per game (92.1) and No. 4 in third-down efficiency (34.9). Under Leonard's guidance, his unit combined for 19.5 sacks, including OLB Justin Houston who recorded 9.5 sacks and became the first Ravens defender in franchise history to produce three straight multi-sack games.

Prior to Baltimore, Leonard spent three years (2019-21) with the Miami Dolphins, where he held multiple positions during his tenure... He led a linebacker corps that produced 329 total tackles, 34 tackles for loss and 19.5 sacks, while tying for the NFL's fourth-most quarterback hits (61) over that span...

Under Leonard's tutelage in 2021, rookie OLB Jaelan Phillips finished with a Dolphins' rookie record with 8.5 sacks, good for second among all NFL rookies.

As the assistant defensive line coach in 2020, Leonard helped Miami's defense finish first in the NFL in both takeaways (29) and third-down defense (31.2 percent)... Spent the 2019 season as Miami's linebackers coach, helping Baker rank fourth in the AFC with 124 total tackles.

He spent the first six seasons of his NFL coaching career (2013-18) as an assistant with the New York Giants.

In 2018, Leonard served as outside linebackers coach, helping DE Olivier Vernon lead New York with seven sacks and 21 QB hits... As the assistant defensive line coach in 2017, helped guide DT Damon Harrison to produce 76 tackles, which ranked second on the team and led all NFL defensive linemen.

From 2013-16, Leonard was part of a staff that coached the NFL's most-improved defense, going from 32nd (420.3 yards per game) in 2015 to 10th (339.7 yards per game) in 2016 in total yards allowed... That season, the Giants finished 11-5 and earned a playoff berth... New York ranked eighth in the NFL in total defense in 2013, allowing just 332.3 yards per game.

Prior to joining the NFL ranks, Leonard coached at his alma mater, North Carolina State, where he was a graduate assistant for three seasons (2010-12), helping the Wolfpack appear in three consecutive bowl games.

In 2009, he served as a defensive assistant with Cardinal Gibbons High School in Raleigh, N.C.

Leonard was a three-year letterman at safety and linebacker at North Carolina State, initially joining the team as a walk-on before earning a scholarship following his freshman season at Washington & Jefferson College... In 2008, he led the Wolfpack with 95 tackles and earned the team's Mike Hardy Award, given annually to the player who plays beyond his capabilities.

PERSONAL: Attended Moon Area (Moon Township, Pa.) High School, where he earned first-team All-Conference honors as a cornerback, while also playing as a running back, kick returner and punter... 1st Season with Raiders

Marcus “Bug” Lewis enters his first season with the Las Vegas Raiders in 2024 as an assistant linebackers coach, bringing with him 10 years of coaching experience, including five years as a coach in the NFL.

Prior to joining the Raiders, Lewis served as the running backs coach for the Las Vegas Vipers of the XFL. Lewis led the running backs room to finish fourth in the league in rushing (93.1 yards per game). Starting running back and leader of the offense, Rod Smith, played nine games and led the team with 274 yards on 70 attempts (3.91) and two touchdowns. Another notable running back, John Lovett, had 227 yards on 59 attempts (3.85) and three touchdowns.

Lewis served as a defensive analyst for the Arizona State Sun Devils in 2020. In an abbreviated season, Lewis assisted a defensive unit that ranked first nationally in turnover margin (+8) and also ranked first in the Pac-12 in scoring defense (23.2) and fumble recoveries (8).

Before Arizona State, Lewis spent one season (2019) as the running backs coach at Hampton University. Under Lewis’ guidance, running back Shai McKenzie earned first-team All-Big South honors after becoming the first Hampton running back to run for 1,000 yards since 2012.

His last stint in the NFL was five seasons (2014-18) with the Cincinnati Bengals, working as a defensive assistant/defensive quality control coach (2014-15), defensive line/defensive quality control coach (2016-17) and a linebackers/defensive quality control coach (2018). At the helm of the defensive line in 2017, his unit helped the Bengals defense rank sixth in the NFL in total yards allowed per play (5.0) and ninth in sacks per pass play (0.11). The defensive line also played a key role in helping the Bengals rank sixth in the NFL in red-zone defense, allowing TDs on only 46.4 percent of trips inside the 20-yard line. Over his time in Cincinnati, Lewis saw DT Geno Atkins earn two Pro Bowl nods and twice led all NFL interior linemen in sacks. DE Carlos Dunlap also posted 7.5 sacks in 2017, bringing his career total to 64.5, second all-time in Bengals history.

In 2016, the Bengals defense ranked eighth in the NFL in points allowed per game (19.7). DT Geno Atkins was named Defensive MVP of the AFC North in a vote of ESPN.com division beat writers. Lewis helped DE Carlos Dunlap to a Pro Bowl nod in 2016, after posting the second most sacks on the team with 8.0 and had eight passes defended, tied for the most in the NFL among defensive linemen. He was the first defensive lineman to lead the Bengals in passes defended in a season.

As a defensive assistant in 2015, Lewis contributed to a unit that allowed the second-fewest points (279, 17.4 per game) in the NFL, the highest single-season league ranking in Bengals history. In 2014, his first season in Cincinnati, the Bengals ranked 12th in the NFL in fewest points allowed (21.5 per game), and the defense ranked in the top 10 in nine of the 15 major statistical categories widely monitored by NFL coaching staffs. Among those top 10 rankings, the Bengals were tied for third in interceptions (20) and third in lowest passer rating allowed (75.8).

Lewis began his coaching career at the University of Cincinnati in 2013, where he worked as a defensive assistant. He worked primarily with the defensive line and was in charge of scout teams film breakdown and practice organizations. In 2013, the Bearcats’ defense ranked ninth nationally in fewest yards allowed (315.6 per game).

MARVIN LEWIS

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH

28th Season in NFL

1st Season with Raiders

Marvin Lewis, a 27-year NFL coaching veteran and former AP Coach of the Year (2009), joins the Raiders in 2024 as the assistant head coach. Lewis brings with him 43 total years of coaching experience at the collegiate and professional level, including 27 years of experience coaching in the NFL – 16 years as an NFL head coach.

Lewis comes to Las Vegas after spending the last five years at Arizona State University (2019-23), serving as a special advisor (2019, 2021-23) and a co-defensive coordinator (2020). As a co-defensive coordinator for the Sun Devils' abbreviated season in 2020, Lewis helped lead a unit that ranked first nationally in turnover margin (+8) and also ranked first in the Pac-12 in scoring defense (23.2) and fumble recoveries (8).

Prior to Arizona State, Lewis spent the largest portion of his career as the head coach of the Cincinnati Bengals (2003-18) – becoming the longest tenured head coach in franchise history (16 seasons). Over his 16 years with the Bengals, Lewis established several franchise records, including most wins (131), playoff appearances (seven), consecutive playoff appearances (five) and division titles (four). The Bengals' seven playoff appearances under Lewis matched the number of playoff appearances the franchise had in the previous 35 years combined. Under his leadership, the Bengals reached the playoffs in each season from 2011-15, the only team in the NFL to do so. Over his 16 seasons in Cincinnati, Lewis finished with a 131-122-3 overall record in the regular season, including 10 seasons at .500 or above. Lewis was also the consensus choice for NFL Coach of the Year in 2009, when the Bengals improved from a 4-11 finish in 2008 to an AFC North Division title and a 10-6 record in 2009. Lewis became the first coach in franchise history to win the award since the team founder Paul Brown won it in 1970. Lewis coached 21 Pro Bowl players during his time in Cincinnati, with nine of those players earning the honor multiple times. Under Lewis, Bengals DE Carlos Dunlap and DT Geno Atkins developed to one of the best pass rush duos in the NFL. After being drafted in 2010 by Cincinnati, the duo earned a total of nine Pro Bowl nods in their nine seasons under Lewis, including seven by Atkins, the most ever by a Bengals defensive player.

Highlighting his time in Cincinnati was his 2015 squad that finished with a 12-4 record, tied with the 1981 and 1988 Super Bowl champions for the best winning percentage (.750) in a 16-game season. Lewis' defense in 2015 only allowed 92.3 rushing yards per game, the seventh fewest in the NFL. Cincinnati's defense also only allowed 5.3 yards per play in 2015, the 10th best mark in the NFL. The Bengals also recorded 17 interceptions in 2015, tied for the eighth most in the NFL.

In 2009, the Bengals won their second division championship under Lewis, finishing with a 10-6 record. Their march to the AFC North title included a 6-0 mark in division games, marking the first time in franchise history for Cincinnati to sweep its division opponents. The team was led by the defensive effort, finishing fourth in the NFL in fewest yards allowed (301.4 per game), sixth in the NFL in passing yards allowed per game (203.1) and seventh in rushing yards allowed per game (98.3).

In 2005, Lewis' third season with the Bengals won the AFC North Division title with an 11-5 record, earning the franchise's first playoff appearance since 1990. The offense ranked near the top of the league in multiple categories, including fifth in passing yards per game (238.8), sixth in total yards per game (358.1) and 11th in rushing yards per game (119.4). Five Bengals were voted to the Pro Bowl, the largest Cincinnati contingent since the 1989 team placed six. The five were QB Carson Palmer, CB Deltha O'Neal, OT Willie Anderson, K Shayne Graham and WR Chad Johnson. CB Deltha O'Neal established a franchise single-season record, recording 10 interceptions, earning Pro Bowl and AP Second Team All-Pro honors.

In his first season with Cincinnati in 2003, Lewis helped make an immediate improvement, leading the Bengals to an 8-8 record after a 2-14 record in 2002. The Bengals' six-game improvement was the biggest of any NFL team from '02 to '03. It was also the second-biggest one-year improvement in Bengals history. Lewis finished second to Bill Belichick in Associated Press voting for NFL Coach of the Year.

Before Cincinnati, Lewis spent one season with Washington (2002) as the assistant head coach and defensive coordinator, leading the fifth-best defense in the league. His time with Washington was preceded by a six-season stint with the Baltimore Ravens as a defensive coordinator (1996-01), where he was a part of a Super Bowl XXXV win in 2000. In the Ravens' Super Bowl season in 2000, Lewis led a record-setting defense that allowed the fewest points in a 16-game season in NFL history (165), clipping 22 points off the previous mark. Lewis' defense in 2000 also allowed the fewest rushing yards in a 16-game season in NFL history (970). His defense also finished first in the NFL in rushing average allowed (2.7), total takeaways (49), fumble recoveries (26) and shutouts (4). The Ravens' four shutouts were the most by an NFL team since Pittsburgh had five in 1976. In his last three seasons (1999-01) with Baltimore before going to Washington, his defenses ranked second in the NFL in each of the three seasons.

Lewis' first NFL coaching job was with the Pittsburgh Steelers where he served as the linebackers coach for four seasons (1992-95). In each season from 1993-95, Lewis assisted with a Steelers defense that ranked in the top three in the NFL. He also aided the development of four Pro Bowl linebackers over his time in Pittsburgh, including Pro Football Hall of Famer Kevin Greene, Chad Brown, Levon Kirkland and Greg Lloyd. Lewis was part of a staff that led the Steelers to a winning record in each of his four seasons in Pittsburgh as well as playoff appearances each year, including a run to Super Bowl XXX, where Pittsburgh ultimately fell to the Cowboys.

Lewis began his coaching career at his alma mater, Idaho State, where he was the linebackers coach from 1981-84. Idaho State finished 12-1 in Lewis' first season with the team and won the NCAA Division I-AA championship. Lewis then coached linebackers for two seasons at Long Beach State (1985-86) and three seasons at New Mexico (1987-89).

PERSONAL: A native of McDonald, Pa. ...Lewis played linebacker at Idaho State, earning All-Big Sky Conference honors for three consecutive years (1978-80)...Also saw action at quarterback and free safety during his college career...Received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Idaho State in 1981 and earned his master's in athletic administration in '82...Was inducted into Idaho State's Hall of Fame in 2001...He and his wife, Peggy, have a daughter, Whitney, and a son, Marcus, who joined the Raiders in 2024 as the assistant linebackers coach.

RICKY MANNING JR.

CORNERBACKS

11th Season in NFL
(6 as a player)

1st Season with Raiders

Ricky Manning Jr. enters his first season as the corners coach for the Raiders in 2024. A six-year NFL veteran as a player, Manning Jr. brings with him 12 years of coaching experience, including five seasons coaching in the NFL ranks.

Prior to joining the Silver and Black, Manning Jr. served as the New York Jets defensive assistant from 2021-22 before being promoted to defensive backs/nickels in 2023.

Last season, Manning helped the Jets finish fifth in the NFL in fewest passing yards allowed per game (168.3), second in passes defended (88), tied for eighth in interceptions (17), and third in opponent completion percentage (60%). During the 2022 season, Manning helped contribute to the success of the team's cornerbacks, including D.J. Reed and rookie Sauce Gardner, a duo that ranked top 10 in the NFL in yards per reception, reception percentage, yards after catch, passer rating allowed, and total yards allowed. Gardner earned Defensive Rookie of the Year and first-team All-Pro honors, in addition to being selected to the 2022 Pro Bowl, after leading the League in passes defended (20). While Reed finished with a career-high 12 passes defended and 80 tackles, the seventh-best rank among all cornerbacks in the NFL that season. Manning also helped develop CB Michael Carter II into one of the top-performing nickels in the league, where he set single-season highs in tackles, interceptions, and passes defended, against the run, he recorded a 5.0% stop percentage, the fifth best among all corners with at least 200 snaps against the run. Additionally, he posted the same strong numbers against the pass, ranking fifth in stop percentage (3.7%), among all cornerbacks with at least 400 snaps against the pass. Only five corners ranked in the top 10 in both run and pass stop percentage in 2022, while his average rankings (fifth and fifth) were the second-best among the top five.

Manning Jr. got his first NFL coaching job with the Seattle Seahawks, where he spent two seasons (2016-17) as the assistant defensive backs coach, helping the Seahawks defense rank in the top 10 in opponent completion percentage and passer rating allowed, while finishing in the top five in passing defense. Under Manning's guidance, both CB Richard Sherman (2016) and S Earl Thomas (2017) were Pro Bowl selections, while rookie CB Shaquill Griffin (2017) registered a career-high 15 passes defended.

Manning Jr. coached at Fresno State (2015) and Fresno City College (2013-14), after beginning his coaching career as the head coach at his alma mater, Edison (CA) HS (2012). Before joining the Jets staff, he served as a defensive back coach (2018-19) before being promoted to the defensive coordinator (2020) at Clovis North (CA) HS.

PERSONAL: Starting 45 consecutive games for UCLA, the second-longest streak in school history, Manning Jr. was a three-time first-team All-Pac 10 selection, finishing his career with 13 interceptions, a top 10 total in Bruins history... An NFL veteran for six seasons, Manning, Jr. played in 84 games (38 starts) with the Carolina Panthers (2003-05), Chicago Bears (2006-07) and Rams (2008)... Appeared in two Super Bowls... Registered 14 interceptions in the regular season – adding another five in the postseason – scoring three defensive touchdowns (two INT returns and one fumble return)... Following his NFL career, he played in the UFL for the Florida/Virginia franchise... Manning and his wife, Tasha, have four sons, Ricky III, Kingsley, Brayley, and Brody.

TOM McMAHON

SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

18th Season in NFL

3rd Season with Raiders

Tom McMahon enters his third season as special teams coordinator of the Las Vegas Raiders. Last season (2023), McMahon's special teams unit led the NFL in 2023 with a 45.1 net punting average, which is also the best average in a single season in Raiders history (since 1976). The punt team also downed 45.3% (34-of-75) punts inside the 20-yard line, the fifth most in the NFL. Under McMahon's leadership, P AJ Cole earned his third-straight Pro Bowl selection, his second-career AP First Team All-Pro selection and his second PFWA All-NFL Team selection after averaging a league-leading and Raiders-record 45.1 net yards per punt. Cole also set an NFL record in Week 9 last season after posting 63.6 yards per punt, the highest single-game average in NFL history (min. four punts). WR DeAndre Carter also averaged 9.7 yards per punt return in 2023, tied for 11th in the NFL in 2023 and the sixth best average by a Raiders returner in a single season since 2000.

In his first season with the Raiders in 2022, McMahon led a special teams unit that produced two Pro Bowl selections in K Daniel Carlson and P AJ Cole. Carlson broke an NFL record in 2022, making 11 field goals of 50+ yards and ranked tied for second in the league in field goal percentage (91.9). Cole finished fifth in the NFL in yards per punt (48.8) and downed 8.5 percent of his punts inside the five-yard line, the second-best percentage in the NFL. Under McMahon, the special teams unit also only allowed 20.1 yards per kick return in 2022, the second lowest average in the NFL.

McMahon is a 32-year coaching veteran who has coached special teams at the NFL level for the past 17 seasons. Before joining the Raiders, he served four seasons as special teams coordinator for the Denver Broncos. Before joining the Broncos' staff, he worked as special teams coordinator for Indianapolis (2013-17), Kansas City (2012) and St. Louis (2009-11). During his time in the NFL, McMahon has coached seven players to Pro Bowl selections: P AJ Cole (2022, '23), K Daniel Carlson (2022), P Dustin Colquitt (2012), LS Matt Overton (2013), K Adam Vinatieri (2014), P Pat McAfee (2014, '16) and LS Casey Kreiter (2018).

McMahon has seen his units establish all-time records in several categories. His Falcons unit in 2008 set an NFL mark by allowing just 49 yards in punt returns for the season, while his Colts group in 2015 allowed only 156 yards on kickoff returns to set a league record. In addition, Vinatieri set the NFL record by making 44 consecutive field goal attempts in a stretch from 2015-16. His Raiders units have also produced records, including K Daniel Carlson breaking the NFL single-season record with 11 field goal makes from 50+ yards in 2022 and P AJ Cole breaking the single-game gross punting record with 63.6 yards per attempt in Week 9 of 2023.

During McMahon's four seasons in Denver, K Brandon McManus has ranked among the league's best, making 103-of-124 field goals (83.1 percent) and 117-of-122 extra point attempts (95.9 percent). McManus ranked second in the NFL with 21 made field goals from 50-plus yards, including an NFL single-season record tying 10 made field goals from 50-plus yards in 2020.

In 2021, McMahon saw P Sam Martin place 28 punts inside the 20-yard line, which ranked tied for fifth-most in the league. Under his guidance, K Brandon McManus moved into second all-time for field goal percentage (82.7 percent), total points (837) and field goals made (195) in team history.

McMahon guided the Broncos to improvement in net punting and punt returns in 2020. He saw PR Diontae Spencer ranked second in the league among qualifying players in punt return yards (15.8 avg.) while P Sam Martin helped the Broncos improve from 26th to 14th in net punting. McMahon's unit was the only team in the AFC to earn three Special Teams of the Week Honors in 2020 with key performances from McManus (Week 4 and 6) and Spencer (Week 14). McManus, who had three games with two 50-plus yard field goals, became the first kicker in NFL history with two games with a pair of 50-plus yard made field goals in the fourth quarter or overtime of the same season.

In 2019, Denver's special teams units ranked third in the NFL in kickoff return average (25.4 yards per return) while allowing the sixth fewest yards on kickoffs (439). Spencer was named a Pro Bowl alternate in his first season after finishing third in the league in kickoff return average (29.1) and tied for seventh in punt return average (8.0) among qualifying players.

In its first year under McMahon's guidance in 2018, Denver's special teams units improved in several significant categories. The Broncos led the NFL with four blocked kicks and were one of only two teams to block a field goal attempt (2), an extra point attempt and a punt. LS Casey Kreiter was selected to his first career Pro Bowl that season.

The Colts featured one of the NFL's most consistent special teams units during McMahon's five seasons in Indianapolis, ranking in the league's Top 5 in field goal percentage (89.6 / 3rd), net punting average (41.3 / 3rd), gross punting average (46.4 / 4th) and kickoff return average (24.5 / 5th) during that span. Three Colts special-teammates combined for five Pro Bowl selections playing for McMahon: punter Pat McAfee (2014, '16), kicker Adam Vinatieri (2014) and long snapper Matt Overton (2013).

In 2017, the Colts were one of just four clubs to produce multiple special-teams takeaways without committing a turnover on those units. Indianapolis was also one of just two teams to allow fewer than 100 punt return yards (80) as punter Rigoberto Sanchez ranked fourth in the NFL with his 42.6-yard net punting average that broke the NFL rookie record. McAfee set a Colts record with a league-leading 49.3-yard gross punting average under McMahon in 2016 to earn his second career Pro Bowl selection. Vinatieri made his first 19 field goals that season to set an NFL record with 44 consecutive field goals made dating to the previous year. In 2014, McMahon helped Vinatieri (30-of-31 FGs) and McAfee (42.8 net avg., 30 punts inside the 20, 70 kickoff touchbacks) become just the fourth kicker-punter duo to both earn First Team All-Pro recognition from the Associated Press.

With the Chiefs in 2012, McMahon's special-teams unit ranked fourth in the NFL with three takeaways. Punter Dustin Colquitt earned his first career Pro Bowl selection after ranking second in the league with 45 punts placed inside the 20.

Coaching special teams for the St. Louis Rams from 2009-11, McMahon worked with talented returner Danny Amendola, who led the NFL with 3,572 combined return yards (812 PR / 2,760 KR) during his first two NFL seasons (2009-10).

McMahon began his NFL career as an assistant special teams coach for Atlanta from 2007-08. During his two years with the Falcons, Jerious Norwood ranked third in the NFL with a combined 2,628 kick return yards.

Before joining the NFL, McMahon coached outside linebackers and special teams at the University of Louisville in 2006. That season, kicker Art Carmody was named the Lou Groza Award winner as the nation's top kicker after converting 21-of-25 field goals (.840) and all 60 extra point attempts for 123 total points.

McMahon spent 11 seasons at Utah State University from 1995-2005 in a variety of roles. After beginning his tenure with the Aggies as a graduate assistant from 1995-97, he went on to serve as special teams/linebackers coach from 1998-2000 and defensive line coach/recruiting coordinator from 2001-05.

PERSONAL: Native of Ocean City, N.J. ... Earned his bachelor's degree in communications from Fordham in 2011... His father, Michael, worked as an assistant to the Patriots coaching staff from 2014-16 and spent time as an executive for the 49ers, Browns, Eagles and Raiders... His brother, Matt, currently serves as an offensive assistant/assistant wide receivers coach with Las Vegas... Lombardi and his wife, Michelle, have two sons, Dominic and Michael, and a daughter, Sienna.



A.J. NEIBEL

HEAD STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

20th Season in NFL

12th Season with Raiders

A.J. Neibel, who holds 19 years of NFL experience in the sports performance and strength and conditioning realm, enters his sixth season as head strength and conditioning coach of the Silver and Black.

Neibel oversees all elements of the Raiders' strength and conditioning program, developing and implementing a comprehensive strategy for all position groups throughout the roster. Neibel directs all strength training, manages the team's performance data and works closely with the athletic training staff to transition players back from injury into participation.

Last season, Neibel helped DE Maxx Crosby earn his third-straight Pro Bowl selection and second career AP Second Team All-Pro selection after finishing with career highs in total tackles (90), TFLs (23) and sacks (14.5). Neibel's strength training also helped the offensive line tie for the 12-fewest sacks allowed in the NFL (40). P AJ Cole also earned his third-straight Pro Bowl selection after leading the NFL in net punting average (45.1).

In 2022, Neibel's staff helped produce five Pro Bowlers in WR Davante Adams, DE Maxx Crosby, RB Josh Jacobs, QB Derek Carr and P AJ Cole, the most by the Raiders since 2016. He saw Jacobs total 1,653 yards on the ground to become the first Raider to lead the NFL in rushing since 1985, while Adams set a franchise record with 1,516 receiving yards and lead the NFL with 14 touchdowns through the air. Neibel also excelled in helping the 2022 undrafted free agent class, with four players making the 53-man roster out of training camp, tied for the most over the last 10 seasons by the Raiders and the most since 2019.

In 2021, Neibel and his staff's work with the team helped the Raiders earn a 10-7 record, clinching the club's first postseason berth since 2016. Under Neibel's guidance, the Raiders produced four first-time Pro Bowlers in P AJ Cole, DE Maxx Crosby, LB Denzel Perryman and WR Hunter Renfrow. Renfrow set career highs in catches (103), receiving yards (1,038) and touchdowns (nine), while Cole averaged a league- and career-high 50.0 yards per punt, a mark that ranks eighth all-time in NFL history. Additionally, Crosby and Perryman anchored a defensive unit that ranked sixth in the AFC with just 337.2 yards per game allowed.

In 2020, Neibel and his staff helped field a team that produced two offensive Pro Bowlers in RB Josh Jacobs and TE Darren Waller, while also seeing numerous other veteran players establish career highs in appearances, starts and statistical milestones. Jacobs appeared in a career-high 15 contests, setting personal bests in carries (273), rushing touchdowns (12), receptions (33) and receiving yards (238).

In part due to Neibel's strength program, Waller was once again able to compete in all 16 contests for the second consecutive campaign. He put together one of the most prolific campaigns by a player in Raiders history, compiling 1,196 receiving yards and nine touchdowns, while breaking Hall of Famer WR Tim Brown's single-season receptions record by tallying 107 on the year, fourth-most in the NFL and most among all tight ends. Waller became just the sixth tight end in NFL history to surpass 100 receptions in a single season, while also hauling in at least five passes in an incredible 13 contests and tallying five 100-yard contests.

In his return to the Silver and Black in 2019 after previously spending six seasons with the Silver and Black from 2003-08, Neibel helped produce two Pro Bowlers in T Trent Brown and C Rodney Hudson. The two paved the way for rookie running back Jacobs, who became the first-ever 1,000-yard rookie rusher in team history, while helping the club surrender just 29 sacks on the year, good for eighth-fewest in the NFL.

Neibel and his staff also excelled in helping the 2019 rookie class make the transition from college to the NFL, as the Raiders rookies combined to lead the NFL in scrimmage touchdowns (17) amongst their rookie peers. The Raiders rookies also ranked first in sacks (14.5), yards after the catch (676), rushing yards (1,167), rushing touchdowns (seven) and rushing first downs (60), while ranking second in receptions (107) and receiving yards (1,112).

Neibel's return to the Raiders came after spending the previous two seasons (2017-18) with the Jacksonville Jaguars as the club's athletic performance specialist/physical therapy assistant. In his role with the Jaguars, Neibel assisted both the medical and strength and conditioning staff transition players from injury back into participation, while helping manage performance data for the team's coaching staff. The team garnered eight Pro Bowl selections over two seasons under Neibel's guidance.


Prior to his stint with the Jaguars, Neibel spent six years (2011-16) with the Atlanta Falcons in a variety of roles. Over his five years with the club, the Falcons earned 21 total Pro Bowl selections under Neibel's direction, including four from WR Julio Jones (2012, 2014-16), and three apiece from TE Tony Gonzalez (2011-13) and QB Matt Ryan (2012, 2014, 2016).

In 2016, Neibel was tabbed as the club's athletic performance manager after serving as the team's head strength and conditioning coach during the previous three seasons (2013-15). In his first two seasons (2011-12) with the Falcons, Neibel was on staff as strength and conditioning assistant. Before joining the club, Neibel spent time working for the Atlanta Falcons' Therapy Center in Snellville, Ga.

Prior to Atlanta, Neibel also worked in the Bay Area with the San Francisco Giants of Major League Baseball and their affiliate, the San Jose Giants, as a strength and conditioning consultant from 2009-10. In his first tour with the Raiders, Neibel helped train athletes as a strength and conditioning/sports medicine associate.

JOE PHILBIN

SENIOR OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT

19th Season in NFL

1st Season with Raiders

Joe Philbin enters his first season as a senior offensive assistant with the Las Vegas Raiders, bringing 38 years of coaching experience, including five seasons as a head coach in the NFL. He spent the past season at Ohio State working with the offensive line, where he tutored first-team All-Big Ten selections in T Josh Fryar, G Donovan Jackson, and G Matt Jones. Philbin assisted an offense that finished first in the Big Ten in total yards per game (407.9), second in passing offense (278.9) and third in scoring (30.5 ppg).

Philbin most recently worked in the NFL with the Dallas Cowboys from 2020-2022, serving as the club's offensive line coach. During the 2021 season, he oversaw seven different line combinations for a unit that blocked for the No. 1 offense in the league in total yards per game (407.0) and points per game (31.2). The offensive line provided protection for a 4,000-yard passer (Dak Prescott, 4,449), a 1,000-yard receiver (CeeDee Lamb, 1,102) and a 1,000-yard rusher (Ezekiel Elliot, 1,002). Under Philbin's guidance, he saw two players named to the Pro Bowl in T Tyron Smith and G Zack Martin, with Martin also earning first team All-Pro honors.

During his first season in Dallas, Philbin started eight different offensive line combinations that helped the offense tie a team record with four 500-yard performances, while ranking seventh in the league in first downs (371) and first in drives of 10-or-more plays (41).

Philbin previously served as offensive coordinator with the Green Bay Packers during two different stints, first from 2007-11, and then again in 2018. He rejoined the Packers after two seasons as the assistant head coach/offensive line for the Indianapolis Colts (2016-17) and four seasons as the head coach of the Miami Dolphins (2012-15).

In his return to Green Bay in 2018, Philbin helped QB Aaron Rodgers throw for 4,442 yards and 25 touchdowns against two interceptions – a TD/INT ratio of 12.5, the best single season mark in Packers' history.

During his two seasons with the Colts, Philbin led an offensive line that helped the offense rank seventh in the NFL in fewest giveaways (37) from 2016-17. The offensive line also paved the way for RB Frank Gore, who ranked ninth in total rushing yards (1,986) from 2016-17.

In 2016, Philbin tutored four different rookie starters along the offensive line, the most in the NFL, with C Ryan Kelly (16 starts) and T Joe Haeg (14) leading the way. Under his guidance, QB Andrew Luck finished in the top-10 in passing yards (4,240), passing touchdowns (31) and passer rating (96.4), while Gore became the first NFL running back to rush for 1,000-plus yards at the age of 33 or older since Redskins RB John Riggins in 1984.

As the head coach of the Miami Dolphins, Philbin helped the team increase their win total in his first two seasons (2012-13). From 2012-14, Miami ranked first in the NFL in fewest penalties with 233 over that span.

In 2014, Philbin coached QB Ryan Tannehill (4,045) and RB Lamar Miller (1,099) to become the first duo in franchise history to throw for 4,000-plus yards and rush for 1,000-plus yards in the same season.

In 2013, Miami ranked eighth in the league in scoring defense (20.9 ppg) and fifth in opponent passer rating (77.3). In his first season as head coach in 2012, Philbin led the Dolphins to the seventh-ranked scoring defense (19.8 ppg) and top-ranked red zone defense (42.6 percent) in the NFL, while guiding Tannehill to set a franchise rookie record in passing yards (3,294).

From 2007-11, Philbin served as the Packers offensive coordinator and directed an offense that ranked third in the NFL over that span in points per game (28.3), touchdowns (267), passing touchdowns (170) and net yards per game (372.8). During that time, the Packers ranked in the top-10 in the NFL in total yards and total points each season, one of only two teams to do so, and ranked second in the league in fewest giveaways with 97. Three of the Packers top scoring seasons (2007, 2009, 2011) in team history came during his tenure.

In 2011, Philbin helped the Packers set franchise single-season records for total points (560), touchdowns (70), total yards (6,482) and net passing yards (4,924), while guiding Rodgers to the best single-season passer rating in NFL history (122.5). Green Bay led the league in scoring (35.0 ppg) and ranked second in fewest giveaways (14) and third in total yards per game (405.1).

In 2010, en route to winning Super Bowl XLV, the Packers finished with the NFL's fifth-ranked passing offense at 257.8 yards per contest, marking the first time in franchise history that the Packers averaged 250.0 net passing yards in back-to-back seasons. The offense also posted two 45-point games during the regular season, the first time Green Bay had accomplished that feat since 1983.

From 2008-09, Philbin helped the Packers become the first team in league history to have a 4,000-yard passer (Rodgers), a 1,200-yard rusher (RB Ryan Grant) and two 1,000-yard receivers (WRs Greg Jennings and Donald Driver) in back-to-back seasons.

In 2007, Philbin helped the Packers' offense rank second in the NFL in total yards per game (370.7). He helped QB Brett Favre throw for 4,155 yards and 28 touchdowns that year, which combined with Rodgers' 4,038 yards in 2008 marked the first time in league history that a team had different 4,000-yard passers in consecutive years.

In 2006, Philbin oversaw a line that ranked fifth in the NFL with 24 sacks allowed and improved their rushing average by a half-yard per carry. In 2005, Philbin's tight-end group featured three players with 25-plus receptions each (Donald Lee, David Martin, Bubba Franks), one of only two teams in the NFL to do so that season.

Philbin originally joined the Packers in 2003 as an assistant offensive line coach and then spent two seasons as the tight ends/assistant offensive line coach (2004-05) before being promoted to offensive line coach in 2006. He helped the offensive line rank second in the league in sacks allowed (60) from 2003-05, including a franchise low 14 in 2004.

PHILBIN

Philbin came to Green Bay after 19 seasons coaching at the collegiate level, including four as offensive line coach at the University of Iowa (1999-2002). In 2002, he coached an offensive line that helped the team finish second in the Big Ten in rushing (214.2 yards per game). Under Philbin's guidance, Eric Steinbach, Robert Gallery, and Bruce Nelson earned first team All-Big Ten honors, while Steinbach also earned All-America honors. All three players went on to be selected in the first two rounds of the NFL Draft.

Prior to Iowa, Philbin served as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Harvard from 1997-98. He was the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Northeastern University from 1995-96 after one season as offensive line coach at Ohio University in 1994.

He also spent four seasons (1990-93) at Allegheny College, where the program finished with two undefeated seasons and the NCAA Division III national championship in 1990.

PERSONAL: A native of Springfield, Mass., Philbin graduated from Washington & Jefferson College (Pa.), where he played tight end... He earned a master's degree in education from Tulane University in 1986... Philbin and his wife, Diane, have six children, Matthew, John, Kevin, Tim, Colleen, and deceased son, Michael.

Josh Phillips joins the Raiders in 2024 as a defensive assistant, bringing with him 13 years of coaching experience at the college and high school levels.

Prior to joining the Silver and Black, Phillips was the head coach/offensive coordinator for Sarasota High School in 2023.

In 2022, he held several defensive positions with Manatee High School, serving as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach, leading a defense that held opponents to less than 100 yards passing per game, and a less than 30.0% third down conversion rate per game. He also improved the team's record to 6-3 from 2-7 the previous year, earning the number three playoff seed.

Phillips also coached for Granada High School in the Bay Area for four years (2016-19), serving as the defensive coordinator (2019), pass game coordinator (2017-18), and coached defensive backs, linebackers, quarterbacks, wide receivers and special teams in 2016.

From 2010-12, Phillips held the Assistant Strength and Conditioning coach title at University of California, Berkeley, where he worked with NFL Pro Bowl WR Keenan Allen, All-Pro and Pro Bowl DE Cameron Jordan, Super Bowl Champion and Pro Bowl RB CJ Anderson, Super Bowl Champion and Pro Bowl T Mitchell Schwartz, and Super Bowl Champion RB Shane Vereen.

Prior to arriving at Cal, Phillips spent one year at UC Santa Barbara where he was an assistant sports performance coach during the 2009-10 athletic year. He worked with all 20 varsity sports at UCSB, with a focus on baseball, softball, and track and field. His responsibilities included athlete instruction, training and program development. He also piloted speed development clinics and assisted with nutritional needs assessment and dietary program implementation.

He was the defensive coordinator at Pierce College in Woodland Hills, Los Angeles, Calif. in 2009, leading the two-year school to its first American Pacific Conference crown in 24 years. The Brahmas posted a 7-3 overall record and earned a No. 13 ranking among Southern California junior colleges. Phillips coached seven all-conference players, including former Cal wide receiver/returner Coleman Edmond, who was the 2009 APC Offensive Player of the Year and an all-state honoree.

Phillips spent the 2007 and 2008 campaigns as the secondary coach and co-special teams coordinator at Wagner College, leading the NCAA Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) squad to the No. 6 national ranking in total defense in 2007 and a No. 3 ranking against the pass in 2008. Wagner was also the No. 1 team in total defense in the Northeast Conference both seasons. Among the players Phillips coached was All-American cornerback Al Phillips, who ranked fifth in the nation with seven interceptions in 2007 and signed an NFL free agent contract with the New York Jets in 2008. In addition, Phillips was the program's liaison to professional football and headed the Seahawks' leadership program, which included elements of community service and academic achievement.

Before beginning his career in coaching and sports performance, Phillips' played three seasons of professional football from 2002-04 with NFL Europe's Amsterdam Admirals (2002), the NFL's Houston Texans (2002) and the Chicago Rush of the Arena Football League (2003-04).

De'Andre Pierce enters his first season as an offensive assistant coach for the Las Vegas Raiders.

Pierce began his coaching career at Cal Poly Luis Obispo, where he served as a defensive quality control coach in 2023. In his single season, Pierce saw DE Elijah Ponder lead the team in sacks (10), making him the first Mustang with 10 plus sacks since 2005. Ponders had 13 tackles for loss, and 17 QB hits, tied for program record. He earned All-Conference first team defense and 2023 Walter Camp FCS All-American Team. Pierce then went to Texas Christian University where he was a graduate assistant in 2024 before joining the Raiders.

Before beginning his coaching career in 2023, Pierce played six years at the collegiate level, two years at Arizona State University (2020-21) and four years at Boise State University (2016-19). Pierce played under his father - Raiders Head Coach Antonio Pierce - at Arizona State for two seasons, racking up 86 tackles, a sack, three interceptions and four passes defended in 17 games earning the Darren Woodson Outstanding Secondary Award and an Honorable Pac-12 Mention in 2021.

In four seasons (2016-19) at Boise State, Pierce totaled 144 tackles, seven tackles for loss, a sack, an interception, and six passes defended in 36 games as a defensive back. He was named All-Mountain West Honorable Mention his sophomore season after recording 83 tackles, four tackles for loss and an interception and earned an 84.7 PFF grade, the fifth best mark among FBS safeties.

From 2005-06, Rannings spent time as the wide receivers coach at St. Joseph's College and as a defensive assistant at San Diego.


Rannings earned his first coaching job at his alma mater, Oregon State, working as a graduate assistant.

ROB RYAN

SENIOR DEFENSIVE ASSISTANT

24th Season in NFL

8th Season with Raiders

Rob Ryan returned to the Silver and Black in 2022 and enters his third season as the Raiders' senior defensive assistant, bringing 34 years of coaching experience to the position, including 23 seasons in the NFL ranks. Ryan has served as the defensive coordinator for the Oakland Raiders (2004-08), Cleveland Browns (2009-10), Dallas Cowboys (2011-12) and New Orleans Saints (2013-15), while also holding coaching positions with the Arizona Cardinals (1994-95), New England Patriots (2000-03), Buffalo Bills (2016), Washington Redskins (2019) and Baltimore Ravens (2021).

Last season (2023), Ryan helped lead a unit that allowed just 331 points, the ninth best mark in the NFL and the fewest points allowed by the Raiders in a single season since 2002 (304). The Raiders defense also recorded five defensive touchdowns in 2023, the second most in the league and tied for the third most in a single season in franchise history—the most since 2000 (6). Ryan also helped lead the defense to a major improvement from the first half of the season to the second half after Antonio Pierce became the interim head coach in Week 9. From Week 9-18, the Raiders defense ranked first in the NFL points allowed per game (16.0), tied for third in sacks (30), first in defensive touchdowns (4) and tied for 10th in takeaways (14).

In his first season since rejoining the Silver and Black (2022), Ryan helped guide DE Max Crosby by his second Pro Bowl selection after career bests in tackles (88), tackles for loss (22) and sacks (12.5). Crosby's 88 tackles are the most in a single season by a Raiders defensive lineman and he became only the second defensive lineman in franchise history to record 20+ tackles for loss in a single season. He also worked with four-time Pro Bowler DE Chandler Jones, who finished second on the team with 4.5 sacks and 15 quarterback hits. Under the guidance of Ryan, the defense ranked 19th in the NFL in rushing yards allowed per game (122.8 yards per game) and saw a slight improvement in tackles for loss (68) and stuffs (39) from the previous year.

Ryan spent the 2021 season as the inside linebackers coach for the Baltimore Ravens. During his time with the Ravens, Ryan helped guide LB Patrick Queen as he led the team with 98 tackles. Ryan's group was instrumental to the No. 1 ranked run defense in the NFL (84.5 yards per game).

In 2019, Ryan coached inside linebackers for Washington, helping guide LB Jon Bostic to a career-high 105 tackles. He also tutored rookie LB Cole Holcomb, who finished second in the NFL among rookie defenders with 101 tackles.

In 2016, Ryan served as the Buffalo Bills' assistant head coach/defense under his brother Rex Ryan. The defense ranked sixth in the NFL in passing defense (223.9 yards per game) and eighth in sacks (39) and produced four Pro Bowlers in DT Kyle Williams, LB Lorenzo Alexander, LB Zach Brown and CB Stephon Gilmore.

From 2013-15, Ryan served as defensive coordinator for the New Orleans Saints... In 2015, Ryan led a defensive unit that was among the youngest in the NFL and helped mentor a rookie class that included LB Stephone Anthony and LB Hau'oli Kikaha. Under the guidance of Ryan, Anthony finished with 144 tackles, first among rookies, and was named to the All-Rookie Team, while Kikaha recorded four forced fumbles, tied for second in the NFL and ranked first among rookies.

Ryan helped DE Cameron Jordan earn his second Pro Bowl selection after finishing with 10 sacks. In 2014, Ryan guided LB Curtis Lofton to a career-high 144 tackles, the fourth-most in the NFL, while DE Cameron Jordan recorded 7.5 sacks.

In 2013, Ryan led a Saints' defensive unit that finished fourth in the NFL in total defense (305.7), a 28-place improvement from the prior season. The unit ranked in the top-10 in many defensive categories, including sacks (49-fourth), pass defense (194.1-second), scoring defense (19.0-fourth) and third down conversion percentage (34.7-ninth). Ryan helped S Kenny Vaccaro earn PFWA All-Rookie Team honors after leading the secondary with 77 tackles and saw DE Cam Jordan selected to his first Pro Bowl after ranking fifth in the league with a career-high 12.5 sacks.

Ryan spent two seasons as the Dallas Cowboys' defensive coordinator from 2011-12, working with OLB DeMarcus Ware who recorded double-digit sacks totals and earned Pro Bowl honors in both seasons. In 2012, Ryan led a defense that produced two Pro Bowl selections in DE Anthony Spencer and Ware. Spencer posted a career-high 11 sacks while Ware led the team with 11.5 sacks, making the Cowboys one of three teams in the NFL to have two players with 11-plus sacks. In 2011, Ryan helped Ware to his sixth Pro Bowl selection and fourth first-team All-Pro recognition after finishing second in the NFL with 19.5 sacks... Ryan also helped second year LB Sean Lee lead the team with 102 tackles.

From 2009-10, Ryan served as the defensive coordinator for the Cleveland Browns. In 2010, the Browns' defense tied for eighth in the NFL with 19 interceptions and Ryan saw six different players post multiple takeaways... Ryan guided a secondary that included rookie CB Joe Haden, who tied for fifth in the NFL and second among rookies with a career-high six interceptions. Ryan also mentored rookie S T.J. Ward, who finished first among all rookies and sixth among all defensive backs in the NFL with 105 tackles. Both players were named to the PFWA All-Rookie Team. Under Ryan's guidance, the Browns defense allowed the fourth-fewest rushing touchdowns (seven). During his first season with the Browns, Ryan led a defensive unit that ranked eighth in the NFL in sacks (40).

Ryan earned his first NFL defensive coordinator position with the Raiders and spent five seasons (2004-08) with the club, helping produce a pair of Pro Bowlers DE Derrick Burgess and CB Nnamdi Asomugha. In 2006, Ryan oversaw a defense that led the NFL in pass defense and ranked third in total defense. The Raiders defense under Ryan also ranked fourth in the NFL in fewest yards allowed per play, fifth in defense inside the 20, fifth (tie) in defensive touchdowns and fifth in net passing yards per play. Ryan's defensive schemes in 2006 also helped Derrick Burgess record 12 sacks and play in his second straight Pro Bowl and Warren Sapp record 10 sacks, an NFL high for defensive tackles. In addition, the defensive schemes helped Nnamdi Asomugha post a career high eight interceptions. In 2005, Ryan saw Burgess named to his first Pro Bowl after leading the NFL with a career-high 16 sacks.

Prior to the Raiders, Ryan spent four years (200-03) as the linebackers coach for the New England Patriots... Ryan was part of two Super Bowl championship teams (XXXVI and XXXVIII). In 2003, Ryan's squad helped the Patriots defense rank first in the NFL in fewest points allowed (238) while ranking seventh overall in the NFL in total defense (291.6 yards per game). Ryan's unit also contributed to one

of the best scoring defenses in franchise history in 2001, as the Patriots allowed just 14.9 points per game and produced Pro Bowlers Willie McGinest and Tedy Bruschi.

Ryan originally entered the NFL coaching ranks in 1994 as defensive backs coach on his father's staff at Arizona. He also coached Cardinals cornerbacks and safeties in 1995. With Ryan as his position coach, CB Aeneas Williams earned two trips to the Pro Bowl in 1994 and 1995. In 1995, the Cardinals led the NFL with 32 interceptions and 42 total takeaways. The 1994 Cardinals ranked second in the NFL total defense, second in run defense and third in pass defense.

From 1997-99, Ryan was Oklahoma State's defensive coordinator, where the Cowboys defense continually ranked among the best in the nation. He was named Coordinator of the Year by The Sporting News in 1997. In 1999, they were ranked 10th in the nation in total defense. In 1998, they were second in the nation with 41 sacks. In his first season at Oklahoma State, the Cowboys defense finished among the nation's top-20 in turnover margin, rushing defense, scoring defense and total defense, allowing just 302.7 yards per game... It was an over 100-yard improvement per game from the year before and helped the Cowboys produce an 8-4 mark and an Alamo Bowl berth.

Ryan was a graduate assistant at Western Kentucky in 1987 and at Ohio State in 1988. Ryan then spent five seasons at Tennessee State, where he coached running backs (1989-91), linebackers (1992) and the defensive line (1993).

He served as defensive coordinator at Hutchinson Community College in 1996, where they led the nation in total defense (228 yards per game) and in sacks (56)... His defense also set a national record by forcing 49 turnovers.

PERSONAL: Ryan played three seasons as an outside linebacker at Southwestern Oklahoma State... He is the son of NFL defensive coaching legend Buddy Ryan... His twin brother, Rex, was a head coach in the NFL for the New York Jets (2009-14) and Buffalo Bills (2015-16)... Rob and his wife, Kristin, have two sons, Joseph and Matthew, and a daughter, Dimitria.



RICH SCANGARELLO

Rich Scangarello joins the Raiders in 2024 as the quarterbacks coach, bringing with him 26 years of coaching experience, including seven in the NFL and 17 in the college ranks.

Scangarello most recently served as the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at the University of Kentucky in 2022, where he worked closely with QB Will Lewis who was selected in the 2nd round of the 2023 NFL Draft (33rd overall). With Scangarello's guidance, Lewis was named to the CFPA National Performer of the Year Watch List, completing 185 of 283 passes for 2,406 yards and 19 touchdowns his senior season. Lewis finished ranked fourth in the SEC and 27th nationally in pass efficiency (151.9).

Prior to joining Kentucky, Scangarello served as the quarterbacks coach for the San Francisco 49ers in 2021 after previously serving in the same position with San Francisco from 2017-18. In 2021, Scangarello helped the 49ers to a 10-7 record and an NFC Championship appearance for the second time in three seasons. Under Scangarello, QB Jimmy Garoppolo completed 301-of-441 passes for 3,801 yards, 20 touchdowns and a 98.7 passer rating, leading an offense that ranked seventh in the NFL (375.7).

In 2020, Scangarello served as a senior offensive assistant with the Philadelphia Eagles, where he assisted in the development of rookie QB Jalen Hurts, who finished his first season in the NFL with 1,061 yards and six touchdowns.

Scangarello served as the Denver Broncos' offensive coordinator for the 2019 season. He worked with QB Drew Lock, who completed 100-of-156 passes for 1,020 yards and seven touchdowns in five games as a rookie, becoming the seventh rookie quarterback in NFL history to win four of his first five starts. Lock was paired with fellow rookie TE Noah Fant, who finished with the most receptions (40) and receiving yards (562) by a rookie tight end in franchise history. In that same year, Scangarello also worked with QBs Joe Flacco and Brandon Allen. Flacco finished the season with 1,822 yards and six touchdowns in eight starts, while Allen tallied 515 yards and three touchdowns in three games.

Prior to his time in Denver, Scangarello spent the 2017 and 2018 seasons as the 49ers quarterbacks coach. In 2018, he worked closely with QB Nick Mullens, who saw extended action for the first time in his NFL career, starting in all eight games in which he appeared and completing 176-of-274 attempts for 2,277 yards, 13 touchdowns and a 90.8 passer rating. He also joined Hall of Famers Fran Tarkenton (1961) and Jim Kelly (1986) as the only players in NFL history to throw for 250+ yards, 3+ touchdowns and zero interceptions in their NFL debut.

In his first season with San Francisco in 2017, Scangarello worked with rookie QB C.J. Beathard and mid-season acquisition Garoppolo, helping both set franchise records. Beathard, who played in seven games (five starts), set the single-season franchise record for attempts (224), completions (123) and passing yards (1,430) by a rookie quarterback. Garoppolo, who started the last five games of the season, became the first 49ers quarterback since the merger in 1970 to win each of his first five starts with the team and set the franchise record for the most passing yards in his first five starts with the 49ers (1,542). His 1,542 passing yards ranked fourth among all quarterbacks in their first five starts with a new team since the merger in 1970.

Before his first stint with the 49ers, Scangarello was the offensive coordinator at Wagner College in 2016 after one season as an offensive quality control coach with the Atlanta Falcons in 2015. In Atlanta, he assisted the offensive line with run-game preparation and coordinated the defensive scout team for the offense.

From 2012-14, Scangarello served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Northern Arizona University. In 2013, the Lumberjacks offense completed 235-of-387 passing attempts (60.7%) and finished with 2,425 passing yards and 14 touchdowns.

Prior to his time at Northern Arizona University, Scangarello served as the offensive coordinator/assistant head coach/quarterbacks coach for two seasons at Millsaps College (2010-11), where he helped QB Garrett Pinciotti earn second-team All-Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference honors in 2011 after throwing for 2,200 yards and 23 touchdowns.

Scangarello first entered the NFL coaching ranks in 2009 with the Oakland Raiders as an offensive quality control coach.

Before Oakland, Scangarello coached five years (2004-08) at UC-Davis, which included one year (2008) as the school's co-offensive coordinator. In 2008, under the guidance of Scangarello, the Aggies offense ranked 11th in the FCS in total offense, averaging 426.5 yards per game and 28.5 points per game. He also served as an offensive assistant/passing game coordinator/wide receivers coach from 2004-07.

Scangarello worked under former Raiders head coach Tom Cable at Idaho from 2002-03, serving as an offensive assistant/quarterbacks coach after spending one season (2021) at Carleton College in Northfield, Min. as the offensive coordinator. Scangarello was also an offensive graduate assistant at the University of Idaho in 2000.

Scangarello began his coaching career at UC-Davis, where he was an offensive assistant from 1998-99, working with future NFL draft pick and consecutive consensus Division II All-American J.T. O'Sullivan, who completed 669 of 1,070 passes for 10,745 yards and 96 touchdowns with 41 interceptions during his college career, also setting the school record for total offense with 11,544 yards.

Matt Sheldon enters his third season with the Las Vegas Raiders in 2024, his first season overseeing game management after spending the last two seasons (2022-23) as the director of football research and strategy for the Silver and Black. Sheldon has 20 years of NFL experience in coaching, analytics and video, including 20 years of experience in the NFL.

Sheldon previously worked as a senior analyst for the Denver Broncos in 2021 after serving as the director of football research and strategy with both the New York Jets (2019-20) and Miami Dolphins (2017-18). He also served as director of analytics and football research for the Chicago Bears from 2015-16. From 2013-14, Sheldon worked as the director of sports solutions development at Zebra Technologies, the official on-field player-tracking provider of the NFL.

Sheldon spent 12 seasons as a coach at the professional level, most recently as linebackers coach for the Montreal Alouettes of the CFL in 2012.

From 2010-11, Sheldon was the assistant defensive backs coach for the Minnesota Vikings. In 2010, the Vikings defense ranked eighth in total defense (312.6) and 10th in passing defense (210.4).

From 2006-09, he coached linebackers with the Buffalo Bills. In 2009, Sheldon's unit helped the Bills defense rank second in passing defense (184.3 yards per game) and interceptions (28) in 2009. Under Sheldon's guidance, LB Paul Posluszny led the Bills in tackles in 2008 and 2009.

Sheldon entered the NFL coaching ranks with the St. Louis Rams from 2001-05, where he was a defensive and special teams assistant. Defensively, he assisted with both the secondary and the linebackers. In his first season, the Rams were NFC champions and played in Super Bowl XXXVI.

Prior to St. Louis, Sheldon served as a defensive graduate assistant at Wisconsin (1997-99), where he assisted with the secondary and helped the Badgers win back-to-back Rose Bowls.

ASSISTANT TIGHT ENDS

3rd Season in NFL

3rd Season with Raiders

Mitch Singler enters his first season as assistant tight ends coach with the Raiders in 2024, having spent the past two seasons (2022-23) as the team's offensive quality control coach.

As the offensive quality control coach in 2023, Singler's primary focus was assisting the wide receiver unit. In 2023, free agent addition WR Jakobi Meyers set a single-season career high with eight receiving touchdowns, finishing with 71 catches for 807 yards (11.4 avg.). WR Davante Adams also notch his fourth-straight season with 100+ catches and 1,000+ receiving yards, becoming one of just two players in the league (Stefon Diggs) to have 100+ receptions in the last four seasons.

In his first season with the Silver and Black, Singler worked closely with the wide receivers and saw WR Davante Adams set a franchise record with 1,526 receiving yards, while his 14 receiving touchdowns ranked as the most in the NFL and tied for second-most in a single season in franchise history. Singler also helped WR Mack Hollins to career highs with 57 receptions, 690 receiving yards and four touchdowns.

Prior to joining Las Vegas, Singler spent four seasons at Duke, serving as a football analyst working primarily with the offense for three seasons (2018-20) before being elevated to offensive quality control coordinator in 2021.

Last season, Singler helped coach RB Mateo Durant to first team All-ACC honors after rushing for 1,233 yards and nine touchdowns. Under the guidance of Singler, Durant finished first in the ACC in rushing attempts (256), second in rushing yards (1,233), second in rushing yards per game (102.8) and seventh in rushing touchdowns (nine).

In 2020, Singler mentored Durant and RB Deon Jackson who both surpassed the 600-yard rushing mark on the ground, finishing with 817 and 682 yards, respectively. Durant led the team with four 100-yard rushing games and ranked seventh in the ACC in rushing yards (817) and fourth in rushing yards per attempt (6.8).


In 2019, Singler worked with Jackson who led the team with 641 rushing yards and ranked ninth in the ACC with 172 rushing attempts. Singler saw Jackson earn second team All-ACC honors in 2018 after leading the Blue Devils in rushing yards (847) and rushing touchdowns (seven).

Prior to Duke, Singler served two seasons (2016-17) as the offensive quality control coach at his alma mater Oregon State. In 2017, Singler helped RB Ryan Nall finish with a team-high 810 rushing yards and eight rushing touchdowns. Nall was named a Pac-12 honorable mention in 2016 after ranking sixth in the Pac-12 in rushing yards (951), sixth in rushing yards per attempt (6.5) and third in rushing touchdowns (13).

PERSONAL: A native of Medford, Ore., Singler played wide receiver at Oregon State and helped the Beavers to bowl games in 2009 (Las Vegas Bowl), 2011 (Alamo Bowl) and 2013 (Hawaii Bowl) before graduating in 2014 with a degree in marketing...He and his wife, Janae, have one son, Easton (2).

RICK SLATE

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING ASSISTANT

7th Season in NFL

7th Season with Raiders

Rick Slate, who brings 36 years of strength and conditioning experience, enters his seventh season with the Silver and Black as a strength and conditioning assistant. He joined the Raiders after spending 25 seasons in Major League Baseball with the Florida Marlins, New York Mets and Atlanta Braves.

Working extensively with all position groups on the roster, Slate focuses include strength training and assistance in transitioning players back from injury into participation. He also helps manage performance data for the team's strength and conditioning staff.

Last season, Slate helped DE Maxx Crosby earn his third-straight Pro Bowl selection after finishing with career highs in total tackles (90), TFLs (23) and sacks (14.5). He assisted in training 25 players who appeared in all 17 regular season games and helped transition a rookie draft class that accounted for 17-of-31 total touchdowns on offense (Aidan O'Connell, 13; Michael Mayer, 2; Tre Tucker, 2).

In 2022, Slate worked with a group that helped produce five Pro Bowlers in WR Davante Adams, DE Maxx Crosby, RB Josh Jacobs, QB Derek Carr and P AJ Cole. He also assisted in the strength development of four undrafted free agents who made the final 53-man roster, tied for the most over the last 10 seasons by the Raiders and the most since 2019.

In 2021, Slate's work with the team helped the Silver and Black earn a 10-7 record, clinching their first postseason berth since 2016. Slate also saw the Raiders produce four first-time Pro Bowlers in P AJ Cole, DE Maxx Crosby, LB Denzel Perryman and WR Hunter Renfrow. Renfrow set career highs in catches (103), receiving yards (1,038) and touchdowns (nine), while Cole averaged a league- and career-high 50.0 yards per punt, a mark that ranks eighth all-time in NFL history. Additionally, Crosby and Perryman anchored a defensive unit that ranked sixth in the AFC with just 337.2 yards per game allowed.

Under Slate's training, QB Derek Carr put together one of his best seasons as a Raider. Carr set a career and franchise record with 4,804 yards and became the only quarterback in the NFL to rank in the top-five in passing yards (4,804) and completion percentage (68.4).

During his third season with the Raiders in 2020, Slate's guidance in the weight room helped the Raiders produce two Pro Bowlers in RB Josh Jacobs and TE Darren Waller, both earning the nod for the first time in their careers. Waller led the team in all major receiving categories, setting a new club record with 107 receptions and posting career highs in receiving yards (1,196) and touchdowns (nine), while Jacobs surpassed the 1,000-yard mark with 1,065 yards on the ground and set a career high with 12 touchdowns. Slate also saw Carr set personal bests in yards per attempt (7.9 avg.) and passer rating (101.4), while extending his streak of most seasons (three) in franchise history with at least 4,000 passing yards.

In 2019, Slate continued to help implement the team's strength and conditioning program while working with multiple position groups throughout the roster. Slate saw T Trent Brown and C Rodney Hudson earn Pro Bowl honors, while G Richie Incognito, FB Alec Ingold, Jacobs and Waller were named as alternates.

Slate helped guide the 2019 rookie class in their transition from college to the NFL, as Raiders rookies combined to lead the NFL in scrimmage touchdowns (17), sacks (14.5), yards after the catch (676), rushing yards (1,167), rushing touchdowns (seven) and rushing first downs (60) among their rookie peers. The Raiders rookies also ranked second in receptions (107) and receiving yards (1,112).

In 2018, Slate worked with TE Jared Cook as he earned his first Pro Bowl selection in 2018. Cook set career highs in receptions (68), receiving yards (896) and touchdowns (six) and tallied four 100-yard contests on the season. Slate also helped train Hudson and G/T Kelechi Osemele in 2018, who were named Pro Bowl alternates.

With Slate's guidance in the weight room, Carr started in all 16 contests for the third time in his career and finished the season with 4,049 yards on 381-of-553 passing (68.9 percent), 19 touchdowns against 10 interceptions for a passer rating of 93.9. In his fifth season in the league, Carr's completions, completion percentage, yards and yards per attempt (7.3 avg.) all marked then-career highs.

Prior to entering the NFL, Slate was with the Braves organization from 2011-17 serving as the team's director of strength and conditioning. Slate initially joined Atlanta in 2011 and served as the Braves' minor league strength and conditioning coordinator before being promoted in 2012.

In Atlanta, Slate oversaw all aspects of the Braves' strength and conditioning program throughout all levels of the organization. Under his program, the Braves reached the postseason in back-to-back seasons from 2012-13 and saw the team capture the NL East title in 2013.

From 2003-10, Slate was with the Mets for eight seasons as New York's strength and conditioning coordinator. Slate helped the club win the NL East title in 2006, their first division crown since 1988, and went on to reach the League Championship Series.

Slate began his professional career with the Marlins in 1992, one year prior to their inaugural season, as the team's minor league strength and conditioning coordinator. He was promoted in 1993 and served as Florida's strength and conditioning coordinator for nine years. During his tenure with the Marlins, Slate helped them win the 1997 World Series, becoming the first wild card team ever to win the World Series.

Before entering professional baseball, Slate spent six years at Florida State as an assistant strength and conditioning coach from 1987-92. During his time at Florida State, he helped the football program record six consecutive seasons with 10 or more wins, while earning six bowl wins and one ACC championship. He also helped his collegiate teams make it to the Sweet 16 in basketball and the College World Series in baseball while at Florida State.

TIGHT ENDS

16th Season in NFL

1st Season with Raiders

Luke Steckel enters his first season as tight ends coach with the Las Vegas Raiders in 2024.

He joins the Silver and Black after spending one season as the assistant offensive line coach with the Chicago Bears. In 2023, Steckel worked with an offensive line that paved the way for a rushing attack that ranked second in the NFL in rushing attempts (534), rushing yards (2,399) and rushing yards per game (141.1). The Bears also ranked tied for first in big plays rushing (10+ yards) with 74, fifth in rushing first downs (137) and sixth in yards per carry (4.49). With Steckel's guidance, first round draft pick Darnell Wright started in all 17 games at right tackle and was named First Team All-Rookie by the Pro Football Writers of America.

Prior to joining the Bears, Steckel spent 10 seasons with the Tennessee Titans in multiple roles. In 2022, he completed his second season as tight ends coach and helped TE Chig Okonkwo lead all rookie tight ends in the NFL in receiving yards (450) and receiving touchdowns (three), earning PFWA All-Rookie honors. Steckel also worked with TE Austin Hooper, helping him finish second on the team in receptions (41) and receiving yards (444).

In 2021, Steckel was promoted to tight ends coach following three years as an offensive assistant. Under his guidance, TE Geoff Swaim set career highs in receptions (31) and touchdowns (three), while TE MyCole Pruitt recorded then-career bests in catches (14), receiving yards (145) and touchdowns (three). The tight ends combined for eight of the team's 22 receiving touchdowns and helped the offense rank fifth in the NFL in rushing (141.4 yards per game).

In 2020, Steckel was part of an offensive staff that helped the Titans rank second in total offense (396.4 yards per game), second in rushing (168.1) and third in scoring (30.7 points per game). He continued his work with the wide receivers, helping WR A.J. Brown earn his first career Pro Bowl honor after recording 70 receptions for 1,075 yards and 11 touchdowns. He also coached WR Corey Davis to a career-high 984 receiving yards and five touchdowns.

In 2019, Steckel helped QB Ryan Tannehill register an NFL-best 117.5 passer rating, a 70.3 completion percentage, an NFL-high 9.6 yards per attempt and 22 touchdowns – all career highs – en route to being named Associated Press Comeback Player of the Year. The Titans' offense ranked fourth in the league in yards per play (6.12) and first in red zone efficiency (75.6 percent).

In 2018, Steckel began his second stint as an offensive assistant, working with second year WR Davis who led the offense with 65 receptions for 891 receiving yards and four touchdowns.

In 2017, he was promoted to assistant wide receivers coach and helped WR Eric Decker finish second on the team with 54 receptions and 563 receiving yards. WR Rishard Matthews finished with 53 catches for 795 receiving yards and a team-high four receiving touchdowns.

From 2014-16, Steckel served as an offensive assistant and worked primarily with the tight ends and running backs positions.

In 2016, Steckel assisted the tight ends group and helped TE Delanie Walker earn his second Pro Bowl honor after recording a team-high 65 receptions for 800 yards and a career-high seven touchdowns. The run-blocking by the tight end group also played a key role in the success of the Titans run game, which ranked third in the NFL and saw RB DeMarco Murray lead the AFC in rushing yards (1,287).

In 2015, Steckel coached RB Dexter McCCluster, who was the only player in the NFL that season, and the first player since Darren Sproles in 2011, to record 200-plus receiving yards, 200-plus rushing yards, 200-plus yards on kickoff returns and 200-plus yards on punt returns. McCCluster is 1-of-23 players to accomplish the feat in a single season in NFL history.

In 2014, Steckel helped with the development of rookie RB Bishop Sankey who played in all 16 games and led the team with 551 rushing yards with two touchdowns. In his first year with the Titans in 2013, he served as the assistant to the head coach.

Prior to Tennessee, Steckel spent four seasons with the Cleveland Browns as the assistant to the head coach, where he handled a variety of duties for the head coach and coaching staff.

DERIUS SWINTON II

ASSISTANT SPECIAL TEAMS

14th Season in NFL

2nd Season with Raiders

Derius Swinton II enters his second season with the Las Vegas Raiders as the assistant special teams coach, his 14th season in the NFL coaching ranks.

In 2023, Swinton supported a special teams unit that performed among the best in the NFL, helping P AJ Cole earn his third-straight Pro Bowl appearance after finishing the season with a league-high 45.1 net punting average, also the best average in a single season in Raiders history since 1976. He also saw K Daniel Carlson become just the 12th player in NFL history to reach 700 career points in his first six NFL seasons. Carlson finished the season making 26-of-30 field goals and 32-of-32 extra points. Swinton also oversaw WR DeAndre Carter in his first season with the Raiders, who returned 24 punts for 232 yards (9.7 avg.). His 9.7 yards per punt return was tied for the 12th best average in the NFL in 2023 (min. 20 returns).

Swinton joined the Raiders after serving as the special teams coordinator of the Los Angeles Chargers for the 2021 season. His new position in Las Vegas completes his AFC West career tour as Swinton has now held coaching positions for all four teams in the division beginning with the Chiefs in 2012, the Broncos in 2013-14, the Chargers in 2021 and now the Raiders in 2023.

In his lone season with the Chargers, he led a special teams unit that made significant improvement from 2020 to 2021 in the kicking and return game. Under Swinton, LA improved from 29th in the league in field goal percentage (72.7) to ninth in 2021 (88.9 percent), in large part to the mid-season acquisition of K Dustin Hopkins, who made 18-of-20 (90.0 percent) field goals after joining the Chargers in Week 8. In the kickoff return game, Swinton helped improve the Chargers from the 15th best average in the NFL in 2020 (22.0) to the fourth best average in the NFL in 2021 (25.0), led by the mid-season acquisition of Andre Roberts, who averaged 32.8 yards per kick return after joining the Chargers in Week 8, the second best mark in the league.

Swinton also spent a short stint of his career on the offensive side of the ball in 2018, serving as an offensive assistant with the Detroit Lions before returning to the special teams ranks with the Cardinals in 2020 as the assistant special teams coach, helping the team improve to the fifth best kickoff coverage in the NFL in 2020 (19.5 opp. avg.).

Swinton served as assistant special teams coach with the Chicago Bears for two seasons (2015, 17), highlighted by the Bears punt return unit posting the third-best average in the NFL in 2017 (10.5 avg.) and K Robbie Gould making a league-best seven field goals from 50+ yards in 2015.

Between his two seasons in Chicago, Swinton got his first opportunity as a special teams coordinator with the San Francisco 49ers in 2016. During his time in the Bay Area, he helped improve the 49ers kickoff coverage from the 25th fewest average return yards allowed to the fifth fewest return yards allowed in the NFL.

Swinton began his NFL coaching career with the St. Louis Rams in 2009, where he served as a special teams quality control coach from 2009-11 before coaching in the same role with the Chiefs in 2012.

After his lone season with the Chiefs in 2012, Swinton spent two seasons with the Denver Broncos (2013-14) as an assistant special teams coach, helping K Matt Prater to a Pro Bowl selection and second-team All-Pro honors after making 96.2 percent of his field goal attempts (2nd in the NFL), including an NFL-record 64-yard field goal.

PERSONAL: A native of Newport News, Va., Swinton began his coaching career after graduating from Hampton University in Hampton, Virginia, where he was a two-sport athlete, doubling as a star in the secondary and key contributor on the basketball team. After graduation, he took a defensive graduate assistant position at the University of Tennessee, where he helped safety Eric Berry earn All-America honors as a sophomore and second-team All-Southeastern Conference recognition as a freshman. In his second season with the Volunteers in 2008, Tennessee ranked third in the nation in total defense. Swinton is married to Hillary Thomas, and they have one son, Cameron (2).

SCOTT TURNER

PASS GAME COORDINATOR

13th Season in NFL

2nd Season with Raiders

Turner enters his second season with the Las Vegas Raiders as the team's pass game coordinator, bringing with him 12 years of NFL coaching experience.

In 2023, Turner played a key role in the development of rookie QB Aidan O'Connell, who finished third among all rookie quarterbacks with 2,218 passing yards and second with 12 passing touchdowns. O'Connell became the first rookie in Raiders history to have a 100.0 passer rating in multiple games (3) of his rookie season while also tying the franchise rookie record for most passing touchdowns in a single game (4). Over the last four weeks of the season, O'Connell threw eight touchdowns and zero interceptions, becoming just the third Raiders quarterback since 1970 to throw eight touchdowns and zero interceptions over a four-game span — joining Ken Stabler and Derek Carr.

Prior to joining the Raiders, Turner spent the previous three seasons (2020-22) as the offensive coordinator with the Washington Commanders. In 2021, Turner led an offense that produced a 1,000-yard rusher and receiver and ranked sixth in the NFC in rushing yards per game (121.2). WR Terry McLaurin recorded 1,000 receiving yards in each of his three seasons under Turner.

Prior to Washington, Turner served as the quarterbacks coach with the Carolina Panthers from 2018-19, as well as interim offensive coordinator in 2019. In his first season with Carolina, the offense finished 10th in the league in net yards (373.3), the second-highest season average in club history.

From 2014-16, Turner served as quarterbacks coach with the Minnesota Vikings. Under Turner's guidance, QB Teddy Bridgewater was named to the Pro Bowl in his second season in 2015 and recorded the eighth-best completion percentage (64.6 percent) and the 17th-highest passer rating (85.2) by a rookie in NFL history in 2014.

In his lone season as the Cleveland Browns wide receivers coach in 2013, Turner helped WR Josh Gordon to become the first Browns player in history to lead the NFL in receiving yards (1,646) and the 17th-best single-season receiving mark in NFL history.

Turner entered the NFL coaching ranks as an offensive quality control coach for the Panthers from 2011-12. The Panthers recorded two of the top four seasons in franchise history in terms of net yards, setting the all-time mark with 389.8 yards per game in 2011 and 360.7 in 2012. Turner helped coach QB Cam Newton, who was named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year in 2011.

Prior to Turner's first stint in Carolina, he spent three seasons at the University of Pittsburgh (2008-10), two as an offensive assistant and the last as wide receivers coach. Turner made his coaching debut in 2005 as a graduate assistant at Oregon State.

A three-year letterman at UNLV from 2002-04, Turner served as a reserve quarterback for the Rebels before earning his degree in psychology in 2005.

PERSONAL: A native of Oakton, Va. ... He is the son of former NFL Coach Norv Turner... The two previously coached together in Carolina, Minnesota, and Cleveland... He and his wife, Robyn, have two children — a son, Harry (10) and a daughter, Rose (8).

FRED WALKER

ASSISTANT QUARTERBACKS

3rd Season in NFL

3rd Season with Raiders

Fred Walker enters his first season as assistant quarterbacks coach with the Raiders in 2024, having spent the past two seasons (2022-23) as the team's offensive assistant.

In 2023, Walker helped mentor rookie QB Aidan O'Connell, who threw for 12 touchdowns and 2,218 yards on 213 completions. He saw O'Connell become the first rookie in franchise history to have a 100.0+ passer rating in multiple games (3) of his rookie season, while also tying the rookie club record with four passing touchdowns in a single game. Over the last four weeks of the season, O'Connell threw eight touchdowns and zero interceptions, becoming just the third Raiders quarterback since 1970 to throw eight touchdowns and zero interceptions over a four-game span – joining Ken Stabler and Derek Carr.

In 2022, Walker helped an offense that ranked No. 5 in the NFL in scoring percentage, scoring on 73-of-172 of the team's offensive possessions, a mark that ranked fifth in the league and was the second highest for a Raiders offense since 2001. He also saw quarterback Derek Carr complete 305-of-502 passes for 3,522 yards and 24 touchdowns and be named to his fourth Pro Bowl.

Prior to entering the NFL coaching ranks, Walker spent 11 seasons coaching at the college level.

In 2021, Walker served as the quarterbacks coach at Massachusetts after one year coaching wide receivers for Murray State in 2020.

Walker served as an offensive assistant at Duke from 2018-19, where he worked primarily with the quarterbacks. Under Walker's guidance, QB Daniel Jones was a two-time team Most Valuable Player with the Blue Devils and finished his final season completing 237-of-392 passes (60 percent) for 22 touchdowns and nine interceptions, while rushing for 319 yards and three TDs.

During the 2017 season, Walker served as wide receivers coach at Tennessee Tech, where he helped WR Dontez Byrd earn All-OVC first team honors after setting new school records for receptions (78) and receiving yards (1,003), while ranking 10th nationally for receptions per game (7.1) and 18th in receiving yards per game (91.2).

Walker spent two seasons as a graduate assistant at Troy University from 2015-16. In 2016, he helped QB Brandon Silvers and RB Jordan Chunn earn first team All-Sun Belt honors.

While in his assistantship with Mississippi State, Walker helped coach the Bulldogs' wide receivers from 2011-2012 before working primarily with the quarterbacks from 2013-2015. During his tenure, he guided QB Dak Prescott, who set school records for rushing yards by a quarterback (986), total offense (4,435), total touchdowns (41), completion percentage (.62), passing yards (3,449), 200-yard passing games (12) and passing touchdowns (27) in 2014.

Among his other duties at Mississippi State, he helped break down opponent film and develop scouting reports, was the offensive signal caller during games, and helped build the offensive playbook.

PERSONAL: A native of Canton, Miss., Walker graduated from Mississippi State in 2014 with a degree in kinesiology... He earned a graduate degree in criminal justice from Troy in 2016... He is married to his wife, Jamie.

CARNELL WILLIAMS

RUNNING BACKS

8th Season in NFL
(7 as a player)

1st Season with Raiders

Carnell Williams, a former all-American, first-round pick and seven-year NFL vet, joins the Las Vegas Raiders as a running backs coach in 2024, his first season coaching in the NFL. Williams brings seven years of playing experience in the NFL and nine years of coaching experience in high school, college and the AAF.

Williams comes to the Raiders after spending the last five seasons at Auburn University, his alma mater, where he served as the running backs coach from 2019-22 before being promoted to interim head coach during the 2022 season and then associate head coach/running backs in 2023. Last season (2023), Auburn averaged 189.0 rushing yards per game, which ranked 23rd in the nation and fourth in the SEC.

In 2022, Williams began the season as the running backs coach and after a late October dismissal of Head Coach Bryan Harsin, Williams was selected to lead the Tigers as interim head coach for the final four games of the season. At the helm, Williams led Auburn to a 2-2 record, including wins over Texas A&M and Western Kentucky. Williams also led a running back unit that averaged 205.8 rushing yards per game, ranking 18th nationally and third in the SEC, while the Tigers' lead back, RB Tank Bigsby, was drafted in the third round (88th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft after his junior season.

Under Williams' guidance in 2020, freshman RB Tank Bigsby was named the SEC Co-Freshman of the Year and Associated Press SEC Newcomer of the Year after leading all freshmen in the conference with 834 rushing yards. Bigsby was the first Auburn freshman in school history to rush for three consecutive 100-yard games and his 834 yards were the second most all-time at Auburn by a rookie.

Williams returned to Auburn to coach running backs in 2019 under Gus Malzahn and during his first season, the Tigers posted five 100-yard rushing games.

Williams' coaching career started at Henderson State in 2015 where he served as the running backs coach. After a stint at the University of West Georgia in 2016, Williams was the running backs coach for IMG Academy in Bradenton, Florida for two seasons (2017-18). Williams also served as the running backs coach for the Birmingham Iron of the Alliance of American Football (AAF).

PERSONAL: A native of Gadsden, Ala. ...Williams played four seasons at Auburn (2001-04) and is still the program's career leader in rushing touchdowns (45) and second all-time in career rushing yards (3,831) – behind only Auburn Heisman Trophy winner and former Raider, Bo Jackson. ...Williams helped Auburn to a 13-0 season and an SEC Championship as a senior in 2004, finishing with 1,165 rushing yards, 12 touchdowns and 1,718 all-purpose yards, earning all-America honors and the SEC Special Teams Player of the Year award. ... After college, Williams was drafted by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the first round (fifth overall) of the 2005 NFL Draft and was named AP NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year after leading all rookies with 1,178 rushing yards. ... Over his seven-year NFL career with Tampa Bay (2005-10) and St. Louis (2011), Williams played in 81 games (58 starts) and racked up 4,038 rushing yards and 21 touchdowns on 1,055 carries (3.8 avg.) along with 148 receptions for 1,002 yards and four touchdowns. ... Williams returned to Auburn to finish his degree in sociology and graduated in December 2014. He and his wife, Evan Williams, have two boys: Cole and Cuinn.

TIM ZETTS

OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT

4th Season in NFL

1st Season with Raiders

Tim Zetts enters his first season with the Raiders in 2024 as an offensive assistant, bringing with him 16 years of coaching experience, including four years at the NFL level.

Zetts spent two seasons (2022-23) with the Chicago Bears as an assistant tight ends coach, where he was a part of a staff that helped contribute to the growth of TE Cole Kmet. In 2023, Zetts and tight ends coach Jim Dray saw Kmet finish with a career-high 719 yards on 73 receptions (9.8 avg.) and six touchdowns. In 2022, Kmet also led all Bears pass-catchers with 544 yards on 50 receptions (10.9 avg.) as well as a career-high seven touchdown receptions on the season, tied for third-most among all tight ends in the NFL.

In 2021, Zetts served as an offensive quality control coach for the Green Bay Packers. With Zetts' assistance, the Packers won the NFC North and claimed the NFC's top playoff seed for the second consecutive season. The Packers' offense also ranked in the league's top-10 in total scoring and receiving yards, tied the Bengals for sixth with 54 total touchdowns and finished ninth in receiving yards (4,526). Zetts assisted a Packers offense that saw QB Aaron Rodgers orchestrate an MVP caliber season comprised of 37 touchdown passes and just four interceptions while compiling a league-best 111.9 passer rating. Rodgers led the league in passing touchdown percentage (7%) and tied Dak Prescott and Patrick Mahomes for the fourth most passing touchdowns (37). Zetts also assisted with WR Davante Adams' success, who finished third in the league in receiving yards with 1,553.

Prior to joining the Packers, Zetts spent two seasons (2019-20) at Austin Peay State University in Clarksville, Tenn., where he served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. Zetts led Austin Peay's offense during an abbreviated fall football schedule before the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) season was postponed until the spring of 2021. In his first season with the Governors in 2019, AP's offense led the Ohio Valley Conference in scoring (34.1 ppg), fewest sacks allowed (14) and third-down percentage, while finishing second in total offense (414.1 ypg), rushing offense (175.6 ypg) and pass efficiency (139.0). Austin Peay finished the season with 11 total wins (the most in program history), won the OVC for the first time since 1977 and advanced to the FCS quarterfinals.

Prior Zetts served as an assistant wide receivers/offensive skill quality control coach at Mississippi State University in 2018. At MSU, he coached alongside Raiders offensive coordinator Luke Getsy, who was in his first season as offensive coordinator for the Bulldogs. Mississippi State's offense finished the year tied for first in the nation with only three fumbles lost and ranked tied for third in the country with just nine total fumbles.

Prior to his stop in Mississippi, Zetts spent one season at Davison College as a quarterbacks coach (2017), and two seasons as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at John Carroll University (2015-16). In 2016, Zetts helped John Carroll to 12 wins – the most in school history – and their first outright OAC conference championship since 1989 before advancing to the NCAA Division III semi-finals. Zetts spent the 2012-14 seasons at Fordham, serving as the Rams' running backs coach and recruiting coordinator. While with the Rams, Zetts mentored running back Chase Edmonds, a fourth-round selection (No. 134 overall) by the Arizona Cardinals in the 2018 NFL Draft. Before arriving Fordham, Zetts joined Getsy on the coaching staff at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, serving for one season (2011) as the running backs coach while also assisting with the kickoff return, punt return and field goal units for the Crimson Hawks.

Before his time at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, Zetts spent the 2010 season as an offensive quality control coach at California University of Pennsylvania.

Zetts began his coaching career at his alma mater, the University of Akron, serving as an offensive student assistant and assistant quarterback coach during the 2008-09 seasons.

JOJO WOODEN


SENIOR DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

John Barnett enters his third season as Director of Scouting Administration and Assistant to the General Manager for the Las Vegas Raiders after 11 seasons in administration at the collegiate level. He spent the previous six seasons as Director of Football Operations, with stints at Louisiana Tech, Southern Miss, and Eastern Kentucky University. His responsibilities included overseeing all day-to-day operations of the football program, coordinating team travel logistics, and serving as a liaison with campus departments and the community. Prior to working at the collegiate level, he served as an assistant football coach at Blacksburg (Va.) High School and Camden (N.J.) Catholic High School, his alma mater.




CURTIS KNOX II

A native of Gadsden, S.C., Michael earned a bachelor's degree in Sport and Entertainment Management from the University of South Carolina.




CARTER THORNTON


KENAN CLARKE




SCOTT TOUCHET




ADAM JOHNSON




NICO BARNES




RON CONNOLLY




ASHLEY SMITH

SUPER BOWL II

Miami Orange Bowl, Sunday, Jan. 14, 1968, Attendance: 75,546, Time: 2:34 PM PST, Weather: 68°F, partly cloudy, 52% humidity, wind W 14 mph

The Raiders stormed into Super Bowl II after claiming the club's first-ever American Football League championship with a 40-7 romp over the Houston Oilers on Dec. 31, 1967. The Raiders mounted a spirited challenge to the Green Bay Packers, the defending Super Bowl champions, but ultimately fell short in Miami, 33-14.

In a game that drew the first \$3 million gate in football history, the Bart Starr-led Packers jumped out to a 13-0 lead in the second quarter after a 62-yard touchdown reception by Boyd Dowler. The Raiders cut into the lead with a 23-yard touchdown pass from Daryle Lamonica to Bill Miller, the first of two touchdown receptions on the day for the wide receiver, who played collegiately at the University of Miami.

Down 16-7 entering the second half, the Raiders were unable to contain a Packers offense that added a 2-yard touchdown run by Donny Anderson and Don Chandler's fourth field goal of the day, in the third quarter. Herb Adderley's 60-yard interception return for a touchdown on a fourth-quarter Lamonica pass sealed the Packers victory. Lamonica connected with Miller for a 23-yard Oakland touchdown late in the final period.

Starr earned the game's MVP honors after completing 13-of-24 passes for 202 yards and one touchdown. Miller hauled in a game-high five passes for 84 yards and two touchdowns to lead the Raiders.



SUPER BOWL XI

Rose Bowl, Sunday, Jan. 9, 1977; Attendance: 103,424; Time: 3:03 PM PST; Weather: 58°F; clear and sunny, 59% humidity, wind NW 5 mph

The 1976 Raiders advanced to Super Bowl XI with a 13-1 regular season record and a 2-0 mark in the playoffs, upending the Pittsburgh Steelers in the AFC Championship Game for the first time in three tries, 24-7. Against the NFC Champion Vikings in front of 103,424 fans at the Rose Bowl, the Silver and Black put forth dominant efforts on both offense and defense in posting a 32-14 victory and capturing the club's first-ever Super Bowl championship.

Oakland built a 16-0 first-half lead as Dave Casper and Pete Banaszak each scored short touchdowns after receptions by Fred Biletnikoff brought the Raiders to the goal line on two separate drives. An additional short-yardage touchdown run by Banaszak in the second half put the Raiders up, 26-7, and set the stage



for the signature moment of the contest. With Fran Tarkenton under heavy pressure in the fourth quarter, veteran Willie Brown intercepted a pass and returned it 75 yards for a touchdown to seal the victory.

The Vikings could only muster two second-half touchdowns as the Silver and Black put together a dominant defensive performance, limiting Chuck Foreman to just 44 yards rushing and intercepting Tarkenton twice.

Biletnikoff's 79 yards on four receptions, three of which set up Raider touchdowns, earned him MVP honors, while Clarence Davis helped pace the offense with 137 rushing yards on 16 carries.

A startling 12 Raiders from Super Bowl XI would go on to enshrinement in the Pro Football Hall of Fame, with Owner Al Davis joining Head Coach John Madden, Biletnikoff, Brown, Ted Hendricks, Ray Guy, Ken Stabler, Gene Upshaw, Art Shell, Casper, assistant coach Tom Flores and Cliff Branch in Canton.

SUPER BOWLS

SUPER BOWL XV

Louisiana Superdome, Sunday, Jan. 25, 1981; Attendance: 76,135; Time: 3:13 PM PST; Weather: played indoors, domed stadium

The 1980 Oakland Raiders entered Super Bowl XV against the NFC Champion Philadelphia Eagles as the ultimate underdogs. Not only were the Raiders the first wild card team to advance to the Super Bowl since the NFL adopted the new playoff format in 1978, but the Eagles had already defeated the Silver and Black, 10-7, just eight weeks earlier. This matchup would be markedly different, as a team that started the season with just a 2-3 record would claim the club's second championship with a dominating 27-10 victory.

The Raiders wasted no time establishing themselves in New Orleans, as Rod Martin picked off a Ron Jaworski pass on the game's third play and re-



turned it 25 yards to set up a Jim Plunkett touchdown pass to Cliff Branch. Later in the first quarter, Plunkett hit Kenny King for an 80-yard touchdown strike that set a then-Super Bowl record and gave the Silver and Black a 14-0 lead.

Head coach Tom Flores, employing a philosophy of pressure football, kept the offense firing away in the second half. Plunkett engineered a third-quarter drive that culminated in a 29-yard touchdown pass to Branch that gave the Raiders an insurmountable 21-3 lead. Chris Bahr added two field goals in the second half and the defense, led by a Super Bowl-record three interceptions by Martin, surrendered only a fourth-quarter touchdown.

Plunkett was tabbed for MVP honors after completing 13-of-21 passes for 261 yards and three touchdowns as the Silver and Black became the first wild card team in NFL history to win the Super Bowl.

SUPER BOWL XVIII

Tampa Stadium; Sunday, Jan. 22, 1984; Attendance: 72,920; Time: 3:31 PM PST; Weather: 68°F; partly cloudy, wind NE 20 mph

Famously dubbed "Black Sunday" by NFL Films, Super Bowl XVIII put on display the best that the NFL had to offer as the Los Angeles Raiders drubbed the Washington Redskins, 38-9. The resounding victory rested on the running brilliance of Marcus Allen and the strength of dominating defense and special teams play that lifted the Raiders to the club's third Super Bowl title in eight years.

Clad in their famous black jerseys, the Raiders jumped on the scoreboard first as Derrick Jensen blocked a first-quarter punt deep in Washington territory and fell on the ball in the end zone for a touchdown. In the second quarter, Jim Plunkett orchestrated an efficient three-play drive that culminated in a 12-yard touchdown pass to Cliff Branch.

After a Redskins field goal, the Silver and Black defense would strike just moments before halftime. Keying on a Washington screen pass play that had worked successfully against the Raiders during a regular season meeting between the two teams, defensive coordinator Charlie Sumner inserted reserve Jack Squirek with time winding down in the first half. As Joe Theismann lobbed a screen out towards Joe Washington from the 12-yard line, Squirek stepped in front of the pass and returned the interception for a touchdown to give the Raiders a 21-3 halftime advantage.

The Raiders' second half performance was just as dominant as the team shifted focus to its running game, led by Allen. The second-year running back scored a third-quarter touchdown

on a 5-yard run before breaking off perhaps the finest run in Super Bowl history later in the same period. Allen took a handoff from Plunkett and started left on the play but went too wide for his blocking and reversed his field, burst free of pursuit and found the end zone after a 74-yard sprint to give the Raiders an insurmountable lead and give the city of Los Angeles its first Super Bowl victory.

Allen was the easy choice as the game's Most Valuable Player, gaining 191 yards on 20 carries with two touchdowns.

After three seasons of knocking on the door, the 2002 Raiders broke through to earn a place in the Super Bowl for the fifth time in franchise history. Led by NFL Most Valuable Player Rich Gannon, the Silver and Black claimed a third-straight AFC West title in 2002, and dispatched the Tennessee Titans in the AFC Championship Game, 41-24, in dominating fashion. The team's ultimate goal of a fourth Super Bowl title would prove elusive, however, as the Raiders fell to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in Super Bowl XXXVII in San Diego, 48-21.

The Raiders got on the board first, capitalizing on a Charles Woodson interception on the game's first possession and getting a 40-yard field goal from Sebastian Janikowski.



The score would be the last until late in the third quarter for the Raiders, as the Buccaneers reeled off 34 unanswered points to build a large lead.

The Silver and Black got back into the game with three touchdowns in the second half. Gannon connected with Jerry Porter and Jerry Rice on touchdown passes of 39 and 48 yards, respectively, and Eric Johnson returned a blocked punt 13 yards for a score to move the Raiders to within two scores at 34-21 in the fourth quarter.

Tampa Bay halted any chance of a Raider comeback with two interception returns for touchdowns in the fourth quarter, one by Derrick Brooks for 44 yards and one by Dwight Smith on a tipped pass for 50 yards.

1967 AFL Championship

Dec. 31, 1967 at Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum; Oakland, Calif.

The Raiders made a splash in the organization's first-ever postseason contest, posting an emphatic 40-7 victory over Houston in front of 53,330 fans at Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum.

Fullbacks Pete Banaszak (15-116) and Hewritt Dixon (21-144) each topped 100 yards on the ground and quarterback Daryle Lamonica tossed a pair of touchdown passes and rushed for an additional score in the rout. Veteran kicker George Blanda added four field goals for Oakland.

Following a tight first period, Dixon got the Raiders into the endzone with a 69-yard touchdown scamper around left end in the second quarter. Blanda set up for a field-goal attempt on fourth-and-1 later in the frame, but Lamonica took the snap and connected with tight end Dave Kocourek for a 17-yard touchdown pass to give the Raiders a 17-0 lead at the half.

In the third quarter, Lamonica's 1-yard dive and the second of Blanda's four field goals gave Oakland an insurmountable 27-0 lead. Two more Blanda field goals and a 12-yard touchdown pass from Lamonica to wide receiver Bill Miller in the fourth period closed out the scoring for the day for Oakland, earning for the Raiders the right to represent the American Football League in the second AFL-NFL Championship.

RAIDERS 41, KANSAS CITY 6

1968 AFL Playoff

Dec. 22, 1968 at Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum; Oakland, Calif.

Deadlocked atop the AFL Western Division standings with identical 12-2 records, the Raiders and Chiefs met in a playoff contest to determine the New York Jets' opponent in the 1968 AFL Championship Game. Oakland used a devastating air attack behind quarterback Daryle Lamonica and receivers Fred Biletnikoff and Warren Wells to hand Kansas City a 41-6 defeat and book a date with Joe Namath's Jets for a shot at the team's second straight AFL title.

Lamonica lived up to his "Mad Bomber" moniker, passing for 347 yards on 19 completions with five touchdowns on the day. All of Lamonica's scoring tosses went to either Biletnikoff (7-180-3) or Wells (4-93-2), while an opportunistic Raider defense picked off Chiefs quarterback Len Dawson four times in the decisive victory.

Oakland jumped out to a 21-0 lead in the first quarter following two touchdown passes from Lamonica to Biletnikoff and an additional scoring toss to Wells. The Chiefs got into the action with a pair of Jan Stenerud field goals in the second quarter, but a 54-yard pass on a third-and-8 play for Biletnikoff's third scoring catch gave the Raiders a 28-6 advantage at the half.

Following a scoreless third period, Lamonica hooked up with Wells for a 35-yard touchdown pass in the fourth quarter to extend the Oakland lead. Wells' second touchdown of the day and a pair of George Blanda field goals following interceptions by defensive backs Willie Brown and Nemiah Wilson sealed the victory for the Silver and Black.




PLAYOFF HISTORY

NEW YORK JETS 27, RAIDERS 23

1968 AFL Championship

Dec. 29, 1968 at Shea Stadium; Flushing Meadows, N.Y.

Just six weeks after the two teams met in the famed "Heidi Game," the Raiders' quest for a second straight AFL title came to an end as Joe Namath's 6-yard touchdown pass to receiver Don Maynard with just under eight minutes remaining in regulation lifted the Jets to a 27-23 win in a back-and-forth struggle.

Oakland quarterback Daryle Lamonica posted a second prolific passing performance in as many weeks, completing 20-of-47 attempts for a franchise-record 401 yards and one touchdown. Fred Biletnikoff hauled in seven passes for 190 yards and one touchdown to lead all receivers.

After surrendering 10 points in the first quarter, a 29-yard scoring pass from Lamonica to Biletnikoff and a George Blanda field goal trimmed the New York lead to 13-10 entering the half. Blanda tied the score with a 9-yard field goal midway through the third period, but the Jets took the lead once again by way of a 20-yard pass from Namath to Pete Lammons, setting up a wildly entertaining fourth quarter.

Blanda's third field goal of the day, a 20-yarder, cut the lead to four points in the final period and rookie defensive back George Atkinson picked off a Namath pass and returned it to New York's 5-yard line on the ensuing possession. Fullback Pete Banaszak barreled into the end zone on the very next play, giving the Raiders their first lead of the game.

The Jets came back with a three-play scoring drive, culminating in Namath's touchdown pass to Maynard after the two had hooked up for a 52-yard gain on the previous play. Lamonica took the Raiders deep into scoring range on two more fourth-quarter drives, the second of which ended on an incomplete swing pass intended for Charlie Smith that was ruled a lateral and recovered by the Jets.

RAIDERS 56, HOUSTON OILERS 7

1969 AFL Divisional Playoff

Dec. 21, 1969 at Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum; Oakland, Calif.

Quarterback Daryle Lamonica, in perhaps his finest hour as a pro, set a single-game playoff record with six touchdown passes to lead the Silver and Black to a swift and decisive 56-7 victory over the visiting Houston Oilers in an AFL Divisional Playoff.

Under the direction of first-year head coach John Madden, a quick-strike offense and a smothering defense paced the Raiders to 28 first-quarter points.

On the team's second possession, Lamonica connected with running back Larry Todd for a 40-yard completion, setting up a 13-yard scoring pass to receiver Fred Biletnikoff. On the ensuing possession, defensive back George Atkinson picked off a pass from Houston quarterback Pete Beathard and returned it 57 yards for a touchdown, staking the Raiders to a 14-0 advantage.

The Raider defense struck again on the Oilers' next series, as lineman Carleton Oats recovered a fumble on a first-down play. The turnover set up another scoring strike, with Lamonica finding receiver Rod Sherman for a 24-yard score. Another Oiler fumble, this time by Beathard on a first-down snap, set up an immediate 31-yard scoring pass from Lamonica to Biletnikoff.


Oakland's offense continued to fire on all cylinders in the second quarter, as Lamonica hooked up with running back Charlie Smith for a 60-yard touchdown catch-and-run to make the score 35-0.

Third-quarter touchdown passes to Sherman and tight end Billy Cannon gave Lamonica the record and effectively put the game out of reach for Houston. A late fourth-quarter touchdown pass from Beathard was equaled by a 4-yard touchdown run from fullback Marv Hubbard to round out the scoring.

Lamonica's touchdown bounty established the single-game playoff standard, and has been matched only twice since his record-setting day. As a team, the win over Houston remains the highest playoff point total and largest postseason margin of victory in franchise history.

The final American Football League Championship fittingly took place in Oakland, as the Raiders had come to dominate the AFL's Western Division, advancing to the championship contest for the third straight season.

A stifling Kansas City defense and a balanced offense led by quarterback Len Dawson conspired to derail the Raiders' attempt for a second AFL title in three seasons. The Chiefs' defense harassed Oakland quarterbacks Daryle Lamonica and George Blanda, forcing the signal-callers to throw four interceptions. Despite the best efforts of running back Charlie Smith, who totaled eight catches for 86 yards and rushed for the Raiders' lone touchdown, the high-flying Oakland offense was limited to its lowest point total of the season.

Smith got the Raiders on the scoreboard first, scampering in around left end from three yards out to cap a 66-yard drive at the end of the first quarter. The Chiefs leveled the score behind a 1-yard scoring plunge by running back Wendell Hayes, and the teams entered the half tied at seven.

Blanda entered the contest at quarterback for Lamonica, who sustained a hand injury, in the third quarter but was picked off deep in Kansas City territory. The Chiefs capitalized on the ensuing possession, marching 94 yards on a drive that culminated in a 5-yard touchdown run by running back Robert Holmes.

Back in the huddle, Lamonica and the Raiders attempted to even the score, but the dinged-up quarterback was picked off on three straight possessions in the fourth quarter. A Jan Stenerud field goal capped the scoring for Kansas City, which came away with the upset victory in Oakland.



The Raiders spoiled Miami's postseason debut on a muddy Coliseum field, using an opportunistic passing attack to upend the upstart Dolphins. Quarterback Daryle Lamonica tossed two touchdown passes and defensive back Willie Brown's 50-yard interception return for a touchdown earned the Raiders a spot in the first AFC Championship game with the 21-14 win.

Miami struck first, as quarterback Bob Griese found receiver Paul Warfield in the end zone for a 16-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter. Oakland pulled even near the half, as Lamonica connected with receiver Fred Biletnikoff for a 22-yard score with 1:50 left on the clock.

Oakland drove to the Miami 2-yard line on the opening possession of the third quarter, but a fumble by running back Charlie Smith was recovered by safety Jake Scott. The Dolphins drove to their own 38-yard line but a Griese pass intended for Warfield was picked off by Brown and returned half the length of the field for a score.

Following a missed Miami field-goal attempt early in the fourth quarter, Lamonica unleashed an 82-yard touchdown pass to receiver Rod Sherman with 9:34 left to play, extending the Raider lead. Griese led the Dolphins to within one score with a 7-yard scoring toss to Willie Richardson, but the Oakland defense held firm on Miami's following possession to close out the victory.




BALTIMORE COLTS 27, RAIDERS 17

1970 AFC Championship

Jan. 3, 1971 at Memorial Stadium; Baltimore, Md.

The Silver and Black fell short of a Super Bowl berth for the third straight season, falling to Baltimore on a barren Memorial Stadium field in the first AFC Championship game, 27-17.

The matchup between Oakland, owners of the league's top offense, and the Colts, who were led by legendary signal-caller Johnny Unitas, made for a most compelling championship battle that was dubbed the "Duel in the Dust" by NFL Films.



The Baltimore defense immediately posed problems for quarterback Daryle Lamonica, and the Raider offense stalled in the first quarter, failing to record a first down. Rookie kicker Jim O'Brien gave the Colts the lead midway through the opening frame, booting a 16-yard field goal.

Oakland drove into Colts territory early in the second period but Lamonica was sacked by Bubba Smith, forcing the quarterback to leave the game due to injury. Grizzled veteran George Blanda was called into action once again, looking to spark the Raiders to victory as he had over a remarkable five-game stretch during the regular season. After a 2-yard touchdown plunge by rookie running back Norm Bulaich put the Colts up 10-0, the Raiders drove into Colts territory and Blanda put Oakland on the board with a 48-yard field goal.

Blanda quickly drew the Raiders level in the third quarter, piloting the half's opening drive and connecting with receiver Fred Biletnikoff for a 38-yard touchdown pass. The Colts answered immediately with a field goal and took a commanding lead at the end of the period on Bulaich's second rushing touchdown of the day, an expertly-blocked 11-yard scamper around left end.

The Raiders pulled to within three points on their first drive of the fourth period. Blanda hit Warren Wells for a 15-yard touchdown, part of a five-catch, 108-yard day for the deep-threat receiver. Matching Blanda blow-for-blow was the immeasurable Unitas, who promptly tossed a 68-yard scoring strike to receiver Ray Perkins to bring the Colts' lead back to 10 points.

Blanda's magic could not rally the Raiders again, however, as two of the team's final four possessions resulted in interceptions deep in Baltimore territory and the Colts advanced to Super Bowl V.

1972 AFC Divisional Playoff

Dec. 23, 1972 at Three Rivers Stadium; Pittsburgh, Pa.

What many have referred to as the greatest and most controversial play of all-time, "The Immaculate Reception," decided an AFC Playoff tilt between the Raiders and Steelers, setting the stage for numerous postseason battles between the two elite teams during the 1970s.

Oakland, returning to the postseason after a one-year hiatus, nursed a 7-6 advantage in a physical contest, and the Steelers were facing a fourth-and-10 as time wound down in regulation. Quarterback Terry Bradshaw's pass, intended for running back Frenchy Fuqua, ricocheted back toward the line of scrimmage and was scooped up by running back Franco Harris, who rumbled 60 yards into the end zone. The pass was deemed by officials to have been deflected by a defender, Raider safety Jack Tatum, and ruled a reception and touchdown in what remains one of the most controversial plays in NFL history.

All of the scoring came in the second half, with defense dominating the first two quarters on both sides. Quarterback Daryle Lamonica was intercepted on Oakland's first drive and a fumble by running back Marv Hubbard put the Raider defense on short fields, but the unit held strong on both occasions and halftime came with no score for either team.

The Steelers, making the organization's first postseason appearance in a decade, struck first with a Roy Gerela field goal early in the third quarter. The Raider offense could not get on track against the "Steel Curtain" defense, and Lamonica was removed in favor of Ken Stabler after throwing a fourth-quarter interception.

Pittsburgh tacked on a 29-yard field goal by Gerela with less than four minutes left in regulation and Stabler assumed the controls from the Raider 20-yard line with 3:42 left on the clock. "The Snake" converted a fourth-down play and connected with four different receivers to move the ball to the Pittsburgh 30-yard line. From there Stabler, almost stopped in the backfield, circled left and darted untouched into the end zone to give the Silver and Black their first lead of the day.

On the Steelers' final possession, Bradshaw moved the offense to the 40-yard line but stalled out there, setting up the controversial play that is still debated to this day.



RAIDERS 33, PITTSBURGH 14

1973 AFC Divisional Playoff

Dec. 22, 1973 at Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum; Oakland, Calif.

A pair of Marv Hubbard touchdown plunges and four George Blanda field goals helped the Raiders exact a measure of revenge for the previous season's "Immaculate Reception" game with a 33-14 win over Pittsburgh.

Quarterback Ken Stabler's precision passing coupled with a versatile running game, which generated 232 yards on 55 carries, cut through Pittsburgh's "Steel Curtain" defense, while a smothering defense limited running back Franco Harris to just 29 yards on the ground and forced quarterback Terry Bradshaw to throw three interceptions.

The Raiders wasted no time getting on the scoreboard, as the ground attack keyed a 16-play, 82-yard touchdown drive on Oakland's first possession. Hubbard broke off a 20-yard run to put the Silver and Black in scoring range, while Clarence Davis had four carries for 27 yards to set up Hubbard's 1-yard touchdown run over left tackle.

Blanda's first field goal gave the Raiders a 10-0 lead early in the second period, but a 20-yard punt return set up the Steelers in Oakland territory later in the frame. Pittsburgh capitalized and cut the lead to three following Bradshaw's 4-yard scoring toss to Barry Pearson.


The Raiders continued to pound the ball on the ground in the third quarter, racking up yardage and dominating possession, but producing only a pair of field goals. The Pittsburgh offense took to the air in an attempt to make up for lost time, but the game was effectively put out of reach when a Bradshaw pass was picked off by cornerback Willie Brown and returned 54 yards for a touchdown.

Down 23-7, Pittsburgh again tried to move the ball through the air, but Bradshaw was picked off, this time by safety George Atkinson, setting up Blanda's fourth field goal of the day.

Pittsburgh got a late touchdown, but Hubbard's leaping 1-yard touchdown dive over the middle with 19 seconds left in regulation put an exclamation point on an outstanding all-around performance.

An effective running game, led by Larry Csonka's 117 yards and three touchdowns, lifted the Dolphins to a 27-10 victory over the Raiders in front of 75,105 fans at Miami's Orange Bowl. Csonka's effort paced a Dolphin offense that chewed up 266 yards on the ground, averaging over five yards per rushing attempt.

Miami set the tone early, taking the opening kickoff and embarking on a nine-play, 64-yard drive that included just one pass attempt. Quarterback Bob Griese's 27-yard scamper set up an 11-yard touchdown run by Csonka, giving the Dolphins an early lead.

The Oakland offense failed to get on track, punting twice and missing a field-goal attempt before Miami doubled its lead by virtue of a 2-yard Csonka score. The touchdown capped a drive that included 14 running plays and just two pass attempts, both of which fell incomplete.


The Raiders got back into the contest in the third quarter, as kicker George Blanda booted a 21-yard field goal on the first possession of the second half. On the Silver and Black's next offensive series, quarterback Ken Stabler found receiver Mike Siani three times for 45 yards, including a 25-yard touchdown pass that cut the Dolphin lead to 14-10.

Miami returned to the ground game, running the ball on 11 straight plays to set up a Garo Yepremian field goal in the fourth quarter. The Dolphins defense then held firm on a fourth-and-1 play on the Raiders' next possession, stopping running back Marv Hubbard to turn the ball over on downs.

Csonka struck again late in the final period, scoring on a 2-yard run with 1:49 remaining to close out the game and send the Dolphins to their third straight Super Bowl.

Dec. 21, 1974 at Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum; Oakland, Calif.

In the closing seconds of a tight contest, Clarence Davis hauled in a desperation toss from quarterback Ken Stabler amidst a "Sea of Hands," giving the Raiders a 28-26 victory over the Miami Dolphins in what NBC Sports play-by-play announcer Curt Gowdy called, "the greatest game I have ever seen."

In an epic contest chock full of individual heroes, Stabler's 293 passing yards and four touchdowns and receiver Fred Biletnikoff's knack for timely receptions to the tune of eight catches for 122 yards, edged out Miami's vaunted running game and 114 yards from running back Larry Csonka.

The Dolphins wasted no time getting on the scoreboard, as Nat Moore returned the opening kickoff 89 yards for a touchdown to stake the visitors to a 7-0 lead. The Raiders drew even in the second quarter, as Stabler tossed a perfect pass to Charlie Smith in single coverage down the middle for a 31-yard touchdown. Miami turned to the ground game on the ensuing possession, driving into Oakland territory and settling for a 33-yard field goal from Garo Yepremian to enter the half with a 10-7 lead.

Oakland briefly took the lead in the third quarter, with Stabler and Biletnikoff hooking up three times, the third of which was a marvelous one-handed touchdown grab just inside the pylon while draped in coverage. The Dolphins quickly retook the lead, as quarterback Bob Griese found a wide open Paul Warfield in the end zone for a 16-yard touchdown after defensive back Nemiah Wilson slipped in coverage.

A memorable fourth quarter began well for Miami, as Yepremian's second field goal increased the Dolphin lead to 19-14. On Oakland's next possession, Stabler's deep pass was caught by a diving Cliff Branch, who having not been touched by a defender, rose to his feet and scampered 72 yards for a touchdown. Running back Benny Malone gave the Dolphins the advantage once again, breaking tackles and ducking under defenders for a 23-yard touchdown.

Behind the swashbuckling Stabler, the Raiders then drove to the Miami 8-yard line with 35 seconds left on the clock. On first-and-goal, the Miami rush closed in on the quarterback and with defensive end Vern Den Herder at his legs, Stabler looped the ball toward the end zone, where Davis outfought a crowd of white jerseys to come down with the football, clutching it to his chest for the game-winning touchdown.

A pair of Franco Harris touchdowns, 21 fourth-quarter points and a stingy Pittsburgh defense ended the Raiders' hopes for an AFC title in Oakland. Quarterback Ken Stabler completed 19 passes for 271 yards, but three interceptions contributed to a second straight championship defeat for the Silver and Black.

A fumbled punt on the game's first possession put Oakland within scoring range, and a 40-yard George Blanda field goal gave the Raiders the early advantage. A strong Pittsburgh ground game put kicker Roy Gerela in field-goal range late in the first quarter, but his 20-yard effort sailed wide left. A second-quarter field goal by Gerela, this time from 23-yards out, drew the game level and an interception by Raider defensive back Nemiah Wilson in the end zone helped preserve the 3-3 tie at the half.

Using an efficient passing attack, the Raiders grabbed the lead midway through the third quarter. Stabler drove the offense to the Steelers' 38-yard line, and connected with receiver Cliff Branch on the left side for a touchdown strike.

The Oakland lead was short-lived, however, as Pittsburgh used seven running plays and a 13-yard completion to drive to Oakland's 8-yard line, from where Harris took it up the middle for a score. On the ensuing drive, Stabler was intercepted by linebacker Jack Ham deep in Raider territory, setting up a 6-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Terry Bradshaw to receiver Lynn Swann.

Oakland cut the lead to 17-13 with a 24-yard field goal by Blanda, but Pittsburgh's J.T. Thomas picked off a Stabler pass to dash the Raiders' hopes late in the game. Harris capped the game with a 21-yard touchdown run shortly after the interception, lifting the Steelers to the organization's first Super Bowl appearance.




The Raiders out-paced a vaunted Cincinnati passing attack, building a significant lead before withstanding a furious Bengal rally to post a 31-28 victory in an AFC Divisional Playoff contest in Oakland.

The Silver and Black offense got off to a fast start, driving into field-goal range on the first possession of the game, but the Raiders came up empty as George Blanda's 41-yard effort fell short. Blanda would make amends later in the period, booting a 27-yard field goal to give the Raiders a 3-0 advantage.

Capitalizing on a short field following a late first-quarter punt, the Raiders added to their lead when quarterback Ken Stabler found receiver Mike Siani in the middle of the end zone for a 9-yard touchdown completion. Cincinnati got on the board via a 1-yard plunge over right tackle by running back Stan Fritts, but Oakland regained its 10-point advantage with an 8-yard touchdown pass from Stabler to tight end Bob Moore with just two minutes remaining in the first half.

The Bengals were forced to punt on their opening second-half possession, and a 20-yard return by Neal Colzie put the Raiders in scoring position at the Cincinnati 35-yard line. Four plays later, running back Pete Banaszak rumbled into the end zone from 6 yards out to increase the Raider lead. Cincinnati scored on the ensuing possession, as quarterback Ken Anderson orchestrated an 11-play, 91-yard drive that culminated in a Lenvil Elliott 6-yard touchdown run.

In a fourth quarter that saw the Coliseum air filled with foot-balls, the Raiders re-established a significant lead with tight end Dave Casper's 2-yard touchdown catch from a Stabler, his third scoring pass of the game. Cincinnati worked to get back in the game and, following an interception, scored on a 25-yard pass from Anderson to receiver Charlie Joiner. Anderson led a touchdown drive again on the Bengals' next series, connecting with receiver Isaac Curtis for a 14-yard score.

With the lead cut to three points, Cincinnati had one last chance to score the upset, but a tackle for loss by linebacker Ted Hendricks and three incomplete passes on the Bengals' final drive halted any chance of a come-from-behind triumph for the visitors.

On a frigid, ice-covered synthetic turf field at Three Rivers Stadium, the Raiders' vertical passing game was limited to the tune of a 16-10 defeat in what the NFL Network called one of the top "bad weather" games in league history. A defensive struggle turned into an offensive onslaught in the fourth quarter, with the Raiders falling just short against the defending Super Bowl champion Steelers.

With the temperature reaching just 16 degrees at kickoff, both teams struggled to find the end zone through the game's first three quarters. The Steelers got on the scoreboard first in the second period, turning the first of two interceptions by safety Mike Wagner into a 36-yard field goal by Roy Gerela.

Play on both sides got increasingly sloppy on the slippery turf, as the third quarter featured an interception, three turnovers on fumbles, two missed field-goal attempts and two punts, yet yielded zero points.

Pittsburgh broke through early in the fourth quarter, driving to the Oakland 25-yard line before running back Franco Harris bounced to the left after breaking a tackle and raced up the sideline for the game's first touchdown. Oakland answered back, as quarterback Ken Stabler connected with tight end Dave Casper on three consecutive passes for 46 yards, setting up a 14-yard scoring strike to receiver Mike Siani.

The Steelers increased their lead, capitalizing on a fumble recovery deep in Raider territory to score on 20-yard pass from quarterback Terry Bradshaw to receiver John Stallworth. Oakland got a 41-yard field goal from George Blanda late in the fourth quarter to cut the deficit to 16-10, and recovered the ensuing on-side kick, but receiver Cliff Branch was tackled as time expired to quell Oakland's comeback.






RAIDERS 24, NEW ENGLAND 21

Two fourth-quarter touchdowns, including a Ken Stabler scramble with just 10 seconds left in regulation, helped the Raiders avoid a valiant upset bid by the Wild Card qualifier Patriots in Oakland. Stabler's 233 passing yards, and nine receptions for 137 yards from receiver Fred Biletnikoff, put the Raiders through to the team's fourth straight conference championship game with the win.



New England, the only team to defeat the Raiders during the regular season, scored first via a 1-yard touchdown run by running back Andy Johnson. Oakland got on the board with a 40-yard field goal by Errol Mann later in the opening period. A 31-yard touchdown pass from Stabler to Biletnikoff late in the second quarter gave the Silver and Black a 10-7 lead at halftime.

The third quarter was dominated by New England, as second-year quarterback Steve Grogan engineered two long scoring drives. Grogan connected with tight end Russ Francis for a 26-yard touchdown pass to cap off a 9-play, 80-yard drive, and running back Jess Phillips scored on a 3-yard run late in the period to give the Patriots a 21-10 advantage.

The Raiders, in danger of being upset at home after a 13-1 regular season, cut the lead to four points with running back Mark van Eeghen's 1-yard touchdown run early in the fourth quarter. Later, facing a third-and-18 from the New England 27-yard line, Stabler was hit as his pass intended for running back Carl Garrett fell incomplete. Patriot defensive lineman Ray "Sugar Bear" Hamilton was flagged for roughing the passer on the play, and the Raiders were given a fresh set of downs. Four plays later, Stabler scrambled left and dove between two defenders into the end zone for the game's winning touchdown.



A solid rushing performance and a stout defensive effort lifted the Silver and Black to a convincing 24-7 victory over arch-rival Pittsburgh in Oakland. The victory snapped a streak of two straight AFC Championship game victories for the Steelers and punched the Raiders' ticket to Pasadena, Calif., for Super Bowl XI.



Oakland's ground attack, paced by running back Mark van Eeghen's 22

carries for 66 yards, accounted for 157 of the team's 220 total yards of offense. The Raider defense was equally impressive, limiting the Steelers to 72 rushing yards and holding receiver Lynn Swann to just three catches.

A 39-yard field goal by Errol Mann staked the Raiders to an early lead in the first quarter. In the second period, linebacker Willie Hall picked off a Terry Bradshaw pass and returned it 25 yards to the Pittsburgh 1-yard line, setting up a short touchdown run by running back Clarence Davis.

Pittsburgh scored their first points on the ensuing possession, as Bradshaw connected on a pair of deep passes to set up a 3-yard scoring run by running back Reggie Harrison. The Raiders pushed the lead to 10 points just before halftime, mixing a strong running game with mid-range passing to set up Stabler's 4-yard touchdown toss to receiver Warren Bankston in the left side of the end zone.

The Raiders extended the lead on the team's second offensive possession of the third quarter, embarking on a 12-play, 63-yard touchdown drive that culminated in Stabler's 5-yard scoring pass to running back Pete Banaszak.

Oakland's defense clamped down for the remainder of regulation, and jubilant Raider fans poured onto the Coliseum field to celebrate as time expired.



RAIDERS 37, BALTIMORE COLTS 31 (2 OT)

1977 AFC Divisional Playoff

Dec. 24, 1977 at Memorial Stadium; Baltimore, Md.

The defending Super Bowl champion Raiders, a Wild Card entrant after posting an 11-3 regular-season record, engaged in an epic double-overtime battle with Baltimore at Memorial Stadium, a game that is best remembered for a single pass play, the "Ghost to the Post." Tight end Dave Casper was on the receiving end of three touchdown passes from quarterback Ken Stabler on the day, but it was his late grab to set up the game-tying field goal that earned notoriety in a contest that lasted three hours and 50 minutes.



Running back Clarence Davis put the Raiders up in the first quarter, breaking loose over left guard and scoring on a 30-yard run. The Colts drew even in the second quarter when defensive back Bruce Laird intercepted a Stabler pass and raced 61 yards for a touchdown. A Baltimore field goal gave the Colts a 10-7 lead at halftime.

Stabler took to the air on the Raiders' first possession of the second half, connecting with receiver Cliff Branch for a 41-yard gain before hitting Casper in the end zone from 8 yards out. The Colts retook the lead on the ensuing kickoff, with Marshall Johnson returning Ray Guy's kick 87 yards for a score. The see-saw contest swung in the Raiders' favor later in the third period, as linebacker Ted Hendricks blocked a Baltimore punt to set up Casper's second touchdown catch, a 10-yard toss from Stabler.

Quarterback Bert Jones drove the Colts to Oakland's 1-yard line early in the fourth quarter and running back Ron Lee punched it in for the go-ahead score. Raider running back Pete Banaszak countered with a 1-yard plunge of his own, and the Silver and Black went up once again. A four-play, 73-yard drive capped by Lee's second touchdown run, a 13-yarder, gave the Colts the lead and set up one of the most famous plays in NFL history.

After the teams traded punts on the next four possessions, the Raiders found themselves facing a second-and-10 from their own 44-yard line with the clock winding down. Stabler dropped back to pass, pump faked, and passed to Casper who, running a post pattern, split two defenders and made an over-the-shoulder catch for 42 yards to the Baltimore 14-yard line. Three Banaszak runs brought the ball to the 5-yard line and kicker Errol Mann evened the score with a 22-yard field goal.

Both offenses labored through a scoreless overtime period, with the Raiders driving to Baltimore 13-yard line as the frame closed. Two plays into the sixth period, Stabler, with his 40th pass attempt of the game, fittingly found Casper in the back of the end zone for the game-winning touchdown.

DENVER 20, RAIDERS 17

1977 AFC Championship

Jan. 1, 1978 at Mile High Stadium; Denver, Colo.

Denver's "Orange Crush" defense and a controversial ruling on what appeared to be a late-game fumble by Bronco running back Rob Lytle, conspired to deny the Silver and Black a second straight Super Bowl berth at Mile High Stadium. On a frigid, 18 degree day, quarterback Ken Stabler passed for 215 yards, including two touchdown tosses to Dave Casper, but Oakland fell short in the team's fifth consecutive conference championship game appearance.



Kicker Errol Mann scored the first points of the game, booting a 20-yard field goal to cap the Raiders' first drive. The Broncos responded immediately, with quarterback Craig Morton connecting with receiver Haven Moses for a 74-yard catch-and-run for a touchdown. After a scoreless second quarter, the stage was set for a compelling second half between the two AFC West rivals.

Raider running back Clarence Davis fumbled deep in Oakland territory early in the third quarter, and the Broncos took over and drove to the 2-yard line. Lytle got the carry and was blasted by Raider safety Jack Tatum, causing what appeared to be a fumble that was recovered by Oakland lineman Mike McCoy. An official had blown his whistle, however, and after a conference, ruled Lytle down and assessed the Raiders with an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty, setting up a first-and-goal from the 1-yard line. On the very next play, Morton pitched to running back Jon Keyworth on the right, who scampered in for the touchdown.

Oakland cut the deficit to 14-10 early in the fourth quarter, as Stabler hit Casper just inside the end zone for a 7-yard touchdown. The Morton-to-Moses connection then gave the Broncos a two-score lead following a Stabler interception, with Moses' second touchdown catch covering 12 of his 168 receiving yards on the day.

The Raiders scored on the ensuing possession, Stabler's 17-yard touchdown toss to Casper capping an eight-play, 74-yard drive, but Denver took over with three minutes remaining and was able to run out the clock to seal the AFC title.

A potent offense and a swarming defense stymied the Houston Oilers and propelled the Raiders to an emphatic 27-7 victory in an AFC Wild Card contest in Oakland. Quarterback Jim Plunkett guided a balanced attack on offense, while cornerback Lester Hayes picked off two passes by former Raider Ken Stabler, returning one for a touchdown in the win.

Houston stumbled out of the gate, as running back Earl Campbell's fumble on the first play from scrimmage was recovered by Raiders safety Mike Davis. Oakland capitalized on the turnover with a 47-yard field goal by kicker Chris Bahr. The Oilers took the lead late in the first period, capping a nine-play, 55-yard drive with a 10-yard touchdown run by Campbell. Plunkett then connected with running back Kenny King for a 37-yard gain in the second quarter, setting up a 1-yard touchdown pass to tight end Todd Christensen.

A scoreless third quarter gave way to a fourth period that would see the Silver and Black dominate on both sides of the ball. Plunkett hooked up with receiver Cliff Branch for a 33-yard completion at the end of the third quarter, setting up a 44-yard touchdown strike from Plunkett to a streaking Arthur Whittington along the right sideline on the first play of the fourth period.

The Raider defense forced punts on the next two Houston possessions, and Bahr added his second field goal of the day, a 37-yarder, to give the Raiders a 13-point lead. Desperate to get back into the contest, Houston took to the air on the ensuing possession. On a third-and-20 play, Stabler's pass was picked off by Hayes, his second of the game, and returned 20 yards for a touchdown to give the Raiders an insurmountable lead.



Two rushing touchdowns from running back Mark van Eeghen and safety Mike Davis' game-saving interception on a designed pass play called "Red Right 88," propelled the Raiders to a 14-12 victory over the Browns on a bitter-cold afternoon at Cleveland Municipal Stadium.

With the temperature at one degree Fahrenheit at kickoff, both offenses struggled to get started on the frozen turf. With whipping winds limiting the passing game, the first quarter came and went with no score and only two total first downs, both by Cleveland.

The Browns' defense would provide the first score of the game in the second quarter, with defensive back Ron Bolton intercepting a Jim Plunkett pass and returning it 42 yards for a touchdown. The Raiders answered back before halftime, embarking on a 14-play, 64-yard drive that culminated in a 1-yard touchdown run by van Eeghen to give Oakland a 7-6 lead at the break.

Cleveland promptly retook the lead in the third quarter, driving 48 yards and getting a 30-yard field goal from kicker Don Cockroft. The Browns added another field goal later in the period, making the score 12-7 entering the fourth quarter.

The Raiders opened up the fourth quarter on a steady drive, Plunkett mixing runs and passes all the way down to the Browns' 3-yard line. Oakland gave the ball to van Eeghen on three straight plays, including a 1-yard dive to give the Raiders a slim two-point lead.

Quarterback Brian Sipe and the Browns' offense, known as the "Cardiac Kids" for their propensity for late comebacks, took over with 2:22 left in the game and drove all the way down to Oakland's 13-yard line. Instead of opting for a field-goal attempt, and facing a second down with :49 left in regulation, Cleveland coach Sam Rutigliano called for a pass play, "Red Right 88." Davis cut in front of tight end Ozzie Newsome on the play, tumbling to the ground with the ball and preserving the narrow victory for the Silver and Black.






RAIDERS 34, SAN DIEGO 27

The Raiders got off to a fast start behind a masterful performance by quarterback Jim Plunkett, and used a ball control offense to upend the Chargers for the AFC title on a slick Jack Murphy Stadium field. Facing a vaunted San Diego passing attack, it was Oakland, led by Plunkett's 14-for-18 passing for 261 yards, which jumped out to a 28-14 halftime lead and held on down the stretch to advance to the Super Bowl for the third time in franchise history.



Oakland wasted no time getting on the scoreboard, as a Plunkett pass glanced off the hands of intended receiver Kenny King directly to tight end Raymond Chester, who galloped 65 yards into the end zone for the score. The Chargers used their aerial attack to even the score, with quarterback Dan Fouts connecting on a 48-yard touchdown toss to receiver Charlie Joiner.

The Raiders retook the lead on the ensuing possession, as a 48-yard completion to receiver Cliff Branch and a pass interference call set up a 5-yard scoring scamper by Plunkett. Oakland scored again on its next possession, Plunkett finding King with a perfect pass in the end zone for 21 yards, to close out a wild first quarter.

A second-quarter fumble recovery by linebacker Ted Hendricks led to another Raider score, as running back Mark van Eeghen got into the end zone on a 3-yard run. The Chargers cut the deficit to two scores on the ensuing possession by virtue of an 8-yard pass from Fouts to Joiner, marking the receiver's second touchdown of the day.

After a break-neck scoring pace in the first half, San Diego chipped away at the Oakland lead with a 26-yard Rolf Benirschke field goal to begin the third quarter. The Chargers cut further into the advantage on their next possession, as running back Chuck Muncie capped off a drive by diving into the end zone following a 6-yard sweep around left tackle.

Starting the fourth quarter on offense, the Raiders controlled the ball for over five minutes on a drive that culminated in kicker Chris Bahr's 33-yard field goal. The Chargers followed with a field-goal drive, but over eight minutes had elapsed and the Raiders took over with less than seven minutes left on the clock. Plunkett expertly engineered four first downs on a 15-play drive that included 14 running plays to close out regulation, ending the game with San Diego's potent offense on the bench.



The Raiders, entering the playoffs as the AFC's top seed in a strike-shortened season after posting an 8-1 record, used an efficient passing offense and a smothering defense to dispatch Cleveland at the L.A. Coliseum, 27-10. Quarterback Jim Plunkett completed 24-of-37 pass attempts for 386 yards and rookie running back Marcus Allen found the end zone twice in the Raiders' first playoff game in Los Angeles.



Kicker Chris Bahr opened the scoring with a 27-yard field goal following a 64-yard toss from Plunkett to receiver Cliff Branch, but two Plunkett interceptions halted any further potential damage by the Raiders in the first quarter. Cleveland tied the game with a 52-yard field goal by Bahr's brother, Matt, but the Silver and Black quickly retook the lead on the ensuing possession, driving 88 yards on just eight plays to set up a pitch to Allen for a 2-yard touchdown.

Cleveland briefly tied the game once again, with quarterback Paul McDonald finding receiver Ricky Feacher for a 43-yard touchdown connection. The Raiders' added a field goal at the end of the second quarter, as Chris Bahr was true from 37 yards out, giving the Silver and Black a 13-10 halftime lead.

The Browns drove to the Raiders 11-yard line on the second half's opening possession, but a fumble by running back Charles White halted their momentum, and the Raiders capitalized with an 89-yard drive that culminated in Allen's second touchdown of the day, a 3-yard run.

A 1-yard touchdown dive in the fourth quarter by running back Frank Hawkins essentially sealed the victory, and the Raider defense took over, not letting the Cleveland offense advance any further than the Los Angeles 47-yard line for the remainder of the contest.

The visiting Jets stifled the Raiders' offense and a late touchdown negated 14 third-quarter points from the Silver and Black in an upset at the L.A. Coliseum. Quarterback Jim Plunkett passed for 266 yards and one touchdown, but was intercepted three times as the Raiders dropped a narrow decision.

The Raiders were in position to score first, but a 34-yard attempt by kicker Chris Bahr hit the right upright. The Jets capitalized immediately, with quarterback Richard Todd orchestrating an 80-yard touchdown drive that culminated in a 20-yard scoring pass to receiver Wesley Walker. Los Angeles drove into Jets territory on the ensuing possession, but a Plunkett pass was picked off by cornerback Bobby Jackson at the 12-yard line. The Jets added a 30-yard field goal by kicker Pat Leahy later in the second quarter and entered the halftime break with a 10-0 advantage.

Plunkett got the Raiders on the board immediately in the third quarter, engineering a 12-play, 77-yard scoring drive that was capped by running back Marcus Allen's 3-yard touchdown run. Regaining possession following a partially-blocked punt, Plunkett promptly connected with receiver Malcolm Barnwell for a 57-yard touchdown strike, giving the Raiders their first lead of the game.

The teams traded turnovers early in the fourth quarter, but a 45-yard completion from Todd to Walker put the Jets in scoring position with just under four minutes remaining in the game. From 1-yard out, running back Scott Dierking dove over the top for the go-ahead touchdown with just 3:45 left on the clock.

The Raiders would have two more opportunities on offense, but on both drives Plunkett was intercepted by linebacker Lance Mehl, ending the Silver and Black's first season in Los Angeles.

Running back Marcus Allen rushed for 121 yards with two touchdowns, and 21 third-quarter points led the Raiders to a dominating 38-10 victory over Pittsburgh in a renewal of one of the NFL's fiercest rivalries at the L.A. Coliseum. Quarterback Jim Plunkett guided an efficient offense and an intimidating defense harried quarterback Cliff Stoudt all afternoon, sacking the Pittsburgh signal-caller five times and intercepting him once.

The Steelers got on the board first with a 17-yard field goal by Gary Anderson. On Pittsburgh's next possession, cornerback Lester Hayes picked off a pass from Stoudt and returned it 18 yards for a touchdown. The Raiders added to their lead in the second quarter, with Allen capping off an 80-yard drive with a 4-yard run over right guard for a touchdown, his first of the day. The Los Angeles defense held firm, allowing Pittsburgh to cross midfield just once on their next three possessions, and a 45-yard field goal by Chris Bahr at the end of the half made the score 17-3.

The third quarter belonged solely to the Silver and Black, as a precision passing game and big-play capability on offense dimmed Pittsburgh's hopes. On the half's opening possession, Plunkett promptly guided a scoring drive by moving the Raiders 72 yards on nine plays, culminating in a 9-yard touchdown run by running back Kenny King.

Allen gave Los Angeles a commanding lead on the team's next series, taking a handoff from Plunkett and breaking free up the middle for a dazzling 49-yard touchdown run. Pittsburgh cut into the lead with a long 58-yard touchdown pass from Stoudt to receiver John Stallworth, but running back Frank Hawkins' bull-dozing 2-yard score at the end of the third quarter essentially wrapped up the victory for the Silver and Black.







RAIDERS 30, SEATTLE 14

Jan. 8, 1984 at Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum; Los Angeles, Calif.

The Raiders were not to be denied in the organization's fifth AFC Championship game appearance in nine years, getting out to a fast start and cruising to a 30-14 triumph at the L.A. Coliseum in front of 92,335 fans, a championship game record. A stifling defense held Seattle scoreless deep into the third quarter, and the combination of quarterback Jim Plunkett and running back Marcus



Allen proved too much for a Seahawk team that had defeated the Raiders twice during the regular season.

Seattle's game-opening drive was halted by a Lester Hayes interception, the first of five picks on the day for the Raiders, and led to a 20-yard field goal by kicker Chris Bahr. In the second quarter, running back Frank Hawkins got into the end zone on a 1-yard plunge, capping a 61-yard drive. On the team's next offensive series, Plunkett connected with receiver Malcolm Barnwell for 49 yards, setting up Hawkins' second touchdown of the quarter on a 5-yard run around left end. Safety Mike Davis' first of two interceptions came on the ensuing possession, setting up a 45-yard field goal from Bahr and a commanding 20-0 lead at the half.

The Seahawks switched quarterbacks early in the third quarter, going with veteran Jim Zorn, but the results were much the same, as Davis picked off a pass on Zorn's first series under center. Allen broke off a long run on the very next play, picking up 43 of his 154 yards on the day, and setting up his own 3-yard touchdown reception from Plunkett. Seattle finally got on the board with Zorn's 11-yard touchdown pass to running back Dan Doornink, but the final result was not in doubt.

A fourth-quarter field goal by Bahr and a late Seahawk touchdown rounded out the scoring, and the Raiders advanced to the Super Bowl for the fourth time in franchise history.



A grinding Seattle running game and just four completions by Seahawk quarterback Dave Krieg, including one for a touchdown, was enough to edge the Silver and Black in an AFC Wild Card contest in Seattle. Running back Marcus Allen rushed for 61 yards and caught five passes for 90 yards, while Seattle running back Dan Doornink carried the ball 29 times for 126 yards in front of 64,910 fans at the Kingdome.



Seattle scored first, capping a nine-play, 93-yard drive with a 26-yard touchdown pass from Krieg to receiver Daryl Turner. The teams traded punts frequently until a fumble by Raiders running back Frank Hawkins led to a short field for Seattle late in the third quarter. A 35-yard field goal by kicker Norm Johnson extended the Seahawks' lead, and the first of two interceptions thrown on the day by Plunkett preserved the 10-0 score at the end of three periods.

Johnson added a 44-yard field goal in the fourth quarter, but the Raiders looked to get Allen going on a drive beginning on their own 22-yard line. Plunkett connected with Allen for two completions for 29 yards before hitting him again over the middle for a 46-yard touchdown catch-and-run.

Looking to hold on to their slim lead, the Seahawks took nearly four minutes off the clock before being forced to punt. Taking over at the 16-yard line with under a minute to go, Plunkett completed two quick passes but his third was intercepted by safety Kenny Easley, sealing Seattle's victory.



Six Raider turnovers led to 20 New England points and Craig James became the first running back to rush for over 100 yards against Los Angeles all season, as the visiting Patriots upended the Silver and Black at the L.A. Coliseum, 27-20. Running back Marcus Allen rushed for 121 yards and one touchdown, but the top-seeded Silver and Black failed to score in the second half in the upset defeat.



A muffed return on a first-quarter punt set up the game's opening score, a 13-yard pass from quarterback Tony Eason to tight end Lin Dawson. Greg Townsend blocked a punt later in the opening period, but the Raider offense stalled and had to settle for a 29-yard field goal by Chris Bahr.

Los Angeles took the lead in the second quarter, as quarterback Marc Wilson found receiver Jessie Hester in the end zone for a 16-yard touchdown. Defensive lineman Howie Long pounced on a fumble on the Patriots' next possession, and the Raiders capitalized with an 11-yard touchdown run by Allen. On the ensuing series, New England covered 80 yards on a 10-play scoring drive, with James capping the sequence with a 2-yard touchdown around left end. After trading field goals, the teams entered halftime with the Raiders clinging to a narrow 20-17 advantage.

Turnovers continued to plague the Raiders in the third quarter, as an Allen fumble in New England territory led to a game-tying, 32-yard field goal by kicker Tony Franklin. On the ensuing kickoff, returner Sam Seale muffed the kick and then fumbled before Jim Bowman fell on the ball in the end zone for a New England touchdown.

The special-teams touchdown would provide the difference in the game, as the Patriots limited the Raiders to just two fourth-quarter possessions, picking off Wilson for the third time to close out the upset.



RAIDERS 20, CINCINNATI 10

Returning to the playoffs after a five-year hiatus, the Raiders used 10 fourth-quarter points to defeat Cincinnati, 20-10, in a game that is perhaps most remembered as running back Bo Jackson's last career appearance on a football field. Quarterback Jay Schroeder passed for 172 yards and two touchdowns on just 11 completions, and running back Marcus Allen gained 140 yards on the ground to lead the Silver and Black.



Art Shell's team drove to the Cincinnati 24-yard line early in the first quarter, but an incompletion on a fourth-and-1 play turned the ball over on downs. A second-quarter field goal gave the Bengals an early lead, but the Raiders' running game got going on the ensuing possession, as Jackson and Allen combined for 56 yards on five rushing attempts before Schroeder found receiver Mervyn Fernandez in the end zone for a 13-yard strike.

Early in the third quarter, Jackson took a pitch from Schroeder and dashed around right end for 34 yards before being dragged down from behind. It would mark the final play of a short but bright career for the dynamic running back, as Jackson suffered a career-ending hip injury on the play.

Kicker Jeff Jaeger booted a 49-yard field goal to cap a third-quarter drive, but the Bengals pulled even when quarterback Boomer Esiason hooked up with receiver Stanford Jennings for an 8-yard touchdown early in the fourth period. On the ensuing possession, Schroeder orchestrated an 80-yard touchdown drive that was highlighted by a 41-yard scoring pass to tight end Ethan Horton, who made a finger-tip grab on the play.

The Bengals began to drive on their next possession, but Greg Townsend's third sack of the game helped derail their offense. Jaeger's 25-yard field goal with just 19 seconds left on the clock ended Cincinnati's hopes and sent the Raiders to the AFC Championship game for the first time since the 1983 season.

Buffalo's potent offense jumped out to 41 first-half points en route to a 51-3 defeat of the Raiders at Rich Stadium. Quarterback Jay Schroeder, directing an offense devoid of star running back Bo Jackson, threw five interceptions, and the Los Angeles defense could not keep pace with a Bills offense that got 300 passing yards from quarterback Jim Kelly and three rushing touchdowns from running back Kenneth Davis.

The Bills got off to a fast start, as Kelly connected with former Raider James Lofton for a 13-yard touchdown on the team's first drive. The Raiders answered immediately, getting a 41-yard field goal from kicker Jeff Jaeger on the ensuing possession. A relentless Buffalo offense scored again on a 12-yard touchdown run by Thurman Thomas, and added seven points on an interception return for a touchdown by linebacker Daryl Talley to make the score 21-3.

With the Raider offense stuck in neutral, the Bills added 20 points in the second quarter via two short-yardage runs by Davis and Lofton's second touchdown catch of the game.

Any spark the Raiders looked to ignite after halftime flamed out in the form of two interceptions in Buffalo territory. Davis' third score of the game on a 1-yard dive and a fourth-quarter field goal from kicker Scott Norwood closed out Buffalo's first conference title.



The Raiders fell to the Chiefs, 10-6, in a contest highlighted by dominating defense on both sides in an AFC Wild Card game. Rookie quarterback Todd Marinovich, who threw three touchdown passes in his NFL debut the previous week against the same Kansas City squad, threw four interceptions, and Chiefs running back Barry Word rushed for 130 yards at Arrowhead Stadium.

Both offenses struggled to put points on the board in the first half, as the two teams combined for three interceptions, two fumbles, two missed field goals and one punt on the game's first eight possessions. Safety Deron Cherry's second interception of the game midway through the second quarter put Kansas City in scoring position, and quarterback Steve DeBerg capitalized with an 11-yard touchdown strike to receiver Fred Jones. Marinovich engineered a score near the end of the second quarter, getting three points on a 32-yard Jeff Jaeger field goal following a 10-play, 65-yard drive.

The Raiders drew closer at the start of the second half, driving to the Kansas City 8-yard line before settling for a 26-yard chip shot by Jaeger. The Silver and Black's offense could not remain on track, however, and the Raiders' final three possessions ended in turnovers. The Chiefs added a Nick Lowery field goal in the fourth quarter, handing Los Angeles the narrow defeat.





A quick-strike offense and three second-half touchdowns by running back Napoleon McCallum propelled the Raiders to a 42-24 shootout victory over Denver at the L.A. Coliseum. Quarterback Jeff Hostetler passed for 294 yards and three first-half scores against a Bronco team that the Silver and Black had defeated in overtime the previous week, forcing Denver to return to Los Angeles for the Wild Card contest.



Los Angeles and Denver exchanged scores on a "blow-for-blow" basis in the first half. The Raiders opened the scoring with Hostetler's 9-yard touchdown pass to tight end Ethan Horton, only to be matched by quarterback John Elway's 23-yard strike to tight end Shannon Sharpe. Hostetler connected on the first long score of the game, hitting receiver Tim Brown for a 65-yard touchdown later in the first quarter. Elway followed suit with a 16-yard touchdown in the second period to tight end Reggie Johnson, but Los Angeles went up again via a 54-yard pass from Hostetler to receiver James Jett. Denver pulled even on Elway's 6-yard toss to receiver Derek Russell, and the game went into the half tied, 21-21.

After posting a pair of three-and-outs on defense, the Raiders took to the ground on offense in the third quarter. McCallum, who had just one carry in the first half, broke loose for a 26-yard touchdown to give the Silver and Black the lead for good. McCallum powered through the middle for a 2-yard score to cap a 52-yard drive later in the period, and the Los Angeles defense did not yield a Bronco first down on four third-quarter possessions to maintain a commanding lead.

Kicker Jason Elam booted a 33-yard field goal to get Denver back on the board in the fourth quarter, but McCallum's third touchdown of the game following a long Raider drive sealed the victory for the Silver and Black.



With temperatures at game time dipping to zero, the Silver and Black built a 17-13 halftime lead, but succumbed to Buffalo behind a pair of second-half touchdown passes from quarterback Jim Kelly to receiver Bill Brooks.



The Bills provided the game's initial threat in the first quarter, driving to the Raider 30-yard line before turning the ball over on downs. The Silver and Black responded immediately, embarking on a 58-yard drive that culminated in kicker Jeff Jaeger's 30-yard field goal in the second quarter.

Running back Kenneth Davis put the Bills ahead with a leaping 1-yard touchdown dive on the ensuing possession, but Raiders running back Napoleon McCallum matched the score with a 1-yard scoring run of his own. Los Angeles extended its lead following a fumble recovery, as McCallum capped an 11-play, 40-yard drive with his second 1-yard touchdown run of the day. The Bills got back into the game on the heels of a 37-yard pass interference call, with running back Thurman Thomas punching it into the end zone from 8 yards out.

Buffalo grabbed the lead in the third quarter, getting a touchdown on Kelly's 25-yard pass to Brooks and adding a field goal to move ahead, 22-17. The Bills' lead was short-lived, however, as quarterback Jeff Hostetler connected with receiver Tim Brown from the Raiders 24-yard line, and Brown streaked up the middle and eluded a tackler to score an 86-yard touchdown.

Kelly guided another scoring drive to put the Bills up for good, connecting with Brooks from 22 yards out to provide the difference. The Raiders' two remaining possessions resulted in three-and-outs, and the Bills ran out the clock to end the Silver and Black's season.



Another Janikowski field goal, this one from 33 yards out, boosted the Oakland lead in the second quarter, and when Gannon connected with receiver James Jett on a 6-yard touchdown pass, the rout was truly on.





The Jets stormed back, as Chrebet hauled in his second touchdown pass of the game from 4 yards out. On the Raiders' next possession, Garner took a handoff and broke free around the right end for 80 yards to set a franchise postseason record and put the game out of reach.



A New England snow storm created a majestic setting at Foxboro Stadium, as the Patriots edged the Raiders in the "Tuck Game," one of the most controversial contests in NFL history.

With less than two minutes remaining in regulation and the Raiders clinging to a three-point lead, cornerback Charles Woodson sacked Patriots quarterback Tom Brady, causing what appeared to be a fumble that was recovered by Raider linebacker Greg Biekert to seal a Raider win. Citing Rule 3, Section 22, Article 2, Note 2 in the NFL rule book, the officials ruled the play an incomplete pass, leading to the game-tying field goal by kicker Adam Vinatieri.



The Raiders built an early lead in the contest, as quarterback Rich Gannon connected with receiver James Jett in the corner of the end zone for a 13-yard score in the second quarter. Two Sebastian Janikowski field goals, from 38 and 45 yards out, gave the Raiders a 13-3 advantage entering the final period.

Brady was efficient in an early fourth-quarter drive, completing nine consecutive pass attempts before scampering into the end zone for a 6-yard touchdown to cut the Raider lead to three points. Brady then led a late-game drive that culminated in Vinatieri's 45-yard, game-tying field goal that came on the heels of the "tuck rule" play.

In overtime, Brady promptly piloted a 61-yard drive that led to Vinatieri's game-winner from 23 yards out.





The Raiders got out to a fast start and out-lasted Tennessee in the second half to secure the Silver and Black's first Super Bowl berth since the 1983 season. A relentless passing attack, led by quarterback Rich Gannon's 286 yards and three touchdowns through the air, proved too much for the visiting Titans.

Oakland wasted no time getting on the scoreboard, as Gannon took the offense 69 yards on the opening possession and connected with receiver Jerry Porter for a 3-yard touchdown pass to open the scoring. The Titans answered immediately, with quarterback Steve McNair hitting receiver Drew Bennett for a 33-yard touchdown on the ensuing drive. The Raiders went up again on their next possession, Gannon moving the offense swiftly downfield to set up a 12-yard touchdown pass to running back Charlie Garner.

Tennessee cut into the Raider lead with a field goal in the second quarter, and the Titans briefly took the lead by virtue of a 9-yard touchdown run by McNair. The Raiders took the lead back near the end of the first half, capitalizing on a fumble recovery deep in Tennessee territory with a 1-yard scoring pass from Gannon to tight end Doug Jolley. A fumble recovery on the ensuing kickoff gave the Raiders the ball in scoring range once again, and kicker Sebastian Janikowski was true from 43 yards out.

A second Janikowski field goal was matched by McNair's second touchdown run of the game, a 13-yard scamper to make the score 27-24 in Oakland's favor entering the fourth quarter. Gannon began the final period by capping off a 66-yard drive with a 2-yard touchdown run of his own, and closed out the victory by leading the Silver and Black on a time-consuming drive that resulted in fullback Zack Crockett's 7-yard touchdown run. McNair and the Titans moved the ball down to the Oakland 6-yard line, but turned the ball over on downs, and Gannon took a knee as the Coliseum erupted in celebration.

PLAYOFF HISTORY

HOUSTON 27, RAIDERS 14

2016 AFC Wild Card

Jan. 7, 2017 at NRG Stadium; Houston, Texas

The Raiders' return to the postseason was spoiled by injuries and an efficient Houston Texans team that capitalized on three turnovers and 20 first half points en route to a 27-14 verdict at NRG Stadium.

Quarterback Connor Cook became the first rookie to make his first career start in a playoff game, taking the reins following a season-ending injury to Derek Carr in Week 16 and a shoulder injury to backup Matt McGloin in the regular season finale.

Houston got off to a fast start, opening the scoring with a 50-yard field goal by Nick Novak. On the ensuing possession, Texans defensive end Jadeveon Clowney tipped and intercepted a third-down screen pass from Cook deep in Raiders territory, setting up a 4-yard touchdown run by Lamar Miller and a 10-0 lead for the home team. The Raiders cut the lead to 10-7 later in the first period, as a 37-yard punt return by rookie running back Jalen Richard started the Raiders at the Texans' 38-yard line, initiating a drive that saw running back Latavius Murray grind out 27 yards on four carries, including a 2-yard touchdown run.

The Texans stemmed the tide and took control in the second quarter, getting a 38-yard field goal from Novak before quarterback Brock Osweiler found wide receiver DeAndre Hopkins for a 38-yard gain and a 2-yard touchdown connection to close the half with a 20-7 lead.

Oakland and Houston combined for seven punts in a third quarter that was dominated by defense, and the Texans moved the score to 27-7 with a 1-yard run by Osweiler early in the final period. The Raiders answered with a 75-yard touchdown drive, culminating in an 8-yard scoring pass from Cook to receiver Andre Holmes.

Battling a dwindling clock in addition to the NFL's top-ranked defensive unit, the Raiders' final two drives of the game ended in interceptions for Cook, who finished 18-for-45 passing for 161 yards, one touchdown and three interceptions in his debut start.

CINCINNATI 26, RAIDERS 19

2021 AFC Wild Card

Jan. 15, 2022 at Paul Brown Stadium; Cincinnati, Ohio

A furious comeback that had the Silver and Black inside the Bengals' 10-yard line and poised to tie the game ended with the ball in the hands of the defense at the 2-yard line, spoiling the Raiders' return to the postseason.

The 26-19 verdict was an abrupt conclusion to a season full of valiant efforts by the Raiders, who went on a remarkable four-game winning streak to close out the season and secure the franchise's first postseason berth in five years.

Quarterback Derek Carr, making his postseason debut, piloted an opening drive that resulted in a 47-yard field goal by Daniel Carlson to begin the scoring. Cincinnati roared back with a 7-yard touchdown pass from Joe Burrow to tight end C.J. Uzomah and the Bengals defense then harried Carr with sacks on back-to-back possessions. A stout defensive effort held Cincinnati to two field goals on their next two possessions despite Cincinnati taking possession in Las Vegas territory on both occasions.

Carlson pulled the Raiders closer with a second-quarter field goal, but the Bengals extended their lead on a controversial play in which Burrow scrambled right towards the sideline and connected with receiver Tyler Boyd in the back of the end zone. An inadvertent whistle was audible as Burrow released the ball but the result of the play stood, giving the Bengals a two-touchdown advantage. The Raiders took possession with 1:51 left in the half and Carr promptly executed an efficient scoring drive, connecting with five different receivers for 55 yards and rushing for 20 more himself, the sequence culminating in a 14-yard strike to Jay Jones to make the score 20-13 at intermission.

The Raiders and Bengals traded a pair of field goals in the second half, Carlson's fourth score of the day tying a franchise single-game record originally set by George Blanda, and Carr took the helm from the 35-yard line facing a seven-point deficit with just 1:51 left in regulation. Remarkable third-down completions to Darren Waller and Jones set the Raiders up at the Cincinnati 9-yard line, but their quest fell just short as Carr's attempt to find Jones on fourth down was intercepted by linebacker Germaine Pratt.



1979 - RON MIX

Raiders offensive tackle, 1971; pro football veteran, 1960-1969, 1971

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 28, 1979... Played 11 pro seasons, 10 with the Los Angeles/San Diego Chargers and one with the Oakland Raiders... First player to have worn a Raider uniform inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame... Second player from the American Football League (AFL) to be enshrined in Canton, following former teammate Lance Alworth... Elected to the AFL All-Star team in eight straight seasons... Nine-time All-AFL selection — eight at tackle, one at guard... Named to the All-Time AFL first-team, and is one of only 20 individuals who played the entire 10 years of the AFL... Played in 142 career games... Flagged for just two holding penalties... Played in five of the first six AFL Championship games, helping lead Chargers to 1963 title... Retired after the 1969 season, but returned to football in 1971 following a trade to the Raiders... Played in 12 games with four starts for the Silver and Black... Earned All-American honors in 1959 as a lineman at USC... Selected by the Baltimore Colts as the 10th

overall pick in the 1960 NFL Draft... Also chosen in the first round of the 1960 AFL Draft by the Boston Patriots and was traded to the Chargers... Named to the International Jewish Sports Hall of Fame in 1980.

1980 - JIM OTTO

Raiders center, 1960-74; pro football veteran, 1960-74



Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 2, 1980... The only All-League center the American Football League ever had (1960-69)... Chosen to Hall of Fame AFL All-Star Team of the Decade... Named the All-American Football Conference center for three seasons, 1970-72... Started 210 consecutive league games, most in Raiders history... Including preseason, post-season and All-Star games, played in 308 games as a Raider... Last of the original Raiders... Participated in all nine AFL All-Star Games and in the first three AFC-NFL Pro Bowls... During his 15-year career, the Raiders won seven division championships and the AFL Championship in 1967... Two-time winner of the Gorman Award (1968 and 1971) as "Player Who Best Exemplifies the Pride and Spirit of the Oakland Raiders"... Selected to AFL-NFL 25-year All-Star Team... Third AFL player inducted into Hall of Fame... Elected to the Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility... Rejoined Raiders front office in special projects in 1995.

1981 - GEORGE BLANDA

Raiders quarterback/kicker, 1967-75; pro football veteran, 1949-75



Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 1, 1981... The first player and one of only two in history to celebrate a Silver Anniversary in pro football... At time of his retirement in 1975, held 44 NFL regular and postseason records — including 26 pro seasons, 2,002 career points — tied for 11 more... Completed 1,911 career passes for 26,920 yards and threw for 236 touchdowns... Played in 224 straight games, 340 overall... At time of retirement, was Raiders all-time scoring leader with 863 points... Led NFL eight times in extra points scored in a season, including 64 in 1961... Missed only 16 of 959 extra point attempts in 26 years... Kicked 335 field goals, including eight of 50 yards or more... Memorable 1970 feat included leading Oakland to four wins, one tie with last-second touchdown passes or field goals — at age 43... 1970 Gorman Award winner as "Player Who Best Exemplifies the Pride and Spirit of the Oakland Raiders"... Set Raider single-season scoring record with 117 points in 1968... Played in 11 championship games, seven with Raiders... Played on three AFL Championship teams, one with Oakland, two with Houston... Named to AFL-NFL 25-year All-Star Team... Chosen for the Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility.

1984 - WILLIE BROWN

Raiders cornerback, 1967-78, pro football veteran, 1963-78



Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 28, 1984... At time of his retirement in 1978, held Raiders all-time lead in interceptions with 39... All-Pro seven times, played in five AFL All-Star Games and four NFL Pro-Bowls... Named to All-Time AFL team at cornerback in 1969... Played in three AFL and six AFC Championship Games with Raiders, plus Super Bowls II and XI... Set Super Bowl record with 75-yard interception return for touchdown against Minnesota in Super Bowl XI... Had two other postseason interception returns for touchdowns — against Miami in 1970 and Pittsburgh in 1973... Set NFL record by intercepting at least one pass in 16 straight seasons... Intercepted 54 passes in career, with 472 return yards, two touchdowns... Tied NFL record with four interceptions against N.Y. Jets on Nov. 15, 1964... Played in 204 games... Defensive MVP in 1965 AFL All-Star Game... Winner of 1968 Gorman Award as "Player Who Best Exemplifies the Pride and Spirit of the Oakland Raiders"... Raiders defensive captain for 10 years... Selected to AFL-NFL 25-year All-Star Team... Chosen to the Hall of Fame in first year of eligibility... Originally signed as free agent by Houston Oilers, played four seasons with Denver Broncos... Served as Raiders defensive backfield coach from 1979-88 and was on staff for Super Bowl XV and XVIII wins... Head football coach at Long Beach State in 1991 and at L.A. Jordan High School in 1994... Inducted to Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame in 1985 and Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame in 1995... Rejoined Raiders in 1995 as director of squad development and returned to on-field coaching until retiring as a position coach... Also served on Raiders football operations staff.



1987 - GENE UPSHAW

Raiders guard, 1967-81; pro football veteran, 1967-81

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 8, 1987...First- or second-team All-League or All-Conference 11 consecutive years, played in seven Pro Bowls and one AFL All-Star Game...At time of his retirement following 1982 season, played in third-most games (217) in team history and 207 consecutive league games and starts both ranked second on Raiders list...Missed only one league game in career...First player in NFL history to participate in Super Bowls in three different decades (after 1967, 1976 and 1980 seasons)...Set Raiders all-time record with 24 playoff game starts...Offensive team captain for nine years (1973-81)...Only second pure guard inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame...During 15-year pro career, the Raiders made 11 playoff appearances, won nine division titles, one AFL Championship, two AFC titles and two World Championships of Professional Football...Named to AFL-NFL 25-year All-Star, NFL 75th Anniversary All-Time and All-Monday Night Teams...Chosen to the Hall of Fame in first year of eligibility...Served as executive director of NFL Players Association from 1983 until his passing in 2008.

1988 - FRED BILETNIKOFF

Raiders wide receiver, 1965-78; pro football veteran, 1965-78

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 30, 1988...At time of retirement, all-time leader in Silver and Black history with 589 career catches (fourth-most in NFL history), in receiving yards (8,974) and receiving touchdowns (76)...Also ended pro football career ranked first on all-time NFL list with 70 receptions for 1,167 yards and 10 touchdowns in 19 postseason games...Played in three AFL title games, five AFC Championships and Super Bowls II and XI...MVP of Super Bowl XI with four catches for 79 yards which set up three Oakland scores...Set NFL record of 10 straight seasons with 40 or more receptions (1967-76)...Raiders leading receiver for six consecutive seasons (1968-73)...Led NFL in receiving with 61 catches in 1971, then led AFC in 1972 with 58...All-AFL in 1969, All-AFC in 1970, 1972 and 1973...Played in two AFL All-Star Games and four Pro Bowls...Played in 190 games in 14 seasons...Had twenty-one 100-yard receiving games...Had four 100-yard receiving games in playoffs...Never played in a losing season with the Raiders...Selected in the second round of the 1965 AFL Draft after record-setting career at Florida State...Named to Walter Camp All-Century Team...Award in his name goes to nation's top collegiate wide receiver...Raiders wide receivers coach from 1989-84, remained on staff from 1995-96 and returned to coach receivers in 1997 until retiring from coaching following the 2006 season.



1989 - ART SHELL

Raiders tackle, 1968-82; pro football veteran, 1968-82

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 5, 1989...Earned first- or second-team All-Pro honors for six consecutive years from 1973 through 1978...Concluded Raiders career which spanned three decades having been selected to play in a franchise-high eight Pro Bowls, and played in 207 league games, second-most in history of Silver and Black to follow Hall of Famer Jim Otto...Played in 23 postseason contests, including eight AFL-AFC Championships and Raider victories in Super Bowls XI and XV...Credited with near-perfect performance in Raiders Super Bowl XI victory over Minnesota, limiting his Vikings opponent to no tackles, sacks or assists during 32-14 win...Played in first 156 games before missing five games due to preseason injury...Launched another streak of 51 straight games...Named to NFL All-Monday Night Team...Selected in third round of the 1968 AFL Draft after stellar career as two-way lineman, three-year all-conference performer at Maryland-Eastern Shore...Upon retiring as a player following the 1982 season, joined Raiders coaching staff, tutoring the offensive line until being elevated to head coach of the Silver and Black during 1989 campaign...Served as head coach of the Raiders until 1994 and re-joined the Silver and Black as head coach in 2006...Also served as an NFL assistant coach with Kansas City and Atlanta and was the NFL's senior vice president for football operations and development.

1990 - TED HENDRICKS

Raiders linebacker, 1975-83; NFL veteran, 1969-83

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 4, 1990...Played in every game during 15 NFL seasons, including nine with the Silver and Black...Ended pro career having played in 131 consecutive league games with the Raiders, 215 in career, most by any linebacker in NFL history...Member of 1976, 1980 and 1983 Raiders teams that won the World Championship of Professional Football...Over pro career, blocked 25 field goals or PATS, intercepted 26 passes for 332 yards and one touchdown while recovering 16 opponent fumbles...Tied NFL record for most safeties in pro career with four...Also tied postseason NFL record for most opponent fumbles recovered in career with four...Scored three touchdowns in career — on a fumble recovery, interception return and return of blocked punt...Named All-AFC seven times, All-NFC once and played in eight AFC-NFC Pro Bowls...Second-round pick in the 1969 Draft by Baltimore Colts...Was a member of Baltimore's Super Bowl V Championship team...Played for Colts before being traded to Green Bay in 1974, then joined Raiders as free agent in 1975...Born in Guatemala City, three-time All-America linebacker/defensive end at the University of Miami...Named to the NFL 75th Anniversary All-Time team in 1994.





1992 - AL DAVIS

Scout, Assistant Coach, Head Coach, General Manager, League Commissioner, Owner


Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 1, 1992...Went from assistant coach of the Los Angeles/San Diego Chargers to Head Coach and General Manager of the Oakland Raiders to Commissioner of the American Football League and to Principal Owner and Chief Executive Officer of the Raiders, transforming the failing franchise into pro football's winningest team...In first season in Oakland, team went 10-4 with Davis being named Coach of the Year by AP, UPI, Sports Illustrated, The Sporting News and his fellow coaches...Became the first sports figure ever honored by the Chamber of Commerce as Oakland's Young Man of the Year...In 1966, became Commissioner of the AFL at 36 and was acclaimed nationally as the driving force who brought on the historic merger between the NFL and AFL...Played a vital role in the development of the game as a participant in the prestigious NFL Competition Committee and the NFL Owners Executive Committee...Chosen by a record nine Pro Football Hall of Fame inductees to present them at the Canton, Ohio, ceremony — Lance Alworth, Jim Otto, George Blanda, Willie Brown, Gene Upshaw, Fred Biletnikoff, Art Shell, Ted Hendricks and John Madden...Became the first recipient of the NFL Players Association's Retired Players Award of Excellence "for his contributions to the men who played the game" in 1991...As a member of the

Executive Committee of the NFL Management Council, was a major factor in achieving a collective bargaining agreement with the players...Was offensive ends coach of the Los Angeles Chargers from 1960-62, before being named Raiders head coach/general manager at age 33...Attended Wittenberg College and Syracuse, earning a degree in English in 1950 while playing football, basketball and baseball...Named line coach at Adelphi College in New York in 1950...His innovative technical football articles, published in the leading coaching magazines, gained him wide acclaim...Went into the U.S. Army, being assigned as head football coach at Ft. Belvoir, Virginia...There he molded a national power service team and capped one season by defeating Maryland, national collegiate football champions, in a squad game...On the staff of the Baltimore Colts in 1954, at age 24, concentrating on player personnel...During 1955-56, served as line coach and chief recruiter at The Citadel...Then spent three years at USC as line coach and in 1959, was also defensive coordinator.

1997 - MIKE HAYNES

Raiders cornerback, 1983-89; NFL veteran, 1976-89

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 26, 1997...Made nine Pro Bowl appearances in 14-year career...Credited with 46 career interceptions while playing with the Raiders and New England...Totaled 688 yards in interception returns and returned two interceptions for touchdowns in pro career...Tied for Raiders single-season lead with three interceptions in 1988...Played in 43 consecutive games with Raiders before missing action midseason in 1986...Led league in interception return yards in 1984 with 220 yards on six interceptions, including single longest return of 97 yards at Miami...Had 18 career interceptions for 295 yards in 87 games for the Silver and Black...Joined Raiders in 1983 midseason trade after spending seven seasons with New England and playing out option...Played final five league games plus three playoff wins for Silver and Black, including Super Bowl XVIII...Had interception as Raiders downed Redskins to capture third World Championship of Professional Football...Made 58 consecutive starts with Patriots from 1976-79...Patriots' top interceptor from 1976-78...Left New England as franchise's all-time punt return leader with 1,159 yards on 111 returns, a 10.4-yard average...Had two punt return touchdowns as a rookie in 1976, with runs of 89 and 62 yards...Also blocked and returned a field goal attempt for a 65-yard touchdown in 1980...Fifth player and first defensive back taken in 1976 Draft by New England...AFC Rookie of Year, NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year...All-Pro in 1977, 1978, 1982, 1984 and 1985 and All-Conference eight times...Named to NFL 75th Anniversary All-Time Team as well as NFL All-Decade Team of the 1980s...All-America defensive back as junior and senior at Arizona State...Named MVP of 1973 Fiesta Bowl...Two-year letterman in track, winning conference long jump title one year and runner-up the other...Served as the NFL's Vice President of Player and Employee Development.



1999 - ERIC DICKERSON

Raiders running back, 1992; NFL veteran 1983-93

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 7, 1999...Played 11 NFL seasons and made six Pro Bowl appearances in pro career...Began NFL career as first-round pick, second selection overall, by L.A. Rams in 1983...Also played for Indianapolis Colts (1987-91), Los Angeles Raiders (1992) and Atlanta Falcons (1993)...Led Raiders in rushing in 1992 with 729 yards...Set NFL rookie season records for most rushing attempts — 390; most yards rushing — 1,808; and most touchdowns rushing — 18...Set NFL records for rushing yards in a season — 2,105; 100-yard rushing performances — 12; and combined yards from scrimmage — 2,244 in 1984...Played in 146 games in pro career and retired from NFL ranked third in career rushing yardage — 13,259...Established a playoff rushing yards record with 248 in 1985 NFC Divisional playoff game as a member of the Rams...In 1987, traded from Rams to Colts in blockbuster deal that also involved the Bills, joined Raiders in 1992 trade with Indianapolis...Recorded a then-record seven consecutive seasons with 1,000 yards rushing...Named NFC Rookie of the Year, 1983; NFL Player of the Year, 1984; NFL Offensive Player of the Year, 1986...All-Pro 1983, 1984, 1986, 1987 and 1988...All-NFC 1983, 1984 and 1986...All-AFC in 1987 and member of 1980s All-Decade Team...Two-time All-America, one of the best college runners in NCAA history after rushing for 4,450 yards in four seasons at SMU.



2000 - HOWIE LONG

Raiders defensive end/defensive tackle, 1981-93; NFL veteran, 1981-93

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 29, 2000...Played 13 NFL seasons, all with the Raiders, and made eight Pro Bowl appearances in pro career...Helped the team capture Super Bowl XVIII victory with two-tackle performance in 38-9 win over Washington Redskins...First- or second-team All-Pro choice in 1983, 1984, 1985, 1986 and 1989...Also named All-AFC first- or second-team in 1983, 1984, 1985 and 1990...Recorded 7.5 sacks in 1981 before the sack was an official NFL stat...Recorded double-digit sacks in three consecutive years, 13 in 1983 to lead the Raiders including a career-high five against Washington, 12 in 1984 and 10 in 1985, with at least one in eight games and was selected as Raider Lineman's Club Defensive Lineman of the Year by his teammates...Also intercepted two passes during his NFL career, one that he returned 73 yards against Houston, and recovered 10 fumbles...Member of the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1980s...Recorded 84 career sacks, not including 7.5 sacks in 1981 before the sack was an official NFL stat...Raiders' second-round pick in 1981 NFL Draft and the 48th player selected overall...Four-year letterman at Villanova and MVP in the 1980 Blue-Gray Game...Has served as an Emmy Award-winning studio analyst for NFL pregame show on FOX since retiring from pro football following the 1993 season.

2000 - RONNIE LOTT

Raiders safety, 1991-92; NFL veteran, 1981-94


Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 29, 2000...Played 14 NFL seasons — including two with the Raiders — at three positions — cornerback, free safety and strong safety, and made 10 Pro Bowl appearances in pro career...Named All-Pro eight times, All-NFC six times and All-AFC once, and was named to the NFL's 75th Anniversary Team as well as the 1980 All-Decade Team and Super Bowl Silver Anniversary Team...In his first NFL season, led a young secondary that helped the 49ers win Super Bowl XVI...Became the second rookie in NFL history to return three interceptions for touchdowns and finished second to Lawrence Taylor for Rookie of the Year honors...In 1986, played 14 games before an injury sidelined him for the final two games of the season, yet still led the league with a career-most 10 interceptions, and added 77 tackles, three forced fumbles and two sacks...During his career with the 49ers (1981-90), Los Angeles Raiders (1991-92) and the New York Jets (1993-94), recorded 63 career interceptions and twice led the league, including in 1991 with the Raiders when he recorded eight...Surpassed the 1,000-career tackle mark in 1993 and had five seasons of at least 100 tackles...In his 10 seasons with the 49ers, San Francisco won eight NFC Western Division titles and four Super Bowls...In 20 playoff contests (all starts), recorded nine interceptions, 89 tackles, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and two touchdowns...At time of his retirement following 1994 season, ranked first in NFL for most individual Super Bowl wins with four — XVI, XIX, XXIII, XXIV; tied for first in postseason interceptions — nine; tied for first in most interceptions returned for touchdowns as a rookie (three in 1981)...First-round selection by San Francisco and the eighth player chosen overall in the 1981 NFL Draft following All-American college career at USC.



2002 - DAVE CASPER

Raiders tight end, 1974-80, 1984; NFL veteran, 1974-84

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 3, 2002...Played 11 seasons in the NFL, seven-and-a-half with the Raiders...Named All-Pro and All-AFC four times and was selected to play in five Pro Bowls...Traded by Raiders to the Houston Oilers for first-round and two second-round draft picks midway through 1980 season, finished the season with 56 receptions...In 1984, after a brief stint with the Minnesota Vikings, returned to the Raiders, finishing his career with 378 receptions for 5,216 yards and 52 touchdowns...Member of Raiders Super Bowl XI-winning team, caught four passes for 70 yards, one touchdown in 32-14 Raiders victory over Minnesota...Outstanding blocker as well as receiver...Caught the game-winning 10-yard touchdown pass in 1977 double-overtime AFC playoff game...His infamous "Ghost to the Post" play, in reference to his 42-yard reception, set up the tying field goal at the end of regulation...Also part of "The Holy Roller" in 1978, advancing then recovering a fumble in the end zone for game-winning score over San Diego...Honorable Mention All-American as an offensive tackle in 1972 and an All-American tight end in 1973 at Notre Dame...Second-round pick by the Raiders in the 1974 NFL Draft.



2003 - MARCUS ALLEN


Raiders running back, 1982-92; NFL veteran, 1982-97

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 3, 2003...The 10th player selected in the 1982 NFL Draft by the Raiders...Played 16 NFL seasons, including 11 with the Los Angeles Raiders...Gained 12,243 yards rushing, 5,411 yards receiving and scored 144 touchdowns...Began pro career as the NFL Rookie of the Year and ended as the league's all-time rushing touchdown leader...During his 11 seasons with the Raiders, named to the Pro Bowl five times and added a sixth appearance in 1993 as a member of the Kansas City Chiefs...Raiders leading rusher seven consecutive years from 1982-88...Led the Raiders in receptions with 51 in 1987...Named MVP in Super Bowl XVIII when the Raiders defeated Washington 38-9 after rushing for 191 yards and scoring two touchdowns, one a then-Super Bowl record 74-yard run...1985 NFL MVP after leading the league with 1,759 rushing yards on 380 carries for a 4.6 yards per carry average and 11 touchdowns...Added 67 receptions for 555 yards and three touchdowns...In 1995, made NFL history when he became the first player in league history to rush for more than 10,000 yards and catch passes for 5,000 more...Completed 12 of 27 passes for 282 yards and six touchdowns during his career...In 16 career playoff games, carried the ball 267 times for 1,347 yards and 11 touchdowns, averaging 5.0 yards per carry...Also added 53 catches for 530 yards and two receiving touchdowns...At the time of his retirement following the 1997 season, held the single-season record for most rushing and receiving yards combined (2,314), ranked second in consecutive 100-yard games and was third in career-combined yardage...1981 Heisman Trophy winner while at USC after rushing for 2,342 yards.

2003 - JAMES LOFTON

Raiders wide receiver, 1987-88; NFL veteran, 1978-93

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 3, 2003...Played two seasons for the Raiders after being acquired by trade in 1987...Entered NFL as No. 1 draft pick of Green Bay in 1978 and spent nine seasons with Packers...Later spent four seasons with the Buffalo Bills and split time playing for the L.A. Rams and Philadelphia Eagles in final NFL season...In 16 seasons, caught 764 passes for 14,004 yards — an 18.3-yard average per catch — and 76 total touchdowns...His career reception yardage mark was an NFL-best at the time of his retirement, while his 43 games with 100 or more yards receiving ranked third...Recorded more than 50 catches in a season nine times...First NFL player to score a touchdown in 1970s, 1980s and 1990s...Named first- or second-team All-Pro four times, All-NFC three times and selected to play in eight Pro Bowls...In 1991, at age 35, became the oldest player in league history to post 1,000 receiving yards in a season and recorded a career single-game best 220 receiving yards against Cincinnati...In 13 playoff game appearances, caught 41 passes for 759 yards and eight touchdowns, including a seven-reception game in Super Bowl XXVI...In three of those playoff games, recorded 100-yard plus performances...Won NCAA long jump title as a senior at Stanford...Coached Raiders wide receivers in 2008 after serving in same capacity for San Diego...Has also served as an analyst for NFL games on radio for Westwood One and television for CBS.



2004 - BOB BROWN

Raiders tackle, 1971-73; NFL veteran, 1964-73

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 8, 2004...Nicknamed "The Boomer," played 10 pro seasons, his final three with the Raiders...First-round draft pick (second overall) in the 1964 Draft by the Philadelphia Eagles...Participated in 126 games in pro career...Named first-team All-NFL seven times, second-team twice...Earned NFL/NFC Offensive Lineman of the Year honors three times...Elected to six Pro Bowls — three with Eagles, two with Rams and one with Raiders...Named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1960s...All-NFL seven of his 10 seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles (1964-68), L.A. Rams (1969-70) and Oakland Raiders (1971-73)...In 1969, after five consecutive all-league seasons with the Eagles, was traded to Los Angeles and that year the Rams offensive line set an NFL record for protecting the passer...All-America guard at Nebraska, was also drafted in the first round by the AFL's Denver Broncos in 1964...Voted college football's Lineman of the Year in 1963 by the Washington, D.C. Touchdown Club.



2006 - JOHN MADDEN


Raiders Head Coach/Assistant Coach, 1967-78

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 5, 2006...Began pro coaching career in 1967 as Oakland Raiders linebackers coach before being named Raiders head coach in 1969 at age 32, when he became youngest head coach in the American Football League...Posted a regular season record of 103 wins, 32 losses and seven ties, while guiding Raiders to seven Western Division titles, including five in a row from 1972 to 1976...Under Madden, Raiders made eight playoff appearances with postseason record of 9-7 to amass a 112-39-7 career coaching record...Completed 10-year coaching career with .759 winning percentage during regular season to rank highest among coaches with 100 career victories...Only Hall of Fame coaches George Halas and Curly Lambeau had reached 100 career wins at an earlier age...AFL Coach of the Year in 1969 after leading Raiders to 12-1-1 record and AFL Western Division title...Under Madden, Oakland never suffered losing record...Silver and Black recorded 10 or more victories six times in 10 seasons...Team won 17 straight games between 1976-77 seasons, one short of NFL record for consecutive wins at the

time, including 13-1 record in 1976 capped by 32-14 win over the Minnesota Vikings in Super Bowl XI...Played at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo before being selected by Philadelphia Eagles in 1958 Draft, but a knee injury prematurely ended playing career...Assistant coach with Allan Hancock College, 1960-61; head coach with Allan Hancock College, 1962-63; defensive coordinator with San Diego State, 1964-66; assistant coach with Oakland Raiders, 1967-68, before becoming Silver and Black head coach in 1969...After retiring as head coach, continued with Raiders handling special projects through 1987...Leading pro football analyst for NBC, ABC's Monday Night Football, Fox and CBS...Retired from broadcasting in 2008.

2009 - ROD WOODSON


Raiders safety, 2002-03; NFL veteran 1987-2003



Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 8, 2009...Finished career with the Raiders from 2002-03, leading Oakland to the AFC title and appearance in Super Bowl XXXVII in his first year with the Silver and Black...Played in 238 games in 17 seasons with Pittsburgh, San Francisco, Baltimore and Oakland...Had 71 interceptions for NFL-record 1,483 career return yards...Added 2,362 yards on punt returns...Scored 17 career touchdowns, including record-setting 12 interception returns for scores, as well as one fumble return, two punt returns and two kickoff returns...Seven-time All-Pro choice (1989, 1990, 1991, 1992, 1993, 1994 and 2002)...One of five players named to the NFL's 75th Anniversary Team in 1994 while still active...Named to the NFL All-Decade Team for the 1990s...Named NFL Defensive Player of the Year in 1993...Earned All-Pro honors as a cornerback, kick returner and safety...Selected to play in 11 Pro Bowls...Tied for NFL lead in interceptions with eight in 2002 as member of the Raiders, with a 98-yard interception return for a TD at Denver, third longest in team history...Played in three Super Bowls with three different teams, including Super Bowl XXX with the Steelers, Super Bowl XXXV with the Ravens and Super Bowl XXXVII with the Raiders...All-American cornerback at Purdue while also seeing action at safety, running back and wide receiver on offense and kickoff and punt returner...10th overall pick by Pittsburgh in the 1987 NFL Draft...Raiders assistant coach in 2011 and 2015-17.

2010 - JERRY RICE

Raiders wide receiver, 2001-04; NFL veteran, 1985-2004



Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 7, 2010...Played 20 NFL seasons, including four with the Oakland Raiders from 2001-04, helping lead Oakland to two playoff berths, an AFC title and an appearance in Super Bowl XXXVII...Selected to play in 13 Pro Bowls...Named first-team All-Pro 11 consecutive seasons from 1986-96 and added second-team nod in 2002 as member of the Raiders...Played in 303 games in 20 seasons with San Francisco, Oakland and Seattle...Retired from professional football having established or tied 38 NFL career records at the time of his retirement, including for receptions (1,549), receiving yards (22,895), touchdown receptions (197), yards from scrimmage (23,540), all-purpose yards (23,546) and total touchdowns (208)...Set single-season NFL records in receiving yards (1,848) in 1995 and touchdown receptions (22) in 1987...Also set NFL marks with at least 50 receptions in 17 seasons, 1,000 receiving yards in 14 seasons, 76 games with at least 100 receiving yards, 13 consecutive games with at least

2013 - WARREN SAPP


Raiders defensive lineman, 2004-07; NFL veteran, 1995-2007

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 3, 2013... Played 13 NFL seasons, including his final four years with the Raiders... Saw action in 198 career games with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and Raiders... Totaled 96.5 career sacks, the second most by an interior lineman in NFL at the time of his retirement... Named first- or second-team All-Pro six times... Selected to seven straight Pro Bowls from 1997-2003... Named to All-Rookie Team in 1995 and part of two NFL All-Decade Teams (1990s and 2000s)... Named NFL Defensive Player of the Year in 1999 after posting 12.5 sacks and four forced fumbles... Set a Tampa Bay franchise record with 16.5 sacks in 2000 and reached double digits in three additional years — 1997 with 10.5 and 2006, as member of the Raiders, with 10... 2014 - RAY GUY

Raiders punter, 1973-86; NFL veteran, 1973-86



Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 2, 2014... First pure punter ever to enter the Hall of Fame... Revolutionized the position with his booming kicks, introduced the term "hang time" into the modern-day football lexicon and helped pioneer directional punting... Became the first punter selected in the first round of the NFL Draft when the Raiders chose him 23rd overall in 1973... Punted 14 seasons for the Raiders... Played in 207 consecutive games to finish career ranked third on the team's all-time participation list... Punted 1,049 times for 44,493 yards, averaging 42.4 yards per effort... Also placed 210 punts inside the 20-yard line which does not include totals from 1973-1975, as they are not available, and had only three punts blocked... Averaged more than 40 yards per punt in 13 of 14 seasons... Named as the punter for the NFL's 75th Anniversary Team in 1994 and selected to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 1970s... Also member of Super Bowl Silver Anniversary Team... Played in seven Pro Bowls (1973-78, 80) and was named first-team All-Pro three times (1976-78)... Also named second-team All-Pro in 1980... Posted a career-high 45.3-yard punting average on 69 punts as a rookie in 1973... Led the NFL in punting average three times: 1974 (42.2 avg.), 1975 (43.8 avg.) and 1977 (43.3 avg.)... Also finished second in the NFL in punting three times (1973, 78, 81)... Played on Raiders Super Bowl XI, XV and XVIII-winning teams... Played in 22 postseason games, averaging 42.2 yards on 111 punts... Had a career-long 77-yard punt against Denver in 1980... Handled kickoff duties and served as Raiders emergency quarterback... 2015 - TIM BROWN

Raiders wide receiver, 1988-2003; NFL veteran, 1988-2004

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 8, 2015... Played 17 NFL seasons, including first 16 campaigns with the Raiders... Joined Raiders as the sixth player selected in the 1988 NFL Draft after winning the Heisman Trophy at Notre Dame... Finished career as the most decorated receiver in Raiders history, setting franchise records with 1,070 receptions for 14,734 yards and 99 touchdowns... Ended Raiders career having played second-most seasons (16) and games played (240) in franchise annals... Also set Raiders record with 3,272 yards and three touchdowns on punt returns and 14,924 total yards from scrimmage... Racked up 19,443 combined net yards as a Raider... Topped 1,000 yards receiving in a season nine straight times from 1993-2001, and posted four of the top five seasons for receiving yardage in franchise history... Career totals during 16 seasons

with Raiders and final NFL campaign in 2004 with Tampa Bay Buccaneers include 1,094 catches for 14,934 yards and 100 touchdowns... Reception total ranked third in NFL history and yardage mark was second in league record book... Punt return yardage total of 3,320 is sixth in league history at time of his retirement... First player in NFL history to record at least 75 receptions in 10 straight seasons (1993-2002)... Posted 11 seasons with 50-or-more receptions and recorded a reception in 179 straight games from 1993-2004... Averaged 87 catches and 1,191 yards per season from 1993-2002... Also posted more yards after the catch than any other NFL receiver from 1992-2004 with 4,475... Selected to play in nine Pro Bowls, including five straight from 1993-97... Named All-Pro in 1988... Earned first-team All-AFC honors six times — once as a kick returner, once as a punt returner, and four times at wide receiver... In 1997, set franchise single-season records with 104 catches for 1,408 yards... Broke Gayle Sayers' NFL record for total yardage by a rookie in 1988, racking up 2,317 all-purpose yards (725 rec., 50 rush., 1,098 KR, 444 PR)... Six-time Commitment to Excellence Award recipient... Named to NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1990s... Led Raiders to three-straight AFC West titles from 2000-02... Started at wide receiver for Raiders in Super Bowl XXXVII.



2015 - RON WOLF


Raiders Personnel Executive/Contributor, 1963-74, 1979-89; AFL/NFL veteran, 1963-2001

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 8, 2015... Top NFL personnel executive during career that spanned five decades... Teamed up with Al Davis to build Raiders into a dominant franchise... In 23 seasons over two stints with the Silver and Black, helped Raiders claim 10 division titles, play in eight AFL/AFC Championship Games and three Super Bowls, including victories in Super Bowls XV and XVIII... Part of a scouting process that saw the Raiders draft eight future Hall of Famers — Gene Upshaw, Fred Biletnikoff, Art Shell, Ray Guy, Dave Casper, Howie Long, Marcus Allen and Tim Brown... First joined Raiders as a scout in 1963... Joined Al Davis, who was named commissioner, in the American Football League office in 1966, but returned just months later when the AFL-NFL merger was announced... Helped build team that won the AFL title and appeared in Super Bowl II after the 1967 season... Became general manager of the expansion Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1976 at age 37, building the foundation for a franchise that reached the NFC Championship Game in just

its fourth season... Returned to Raiders in 1979 and was part of a team that made five playoff appearances and won two Super Bowl titles in first seven seasons back with franchise... Joined New York Jets as personnel director in 1990... Named executive vice president/general manager of the Green Bay Packers late in the 1991 season... In 1995, helped Packers claim first division title in 23 years... Helped lead the Packers to three straight NFC Central titles and back-to-back appearances in the Super Bowl, including a Super Bowl XXXI victory following the 1996 season.

2016 - KEN STABLER

Raiders quarterback, 1970-79; NFL veteran, 1970-1984



Inducted posthumously into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 6, 2016... Played 15 NFL seasons, including first 10 campaigns with the Raiders... Nicknamed "The Snake," joined Raiders as a second-round draft pick (52nd overall) out of Alabama in 1968... Spent first two seasons on the Raiders' inactive/reserve squad before seeing first game action in 1970... In 10 seasons in Oakland, was named All-Pro twice, All-AFC three times and was selected to play in four Pro Bowls... Retired as the franchise's career leader in passing attempts (2,481), completions (1,486), yards (19,078), completion percentage (59.9) and touchdowns (150)... Named to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 1970s... Career totals include 184 games played with 146 starts, 2,270 completions on 3,793 attempts, 27,938 passing yards and 194 touchdowns... Became starting quarterback in 1973 and led Raiders to the first of five straight AFC Championship Game appearances... Also led Raiders to seven straight winning seasons and a 69-26-1 regular season record as a starter... Three-time recipient of the Gorman Award (1973, 1974 and 1976)... Named Associated Press NFL Most Valuable Player in 1974 after passing for 2,469 yards and an NFL-best 26 touchdowns... Named AFC Player of the Year in 1976 after leading the NFL in passing with 194 completions for 2,737 yards and a league-high 27 touchdowns while piloting Raiders to their first World Championship of Professional Football with win in Super Bowl XI... Also led the NFL with a 66.7 completion percentage and set a franchise record with a 103.4 passer rating... Garnered Pro Bowl honors in back-to-back seasons twice (1973 and 1974, 1976 and 1977)... Played in 13 career playoff games with 12 starts... Started 11 playoff games with the Silver and Black, posting a 7-4 record as a starter... Totaled 2,398 passing yards with 19 touchdowns in playoff contests and set an NFL record by recording a touchdown pass in 10 consecutive postseason games... Traded to Houston in 1980 and spent the final five seasons of his career with the Oilers (1980-81) and New Orleans (1982-84)... Following retirement, served as a color commentator on NFL broadcasts for CBS and on radio for Alabama football games.



2018 - RANDY MOSS

Raiders wide receiver, 2005-06; NFL veteran, 1998-2012

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 4, 2018... Played 14 NFL seasons, including the 2005 and 2006 campaigns with the Raiders... Saw action in 218 career games for Minnesota (1998-2004; 2010), Oakland (2005-06), New England (2007-10), Tennessee (2010) and San Francisco (2012)... Totaled 982 career receptions for 15,292 yards and 156 TDs... Career receiving yards and TDs ranked third and fourth, respectively, in NFL history at the time of his retirement... Named Associated Press Offensive Rookie of the Year after setting an NFL rookie record with 17 TDs for Minnesota in 1998... Acquired by the Raiders via trade in 2005... In two years with Oakland, played in 29 games and recorded 102 receptions for 1,558 yards and 11 TDs... Set the NFL single-season record for TD receptions with 23 with New England in 2007... Named to NFL All-Decade Team for the 2000s... Selected to play in six Pro Bowls and named first-team All-Pro four times, All-NFC five times... Caught 10 or more TD passes in a season nine times and had 10 seasons with

1,000 yards receiving, including 1,005 yards receiving, eight touchdowns for Raiders in 2005... Played two years at Marshall, totaling 174 receptions for 3,529 yards and 54 TD... Scored a TD in every collegiate game he played... 1997 Biletnikoff Award winner... Finalist for the 1997 Heisman Trophy... Selected by the Vikings as the 21st overall pick in the 1998 NFL Draft... In 2016, joined ESPN as a studio analyst.







2021 - CHARLES WOODSON

Raiders cornerback, 1998-2005; Raiders safety, 2013-15; NFL veteran, 1998-2015



Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 8, 2021...Played 18 years in the NFL, including 11 seasons over two stints with the Raiders...Played in 254 career games with 251 starts, totaling 65 career interceptions to tie for fifth all-time...Became first player in NFL history to record at least 60 career interceptions and at least 20 career sacks...Joined fellow Raiders Pro Football Hall of Famer Marcus Allen as the only two players in history to win the Heisman Trophy, AP Rookie of the Year, AP Player of the Year and a Super Bowl during their career...Tied the NFL all-time record with 13 career defensive touchdowns...His 11 interceptions returned for touchdowns ranks second in NFL history...Named to the Pro Bowl nine times and was a four-time All-Pro selection...Named to the NFL All-Decade Team for the 2000s...Originally selected by the Raiders with the fourth overall pick in the 1998 NFL Draft after winning the Heisman Trophy at Michigan in 1997...Remains the last defensive player earn college football's top honor...Named AP Rookie of the Year in 1998...Selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first four NFL seasons...Led the Raiders to three straight AFC West titles from 2000-02 and an appearance in Super Bowl XXXVII...Signed by Green Bay as a free agent in 2006 and played seven seasons for the Packers...Named AP Defensive Player of the Year in 2009 after leading the NFL with nine interceptions and three interception returns for a touchdown...In 2010, started all 20 regular season and postseason contests in helping lead Green Bay to a win in Super Bowl XLV...Led the NFL in interceptions in both 2009 (nine) and 2011 (seven)...Re-joined the Raiders as a free agent in 2013 and started all 48 games over his final three seasons...Named to the Pro Bowl following his final season in 2015...Played in 17 career postseason games with 16 starts, totaling one interception, 15 passes defended, one sack, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery...One of two players in history to intercept a pass in 18 straight seasons...First player to record an interception return for a touchdown in six straight seasons (2006-11)...One of only three players to be selected All-Pro at cornerback, free safety and strong safety...Set Raiders franchise records for forced fumbles (18), passes defended (84) and set Packers franchise marks for interceptions returned for touchdowns (nine) and defensive touchdowns (10)...Earned AFC/NFC Defensive Player of the Month honors five times...Recipient of the 2015 Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award.



2022 - CLIFF BRANCH

Raiders wide receiver, 1972-85; NFL veteran, 1972-85

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 6, 2022... Played 14 years in the NFL, all with the Raiders... Part of three Super Bowl Championship teams with the Silver and Black... Finished his career with 501 receptions for 8,685 yards and 67 touchdowns... Averaged a remarkable 17.3 yards per reception... Played in 183 career games with 150 starts as the NFL's premier deep threat... Named to four consecutive Pro Bowls (1974-77) and was named All-Pro in three straight years (1974-76)... Excelled in the postseason, playing in 22 games with 18 starts and retiring as the NFL's all-time leader with 73 catches and 1,289 yards in the playoffs... Averaged 17.7 yards per catch in the postseason... In three Super Bowl games, totaled 14 catches for 181 yards and three touchdowns... Recorded two touchdown receptions in the win over Philadelphia in Super Bowl XV... Totaled six catches for 94 yards and one touchdown as the Raiders posted a 38-9 rout of Washington in Super Bowl XVIII... In 88 games against AFC West foes, totaled 228 receptions for 3,984 yards and 27 touchdowns... Joined the Raiders as a fourth-round draft pick (98th overall) out of Colorado, where he also ran track... Set an NCAA championship meet record in the 100 meters with a time of 10.0 seconds in 1972.

2022 - RICHARD SEYMOUR

Raiders defensive tackle, 2009-12; NFL veteran, 2001-12

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 6, 2022... Played 12 seasons in the NFL, including his final four years with the Raiders after playing eight seasons in New England... Joined the Raiders via trade just prior to the 2009 season... Played in 164 career games with 157 starts, totaling 57.5 sacks, 498 tackles (326 solo), eight fumble recoveries, four forced fumbles and 91 tackles for loss... Also recorded 39 passes defensed, two interceptions and returned one fumble for a touchdown... A seven-time Pro Bowl selection, including five straight selections from 2002-06... Earned three-straight All-Pro selections from 2003-05... Named All-Pro at both defensive end and defensive tackle... Helped lead New England to three Super Bowl Championships in four seasons from 2001-04... Played in four AFC Championship Games and four Super Bowls... Recorded a career-high eight sacks in both 2003 and 2008... Played in 53 games with 52 starts in four seasons with the Raiders... Named to two Pro Bowls with the Silver and Black, earning honors in 2010 and 2011... Totaled 18.5 sacks, 139 tackles (101) and 27 tackles for loss... 

Sept. 9—Raiders make Frank Youell debut in Oakland, fall to New York Titans, 28-17. Oct. 16—Marty Feldman fired, Rod Conkright named head coach.

1963

Jan. 19—Al Davis named head coach and general manager of Raiders. Feb. 8—Dallas Texans announce move of franchise to Kansas City, becoming the Chiefs. March 28—New York Titans sold to group headed by David (Sonny) Werblin; club becomes the Jets. May 11—AFL allows Oakland and New York to select players from other franchises to provide more competitive balance. Dec. 22—Raiders down Houston, 52-49, to finish one game out of the playoffs with a 10-4-0 record, first winning season in club history. 1966

April 8—Al Davis, general manager and head coach of the Raiders, named second Commissioner of American Football League, succeeding Joe Foss. John Rauch hired as Raiders head coach. June 8—American Football League and National Football League agree to an alliance that includes common draft and championship game. July 25—Al Davis resigns as league commissioner. Milt Woodard appointed president of the American Football League. Davis rejoins Raiders as managing general partner. Sept. 18—Raiders open 54,000-seat Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum, against Kansas City Chiefs.

1967

Jan. 15—First World Championship Game played at Los Angeles. NFL Champion Green Bay Packers pull away from AFL champion Kansas City in second half to win, 35-10. Jan. 21—AFL All-Star Game held in Oakland. East posts first series win, 30-23. March 14-15—First AFL-NFL common draft held, Raiders select Texas A&I guard Gene Upshaw in the first round. May 24—Cincinnati award AFL expansion franchise. Aug.-Sept.—First preseason games between AFL and NFL held, including Sept. 3 meeting between Raiders and San Francisco 49ers. Dec. 24—Raiders finish season with 13-1 mark, best record in AFL history. Dec. 31—Raiders rout Houston, 40-7, to win AFL Championship. QB Daryle Lamonica named AFL MVP.

1968

Jan. 14—In Super Bowl II, Green Bay pulls away from AFL Champion Raiders to win, 33-14. Jan. 30-31—Second AFL-NFL common draft held, Raiders select Tennessee State QB Eldridge Dickey in the first round and Alabama quarterback Ken Stabler in the second. Nov. 17—"Heidi" becomes part of sports vocabulary when final minutes of Raiders' 43-32 comeback win over New York are cut off to permit television special to begin on time. Viewers unaware that Raiders scored two late touchdowns to win, then voice headline-grabbing displeasure at NBC. Dec. 22—Raiders wallop visiting Kansas City, 41-6, to capture Western Division Playoff. Dec. 29—Raiders fall to New York Jets, 27-23, in AFL Championship at Shea Stadium before 62,627.

1969

Jan. 28-29—1969 AFL Draft held, Raiders take Syracuse defensive end Art Thoms in the first round. Feb. 4—John Madden appointed Raiders head coach to replace John Rauch, who left to go with Buffalo Bills. May 10—Pro football realignment finds Cleveland Browns, Baltimore Colts and Pittsburgh Steelers moving to new American Football Conference as part of 1970 merger. Colts join Boston, Buffalo, Miami and New York in one division. Browns and Steelers join Houston and Cincinnati in another, and Kansas City, Denver, San Diego and Oakland remain in third division. June 1—Veteran AFL player personnel director and administrator Al LoCasale named executive assistant for Raiders. June 26—ABC acquires rights to televise NFL regular-season Monday night games. Oct. 19—Raiders quarterback Daryle Lamonica sets pro record with six touchdown passes in first half to direct 50-21 win over Buffalo. Oct. 26—Raiders defeat San Diego, 24-12, to equal AFL record of unbeaten games at 15. Dec. 13—Raiders beat Kansas City, 10-6, in regular season finale and win record-tying third straight AFL Western Division title. Dec. 21—Raiders win playoff, set club scoring mark in 56-7 win over Houston. QB Daryle Lamonica named AFL MVP (UPI, The Sporting News) for the second time in three years.

1970

Jan. 4—Raiders bow to Kansas City, 17-7, in AFL Championship before record Coliseum crowd of 54,544. March 16-21—Pro football owners meet in Honolulu. Jason Horowitz returns for his third season as radio play-by-play announcer for the Silver and Black. Horowitz will again be joined on the call for all Raiders games this season by former All-Pro tackle Lincoln Kennedy, who starred for the Silver and Black from 1996-2003, where he anchored the offensive line that captured three straight AFC West titles (200, 2001, and 2002) and played in Super Bowl XXXVII.

Horowitz has most recently called Army Football games for CBS Sports Network and has been the lead studio anchor of Westwood One's NCAA Football and Basketball coverage, a role he held since 2009. His additional work with Westwood One includes NCAA tournaments and Final Four games since 2014 and various shows on SiriusXM NFL Radio and ESPNU over the past 13 years. Horowitz's work has also included coverage of Super Bowls, Olympic Games and Final Four Games. He has also called FCS Championship Games and hosted NFL Drafts.

Kennedy, moved to the booth to handle color analyst duties in 2018 after serving as Raiders Radio sideline reporter for four seasons. Prior to joining the Raiders Radio Network broadcast, Kennedy hosted a national radio show on Fox Sports Radio, was on the NFL Network for two years and served as a track reporter during NASCAR races. Kennedy has also made numerous appearances on both the large and small screen. An All-American at the University of Washington, Kennedy was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2015.

Hosts/analysts of the Raiders Radio pregame and postgame shows are JT The Brick and Eric Allen.

JT The Brick, in his fourth decade with the Raiders, hosts his popular show on Raider Nation Radio 920 AM and is a regular on a number of Raiders media platforms.

Allen spent the last four of his 14 NFL seasons with the Raiders, where he played in 58 games and picked off 15 passes for 256 yards, scored three defensive touchdowns and helped the Silver and Black win the AFC West in 2000 and 2001. Over his NFL career, Allen recorded 54 interceptions, nine defensive touchdowns and played in six NFL Pro Bowls.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS

The Las Vegas Raiders Community Relations Department strives to enrich the community and enhance the lives of others through outreach and engagement, employee community service and charitable giving. During the 2023 season, these efforts impacted over 6,000 people, 424 nonprofit organizations and provided almost 17,000 meals in Nevada. Additionally, 95 players have made 306 total appearances supporting 33 Raiders community programs and events.

In support of Super Bowl LVIII, the Raiders amplified 35 NFL community events including 38 appearances by Raiders players, Alumni, Raiderettes, Raider Rusher and Raiders Executives. Additionally, the Raiders contributed through corporate giving investments and donated 10 Super Bowl tickets to 5 deserving individuals who have made a lasting impact in the Las Vegas community.

GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

The Government Relations Department works to engage government stakeholders around Raiders' strategic business priorities. We engage elected and appointed officials on relevant policy matters at the local and state levels. We monitor legislation, advocate for fair policy on matters that impact our business, conduct public testimony, and maintain knowledge of current political dynamics.



FOOTBALL DEVELOPMENT

The Raiders celebrate youth and high school football year-round through camps, activities, and engaging experiences. Our goal as a department is to engage youth at every stage of the game to develop them as great people on and off the field. Our programs inspire character, leadership, resilience, and teamwork along with key life skills that transfer from the huddle to the classroom and beyond.

Since 2018, the Raiders have conducted 350 Raiders Junior Training Camps in Nevada serving over 55,000 youth. Raiders Junior Training Camps feature the education and recreational benefits of football in a safe and fun environment for youth regardless of age, gender, ability, or experience.

In celebration of “Silver State” high school football the Raiders recognized both tackle and flag football through Education Leadership Integrity Teamwork Equality programming. In 2023, the Raiders contributed \$350,000 to high school programs through equipment donations, coach of the week awards, game of the week awards and team meals. Through partnership with the Nevada Interscholastic Activities Association, football championships are presented by the Raiders.

In 2023, the NFL and the National Federation of State High School Associations, the Raiders were one of seven NFL clubs to pilot the High School Officiating Crew of the Month recognizing high school football officials during the 2023 football season.



RAIDERS IN THE COMMUNITY



The Raiders Foundation is the charitable arm of the Las Vegas Raiders. The Foundation uplifts the community by supporting military members and veterans, health and wellness initiatives, and youth development efforts, driven by a legacy and unwavering commitment to advance social justice, equity, diversity, and inclusion in everything we do.



Primarily focusing its efforts in Nevada, the Raiders Foundation works with community partners to honor military, veterans and their families through programs which provide immediate and ongoing support; advance the wellbeing of our community through initiatives that positively impact social determinants of health; and support programs which improve outcomes for children and encourage youth to be active and healthy.

In the 2023 season, the Raiders Foundation donated more than \$3,000,000 to nearly 100 organizations serving those in need. This includes \$400,000 in social justice grants, \$100,000 to provide thousands of holiday meals, and more.

TRAINING CAMP 2024: Training Camp will be hosted at Jack Hammett Sports Complex, located at 2750 Fairview Rd, Costa Mesa, CA 92626.

TRAINING CAMP CREDENTIALS: Media requesting access to Training Camp should contact Raiders Communications Manager Cam Russo (crusso@raiders.com). Credential requests must be received 72 hours in advance of the desired date to attend.

MEDIA AVAILABILITY: Press conferences for all coaches, players and other personnel will be executed in person and potentially via video conference or conference call. Video of press conferences will be provided to local television and web-based outlets regularly. A media advisory with times and dates will be distributed to media via email.

GAME CREDENTIAL REQUESTS: Credential requests for home games will be honored only for working media on specific assignment for a recognized news or sports organization. Credentials will not be issued to freelance writers or photographers. All single-game requests must be received by 5 p.m. (PT) (crusso@raiders.com) on the Monday prior to each Sunday home game. All full-season and single-game credential requests must be submitted by an editor or sports director.

PARKING: Every effort will be made to accommodate requests for parking passes, but due to limited space, parking cannot be provided for all credentialed media. Television trucks that provide satellite, uplink or microwave functions will need to make prior arrangements with the Raiders Communications department.

MEDIA WILL CALL: Media Will Call is located at the Southwest entry gate of Allegiant Stadium, closest to Parking Lots A and K on Polaris Ave. Each member of the media must pick up their own individual credential and present corresponding photo identification. Media will call opens four hours prior to the scheduled kickoff and stays open until the end of the first quarter.

MEDIA ENTRANCE: The media entrance is clearly marked and located at the Southwest entry gate of Allegiant Stadium. Media credentials will not be honored at any other gate. All media must check in at the media entrance before entering Allegiant Stadium. For security purposes, individuals and their belongings will be searched upon entry into the stadium. Photographers and videographers can retrieve appropriate sideline vests at the media entrance.

POOL REPORTER: As assigned by the Professional Football Writers of America (PFWA), the Las Vegas pool reporter for the 2024 season is Case Keefer of the Las Vegas Sun.

ON-FIELD AND POSTGAME INTERVIEWS: On-field postgame interviews will be accommodated in accordance with the NFL media policy.

INTERVIEW REQUESTS: The Raiders respectfully ask that all interview requests, for any member of the organization, be submitted through the team's Communications department. Players, coaches, executives or other team personnel should never be contacted by media directly by telephone, email, or via social media. Interview requests for Owner Mark Davis, General Manager Tom Telesco, Head Coach Antonio Pierce and other club executives should be directed to Will Kiss (wkiss@raiders.com). Antonio Pierce is available to media before most practices as well as following each game. He will conduct a weekly press conference, typically on Mondays, during the regular season.

Interview requests for assistant coaches should be directed through the Raiders Communications department. Those requesting interviews with Raiders Coordinators or Assistant Coaches should contact FootballCommunications@raiders.com.

Other assistant coaches will be made available in accordance with the NFL media policy. Individual interview requests will also be considered, provided the request is made at least 24 hours in advance to the Raiders Communications department. During a typical regular-season Sunday game week, coordinators are only available on Thursdays, while other assistants are only available Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. Following games, Pierce is the only coach available for comment.

All player one-on-one requests should be made through the Raiders Communications department. With respect to all players, the Raiders will make them available to accredited media in accordance with the NFL's media policy.

Interview requests for Raiders Alumni, the team's Community, Foundation initiatives and Raiderettes should be directed to RaidersPR@raiders.com.

PRACTICE ACCESS & PHOTOGRAPHY/VIDEOGRAPHY GUIDELINES: Accredited members of the media that regularly cover the NFL are welcome to attend the first 30 minutes, or until the "team" portion, of regular-season practices. Photography and videography are allowed, in general, during this window. The team reserves the right to limit photography to certain periods due to competitive-advantage reasons. During any practice open to the media, media should stand at a safe distance and hold all belongings, including bags and video cameras. Tripods are not allowed on the field during practice, for safety reasons.

Tailored to be a one-stop shop for all media members, the Raiders' home for online media will provide standard media guide information, weekly game releases, in-game player tracking features, in addition to statistical reports generated directly from NFL GSIS. PRACTICE REPORTING POLICY: Blogging and tweeting from offseason, training camp and regular-season practices are permitted for practices that are open to the public. For all practices that are closed to the public, blogging and tweeting are permitted only within the designated viewing window. Consistent with Super Bowl reporting protocol for practices, the following are general reporting policies for all media, including blogging and tweeting:

- Media may note which players are practicing as well as those who are not.
- Media may report non-strategy and non-game plan observations.
- Not permitted is any reference to plays run or game strategy. This includes describing formations, personnel groupings (i.e., composition of offensive line) or non-conventional (i.e., "trick") plays.
- Not permitted is the reporting of which players are practicing with individual units (goal line offense, nickel/ dime defense, etc.)
- Not permitted is the reporting of practice injuries until the team has provided an official update.
- Access to the head coach will be provided for comments and injury updates.
- Not permitted is quoting, paraphrasing or reporting comments made by coaches, players or team personnel during a practice session.
- Not permitted are any photo/video transmissions after the designated shooting period has closed.
- Not permitted are wide-view photos/videos of formations and/or personnel groupings (shots must be tightly focused on the player/ball.)
- Not permitted is any audio of quarterback cadence, keywords, audibles, etc.
- All cell phones must be turned to "silent" or "vibrate" mode for practice and all press conferences.
